Editor and Publisher In a trade magazine which we received Tuesday Robert Lerner of the Lerner Newspapers wrote a provoking article which will obviously elicit much comment from suburban newsboys, who are suckered into responding, just as I'm doing by writing this column.

In the article, which concerns the "suburban environment," he was disturbed by the environs around the Wilmette Theatre, which he attended, and which was strewn with leftovers from the children's matinee. Obviously abhorred by the dis-array, he states: "At least this suburb could clean up the theatre." Having been aroused by the sticky candy wrappers and popcorn boxes, he concludes the "ancient suburban environment" has "no more grace, and perhaps less reality, than the thickest Chicago slum,"

Following in fairly quick order, the brief 3 column-article then socks it to suburbia. "Residents behave as if they were programmed from Middletown." Then more socko: "Teenagers are of the narrow-horizoned variety; wear a jacket and tie at night, pick your college, drive an American car."

Lerner cites suburble as being a rest stop for those who've stopped living. Suburbanites, according to Lerner, "pretend to enjoy martinis, go to nte garde movies, bazaars and auctions, and talk a constant and brave game."

Mr. Lerner then blows hard: "Suburbanites are so unhappy." He says we cannot move because we're so insulated; cannot think because we are so inured.

He concedes we are not snooty. But, ah, we are to be pitled. He says, "we march away from the mainstream and grow old without growing up."

Next he goes after sex in the suburbs. He says it "isn't particularly enjoyed except for its de-flance value."

"Relationships," says the man, "turn from comfort and security to boredom and sterility."

Now watch out Lerner says we read "The Godfather but few can converse intelligently about Aristotle and Joyce. Lerner contends we find out about the world by reading about it in the newspapers. We just don't "feel, touch or smell" the world. Continued on Page 19
