## From the Left Hand

Charley Percy and David "Bud" Besser had breakfast together Monday at the Hyatt House. Between the snap, crackle and pop, the senior senator from Illinois had an informal get-together with suburban newspaper people. It was a leisurely 2 hour session which was interrupted only by non-breakfast-eating people who suddenly found themselves wolfing down scrambled eggs and sausages.

While the subject most discussed was the run-away-inflation, Percy was most frank and candid in all his comments. While little newsworthy came out of the session he told us to watch the political future of John Connally, the former Democratic Texas governor, who Nixon recently hired to run the treasury department. While he thought there was not the slightest chance any Republican would try to dislodge Mr. Nixon in the 1972 primaries, he did say it was quite possible Mr. Connally might become Nixon's running mate.

Percy said he was concerned with mass transportation in the country and intended introducing legislation which would aid public transit. He was concerned about the troubles with the CTA, and being a north shore suburbanite, was aware of the dire straits of suburban public transportation.

He stands fast with the president on winding down the war in Indo-China and believes we are still in a favorable position to negotiate the release of prisoners-of-war, contrary to reports in Chicago newspapers, which were somewhat different.

The 6% unemployment rate would have to be cut, according to Percy, or Mr. Nixon will not be re-elected.

It was a worthwhile 2 hours. Percy has that quality we call "charisma" which could well vault him into the top spot in his party. He's a handsome man in his early fifties, who looks 35. He dresses conservatively, expensively, and three shades sharper than his Ivy league counterpart, who's the junior senator from Illinois.

While he's candid in answering all questions he's so adroit he could feel comfortable among liberal college kids as well as old line Union Club members. He's a guy who's got "it," and we're expecting he'll be up at the top, or next.

## Firefighter School

Chief Hildebrandt of the Morton Grove Fire Department announced this week that Firefighter Albert Pitts of his department returned last week from a four day school for Fire Inspectors sponsored by the State Fire Inspectors Association at Rock Island, Illinois. This association is composed of inspectors from Illinois, Wisconsin and Iowa. The school consisted of a series of classes on such subjects as Sprinkler Requirements in High-Rises; NFPA Life Safety Code which regulates the type of construction needed, the number of exits necessary and all other types of fire protection required to make buildings of different occupancies reasonably safe from danger to life as a result of fire, smoke, fumes or panic before buildings can be safely vacated; Bomb identification; arson investigation; proper methods of venting toxic or otherwise dangerous fumes and gases generated by home and industrial heating devices.

Firefighter Pitts attended the school with inspectors from Skokie, Glenview, Des Plaines, Arlington Heights and North Maine. Total attendance included 170 Fire Inspectors from approximately 100 Illinois, Wisconsin and Iowa communities.

## MG Postmaster Defends Rate Hike

Postmaster Robert R. Lutz recently proposed new postal rate increases will place the nation's postal system on a sound financial basis and shift more of the costs from taxpayers generally to those who use the mails the most.

He explained that recent Postal Service proposals submitted Feb. 1 to the Postal Rate Commission would add additional revenues of \$1.45 billion during fiscal 1972, starting July 1. The proposals call for increases in virtually all mail

categories except parcel post. In addition to the long-standing Postal Service proposal for a 2-cent boost for letters from 6 to 8 cents, advertising mail (regular bulk rate third-class) would be increased to a minimum of 5 cents per piece, plus additional increases also are proposed for magazines, newspapers and other categories of second-class mail. Mr. Lutz said, These rather steep increases will be phased in over five years to soften the impact on the mailers.

Other highlights of the proposal: Airmail rates would go up a penny, from 10 to 11 cents, and air mail cards, from 8 to 9 cents each.

If temporary rates are placed into effect, postal cards will go from 5 to 6 cents although the proposal provides for a full increase to 7 cents each.

Concerning "Priority Mail" — packages weighing more than 12 ounces and receiving first-class treatment — higher rates are proposed only for parcels weighing less than 5 pounds. For a 5-pound priority mail package sent across the U.S., the rates would remain \$4.08, under the proposal. However, for a 1-pound package, an increase of from 80 cents to \$1 is proposed.

Controlled circulation publications — usually periodicals without subscription fees mailed to specific audiences or markets — face an increase in only their minimum per piece rate to 5 cents from the existing 3.8 cents postage fee. The pound

rate remains the same.

In third-class, the rates for single pieces — often a circular or small parcel — would rise to 8 cents for the first 2 ounces and the fee for each additional ounce would be raised from 2 to 4 cents under the permanent-rate proposal.

Special delivery and registered mail fees would both be increased. The minimum fee for a special delivery letter would rise from 45 to 60 cents, while the rate for registered mail valued up to \$100 would be increased from 80 to 95 cents under the proposal. There would be proportionate hikes in the fees for shipments registered at higher values.

The total yield under the proposal, when fully effective, is estimated at \$2,125.8 million, including all of the rates to be phased over a period of years.

In the first year \$670 million of the \$2,125.8 million would be provided for appropriations by Congress under the Postal Reorganization Act.

About 80 per cent of the nation's mail volume of nearly 90 billion pieces in fiscal year 1972 will be business-type mail, and the bulk of the increase would be borne by these users.

Compared to other costs the 8¢ stamp proposed by the United States Postal Service will still be one of the best buys for the money that exists anywhere in the world, Morton Grove Postmaster Robert R. Lutz said recently.

When effective, the new rate will mean first class stamp prices have increased by 166 per cent since 1932. During the same 39 year period, wholesale prices have increased by 230 per cent and the average pay of manufacturing workers has gone up by 670 per cent.

"Back in 1932," the postmaster recalled, "nobody complained about the cost of mailing a first class letter at 3 cents. Yet, if postal rates had risen at the same rate as retail prices since 1932, it would cost 10 cents today to send a first class letter."



## Dist. 63 Kindergarten Registration

Registration for children who will attend kindergarten next September in East Maine School District No. 63 schools will be held from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. and from 1 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. on Thursday and Friday, March 18 and 19. Parents should register their children at the individual schools to be attended. Children registering for kindergarten must be five (5) years of age on or before Dec. 1, 1971, and those entering first grade for the first time, or who are new residents of the district (without previous kindergarten experience), must be (6) years of age on or before Dec. 1, 1971.

A certified copy of the birth certificate must be presented at the time of registration or the child cannot be enrolled. For children born in Cook County, you may obtain a certified copy of the birth certificate from the Cook County Clerk's Office.

All children entering kindergarten for the 1971-72 school year must have a physical examination and immunizations for measles, polio, diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis and small pox. The evidence of such examination and immunizations must be brought up to date and verified by the school officials before a child will be admitted to school in the fall.

First graders who did not attend kindergarten, must also present evidence of a physical examination and immunization. Forms will be available for all parents on the registration dates mentioned above. Any refusals because of religious beliefs must be accompanied by a written statement from the parent or a religious affiliation administrator. This request conforms with the law in effect now concerning such examinations.

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
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
