Dist. 63 Approves Easement for Ballard Park Drainage

## TRAILER PARK SITE PURCHASE COMPLETED

At Tuesday night's meeting of the Park Board, Attorney Gabe Berrafato reported that purchase plans for the trailer park site have been completed. The Gemco Co., who are planning a Jewel-Osco-Turnstyle type shopping complex on the Milwaukee Avenue site are awaiting approval of their final construction plans, and as soon as they are received, groundbreaking will take place.

Attorney Berrafato also stated that he had met with officials of School district 63 regarding the acquiring of easement property for storm water drainage at the Ballard Park complex. A resolution was passed by district 63 and approval was given to the Park district for the use of this easement property.

Grading work and the razing of the existing building on the property in the Betty-Chester area has been started. The Fire Department has requested the use of the house on the property for training programs for firemen. They have assured the Park district that no actual burning of property will take place.

Development of the Little Tam golf course has started this week. Four new greens and five new tees are needed to complete the nine-hole golf course. Since 20,000 yards of fill will be required, prices are being checked on this at the present time.

Groundbreaking ceremonies took place on Saturday, Oct. 10 for the Ballard Park Recreation complex. Removal of the numerous trees on the property has been started. The trees were checked by a landscaper and 33 of them were found to either be dead or hollow and decayed in the interior. The ice skating rink will be 85' x 185' and will have a skater capacity of 750.

The rink, when completed will

## Illinois Constitution 1970 - The Bill of Rights

One of the stated purposes of the Sixth Illinois Constitutional Convention was to provide for greater protection of individual rights. Their intent was in great measure fulfilled in the Illinois Constitution 1970 Bill of Rights.

The Convention voted to retain intact the sections pertaining to Inherent and Inalienable Rights, Religious Freedom, Freedom of Speech, Right to Assemble and Petition, Rights After Indictment, Bail and Habeas Corpus, Self-Incrimination and Double Jeopardy, Ex Post Facto Laws and Impairing Contracts, and the Quartering of Soldiers as stated in the 1870 document. The sections covering the right to free elections and the subordination of the military were retained but transferred to the articles covering Suffrage and Elections and the Militia, respectively.

The committee assigned to develop the Bill of Rights under the able leadership of Elmer Gertz, was also assigned the responsibility for drafting the Preamble. To the 1870 Preamble the committee added as a goal for Illinois "to eliminate poverty and inequality; assure legal, social and economic justice; provide opportunity for the fullest development of the individual."

Many of the sections of the 1870 Bill of Rights were expanded or slightly modified. One section was reworded for clarity and modernization of language, one eliminated, and five new sections were added.

To the Section on Searches and Seizures, the Convention added what is probably the strongest provision in any State Constitution by adding protection for the individual against unreasonable "invasions of privacy or interceptions of communications by eavesdropping

devices or other means." This protection of the citizen against Big Brother was further strengthened by adding to the Right to Remedy and Justice the word "privacy" in addition to person, property, or reputation as remedies in the laws.

The Due Process and Equal Protection clause was retained but to it was added "nor be denied the equal protection of the laws" thus giving formal expression to a principle already well recognized and applied in the State.

Persons who are arrested for the commission of a crime shall, under the new Bill of Rights, be entitled to a prompt preliminary hearing to establish probable cause. This provision should act as a spur to the Illinois court system to reverse the present tendency to incarcerate individuals for an unreasonable number of months prior to determination of their guilt or innocence. In addition, a provision to prohibit the imprisonment of an individual due to failure to pay a fine providing he has been afforded adequate time to make payment, in installments, if necessary, has been added. Hopefully the disparity between the affluent and the poor who come before the law should be somewhat diminished under this new principle. In these provisions that deal with the rights of criminals, a most enlightened penal provision was added calling for penalties to be determined according to the seriousness of the offense and "with the object of restoring the offender to useful citizenship." The attitude of society and subsequently the penal system of incarceration as revenge perhaps will be changed to making rehabilitation of the offender the

penal systems primary goal. Trial by jury is a right retained as "inviolable" but the Convention deleted the clause dealing with trials by justices of the peace which was of doubtful validity since the adoption of the Judicial Article in 1964.

"These blessings cannot endure unless the people recognize their corresponding individual obligations and responsibilities" is now a part of the statement of Fundamental Principles, thus affirming the fact that citizens in a democracy not only have rights but must shoulder the responsibilities of citizenship.

The Right of Eminent Domain was changed to clarify and modernize the language leaving the intent intact, and the archaic section on Railroads contained in the 1870 Constitution was eliminated.

A new addition to the Bill of Rights was a prohibition of discrimination in employment and the sale of property. This section has perhaps the best self-executing provision of any State Constitution. These rights are enforceable without legislative action but the General Assembly is given the right to establish "reasonable exemptions" and provide additional remedies. The prohibition of discrimination in the sale and rental of housing is already the law of the land by U. S. Supreme Court decision. The reference to discrimination in employment has been constitutionalized as a statement of principle what has been State law for many years. A companion provision declares that "equal protection of the laws shall not be denied or abridged on account of sex." And in this same vein, a new section was added to prohibit discrimination against the handicapped in the sale or rental of property or in the hiring and promotion practices of any employer.

There are two controversial sections, the one on "individual dignity" which is new and the other on the "right to bear arms." The statement regarding the former is a "constitutional sermon condemning derogatory references to individuals and groups." The latter makes the right to bear arms "subject to the police power." The authors view this wording as granting rights not as considerable as some hope and others fear.

Finally, the Bill of Rights stipulates that the enumeration of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by individual citizens of the State.

To quote Elmer Gertz, Chairman of the Bill of Rights Committee "In a period of stress and strain, our proposed new Bill of Rights pays tribute to individual rights and extends them in a most heroic manner."

The League of Women Voters, a nonpartisan organization, after study and consensus of its members, urges registered voters to vote in favor of the adoption of the Illinois Constitution 1970.

## Dist. 64 Tax Referendum

The District 64 Board of Education adopted the annual budget for the 1970-71 school year on Monday night, Sept. 28, and scheduled a tax rate referendum for the Education Fund for Tuesday, December 1.

A rate increase of 35 cents per \$100 assessed valuation will be requested in the Dec. referendum. Projected deficit in the Education Fund at the end of the current school year is \$1,138,910.

The proposed increase of 35 cents will just barely keep the present deficit from getting larger, according to Board member Ronald Holmberg.

Present rate for the Education Fund is \$1.67. The requested increase would raise it to \$2.02. Ceiling for the Education Fund is \$3. The Board has approved levies for 1970 with the estimated total tax rate of \$2.465 per \$100 assessed valuation.

All Board members agreed that the need for the tax increase in the Education Fund was evident in the 1970-71 budget. There was a difference of opinion on timing of a referendum, with the majority believing that the referendum should be held as soon as possible.

The consensus of the Board was that, if the 1970-71 budget was adopted without a tax increase in the Education Fund, planning for the 1971-72 budget and educational program would be drastically affected. Factors which would affect the financial picture of the District, next spring, such as salary negotiations, state aid, non-public schools, would only compound the need, Mr. Holmberg said. The majority of the Board felt that not asking for the tax increase now would just forestall the inevitable.

## LWV Presents Slide Kit to Dist. 64

A color-slide kit on the non-political activities of the United Nations in the developmental nations, entitled "Development Is..." was recently presented to the Dist. 64 schools by the Park Ridge League of Women Voters.

"Development Is..." was prepared for the United Nations Association of the United States and the League of Women Voters' Education Fund in cooperation with the World Bank. The gift of this film-slide presentation to the school district is a part of the Park Ridge LWV's community project to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the founding of the United Nations.

School officials said the presentation will be used as supplemental resource material for social studies in junior high school and the 6th grade. "We appreciate the interest of the Park Ridge LWV in making this material available to our students," Dr. John Fletcher, curriculum director, said.

Arrangements for making the gift to Dist. 64 were made by Mrs. Edward J. Bradley, U.N. chairman for the LWV.

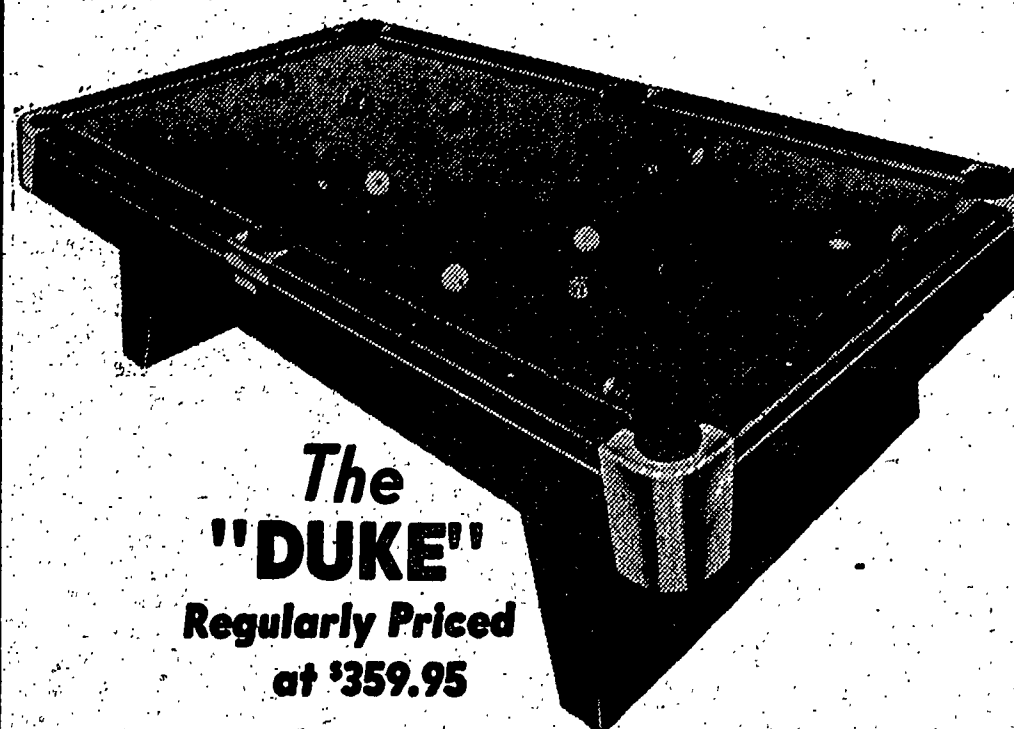

## LEGAL NOTICE

### AN ORDINANCE

REGULATING PARKING IN CERTAIN AREAS WITHIN THE VILLAGE OF NILES, COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS

WHEREAS, it has been determined that it is advisable to designate certain vehicular traffic lanes located in certain shopping areas within the Village of Niles, as fire lanes; and

WHEREAS, the owners, operators and managers of these certain shopping areas have agreed with the officials of the Village of Niles of the advisability of the fire lane designations.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Niles, Cook County, Illinois, as follows:

SECTION 1: That the following locations be and the same are hereafter designated as fire lanes:

(a) The vehicular traffic lane immediately adjacent to and running along the entire front of the shopping center, now known as "Dempster Shopping Center", located at Dempster and Greenwood, Niles, Illinois;

(b) The circular traffic lane immediately adjacent to and running along the entire front of the three apartment buildings, known as the Kingston Apartments, located at 8801-8809-8815 Golf Rd., Niles, Illinois.

SECTION 2: That parking of all vehicular traffic shall be and the same is hereafter prohibited in the vehicular traffic lanes hereinabove designated as fire lanes, in Section 1 of this ordinance.

SECTION 3: That the Director of Public Works be and the same is hereby authorized and directed to emplace signs as follows:

"NO PARKING FIRE LANE, VIOLATORS WILL BE TICKETED".

In the areas designated in Section 1 of this ordinance. Further, that the emplacement of these signs shall be so emplaced so as to be conspicuous and visible by operators of vehicular traffic within the areas designated in Section 1.

SECTION 4: That any person found guilty of violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined a minimum of THREE (\$3.00) DOLLARS to a maximum penalty of TWENTY-FIVE (\$25.00) DOLLARS. (Section #21-259-Penalty Section 21-373C)

SECTION 5: That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.

SECTION 6: That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

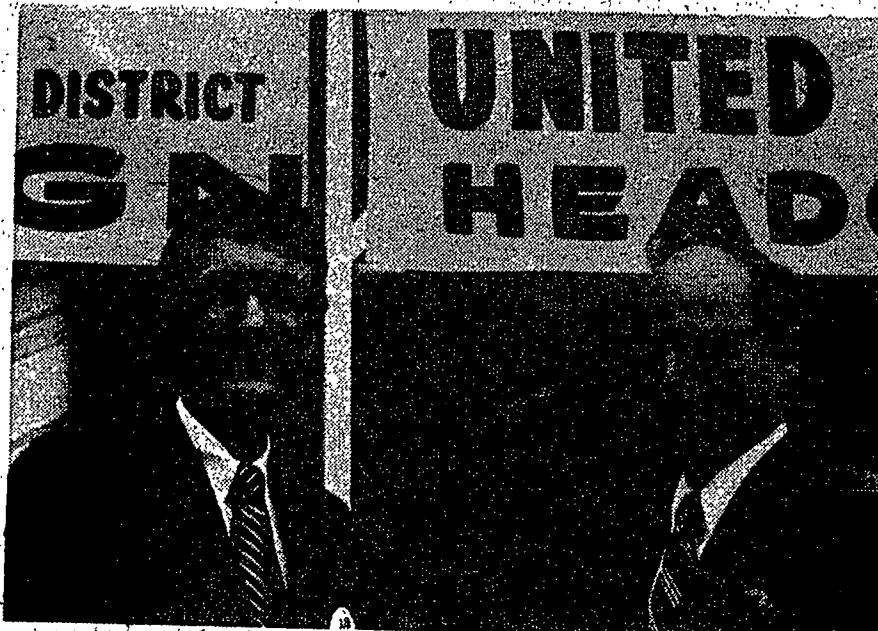

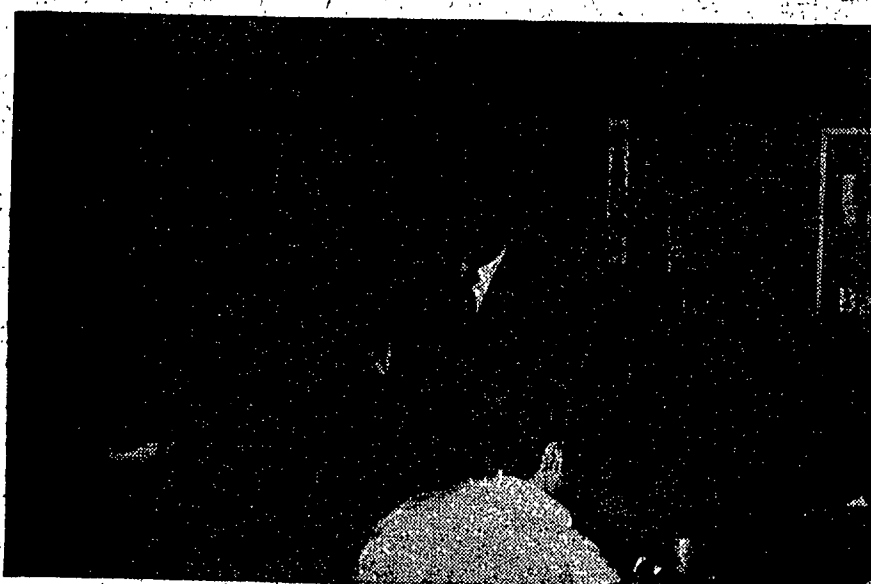

## Citizens for Acher

After trying unsuccessfully to get the matter straightened out by phone calls and letters, I re-registered again. County Clerk Barrett then sent me a new card



correctly listing me at my new address, but putting me in the wrong precinct. After Maggie re-registered and I re-registered for the third time, Mr. Barrett sent us both new voter registration cards finally listing our home address correctly and putting us in the right precinct. It's inconceivable that a simple change of address, which should have required only a few minutes, involved so much unnecessary time and effort over so many months," Acher says. "During the campaign, I've met hundreds of other persons who told me about similar experiences with the Cook county clerk."

But what happened to the Achers gave me personal knowledge about the office's poor quality of services and the serious need for change and improvement," according to Acher.

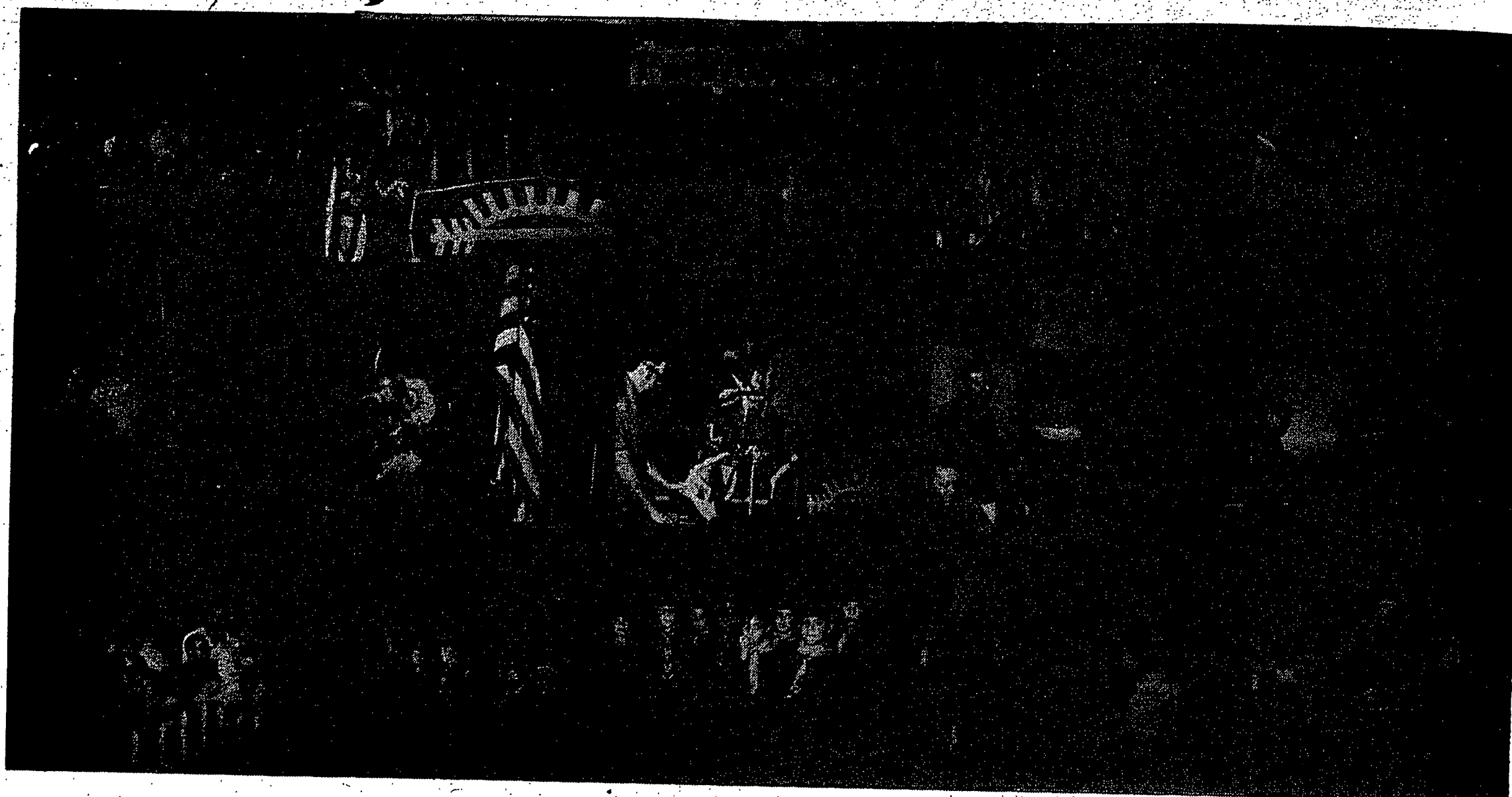

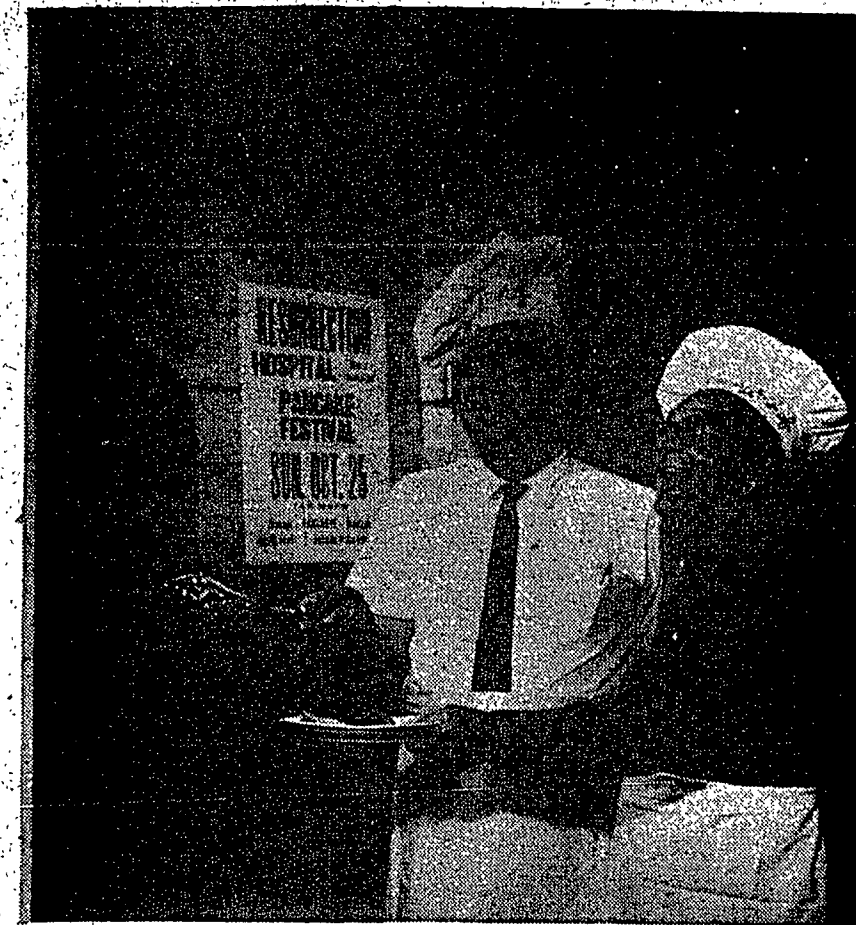

numerous other fundraising organizations. Currently she is the first vice president of the Morton Grove Women's club. She was formerly the chairman of the program and fine arts committees for that group.

Now, however, he must face even greater tax and price increases, with several thousand dollars less, since his earnings are based on a 40 hour week.

"This is a recession no matter how the GOP administration tries to color the facts. The Republicans have and are creating the worst economic crisis we have seen in many years. Government figures show that a family wage earner needs \$500 more now, just to meet expenses for his family, than he did when President Nixon took office 19 months ago. Between added taxes, higher cost of living and a loss of overtime salary, he earns about \$100 a week less. So what the GOP has done is push his family's standard of living down below what it was prior to Nixon's election. Mr. Suburbanite faces a financial dilemma which will result in extreme hardship to his family."

Mr. Blaise concluded his statements with, "When we discuss the real issues of this November campaign, let us do so realistically. ## Dist. 63 Educational Report

The second of East Maine School Dist. #63's educational reports was given Tuesday evening, Oct. 13, at its Board meeting. This is part of an on-going series of Educational Reports given to the School Board and community to inform them of District #63's total educational programs.

Mrs. Lenore Page, principal of Nelson School, presented a report on the Reading Retrieval action research project now underway in five of the district's elementary schools, Nathanson, Ballard, Melzer, Mark Twain, and Nelson. The retrieval system

is a method of rapidly ascertaining exactly what students do and do not know so that teachers may group and regroup pupils for learning. With the kind of continuous diagnosis and prescription that individualized instruction requires, new approaches to record keeping and planning are needed. The district's reading coordinators, several principals and many classroom teachers have prepared a handbook for teachers defining the various reading skills and suitable activities for each level of the child's reading development.

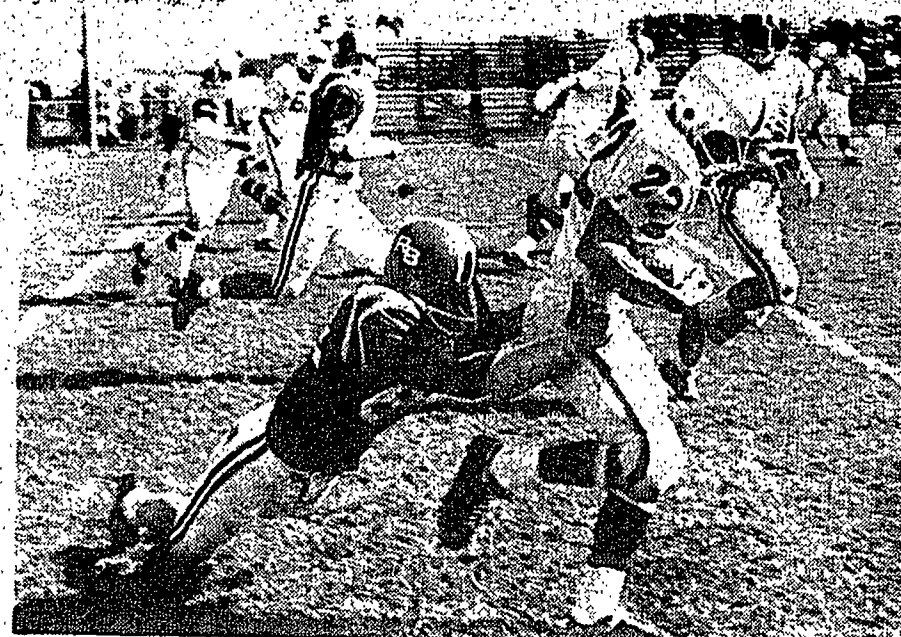

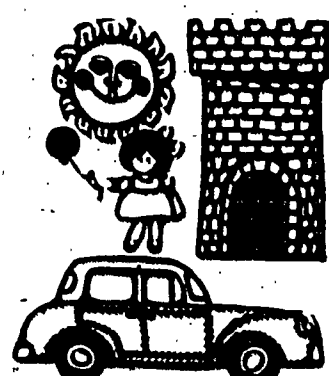
### Ski Time

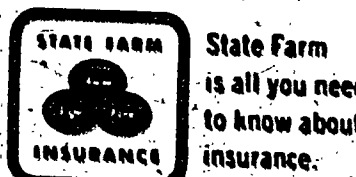

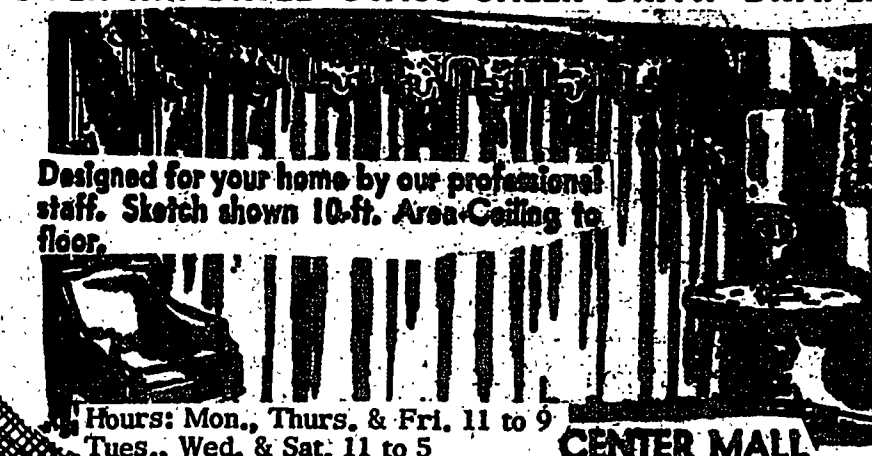

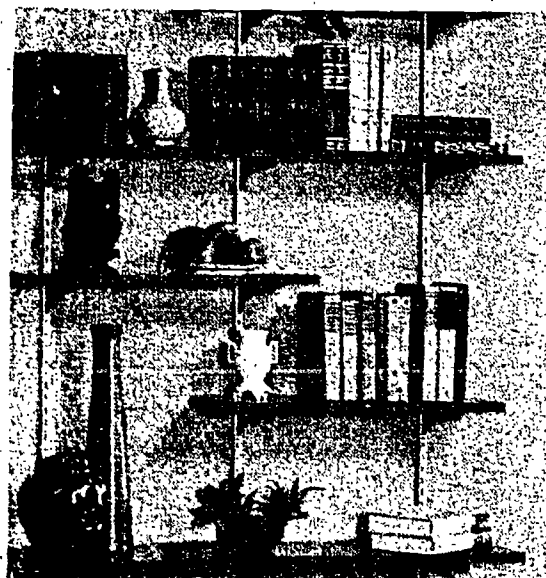
