

Projects resulting from stu-dies done in Science Seminar at Maine Township high school East has placed a Niles boy, Samir Barakat, and a Morton Grove boy, Arnold Barsky, on the list of Honors Group in The 30th Annual Science Talent Search, a contest for the Westinghouse Science Scholarships and Awards. The contest attracted 17,751 participants out of which the Maine East students in the top 210, the Honors Group.

The boys for the past three years have voluntarily spent their free time in Science Seminar where they began and completed their projects under the direction of Dennis Dresen, a master biology teacher. Dresen's primary function as director of the independent study seminar is as consultant and coordinator for student pro-

Barakat's project, "A Study of the Seasonal Fluctuations of Aquatic Beetle Populations of Two Temporary Ponds in North-eastern Illinois," stemmed from his hobby of entymology. For three years, the young sci-entist, described as "highly self-motivated," studied aquatic beetle fauna in relationship to the seasonal changes in two ponds located in Niles. His study resulted in new documentation for previously known beetle as well as identifying a new specie of beetle not previously classified. Several entymologists have verified the new find which will now become public scientific data.

"The Effects of DDT on the Carbon Dioxide Uptake of Chlamydomonas" is the title of the two year study undertaken by Barsky, Chlamydomonas is a fresh water single cell green plant more commonly known as



The purpose of the Science Talent Search is to discover at the high school senior year level those who have the potentialities to become the research scientist of the future. All boys and girls awarded Honors in the Science Talent Search are considered so outstanding that any institution of high learning will be justified in considering their abilities carefully.

Barakat and Barsky both have intentions of continuing their scientific endeavors in college Barakat plans to matriculate at Carleton studying to become an ecologist while Barsky plans to attend the University of Illinois and major in chemistry.

As seniors, both boys are busy preparing papers to be sub-mitted to the Future Scientists and Engineers competition sponsored by Humble Oil Company and the National Science Teachers Association. The contest is judged solely on a written report of an independent research project. The top ten winners will receive scholarships of \$6,000.
