From the Left Hand Community Calendar

Two weeks ago, we answered an article by Robert Lerner, of the Lerner newspapers, in which he attacked "suburbia." He described it as being sterile and boring, and not in touch with the world. In our answer, we noted "our suburbia" was indeed vital, and implied the lack of intellectuality he criticized us for, was indeed superficial. The following letter answers The Left Hand of January 28.

Dear Bud:

I fear you've inadvertently taken me out of context ("Left Hand," Bugle, 1/28), but so skillfully I enjoyed reading your criticism more than I enjoyed writing "The Popcorn on the Floor," the column toward which you were antagonistic.

Several points: the column, of course, was not written for the trade journal, but was simply one of the semi-weekly columns I've been writing. Trade journals usually publish what they feel will receive the most reader response. I operate under the theory that whatever I write is permanently in the public domain, and can be reprinted without permission. The "context" out of which you wrote was not in your selection of quotes — you're too good a newspaperman to be guilty of that — but the "context" of those 104 columns a year. My regular "enemy" is the fear, superstition, ego and avarice Americans display; their coolness toward the sympathy that humanity demands of its members if it is to survive the discounts of civilization. Chicagoans of all stripes have felt my wrath; those suburbanites who irritate me are those who "escaped" to the suburbs, usually giving quasi-realistic fears as their reason, but in truth trying to escape from themselves — which in the long run is impossible. The "sterility" is found in the older, more settled suburbs, where personal escapism has become a way of life, where survival apparently is to avoid the sharp and challenging.

Beginning last year state income tax sharing with local governments began. It was intended this sharing would help municipalities meet their financial needs.

Illinois' sharing with local governments was the first state to undertake such an effort and hopefully decreasing tax levies and increasing aid to education would result from this sharing.

Niles Mayor Nick Blase, who is chairman of the Cook County Council of Governments Aid to Education Committee, said, "I know of no Cook County municipalities that gave their share of the state income tax directly to education."

It is expected the state money will aid in reducing village tax monies locally. Blase told The Bugle he expected this year's tax bill will reflect a reduction in the village tax. This local tax is about 4% of a total tax bill of \$1,000 or about 6% of a real estate tax bill of \$700.

Spiraling government costs led most municipalities to include their shares in the general corporate funds.


Chicago City Budget Director Edward J. Bedore said the distribution of income tax funds is made on the basis of population but it should also be based on need.

How did other suburbs use the past year's moneys? Evergreen Park used the money to offset spiraling construction costs. Cicero President John Karner said the funds have "helped hold the line on losses." Cicero lost the 2% township collectors fee when local commissions were abolished in 1969. While Park Forest's Mayor says the money will also be used for "holding the line" of increased costs, Des Plaines Mayor Behrel said funds caused a drop in the property tax for the city from 78 cents to 56 cents per \$100 assessed valuation and he believed the decrease was a factor in voters okaying a 35 cent educational tax increase for the local school district there.

Arlington Heights officials said the money was used for helping to pay increased costs

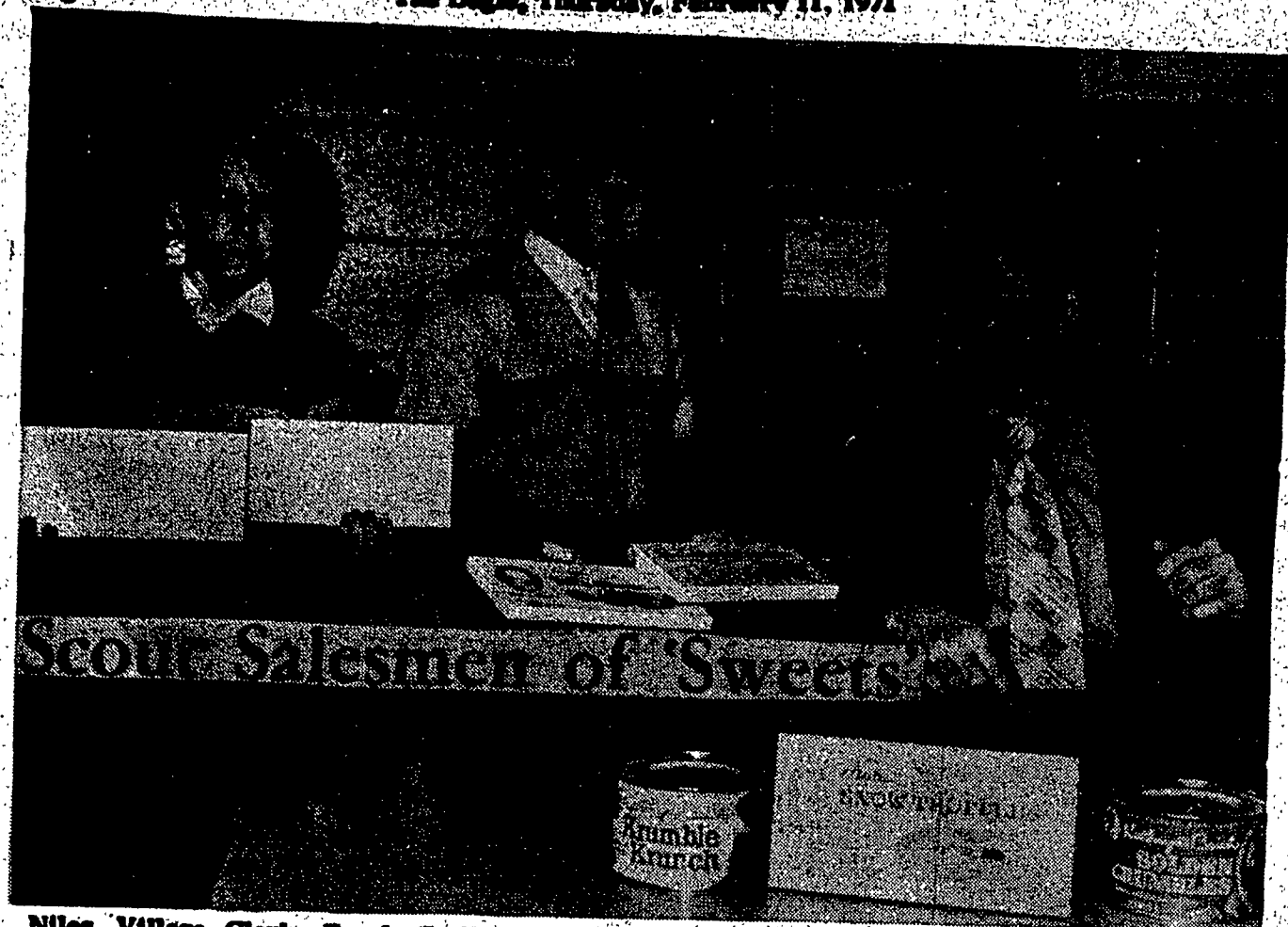

Super Science Students

Projects resulting from studies done in Science Seminar at Maine Township high school East has placed a Niles boy, Samir Barakat, and a Morton Grove boy, Arnold Barsky, on the list of Honors Group in the 30th Annual Science Talent Search, a contest for the Westinghouse Science Scholarships and Awards. The contest attracted 17,751 participants out of which the Maine East students in the top 210, the Honors Group.

The boys for the past three years have voluntarily spent their free time in Science Seminar where they began and completed their projects under the direction of Dennis Dresen, a master biology teacher. Dresen's primary function as director of the independent study seminar is as consultant and coordinator for student projects.

Barakat's project, "A Study of the Seasonal Fluctuations of Aquatic Beetle Populations of Two Temporary Ponds in Northeastern Illinois," stemmed from his hobby of entomology. For three years, the young scientist, described as "highly self-motivated," studied aquatic beetle fauna in relationship to the seasonal changes in two ponds located in Niles. His study resulted in new documentation for previously known beetle as well as identifying a new species of beetle not previously classified. Several entomologists have verified the new find which will now become public scientific data.

"The Effects of DDT on the Carbon Dioxide Uptake of Chlamydomonas" is the title of the two year study undertaken by Barsky. Chlamydomonas is a fresh water single cell green plant more commonly known as

algae. Barsky's project, which emanated from an article dealing with the importance of DDT as a pollutant, measured the effect of DDT on oxygen production of the fresh water algae—algae produces 80% of the earth's oxygen. Equipment at Argonne National Laboratory was used to measure by liquid scintillation the absorbed carbon dioxide of DDT treated algae to controlled comparisons.

The purpose of the Science Talent Search is to discover at the high school senior year level those who have the potentialities to become the research scientist of the future. All boys and girls awarded Honors in the Science Talent Search are considered so outstanding that any institution of high learning will be justified in considering their abilities carefully.

Barakat and Barsky both have intentions of continuing their scientific endeavors in college. Barakat plans to matriculate at Carleton studying to become an ecologist while Barsky plans to attend the University of Illinois and major in chemistry.

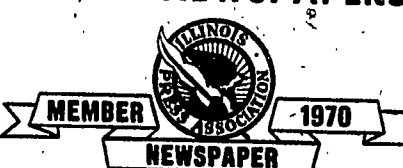
As seniors, both boys are busy preparing papers to be submitted to the Future Scientists and Engineers competition sponsored by Humble Oil Company and the National Science Teachers Association. The contest is judged solely on a written report of an independent research project. The top ten winners will receive scholarships of \$6,000.

More and more adults are reaching out for something more than their present way of life offers them, whether that "something more" takes the form of personal self-expression, making a better income, completing work for a degree, or involvement in community affairs.

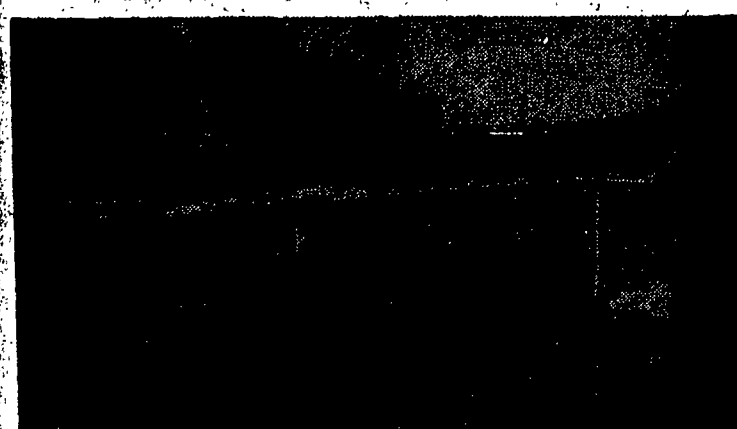

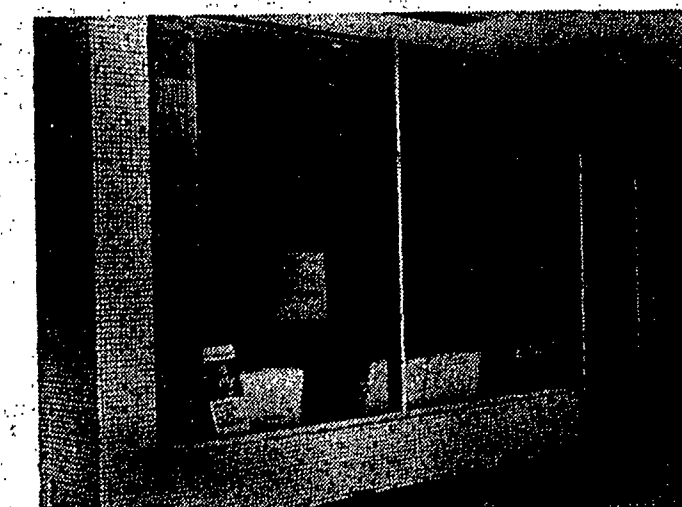

As to Aristotle and Joyce: If the better educated, wealthier suburbanites can't be the repository of some of the world's learning, who can? As a newspaperman, you know that the reader is almost always more intelligent than some newspapers would like to pretend. You and I can write about Aristotle and Joyce and be regularly surprised at how quickly our readers catch the drift, and how much they enjoy it.

My father didn't "give" me 48 newspapers to "play" newspaper with: I served a nine-year, award-winning apprenticeship as a reporter and editor. Although, I don't blame you for saying so; our organization is so gigantic that every other community newspaper in the country is jealous of it. We're big because we're good. But — and this is key — hundreds of fine newspapermen, like yourself, are not jealous so much of our success as our opportunity; you write a good column, and it's a shame you don't have the same 400,000 readers that I enjoy.

Actually, Mr. Besser, I agree: there is so much that is well-written and thoughtful among the smaller brethren, it's a shame they don't have the larger circulation. And, when you become as gigantic as we, in some neighborhoods the coverage falls off and we just live on our reputation, I find The Bugle impressive, as I do.

the papers of several of our few competitors — you can see, that's part of the problem: when you get big enough, it is too hard for a competitor to keep you honest, to force you into excellent coverage and keep you from being lazy or simply overwhelmed by the scope of that which must be covered. One of the reasons for our effectiveness in the Skokie, Niles, Morton Grove, Golf, Glenview, Lincolnwood, Highland Park areas is the strong competition.

Finally, I am not on the board of the Bank of Niles. That is my brother, Louis, who has more sitzpower. I am not connected with the bank in any way; I'm the poor but honest brethren.

Again, in the context of my regular articles "Popcorn on the Floor" is more meaningful. And again, you wrote of it so beautifully I can't complain — in your context, your arguments are interesting, valid and compelling. I've put in 14 1/2 years of the 10-hour days, and (just like you) I love it.

Cites Washington Road Accident Statistics

Dear Mr. Besser,

Thank you for your coverage of the re-zoning of the 12.6 acre site in Maine Township. Enclosed are statistics of accidents during the year 1969 and 1970 on Washington Rd. between Golf and Dempster obtained from three police departments. The statistics show a 50% increase in automobile accidents from 1969 to 1970, without additional dwellings. By adding 360 apartments with a minimum of 540 cars allowed by the developer the accident rate would most likely increase by an additional 30%. Thereby making it suicidal to go shopping by way of Washington Street. This will result in automobile drivers shortcutting through the inner streets of Morton Grove and Niles endangering children who are thought to be safe on the private residential streets.
