Charlie Gomez and his wife Carmen, have a "For Sale" sign in front of their house in Niles. It's a bad sign because the Gomez family would rather live in Niles. But their children have been abused during the 2 years they've lived here and Charlie and Carmen are ready to pull up stakes in the "All America City."

Gomez grew up in Chicago's South Chicago area, and later moved to Ashland Avenue. Living amidst persons of all ethnic backgrounds Charlie never "even had one fight" in all the years he was growing up. Neighbors of all national backgrounds lived in the tough steel mill area, as well as in the mid-Chicago area, and they lived harmoniously.

Charlie has worked hard, taking 19 years to receive a college degree while raising a family. He successfully publishes a Spanish-language weekly newspaper, El Informador, and owns movie houses in Chicago. Charlie was a Republican candidate for the Cook County Board in 1966 and more recently was appointed to serve on the National Advisory Council For Minority Enterprise by the President.

Two years ago Gomez moved from Chicago's South Shore to Niles. He chose a home close to his church and school by St. John Brebeuf.

The problems for the Gomez' oldest child, Cookie, 13, started after a slide projection was shown of Mexico in Cookie's classroom. The slides showed the picturesque peasants, the poverty and the squalid existence of the poor. When Cookie's mother objected to showing only this one-sided picture of Mexico the teacher apologized and accepted Mrs. Gomez' offer to show a film of the arts and culture of Mexico.

Shortly after the film-showing the daughter became the subject of the taunts from classmates. She was called "dirty Mexican" and "Mexican nigger," spat at, and kicked and hit several times by one or more boys. What was most disturbing was none of the children went to her defense.

Gomez telephoned the parents of the boy who kicked her and the father of the boy responded immediately. He said he would break both the legs of his child if he hits the girl again.

The younger children, Charles, 11, and Becky, 7, have also been subjected to similar verbal abuse. But Gomez said his son can take care of himself and leaves the impression he's "used to" such talk. But 7 year-old Becky came home from school and asked her parents what "nigger" meant.

MNLL Registration

There may be snow on the ground Jan. 9 and 10, but that won't stop determined aspirants to the Maine-Northfield Little League from registering for the 1971 season; said League president Ed Karlins of Niles. For those who can't make it at that time, a last chance will be offered on the following Saturday and Sunday, Jan. 16 and 17.

All boys 8 years old before Aug. 1, thru 15 years old by July 31, who live within the MNLL boundaries (Lake-Euclid rd., including Timber Trails and the Willows; Dempster street, Shermer and River rd.) and who would like to play in 1971, should bring a parent or guardian to Flick park, 3 blocks north of Glenview rd., between Pfingsten and Longmeadow in Glenview, between 9 a.m. and noon on Saturday, Jan. 9, or between noon and 3 p.m. on Sunday, Jan. 10. The same hours will prevail Jan. 16 and 17.

Karlins said the registration periods are for boys who played last year as well as newcomers. He added that because of a realignment of the league this year, only a limited number of boys in each age group can be accepted. To assist in notifying as many boys in the area as possible, special notices are being distributed through the schools and Karlins advises the boys to take them home to their parents.

The earlier registration period proved satisfactory last year and is being repeated because it allows the officers and managers more time to make up equal teams and give more boys an equal opportunity to play according to their own capabilities. This year, for the first time, MNLL will consist of 2 major leagues in addition to the minors and the senior division. To be called the National and American Leagues, the 2 majors will be equal in all respects. Another MNLL innovation this year will be a school for managers, which will begin operation next month.

While many parents have come over to the house to express their concern none of the parents of those who've been abusive have contacted Gomez.

Gomez has several concerns. He noted Father Close and the church people quickly responded to the problem. Father Close spoke to the 200 eighth graders and told them any such abuse will result in expulsion. Twice sermons on Sunday have told parishioners about the problem and have condemned such discriminatory practices.

Gomez does not criticize the church or the school although he said the school had no code of conduct before, but since his objections were voiced at a school board meeting, such a code has been instituted.

With exasperation, Gomez said one man told him he was a newcomer and should feel lucky. The man said when the one Negro family moved into Niles 8 years ago their tires were slashed and they were harassed in many ways. Gomez can't understand his being "lucky" since he has the notion this is "his" America just as much as anyone else's. He notes his Spanish forbearers were here long before most of today's

The Committee on Community Life of St. Martha's has contacted many religious, fraternal, civic and social organizations to determine whether

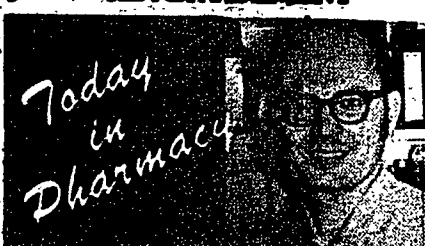
residents' ancestors, but dismissed this type of logic as being irrelevant.

Mr. Volkman was presented with what is now the traditional flower and appeared to be quite pleased. The only sad comment

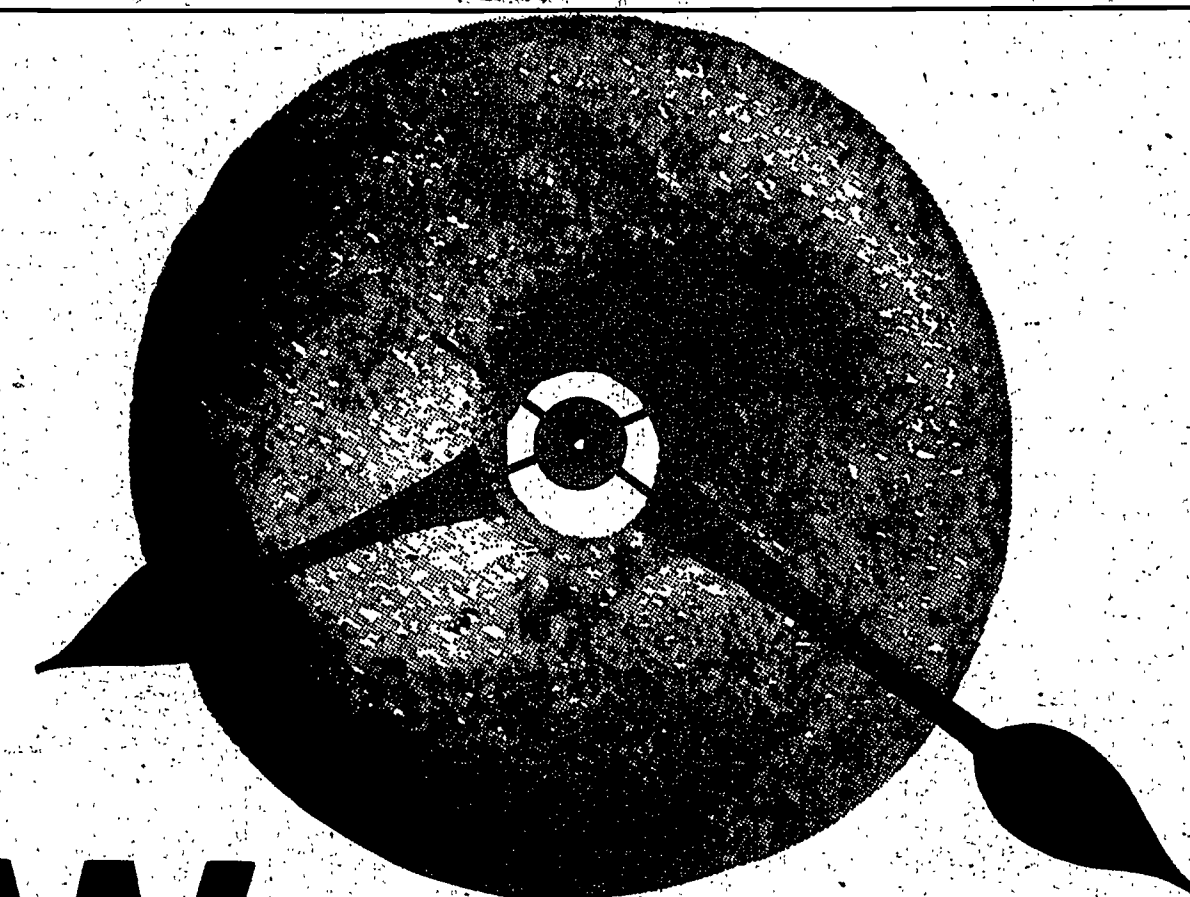
by the students was the question, "Why does he have to leave so soon?" The students and faculty at Nathanson school gained insight with this presentation.

Glickman built a weather vane and Steve Fishman made a rain gauge. The students have used these instruments in a professional manner to predict the weather just as they have seen on television.

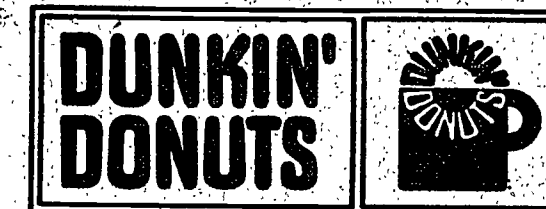

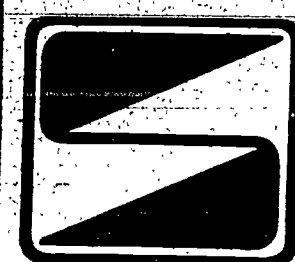

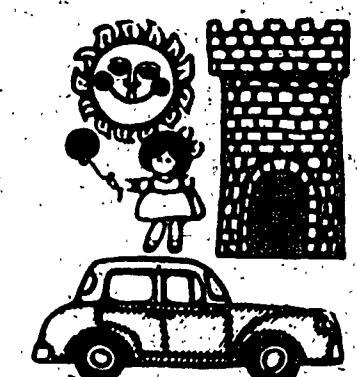

MG Fire Chief Warns of Holiday Hazards

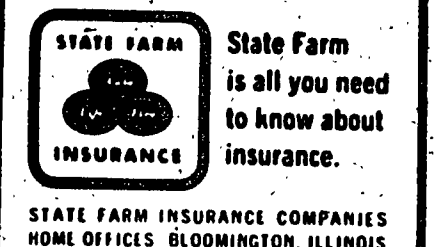
Chief Christ Hildebrandt of the Morton Grove Fire department this week asked that residents of Morton Grove be especially cautious to prevent the usual rash of home accidents and fires which occur every year during the holiday season. There are few things more heartbreaking than a fatal fire or accidental injury during the normally festive season. This is especially true if the victim happens to be an innocent child. In his plea for a safe holiday season, Chief Hildebrandt quoted several excerpts from what he called an excellent article which appeared in Chicago's Tribune on Sunday, Nov. 22, 1970 under the byline of Linda Lee Landis and titled, "How Safe is your Home?"

Why not spend some time today taking a negative approach to safety? Be grisly. Imagine all the nightmarish accidents that could happen in your home. Then take steps to prevent those burns, lacerations, poisonings, broken bones and funerals from becoming a reality in your family. Precautionary measures are endless: DON'T store cleaning materials near the stove; DON'T substitute pennies for fuses causing the wires to overheat; BE SURE your Christmas tree has water — The list is endless. Most of these safety measures you know, but some are worth reviewing. It can save you or a loved one's life.

Carefully check your house for obvious fire hazards. When you do so, remember that there is no such thing as inflammable fabrics — all burn, eventually. Children's clothing ignites most often while they are playing with matches/lighters and when they get too near stoves and heaters. The glass fabrics don't burn, but they melt and produce deep localized burns. Cotton and rayon burn readily and rapidly. Remember to close your bedroom doors at night to prevent smoke or toxic gases from killing you while you sleep should your home catch fire — more people die from suffocation than from the flames themselves.

With Christmas only a few weeks away, its time to start thinking about holiday precautions, mainly those involving the Christmas tree.

First, find a fresh tree. Bounce the butt of the tree hard on the ground. The needles shouldn't come showering down and should withstand your pulling at the end of the branch. Next check to be sure the stump is sticky with resin. If the tree passes the above tests, it is probably fresh. Leave it outside in water or snow until just before Christmas and then before you put it in its stand, cut the trunk at an angle at least 1" above the original cut. Make sure your stand holds the tree securely and that it has a receptacle for water. Check the water supply daily — a dry tree is a serious fire hazard.

After you have crawled thru your attic or rummaged thru your basement and found your electric lighting sets, check that no wires are frayed and that there are no loose connections or broken sockets. Be sure that the set has the UL label and that the fuse serving the outlet into which you are going to plug the tree is equipped with no more than a 15 amp. fuse. Electric lights should not be used on artificial trees. Only 2 manufacturers of these trees have submitted their products to the UL lab's flammability tests.

A tree near the fireplace may look like a Christmas card scene, but it's the worst location in the room because of its proximity to flame. Also, don't block a door or path of escape with the tree in case there is a fire in the house.

Don't put an electric train under the tree. If a short develops or if a piece of tinsel falls across the track, it can cause a spark that may set the tree on fire.

Remove the tree from the house as soon as Christmas holiday festivities are over.

Remember! It takes less than 60 seconds for the average tree to burn up completely, so turn out the lights when the family leaves the home unattended and PLEASE don't leave children alone unattended while the tree is on display in your home.

Electrical equipment should not be handled with wet hands or when standing on a wet or damp surface. Electricity and water form a dangerous combination, which often results in death. An electric shaver

dropped into a washbowl while plugged in and then fished out can kill if not unplugged first. Electric outlets, switches and other equipment should be far enough from the bathtub to deter the bather in a moment of forgetfulness from plugging in an electric razor, radio, sunlamp or hair dryer while immersed in the water. To quote one of those insanely concise safety tips: Avoid Electrocutal!

Do it yourself television repairs have produced a number of serious accidents. The removal of TV tubes for testing or renewal appears to be just a routine procedure, but unless the set is not only turned off, but also drained off of all current, a violent jolt or worse can happen (remember, most of the sets today which are advertised as "instant on" are never completely off even when they appear to be so and require special attention prior to servicing to eliminate a very serious hazard of electrocution.) A TV set can give a jolt in excess of 20,000 volts, 8,000 volts are used in an electric chair!!!

The suburban housewife with her nice clean well-kept home shakes her head sympathetically when she reads of little children in the ghetto who are suffering from lead poisoning from eating falling paint and plaster. She does not realize that the same hazard exists in her own home from the pottery she bought in Mexico or from the pitcher made by one of her friends or maybe by one of her own children in a hobby shop. Lead compounds are widely used in ceramics and pottery glazes and, except for the mass

produced commercially sold dishes, may be improperly applied. Use your pottery as decorative pieces, not as food servers.

Another category of poisoning that may come as a surprise is house plants. Not the rare varieties either. One leaf of a poinsettia plant can kill a child. The berries of mistletoe are also fatal and both adults and children have died from eating them.

Other plants that can kill (by no means a complete list) are the bulbs of the hyacinth, narcissus and daffodil, the leaves and branches of the oleander and all the parts of the elephant ear and the dieffenbachia. In the flower garden plants, the following are dangerous: Lilly of the Valley, Iris, Bleeding Heart, Larkspur, Monkshood, Autumn Crocus, Star of Bethlehem and the Foxglove. In ornamental plants the following are very dangerous: Daphne, Wisteria, Golden Chain, Laurels, Rhododendron, Azaleas, Jessamine, Red Sage and Yew.

Chief Hildebrandt further stated that every person should know how to call the Fire department (965-2121) and the number should be placed near each and every telephone in the house. His department is equipped with an ambulance to handle most other types of emergency, but he hopes that his entire contact with the citizens of Morton Grove over the holidays is this wish for a Happy and Safe Christmas and a Prosperous New Year, which he extends for himself and all the officers and men of the Morton Grove Fire department.

Formulating Oakton College Student Newspaper

Members of the editorial staff of the Daily Planet, student newspaper at Oakton Community college, have met with members of the faculty and administration in order to make plans concerning the operation of the Daily Planet for the 1970-71 school year. It was announced recently by Dr. William A. Koehnline, college president. According to the announcement, three items were discussed: the printing budget for 1970-71, the role of the newspaper at Oakton, and the student newspaper's relationship to the academic institution.

It was agreed by all those present at the meeting that a publications board be established to work on a continuing basis with the editorial staff of the Daily Planet. The publications board would consist of three representatives of the faculty, three representatives of the students elected by the student body, and one administrative representative.

The student newspaper, which

has been strictly paid for out of student funds and serves as a means of communication between students, is meant to be circulated only among those present on the college campus. It is planned that a full report on items related to the student newspaper will be made at a future meeting of the Board of Trustees.

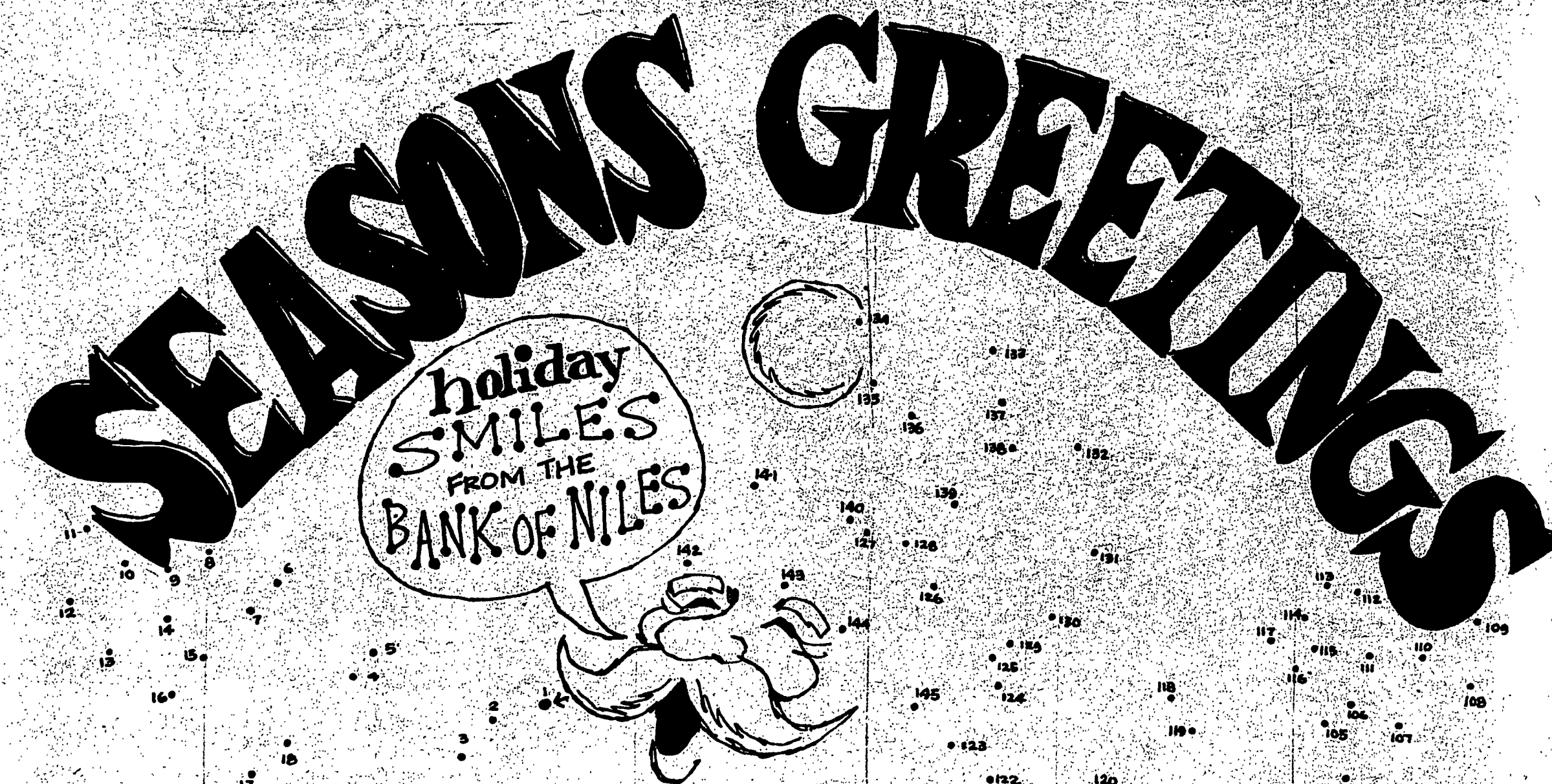

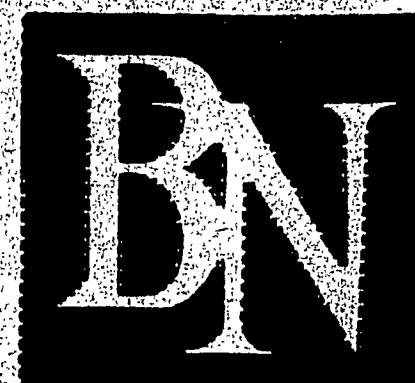

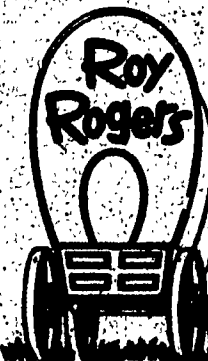

Nathanson School A 'Must Stop'

The Shelley Nathanson school of East Maine School Dist. #63 continues to be one of the "must stops" for people in the field of education. Because of innovative programs of team-teaching and non-gradedness, educators from all points on the compass have made it a point to see the Nathanson School. During American Education Week, Principal Stewart Liechti received visitors from North Park college, the University of Chicago, and the Lyons school system. These groups

were made up of professors of education, classroom teachers, and college students who are working towards a career in education. Principal Liechti outlines the highlights of the school's modern programs and gives the visitors an opportunity to question the philosophy and application as it exists at Nathanson. After this orientation program the visitors move throughout the school and have the opportunity to question both staff and children as to what they are doing. Many of the professional visitors come to Nathanson School to learn the modern approaches to learning knowing that this is the place where effective application of these techniques is being carried out.

Blue Shield program for employees cost \$1200 for 3 months and asked the costs be individually listed. Leske was the commissioner who sought the hospitalization - medical care for employees.

Leske also wondered why the director was expending \$50 every time a public address system was used and was told PA facility costs from \$400 to \$1,000 and would eventually be purchased.

Commissioner Egan was critical of telephone bills of \$426 and said the long distance calls were excessive. When Norman said calls were made to line up staff people for the district, Egan said there were at least 2 long distance calls daily, and asked these calls be lessened.

Approved the expenditure of \$1600 for a cement basement floor for the combination bathhouse and rink shelter building at the Ballard Complex.

Rejected a request from Norman for a new jeep for about \$5200, after he said the old jeep would require \$800 to \$900 for repairs.

Commissioner Provenzano said the park district became 16 years old on December 9, 1970, and thanked all who contributed to its growth thruout these years.

Walter M. Buesse, Commissioner, has issued a call for volunteer coaches and assistant coaches to assist the Park district's boys hockey league.

Today, over 150 boys have registered for the program and will play a regular schedule of games both at Jozwiak park and at the Flying Carpet Motor Inn skating rink with league play beginning on December 26. Games are scheduled on Friday evening and Saturday morning.

Persons interested in volunteering for this program should enjoy working with boys and possess a sound knowledge of hockey fundamentals. Interested persons should call the league supervisor, Wally Fromhart, at 96-6975.

request to send the books and the board agreed.

David Cohen, trustee, reported that \$16,784.28 was received as our share of the Oct. state income tax. Cohen also advised that department heads should consider their budget requests now and turn them over to Treasurer Kennedy before March. John Hilkin announced that the Board of Health will hold its regular meeting next Monday night. Trustee Herbert Houndt said an Ecology Committee will be formed and that to date Public Works Supt. Fragassi has done a good deal of work on several important matters. Mr. Fragassi said newspaper collection would be made twice a month and that this

can be handled effectively with the present personnel. He also has selected a site for glass depository, which will be closed at a later date. Houndt then read a letter received from Glenview stating that the Cook County Highway Dept. has decided to expand Old Orchard rd. to include another entrance. Glenview opposes this and would like us to do the same. Houndt moved, however, to make a further study before coming to any decision, and the board agreed.

Village Attorney John Nordberg read an amendment to the Liquor Ordinance and after much discussion, it was decided to keep operating hours as they are now, from 2 a.m. to 3 a.m. on week-ends. He then read an

amendment to the Traffic Code and 'Misdemeanors'. Both were approved by the board. The one on traffic provided for the exclusion of bicycles (as a vehicle) as per the state statute. The Curlew Ordinance will read: No one under 18 years of age is allowed on the streets after 11 p.m., and no one under 14 years of age is allowed on the streets after 10 p.m. It was stated also that anyone wishing to pay a parking fine prior to a court date will have to pay \$5 instead of \$1.

John Hilkin said the board should instruct the Planning and Zoning Commission to hold public hearing regarding the change in filing Commission. He listed the November fees collected at \$9,325.90.
