From the LEFT HAND

The "West Side Story" in Morton Grove, a 2-year production which is more dramatic than lyrical, seems to be playing an extra long run in the houses there.

That old tavern booze favorite, "They're breaking up that old gang of mine," might be paraphrased by the good burghers in west MG as, "They're breaking up that old gang of mine's houses."

Burglars have had and continue to have a field day there in an area which is dimly lit and camouflaged by a suburban burglar's best friend, shrubbery. Burglaries have been so frequent, some houses are wearing hash marks which indicate the number of times they've been burgled.

Back door robberies have been the most frequent, though one home was burgled at 11 a.m. through the front door while the house was occupied. The action has been so heavy, some homes have been "hit" twice within a few weeks. Week-end nights have been the favorites among the burgle fraternity. So much action takes place that sometimes 2 or 3 burgle groups converge on one house at the same time. If one of them is wearing a hat, they generally draw names to determine who goes in. If hatless, the code of honor among thieves allows the first one on the scene to gain entrance to the house, borrow a coin from the home, and then go back outside and flip it among the competitors, which allows one group to go in for the big touch. That's one of the reasons we never keep coin in the house. Matter of fact, we don't even keep jewels, furs, cigar coupons, or anything more than \$7.95 in value in our house. The house has been decorated in Salvation Army and Goodwill rejects, which makes its total value hardly worth a break-in.

Any guy or gal interested in burgling our house would likely drop a few bucks out of sympathy after he gained entrance.

The natives in the west-end have been devising counter-measures to combat the enemy. One home has a siren with a red light atop the roof which is activated when the house is invaded by strangers. Another one has a signal which is touched off by anyone breaking elec-

Niles Park Commissioners agreed Tuesday night to begin condemnation proceedings for the abandoned Jewish cemetery north of Main st. off Sherman rd. to be used for park land. Rabbi Jay Karzen, president of the suburban branch of the Chicago Rabbinical Society said a paper by its Chicago president interprets Jewish law as allowing the removal of the present graves. However, he said the entire area would have to be dug up to make sure all bodies have been removed. It is expected the removals will be to Shalom Cemetery in Arlington Hts.

The Rabbi emphasized there will be no costs for Rabbinical services for the direction and removal, but noted costs will have to be incurred for re-intering of the bodies. He also said only union labor can be used in cemeteries, emphasizing this cost factor and noted because of the condition of the graves plus the age of the cemetery, it will necessitate the bulldozing of the entire cemetery in order to conform to the interpreted Jewish law. One precedent in recent years concerns a similar removal. When the Eisenhower Expressway was built a similar grave

removal was required. Law suits and injunctions pursued the effort requiring many years of negotiation. The park district's effort to acquire the land has about an 8-year history. Because of the delicacy of the problem with its religious ramifications, neither park officials, residents or religious leaders in the area pursued the matter to its finality. In acknowledging the request from Chesterfield homeowners for a park for an estimated 800-1200 children, park officials hoped the project would begin by springtime.

In other park board actions: The district will host an open house and ribbon ceremony for the Lou Schreiner gymnasium at the Grennan Heights park, Sunday, Jan. 10, 1971. There will be 7 or 8 ice rink locations this winter during the Dec. 15 to Feb. 15 season. Supervisors will be at each rink at Jozwiak, NICO, Kirk Lane, Oakton Manor, Ballard, Chesterfield and 2rinks at Grennan Heights. Chesterfield Park homeowners will also have a rink if they can find suitable space for one.

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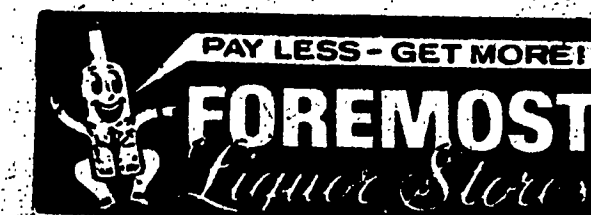

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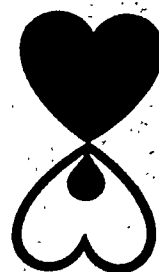

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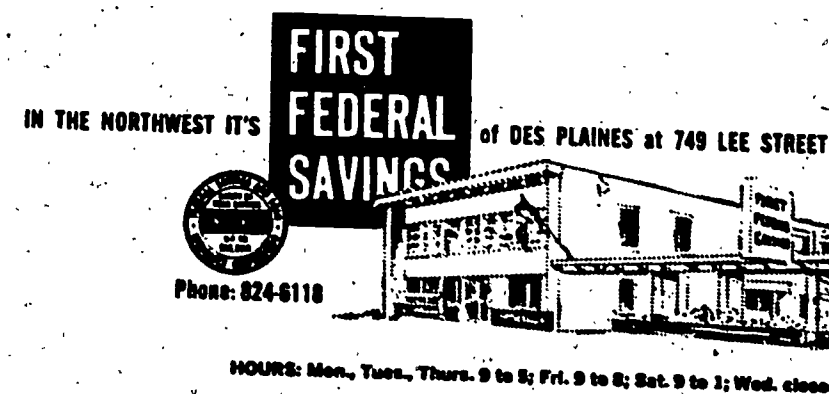
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Illinois Constitution: 1970 The Legislative Article

The Sixth Illinois Constitutional Convention in preparing the Legislative article "sought to achieve more meaningful representation of the people and to improve the procedures in the General Assembly. The new proposition reduces the 1870 Article of about 4000 words and 34 sections to about 2000 words and 15 sections.

The Convention reduced the age limitation of Senators from 25 years to the 21 year limit set for Representatives with residency requirements being reduced from 5 years to 2 years. All members of the General Assembly will be elected in even-numbered non-presidential years to correspond with election of executive officers, thereby focusing voter attention on state issues.

The present method of filling vacancies in the General Assembly is by special election. Special elections are rarely called because of the delay and cost of holding them and the shortness of the remaining term. Districts therefore are sometimes under-represented and under these circumstances, the "dead" cast a negative vote of pending legislation since the Constitution requires passage by a majority of those "elected" to office. This unfortunate situation has been rectified by a provision that vacancies be filled by appointment within 30 days with regulation as to whether

or not the appointee must run in the next election based on the time remaining in the unexpired term. All appointees must be of the same political party as the person they succeed.

Legislative redistricting is probably the knottiest problem that faces any Constitutional Convention. How district voting lines are drawn often determines the strength or weakness of a political party. Rules for redistricting, therefore, must be fair to the political parties while upholding impartially the franchise of the voter. Until the one-man one-vote Supreme Court decision, most state legislatures ignored this responsibility or drew maps not in conformity with state requirements. In order to enforce the constitutional requirements, the 1954 Amendment to the State Constitution under which we are currently functioning, required that if the state legislature failed to apportion, a commission would be appointed to redistrict the State. If the commission failed then all State representatives would run at large. It had been supposed that this remedy for inaction would be so overwhelming to the voter and so disruptive to the political parties that it would never be invoked. Illinois, however, became known in the Nov., 1964, election when we selected our state representatives from 118 candidates from each party on an orange "bed-sheet" ballot. Notwithstanding this experience the General Assembly in 1965 failed again but the Commission succeeded.

The proposed new Constitution has rectified the unconstitutional apportionment requirements for State Senatorial districts. It requires that all districts be compact, contiguous and substantially equal in population. Redistricting is to take place the year following the federal census. If the legislature fails to produce a plan by June 30, a Legislative Redistricting Commission must be formed. This commission is to consist of 8 members, 4 from each political party and is required to present a plan approved by not less than a majority vote. If the Commission fails the Supreme Court must submit the names of 2 persons, one of each party to the Secretary of State. In public, the Secretary of State will draw "at random" the name of one person to serve on the commission and break the existing tie vote. The Supreme Court has jurisdiction over all redistricting actions. While better than the provisions under which we are currently bound it will remain to be seen if these sanctions are stiff enough to insure that apportionment plans do conform to the law of the land.

Another provision is of assistance to fair apportionment and should act as a deterrent to gerrymandering districts for political benefit. Following redistricting, an incumbent is allowed to serve in any of the new districts which were a part of his district prior to redistricting. This provision precludes the necessity to gerrymander the district so as to include the incumbent. He may choose the new district in which he feels his main strength lies although he must then move into the district of his choice.

Under the 1870 Constitution the General Assembly is required to convene every 2 years. While there is no limit set for adjournment, the stipulation that no legislation passed after June 30 may become effective until July 1 of the succeeding year

has acted to limit the length of sessions to just 6 months. In recent years and with increasing frequency, special sessions have been called and the 76th General Assembly did not adjourn but continued in session until the following Spring. Most citizens will recall the June 30 end of sessions with the clock turned back so that the legislature could complete consideration of the hundreds of bills before them. In these closing days, hasty and ill-considered legislation is often passed. The volume of work before the General Assembly and the size of the State budget have pointed up the need for annual sessions.

The proposed Constitution provides for continuous sessions, during the term for which Representatives are elected (2 years). The Governor retains his right to call special sessions to consider matters he deems important in addition both houses may be reconvened by proclamation of the presiding officers of both houses.

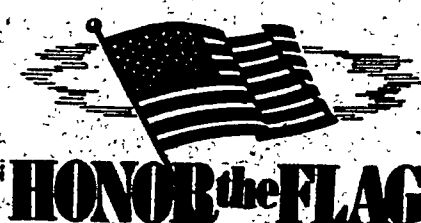
Meetings of the General Assembly, its committees and commissions must be open to the public. The time, place and topic to be considered must be published in advance, thus giving the public far greater insight into the deliberations of the legislature than is presently possible. Meetings may be closed to the public by a 2/3 vote if the public interest requires.

The cumbersome process of reading a bill in its entirety on 3 separate days has been replaced with a requirement that these bills be read by title only on 3 separate days. Bills are required to be published and on the desk of each member before final passage. These new provisions act as a deterrent to hasty action while eliminating an unwieldy time-consuming system.

Each house is to keep a transcript of its proceedings which will be available to the public. All bills passed must be by record vote and 2 members of the Senate or 5 members of the House may require a record vote on any other issue. While the present legislature keeps a journal, transcripts of debate and other business usually are not included. Under the proposed system, voters will have far greater insight into the voting record and views expressed by their representative in the General Assembly.

This action will include the method of selection of Representatives to the General Assembly. The options you will be voting on include: (1) A proposition to retain the present 59 multi-member representative districts using cumulative voting, or (2) 177 single member districts with representatives elected in the adversary system employed at all other levels of government and by all other states. In either case, the Senate will have 59 members, an increase of one. The merits of these options will be discussed later.

If state government is to be reinvigorated and made viable an effective and efficient legislature is a necessity. The constitutional framework established in this proposed article has eliminated many of the deterrents to effective government at the state level. 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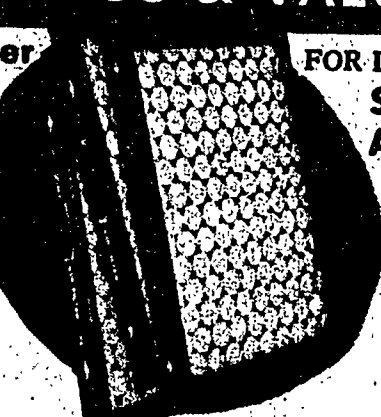
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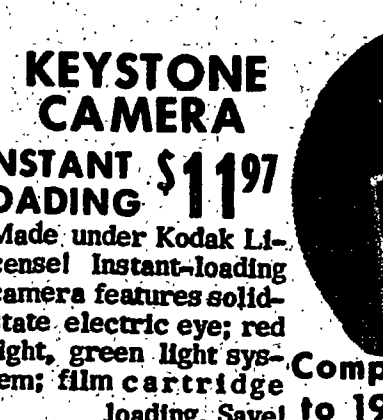
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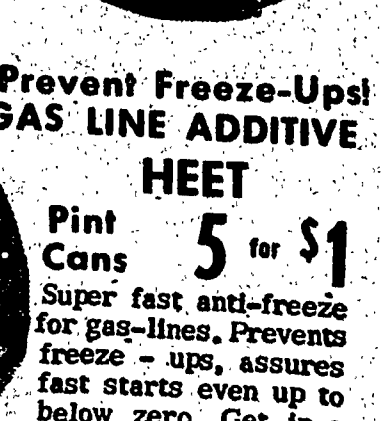

Christmas Mailing

Postmaster Robert R. Lutz recently urged residents of Morton Grove "to try to remember" that recommended mailing dates for civilian domestic Christmas mails start Dec. 1.

The national Christmas "Mail Early" theme this year, he explained, is based on the familiar musical tune "Try to Remember" - and is featured in public service radio and TV announcements. "The idea," he said, "is to have our customers remember recommended mailing dates. This will insure fast and efficient delivery of parcels and cards and prevent disappointments for friends and family members. Of course, it will also be a big help to your post office."

Key suggested latest dates by which Christmas mail should be deposited are as follows, but the postmaster urged customers to mail earlier wherever possible:

Domestic Mails (Except Alaska and Hawaii): a. Distant States Parcels - Dec. 1; Greeting Cards - Dec. 10, b. Local & Nearby Areas Parcels - Dec. 1; Greeting Cards - Dec. 15.

Alaska and Hawaii: a. Surface Mail Parcels - Nov. 30; Greeting Cards - Dec. 4, b. Airmail Mail Parcels - Dec. 14; Greeting Cards - Dec. 14.

In addition, Postmaster Lutz noted several key dates applying for civilian international mail, as follows:

To Canada and Mexico - Surface Parcels, Dec. 4; Greeting Cards, Dec. 9; and Air Parcels, Dec. 16.

To South and Central America Surface Parcels, Nov. 13; Greeting Cards, Nov. 18; and Air Parcels, Dec. 14.

These same dates apply for the various types of mail for Europe.

Dates for international Mails to other parts of the world are usually posted in post office lobbies, but, in case of questions, consult the local post office.

Earlier, Postmaster Lutz announced deadlines required on Military mail going overseas, as follows -

Nov. 21 for "SAM" (space available parcels), and Nov. 28 for "PAL" (Parcel airmail service). Further details on these basic parcels services for the military, as well as dates applying for other mailings to servicemen are also available at the post office.

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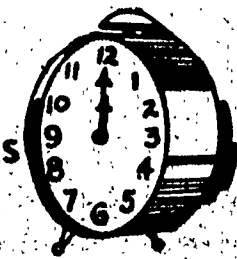

Open Letter:

In Niles, as in many communities, a primary concern of the village officials is the youth of today. We hear talk of vandalism, loitering, drug abuse, and an over abundance of free time leaving the youth open to anti-social tendencies. These anti social acts are but symptoms of a deep lying problem or problems.

One such problem is the lack of planning on the part of the Niles Park officials for planned activity, supervised meeting centers, and neighborhood parks. Since the park bond referendum was passed some years ago, the Park District has had

community - other than the street. Chesterfield is taxed by the Park District for nothing but promises made years ago by the bond issue.

The Park District is not responding to the needs of the citizens. Patience can last just so long; the people of Chesterfield feel the time has come to let their voices be heard. They will be in attendance at the Nov. 17 Park Board meeting to let their voices be heard for the sake of 589 children who need a park.

Suburban Teen Study Program

Suburban teenagers will be the subject of an intensive study program to be conducted by the Edison Park Home of Park Ridge. The mayors of four suburban communities, Park Ridge, Des Plaines, Niles and Elk Grove Village, have endorsed the project.

The survey of adolescent problems and services in the suburban communities has been made possible because of a grant by the Illinois Law Enforcement Commission to Lutheran Welfare Services of Illinois, the parent organization of Edison Park Home.

This survey will include interviews with persons working with adolescents presenting problems such as juvenile offenses of police departments, school counselors, youth workers, and members of social and

psychiatric agencies. It is expected that findings from this study will indicate some needed areas of service to adolescents which can be met by the Edison Park Home. This study will give direction to the Home and to other organizations in developing services to meet the needs of adolescents.

The Illinois Law Enforcement Commission is backing this project as a part of its program to improve and strengthen state and local law enforcement and to promote closer cooperation among federal, state and local agencies concerned with juvenile delinquency problems.

The Project Director is Dr. Kenneth Krause, Assistant Professor at the Jane Addams Graduate School of Social Work, University of Illinois - Chicago Circle Campus.

LEGAL NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE
Regulating Traffic on Certain Streets
Within the Village of Niles

Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Niles, Cook County, Illinois, as follows:

SECTION 1: That the following street shall hereafter be designated a two-way street as hereinafter described in Section 1: (a) Seward Street from Milwaukee Avenue eastwardly to the alley and from Osceola Avenue westwardly to the cul-de-sac;

SECTION 2: That the Superintendent of Public Works for the Village of Niles be and the same is hereby directed to emplace appropriate signs as hereinabove listed in Section (1) of this Ordinance.

SECTION 3: That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 4: That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication by law.
