They were passing around the pipe of hashish at a halloween party in Niles Friday night. When Niles police dropped in at 8048 Davis, they found 8 teen-agers sitting in a circle passing around a water-pipe which had the marijuana derivative inside it. One teen was beating a steady rhythm on some drums, while the puffing 8 were heading for never-never land.

We're writing about it in this column because it's time Mommas and Daddys from Niles and Morton Grove and East Maine should be made aware that what's happening today is happening to their children. The teens, according to police chief Whitey Emrikson, were mostly 14 and 15 year olds.

When the police went to the basement room where the party was, they said many of the youths were in a stupor. One police officer noted they were probably not even aware of their condition, but when they rose from their pipe-smoking positions, they moved almost in slow motion.

One teen went into convulsions and the fire department took him to the hospital. It was believed he had swallowed a piece of the hashish to hide it from the police.

The police rounded up 17 youths and took them to the police station where their parents were brought in. The large group moved to the courtroom and a police officer moderated a question-and-answer discussion, in which the parents openly questioned the teens about the party.

Since your children were probably not there, you undoubtedly wonder who the children are. Most of the students come from Maine East. One was from Notre Dame and one girl was from Marillac.

We note the names of the schools because we inquired last year of one Maine High school Board member who told us he was unaware of any narcotic activities at the school. While it may be true of his unawareness, there's no doubt the drug scene among the young is everywhere, and it's well we should recognize it. Actually, at Maine East the subject among school people is not being swept under the rug. At Monday night's PTC meeting it was reported local communities in the area are distributing a "Hot Line" booklet to parents and teens, acquainting them with drugs and their effects, and what can be done to aid a user.

While the subject is a heavy one, nevertheless, Chief Emrikson noted there's always some humor involved in police efforts. When Niles police arrived on the scene, Father Coleman from Notre Dame, who aids the police in community relations, was there. When one youth saw the police with the man with the collar, he swore at the police. Pointing to the Notre Dame principal's white collar, he said of Niles' finest, "These bastards will do anything."

If we were to give a "poor taste" award for the month of October, it would have to go to the people who concocted the idea for 2 endorsements for State senator candidate Allen Schefres. A press release from the candidate's headquarters had him being endorsed by Richard Rogala, Niles' Pueblo veteran and by a leader in the local Knights of Columbus chapter, Rogala, a fine young man who is now attending college in Michigan, was exploited by these political people in a style which should long have been considered unacceptable. Contrary to the expected result of such an endorsement, such patronizing efforts would make me hesitate to vote for a candidate. And to use a young man who's been thru so much, to get a few more votes from the natives, is a neanderthal way of thinking. Likewise, using the head of a religiously-oriented group for an endorsement, is the kind of hokey which demeans all concerned.

Simmons Wins Squeaker Over Lindquist

INCUMBENTS, JAFFE WIN LOCAL RACES

Unofficial totals in Tuesday's election were so confusing Wednesday morning in township headquarters of Democratic and Republican offices that the accuracy of totals must wait for an official count. Based on figures given to The Bugle by these headquarters, as well as cross-checking with local politicians, as well as other local and metropolitan newspapers, it can be assumed the vote figures are incomplete though the winners in Tuesday's elections can be determined.

In the state senate race in the Niles-Maine Township district, incumbent Republican William Carroll, Pickwick newspaper publisher in Park Ridge, defeated Democrat Alan Schefres, 47,068 to 43,772, with 2 Park Ridge precincts not reporting at press time. The approximate 3300 vote plurality was the lowest Carroll has received in all his bids for this office.

In the race for the State House of Representatives, incumbent Art Simmons, Republican from Skokie, just barely squeaked past Democrat Ken Lindquist, Maine West High

school teacher, to gain the third seat representing this district in Springfield. Incumbent Republican Robert Juckett, Park Ridge attorney, led all candidates in Maine Township with 42,745 votes and added 18,573.5 votes in Niles Township to regain his seat. The high vote-getter in the district was newcomer Democrat Aaron Jaffe, who received a total vote of 73,582.5, garnering 48,016.5 in his home township in Niles Township.

The most surprising race was the narrow victory of Art Simmons, the Republican incumbent from Skokie. He received a total of 55,599.5 votes, while Lindquist received 53,585.5 votes. Interestingly, Maine Township resident Lindquist beat Niles Township resident Simmons in Niles Township, 27,891.5 to 23,222.5 while losing in his own Maine Township 30,989 to 25,758.

In other races, U.S. Senate winner Adlai Stevenson III beat his opponent Smith 35,110 to 15,440 in Niles Township while losing in Maine Township 24,553 to 23,318.

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Illinois Constitution: 1970

(4TH IN A SERIES - LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS)

The question raised most often by citizens is "How will the new Constitution affect me as a taxpayer?" The proposed Revenue Article does not guarantee a reduction in taxes, but rather gives us a more flexible structure so that the taxes can be made fairer.

To consider the effect on the taxpayer, let's first look at the new Finance Article. This article provides for the budget-making procedure which is so important in protecting the taxpayers' money. The governor is charged to prepare a budget and submit it to the General Assembly at a time determined by law. Expenditures proposed cannot exceed funds estimated to be available. The article instructs the General Assembly to develop systems of accounting for local government and school districts in order to make comparison possible and to protect the public interest in local budget-making and reporting procedures. It recognizes the right to require government to maintain its accounts in a form which citizens can understand. In addition, it provides for the appointment by the General Assembly of an Auditor General to serve a ten year term. The Auditor General, responsible to the Legislature, will conduct audits of all public funds of the state thereby establishing a check of the Legislature on the Executive branch of state government.

The Revenue Article builds from the Finance Article. Convention members explain that they were able to give the citizens a more flexible revenue article because of the procedures planned down in the finance article.

What then does the Revenue Article say? First, it reverses the earlier articles provision allowing the General Assembly to levy only such taxes as permitted in the Constitution. Gone are the requirements that taxes be levied on hawkers and jugglers. The General Assembly will have power to raise revenue

except as limited by the Constitution which opens the door to a fairer system of taxation than we presently have.

In the area of non-property taxes (sales, franchise, etc.) the legislature may put taxpayers or objects of taxation into classes for tax purposes. It may make allowances and exemptions within any of the groups providing they are reasonable. This would mean that Illinois could have a true sales tax instead of a tax on the "occupation" of selling at retail and that such necessities of life as food and medicine could be exempt.

The 1870 Revenue Article has nothing to say about an income tax. The present income tax is based on a "privilege tax measured by income" and is a "flat rate" tax. The proposed 1970 Revenue Article prohibits a graduated income tax. The article provides that the State cannot use more than one income tax, and that the rate paid by corporations cannot exceed that paid by individuals by more than the present ratio of 8 to 5. Exemptions and credits are permitted however, thereby making the flat rate tax more equitable. This does not mean that a tax of 5% is automatic for individuals. The present rate is 2 1/2%. It means that corporate rates could be the same as individuals but never greater than the 8 to 5 RATIO. There is no limit on the income tax for limits have a way of being out-of-date and therefore targets to disregard. Since the old revenue article does not mention income taxes there are no limits nor ratios as guides for the Legislature NOW. Corporations will have individual rates low if the new Constitution is adopted since their income tax could be raised accordingly.

A second tax prohibited by the 1970 Constitution is a tax on personal property. Most citizens have long recognized this form of taxation to be inequitable and unfair. If the proposal to abolish personal property taxes on individuals passes Nov. 3 it will become a part of the new Constitution and cannot be reinstated. If not, the new Revenue Article outlines a phase-out plan for eliminating all personal property tax both on individuals and corporations by Jan. 1, 1979. This classification might take the form of household goods, cars, stocks and bonds, etc. Once classified each

class could be taxed differently or not at all.

Real property taxes are to be determined by the value of the property and by uniform rates except in those counties permitted to classify. Counties over 200,000 population of which there are seven in the state of Illinois would have the right to classify real property for tax purposes. Real property could be placed into such classes as industrial, commercial, residential, income-producing and non-income producing etc. Different rates could be used within each class but each class would have to be taxed uniformly. The Article establishes a ratio of 2 1/2 times as the difference between the highest and lowest classes. This proposal insures that special preferences would be limited in amount so that the tax burden could not be shifted to one class. The General Assembly would retain the right to place limitations on the classification practice and the courts would be the ultimate authority on whether classes are "reasonable."

Property of state, religious and charitable organizations could continue to be exempted from real property taxes as they are under our present Constitution. In addition, the General Assembly could grant home-stead exemptions or rent credits. This latter would affect the elderly who pay rent but who do not own a "homestead."

Of special interest to homeowners is a new protection against the sale of real property for non-payment of taxes. The proposal requires a court hearing before real property can be sold for non-payment or special assessments. All "occupants" must be given reasonable notice of the tax sale.

The present Constitution limits the State debt to \$250,000 unless authorized by referendum. To circumvent this restriction the state has set up various "authorities" who issue bonds at a much higher rate of interest and cost to the taxpayer than if these bonds were secured by the full faith and credit of the state. Under the proposed Revenue article, the state may go into debt for a specific purpose if authorized by a 3/5ths vote of all members of the General Assembly. This article specifically regulates the method by which this debt is to be repaid.

The proposed Revenue article is the best answer the Convention could give to fairness in taxation coupled with the need to leave room for taxes which may in the future be better than those we have now.

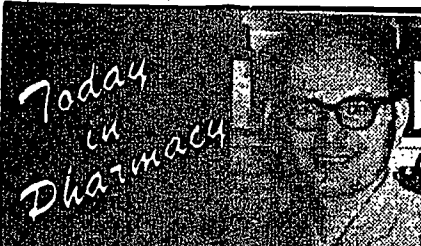

THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW! #2

4. Always tell your doctor if you don't have a prescription filled, or if you don't use the medicine after you buy it. Otherwise, he might think you are not responding to that particular drug product, if your condition is serious or even relatively mild, not taking a medicine prescribed might allow a condition to get worse while the doctor assumes it is being cured or helped. YOU'RE ALSO WASTING YOUR MONEY IF YOU PAY FOR A DOCTOR'S ADVICE AND THEN DON'T FOLLOW IT.

5. Don't stop taking a prescription after you begin to feel better unless your doctor approves. Often anything less than the full course of treatment may prevent the medicine from completely correcting the condition. For example, not taking the prescribed amount of an antibiotic allows either the "bug" or your body to become resistant to it. Not enough of the required medicine could be worse than none at all.

Kiwanis Drug Abuse Program

Illinois Zoning Board - Security or Sham?

Dear Editor:

Have you as a private citizen ever wondered how or why your community is what it is. A modern progressive community needs firm guidelines in the form of dynamic zoning and planning programs to properly govern and control its future growth and overall balance from a social standpoint.

As with all rules and regulations the express purpose for the establishment of zoning boards is to promote health, safety, morals, and to protect and preserve places and areas of historical and cultural importance and significance, or the general welfare of the community. The legislative body of cities and incorporated villages is empowered to regulate and restrict the height, number of stories, and size of buildings and other structures, the percentage of lot that may be occupied, the size of the yards, courts, and other open spaces, the density of population, and the location and use of buildings, structures, and land for trade, industry, residence, or other purposes; and in the case of designated places and areas of historic and cultural importance, to regulate and restrict the construction, alteration, reconstruction, or razing of buildings and other structures.

For any or all of these purposes the local legislative body may divide the municipality into districts of such number, shape, and area as may be deemed best suited to carry out the purposes of the Act; and within such districts it may regulate and restrict the erection, construction, reconstruction, alteration, repair, or use of buildings, structures, or land. All such regulations are to be uniform for each class or kind of building throughout each district, but the regulations in one district may differ from those in other districts.

The foregoing may sound very altruistic and purport to protect each community as well as individual, but if this is true ask yourself this question - why does most all zoning in Illinois fail? It does not pass the test of time or serve to properly control the growth of the

community as the population increases. Why do most communities experience a gradual erosion of the original fine principles, ideals and objectives of good zoning. Frankly, the hidden culprits that bring about this insidious erosion of community life are generally selfish business interests who somehow influence politicians and judges to achieve their end.

What do we mean? - For example why are gas stations allowed on every other busy corner, multiples allowed in residential districts or unincorporated areas notwithstanding contrary zoning. This type of law breaking by elected officials and or our courts results in overcrowded, high density areas, which are conducive to tenements, slums, high delinquency areas, overcrowded schools, higher taxes, traffic problems, and the general lowering of the community standards as well as a reduction in the value of real estate. Instead of establishing a community of high ideals and standards we are in effect promoting a breakdown in the ultimate goals of good community life - this is the ultimate end for all communities?

For the public's information all decisions made by any zoning board in the State of Illinois subject to revisions by the local elected officials or by a court of law if pursued by the petitioner.

The breakdown of good zoning and planning objectives will ultimately result in the creation of Ghetto Districts.

You might ask how or why this condition exists in the State of Illinois. The most important and powerful reason is that the legislators of the State of Illinois have not seen fit to prohibit the appealing of zoning board decisions to a court of law.

However, all states do not subscribe to this fuzzy philosophy as does Illinois. (Example Texas). They and other states have wisely rationalized that local zoning problems can best be solved by the people who are residents of the community and therefore, most

Thirty-five scholarships, funded through the Federal Library Services and Construction Act, have been awarded in 1969-70 through the Illinois State Library.

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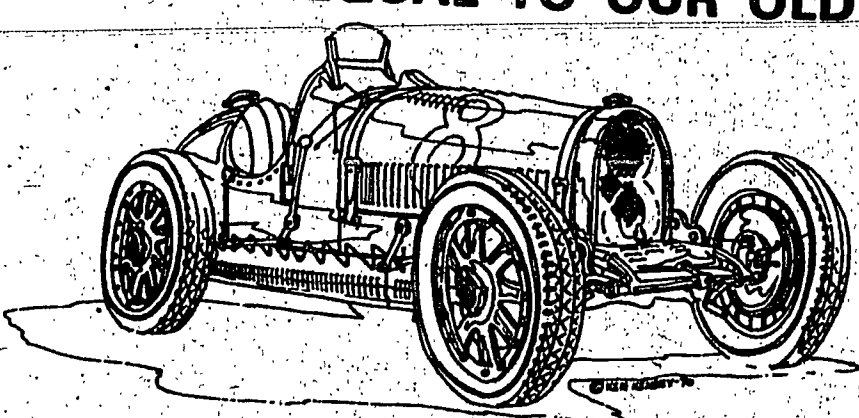
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Just for Fun

Albee Returns to DesPlaines

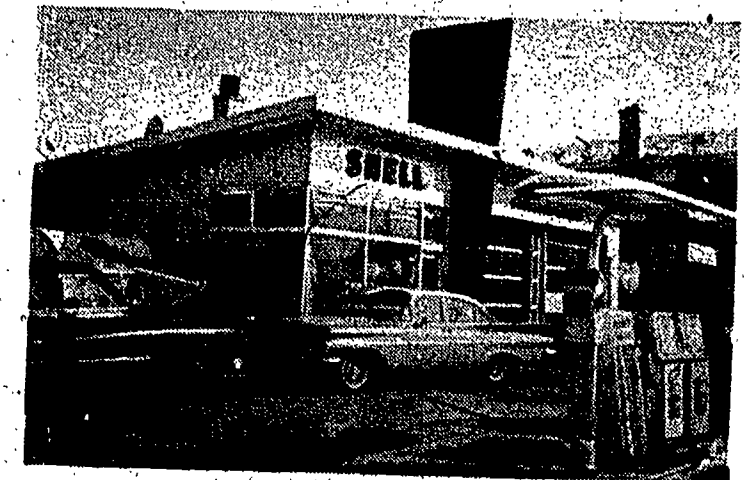
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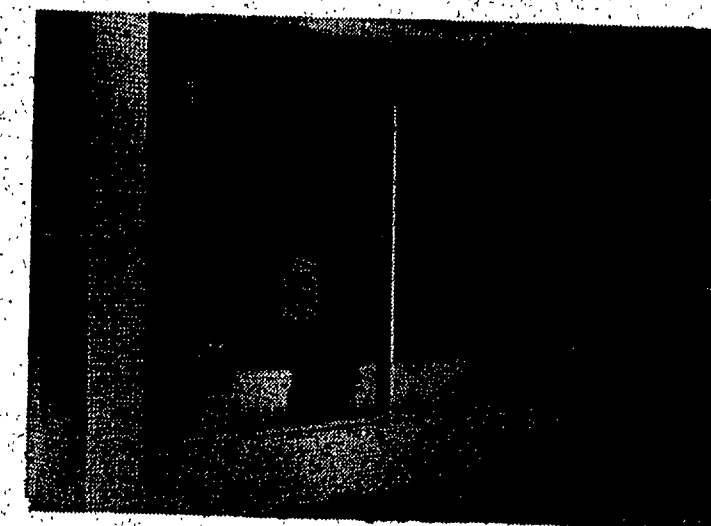

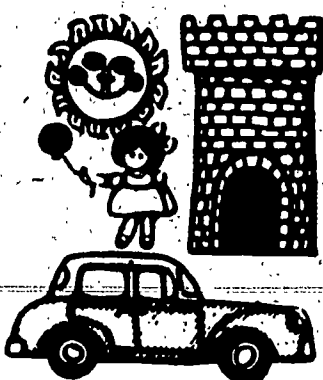

YOUNG PEOPLE WE SALUTE YOU! Students Aid Hospital in Casualty Drill

Maine Township High school East drama students recently participated in a "mass casualty drill" held at Lutheran General hospital in Park Ridge. The purpose of the drill was to measure the effectiveness of the hospital facilities and staff to handle 35 simulative casualties.

Only a few of the top administrators at Lutheran General in addition to Maine East's principal, John J. Clouser and Bruce Pagni, East's Drama chairman, knew of the exact date and time for the drill. Students in drama classes were asked to volunteer as victims and parent approval was obtained. The volunteer victims were uninformed about the date and time they would be taken to the hospital.

On the morning of Thursday, Oct. 20, students were instructed to begin "making up" wounds ranging from abrasions to burns to lacerations to embedded glass. Two students were to simulate a "dead - on arrival" victims. The hospital had provided makeup supplies for the casualty victims and Pagni and Stan Whitley, Art department chairman, supervised the make-up session.

At 9:30, students were taken by private cars, police cars and ambulances to the hospital. They had been instructed to act as though they were actually injured while the hospital staff treated the injuries. Many of the staff members commented on the believability of the students' makeup and acting.

At the conclusion of the drill, a critique session was held in which students were asked to comment on the drill and the treatment they received. Discussing the students' participation, Pagni remarked "The students were quite honest and provided valuable information to the staff for future drills and actual emergencies. I believe the students themselves gained enormously from it."

Principal Clouser summed up

East's participation in the drill, "I feel the drill provided an excellent opportunity for some of our students to render a service to the community - a service which would benefit any one of us who may be involved in a real situation in which there are mass casualties."

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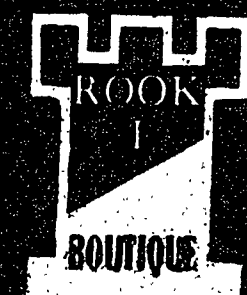

Board of Education Given Dist. 63 Educational Report

The 3rd of East Maine School Dist. #63's educational reports was given Tuesday evening, Oct. 27 at its Board meeting. This is part of an on-going series of Educational reports given to the School board and community to inform them of dist. #63's total educational programs.

Mr. Walter Siekierski, Math Consultant, presented the Mathematics report. He gave an historical background on the development of "new math" by saying "Traditionally, instruction in mathematics was geared almost completely to the skills for consumer living. The launching of Sputnik I caused a revision of this thinking, as people began to wonder what had gone wrong in the nation's schools to permit the Soviet Union to beat us in the space race."

"Tremendous amounts of money were poured into various study groups in the area of mathematics and science to allow them to recommend revisions in the instructional programs in these two areas. The basic result of the mathematics study groups was what has been called 'new math'."

"The changes in mathematical terminology and the introduction of a few new topics such as sets and number bases created quite a stir. New math became a topic of discussion at almost any public or private gathering. Comedy routines were built around the topic and numerous books, articles, and pamphlets were rushed to press to inform the public. However, all this activity centered on a few isolated topics or ideas used in the new math and much

of the most important issues of the "mathematics revolution" were completely overshadowed."

"The real philosophy of 'new math' and the emphasis of the mathematics program in Dist. #63 is not only new topics but also a new approach," he said. Then he continued to say, "We are now emphasizing a logical development of the subject which involves blending both skills and applications, and combining skills and facts in tightly knit packages. Closely related to this is the use and integration of the basic structure of mathematics in the instructional program."

In addition, Mr. Siekierski commented that, "A second major point is a new spirit on the part of the student and teacher. This is accomplished by emphasizing that mathematics is a way of thinking as well as a way of doing. The student should be free to try out ideas and see if they work. If his approach was incorrect he can be guided to correct this avenue. To accomplish this, drill is used less and replaced with other result but also include some thinking."

In his closing remarks of the report, Mr. Siekierski stated, "Throughout the entire mathematics program we try to emphasize the unifying or common threads of the structure of mathematics. This aim combined with the others already mentioned are designed to provide for our students the opportunity to function in an increasingly complex and technical society."
