

For those who can't make it at that 281/2 271/2 time, a last chance will be offered on the following Saturday and Sunday, Jan. 16 and 17.

> All boys 8 years old before Aug. 1, thru 15 years old by July 31, who live within the MNLL boundaries (Lake-Euclid rd., including Timber Trails and the Willows; Dempster street, Shermer and River rd.) and who would like to play in 1971, should bring a parent or guardian to Flick park, 3 blocks north of Glenview rd., between Pfingsten and Longmeadow in Glenview, between 9 a.m. and noon on Saturday, Jan. 9, or between noon and 3 p.m. on Sunday, Jan. 10. The same hours will prevail Jan. 16 and 17.

Karlins said the registration periods are for boys who played last year as well as newcomers. He added that because of a realignment of the league this year, only a limited number of boys in each age group can be accepted. To assist in notifying as many boys in the area as possible, special notices are being distributed through the schools and Karlins advises the boys to take them home to their parents.

The earlier registration period proved satisfactory last year and is being repeated because it allows the officers and managers more time to make up equal teams and give more boys an equal opportunity to play according to their own capabilities. This year, for the first time, MNLL will consist of 2 major leagues in addition to the minors and the senior division. To be called the National and American Leagues, the 2 majors will be equal in all respects. Another MNLL innovation this year will be a school for managers, which will begin opera-

Imagine all the nightmarish accidents that could happen in your home. burns, lacerations, poisonings, broken bones and funerals from becoming a reality in your family. Precautionary measures are endless: DON'T store cleaning materials near the stove; DON'T substitute pennies for fuses causing the wires to overheat: BE SURE your Christmas tree has water - The list is endless. Most of these safety measures you know, but some

save you or a loved one's life. Carefully check your house for obvious fire hazards. When you do so, remember that there is no such thing as inflammable fabrics - all burn, eventually. Children's clothing ignites most often while they are playing with matches/lighters and when they get too near stoves and heaters. The glass fabrics don't burn, but they melt and produce deep localized burns. Cotton and ray-

on burn readily and rapidly. Remember to close your bedroom doors at night to prevent smoke or toxic gases from killing you while you sleep should your home catch fire - more people die from suffocation than

First , find a fresh tree. Bounce the butt of the tree hard on the ground. The needles shouldn't come showering down and should withstand your pulling at the end of the branch. Next check to be sure the stump is sticky with resin. If the tree passes the above tests, it is probably fresh. Leave it outside in water or snow until just before Christmas and then before you put it in its stand, cut the trunk at an angle at least 1° above the original cut. Make sure your stand holds the tree securely and that it has a receptacle for water. Check

tree is a serious fire hazard. After you have crawled thru your attic or rummaged thru your basement and found your electric lighting sets, check that no wires are frayed and that there are no loose connections or broken sockets. Be sure that the set has the UL label and that the fuse serving the outlet into which you are going to plug the tree is equipped with no more than a 15 amp, fuse. Electric lights should not be used on artificial trees. Only 2 manufacturers of these trees have submitted their products to the

UL lab's flammability tests. A tree near the fireplace may look like a Christmas card scene, but it's the worst location in the room because of its proximity to flame. Also, don't block a door or path of escape with the tree in case

there is a fire in the house. Don't put an electric train under the tree. If a short develops or if a piece of tinsel falls across the track, it can cause a spark that may set the tree on fire.

Remove the tree from the house as soon as Christmas holiday festivities are over.

Remember! It takes less than 60 seconds for the average tree to burn up completely, so turn out the lights when the family leaves the home unattended and PLEASE don't leave children alone unattended while the tree

is on display in your home.

not be handled with wet hands or when standing on a wet or damp surface. Electricity and water form a dangerous combination, which often results in death. An electric shaver

can kill if not unplugged first. Electric outlets, switches and other equipment should be far enough from the bathtub to deter the bather in a moment of forgetfulness from plugging in an electric razor, radio, sum-lamp or hairdryer while immersed in the water. To quote one of those insanely concise safety tips: Avoid Electrocution Do it yourself television repairs have produced a number

of serious accidents. The removal of TV tubes for testing or renewal appears to be just a routine procedure, but unless the set is not only turned off, but also drained off of all current, a violent jolt or worse can happen (remember. most of the sets today which are advertised as "instant on" are never completely off even when they appear to be so and require special attention prior to servicing to eliminate a very serious hazard of electrocution.) A TV set can give a jolt in excess of 20,000 volts. 8,000 volts are used in an electric

The suburban housewife with her nice clean well-kept home shakes her head sympathetically when she reads of little children in the ghetto who are suffering from lead poisoning from eating falling paint and plaster. She does not realize that the same hazard exists in her own home from the pottery she bought in Mexico or from the pitcher made by one of her friends or maybe by one of her own children in a hobby shop. Lead compounds are widely used in ceramics and pottery glazes and, except for the mass

dishes, may be improperly applied. Use your pottery as dec-orative pieces, not as food ser-

Other plants that can kill (by no means a complete list) are the bulbs of the hyacinth. narcissus and daffodil, the leaves and branches of the ole-ander and all the parts of the elephant ear and the dieffen-bachia. In the flower garden plants, the following are dan-gerous: Lilly of the Valley, iris, Bleeding Heart, Larkspur, Monkshood, Autumn Crocus Star of Bethlehem and the Foxglove. in ornamental plants the following are very dangerous: Daphne, Wisteria, Golden Chain, Laurels, Rhododendron, Azal-eas, Jessamine, Red Sage and
