BLASE AND LOW COST HOUSING

Niles village president Nick Blase is a politician in the best and worst sense of the word. In past elections he has said it is important area residents elect him because of his close ties to the Chicago and Cook County Democrats. On other occasions, when it was politically expedient in suburbia, he has blasted Mayor Daley. When Blase served as a delegate to the Democratic convention he did just as Mayor Daley told all the Illinois delegates to do, not once deviating from the Daley axis.

This very political man has also been a shining example on 2 separate occasions of standing ten feet tall. When 1 negro family moved into town Blase stood against the tide of public hysteria by defending their rights to live here. Again, when Niles passed an open housing law, against a similar hysteria Blase stood against the tide in backing the local ordinance.

When Niles led the way for the senior citizens building on Milwaukee Avenue, this very political man again showed another side, when he condoned a ruling which prevented any negro families from moving into the building. Niles okayed a resolution which gave Niles residents, and parents of Niles residents, first priority in moving into the building. While the money for the senior citizens building was financed 90% by the federal government, still, Niles passed this regulation, which eliminated negro residency in a building which negroes contributed to thru their own federal taxes.

Blase was seen on television this past week and then immediately issued a news release on low cost housing which we are publishing this week and which we believe is not in the best interests of our country. (See Below)

Blase Blasts Compulsory Low Cost Housing

Niles Mayor Nicholas B. Blase has released the following statements regarding his position on low cost housing in suburban Cook County.

As Mayor of the Village of Niles it is my responsibility to protect the property values of my constituency and to encourage only those projects that will serve their best interests. In its present form, low cost housing will depress real estate property values and cause undue financial stress upon the homeowner. We must first define low cost housing in its present form. I recognize that any man can and should be able to purchase a home wherever he can afford and has a desire to live, but he should be able to maintain a standard of living equal to the area he chooses to reside in. This is integration and I fully believe in it.

I do not have the right to gamble with the property values of the people living in my community. No one has that right. The law clearly states we cannot take property away from a person without due process of law. When we depress a neighborhood by reducing its standards and forcing its residents to live in an unaccetable area we are

Widening of Howard St. Scheduled

At the Niles Chamber of Commerce meeting held March 10 County Commissioner Floyd Fuller reviewed the project to widen Howard Street from the Howard Street bridge over the north branch of the Chicago river.

The schedule calls for the completion of the bridge in 1972 by the County at a cost of \$180,000. Niles will provide sewers and streets from Milwaukee Avenue to Lehigh Road.

Village manager Ken Scheel told The Bugle the improvement is on schedule. The widening from Milwaukee Road was completed in 1970 and the entire 1970 to 1974 project should be completed as planned.

A special assessment will be used for the 48 inch storm sewers which will accept water from lateral sewers leading into them, as well as for the street widening.

Reach Compromise
With Washington St. Residents

GEMCO GRAND ENTRANCE NOT SO

There was a little bit of bombast, some 'save our children' hollering, a bit of backtracking and sidestepping, and when the long 3 hour meeting ended the 'bad guys' (GEMCO Dept. Store) received 1 of 2 temporary Washington Street exits and entrances for their proposed parking lot, and the 'good guys' (Washington Street residents) managed to have the second one eliminated, and will police the area by serving on a committee for safety.

About 100 residents from north Washington Street heard at Tuesday night's special hearing GEMCO attorney George Crampton and architect Larry Duke spell out the plans for the area surrounding their store complex in the 8900 block on Milwaukee Avenue.

With much emotion residents stated the problem. Mrs. Jacobson of Washington Street said, "You can't equate 1 child's broken limb with big business," objecting to any ingress and egress on Washington Street. Emotionally she said the residents would "cry" not the public officials or the GEMCO people, if one child's life is lost there.

A Mrs. Reese, of Churchill Avenue, objected to the hazard caused by children in the Churchill area who have to go to school there (at the Nelson School) and the inherent school crossing dangers in the area.

'Last Bastion of Democracy'

In the year that has passed since our last annual Town Meeting in Maine and Niles Townships, many changes have been made in the structure and operation of township government. The Leagues of Women Voters of Morton Grove-Niles and League of Women Voters of Skokie have been conducting a study of this form of local government and the effects upon it of the new Constitution and recent legislation, and as a public service to our community would like to share their findings.

Commonly called the "last bastion of democracy" by its proponents, township government was, until recently, the only form of local government where the taxpayer had a direct say in matters of budget, appropriation, and tax levy. Although legislation passed by the General Assembly has removed

many of the powers of the voter attending the Town Meeting, and the budget and tax levies other than that for roads and bridges are now established by the Township Board of Auditors; voters who attend the meeting may still approve any policy decisions proposed by the Board, as well as the Highway Commission tax levy.

Another change in the township organization is that the township can no longer retain the 2% commission on real property tax collections, which previously constituted the township's working capital. The cost of running the township must now be provided by a separate tax levy. Since the tax will now provide surplus funds, elementary school districts will no longer benefit from a vote of the electors to transfer funds for their use. The Township Collector now acts as a deputy

of the County Collector. The job of Township Assessor has also become practically non-existent with the abolishment of the personal property tax, effective Jan. 1, 1971. It was his function to evaluate the personal property of individuals and unincorporated businesses, and the personal property tax on businesses will be discounted by 1979.

Maine Township continues to provide General Assistance or Emergency Aid, and maintain its less than 30 miles of unincorporated roads. Niles Township also provides general assistance and supports the Niles Township Youth Commission.

The League of Women Voters will go into more detail on these topics in forthcoming articles as part of our policy to encourage an informed voting population.

Miller Questions Development of Multiples

Dear Friend and Residents of Niles:

Planned unit development has now arrived in Niles, but who will benefit? The people or certain vested interest groups?

Where will it be utilized? It is rumored to be slated for the 9 hole golf course on Golf Road, the vacant 31 acres on the northwest corner across from the Golf Mill Shopping Center and thirdly, a yet to be announced large tract area near the center of Niles. More about this at a later date.

High Rises and Multiple Housing Units do not pay their fair share of School Taxes—, but somebody will pay them— guess who?

Currently, I should like to point out a very serious safety hazard that exists in many areas of our Village. This violation remains a threat to everyone. Namely, the lack of automobile wheel stops that primarily are to be used as safety protective zones between the Customer Parking Areas and the normally constructed pedestrian sidewalks (where they exist). These wheel stops are required by Village Ordinance for the Safety, Health and Welfare of all the people...Why then is this ordinance not enforced by the Village? Do we have a double standard of justice for some?

Space will only allow the listing of one general area where flagrant violations of this Ordinance are occurring daily. We cite for example, Milwaukee Ave. between Howard and Monroe Streets (both sides of the street) where the absence of

wheel stops in many Parking Areas can be readily observed. How can we identify as a progressive Village, one that takes all precautions to protect our loved ones from possible serious injury, when these conditions are allowed to continue to exist.

In this same vain why should heavy traffic be diverted (by executive order) to quiet, orderly residential areas such as proposed in the new Gemco Facility, thereby causing potential injury, congestion, pollution, lowering of the property values etc.

Who do the people of Niles have to protect their rights? I pledge my complete efforts to eliminate these types of violations and all others that are conducive to the lowering of the Village of Niles Safety Standards.

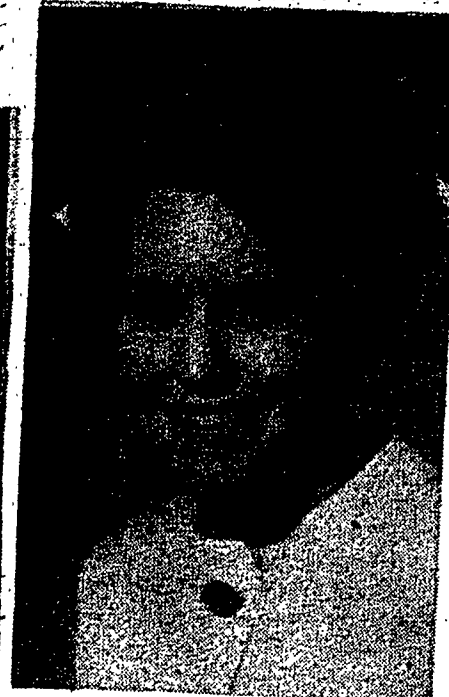

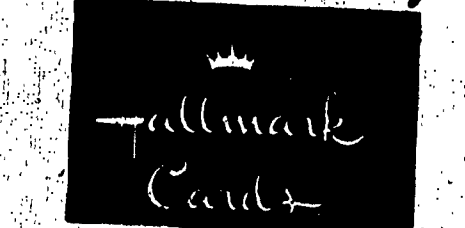

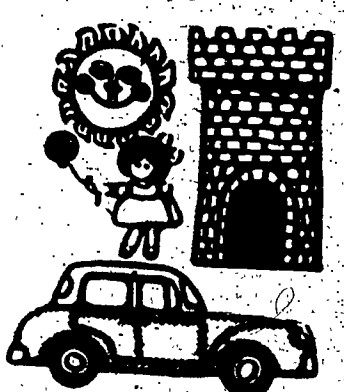
racings against the clock. The next problem was tracking a "ferocious bear" through the snow. A "victim" fell through the ice. Rescue had to be executed and first aid administered.

As is their custom once a year, a hot turkey meal with all the trimmings was prepared by the mothers and delivered to the cabin. Things will get a bit rougher as the boys hike down the Red Caboose Trail and canoe down to the Des Plaines River in the coming months.

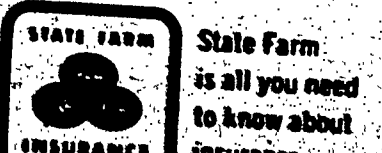

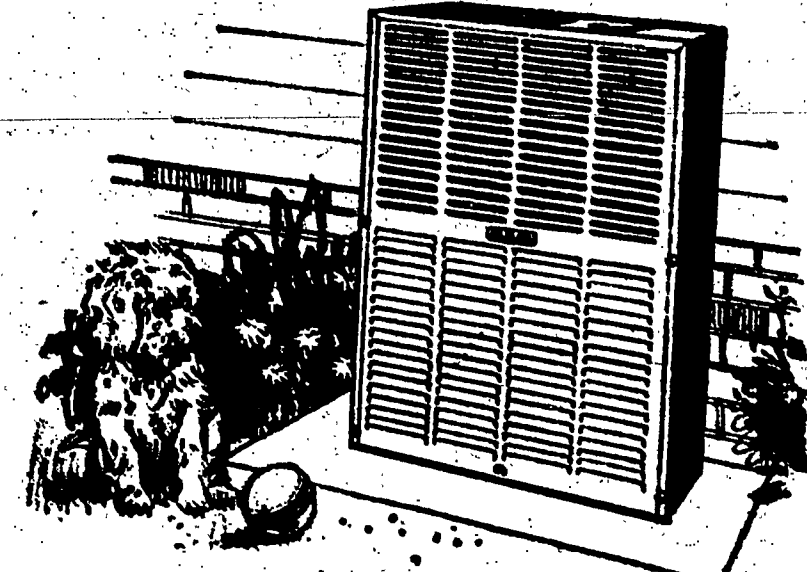

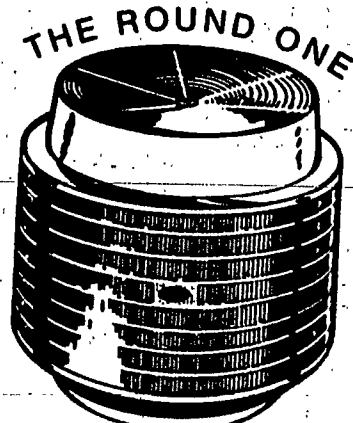

North Maine Fire District Files Law Suit

Trustees of the North Maine Fire Protection District last week filed suit in the Circuit Court of Cook County through their attorney, Wilhelm F. Leander of Des Plaines, for a declaratory judgment to have a 1965 amendment to the State Fire Marshall Act declared unconstitutional.

The amendment concerns the automatic disconnection from fire protection district of territory which is annexed by a neighboring community.

Named as defendants in the action are The Village of Niles, The City of Des Plaines, The City of Park Ridge, and Edward J. Barrett, County Clerk of Cook County, Illinois.

The suit was filed by attorney Leander on March 4. As yet no date for hearings on the action has been set.

According to Henry A. Coopmans, 9118 Greenwood, Des Plaines, president of the North Maine Fire Protection District, the suit has been filed by the

district's trustees because there is a real danger that the fire district's ability to furnish fire protection to residents and property in the North Maine district will be substantially impaired or possibly totally destroyed if disconnections of its territory under this statute are permitted to continue.

Trustees in addition to Coopmans are George Welke, 9250 Golf Rd., and Marvin H. Glickman, 9511 Terrace Place, all in unincorporated Des Plaines.

"The 1965 statute we are seeking to have declared unconstitutional," states Coopmans, "provides that if any territory within a fire protection district is annexed to a city, village or incorporated town that provides fire protection for property within its boundaries, such territory is, by operation of law, disconnected from the fire protection district as of the first of January after such territory is annexed to the city.

"This automatic disconnection can be prevented if the affected fire protection district within 60 days after the alleged annexation becomes effective, files a petition alleging that such disconnection will cause the territory remaining in the district to be noncontiguous, or that the loss of assessed valuation by reason of such disconnection will impair the ability of the district to render fully adequate fire protection to the remaining territory in the district.

"We feel that this statute is

unconstitutional, illegal and invalid," says Coopmans. "In that it violates the due process clause of the State Constitution and is discriminatory to the fire districts and the owners of property within such districts. It is also uncertain, vague, incomplete and contradictory."

The North Maine Fire Protection District has filed several petitions to prevent disconnection of territory from the district under this statute, several of which are still pending.

"Our actions in this regard are in no way attempts to void the purported annexations," Coopmans declares, "nor does this current legal action seek to have any of these annexations declared invalid, or to prevent future annexations. We recognize the right of residents to be annexed to a city or village if that is their wish."

"However, we do protest the automatic disconnection of these territories from our fire protection district and in our suit we ask the court to enjoin Edward J. Barrett, County Clerk for Cook County, from removing from the tax rolls of our district any real or personal property within the boundaries of the North Maine Fire Protection District."

Trustee Coopmans points out that frequently various city or village officials have publicly alleged that property left in a fire protection district which is annexed is subject to double taxation for fire protection.

"This is not true," he emphasizes, "because under Illinois

statutes, where a city and a fire protection district both serve a given area, the Fire District is charged by law with the primary obligation of furnishing fire protection and has the primary right to tax the residents for that purpose.

"On the other hand," Coopmans continues, "these same officials often do not tell the residents of the area that when their territory is annexed to a city or village, the newly annexed taxpayers will have to assume their proportionate share of all the bonded indebtedness of the city, and they must still pay their proportionate share of any outstanding bonds of the fire district, even after their disconnection from that fire district."

There are 695 Fire Protection Districts in Illinois, many of them being hurt by this 1965 amendment to the State Fire Marshall Act. If the North Maine Fire District's action is successful, the decision will favorably affect all the other 694 districts in the state, says president Coopmans.

About 5 years ago we heard a Loyola University professor state the inner city was seaming with discontent. He said the hemming in of blacks in the inner city, while whites flee to suburbia, is an ominous sign of inevitable chaos. He noted whites come into the city for employment, and then take out money back to suburbia, exploiting the city, but not willing to contribute there. Meanwhile, blacks who live there were forced to stay in a ghetto, where their opportunities were limited. Such a conflict, he said, manifested an explosive situation.

More recently we spoke to attorney Louis Ansel, who is a foremost authority on municipalities. He mentioned suburbia has to open up to those trapped in the inner city. Only this past week we heard from a priest working in the Garfield Park area, who said the housing situation there has continued to deteriorate during the past year, as those ghettoized compound the problems they live under.

Niles Mayor Nick Blase's entire thesis is, the lowering of property values and the ability to maintain a standard of living, as the criteria which he objects to low cost housing being placed here in suburbia. He then states "suburban communities have not borrowed money from the federal government for low cost housing", forgetting that the only federal senior citizens building in north suburbia is in Niles, and that was financed by 90% federal monies, for low cost housing.

Bud Robins, a developer and resident on Churchill in Morton Grove took up the resident's shibboleth stating those who designed the GEMCO area don't have to live there. While he said you can't stop progress he suggested the proposed park should act as a buffer from GEMCO, and be extended the length of Washington Street in a narrow elongated strip. He said the present burden at stop lights in the Dempster - Milwaukee area is so great, it now takes three light changes before cars can go thru the intersection. He also said the desirability of extending Ballard to Washington from Milwaukee will greatly enhance traffic in the area to the east, and said the fire department's desire for a fire lane into the area is not necessary since they now successfully service the area.

Fire Chief Al Hoelbi, answering Robins, said the likelihood of the thru street on Ballard will enable Niles fire department saving as much as 2 minutes in getting to an emergency, which FD officials have always said are most critical.

Beverly Rubin, Joseph Levi, Steve Kobaska, Mrs. Halfgort and a Mr. Mudeiman also voiced their opinions regarding the area.

A Mr. Sterling who lives on the corner of Washington and Dempster, suggested no exits and entrances on Washington Street but rather the new Ballard Road have ingress and egress coming and going out only to Milwaukee Avenue.

Niles electrical inspector Joe Salerno momentarily lit a wick under the residents when he cited the greater amount of traffic in other areas of Niles and diminished the importance of the 2000 car daily traffic on Washington Street. When he remarked in his area at Clara and Greenwood there was 1 fatality of a child, the contained emotion almost blew the roof off the chamber room. Shouting with every ounce of emotion and fiery, resident Sherwin Levinson yelled, "1 fatality is 1 too many" and proceeded to tell how his son was struck by an auto there on Washington.

Niles Village attorney Dick Troy said there may be a legal problem in preventing an entrance onto Washington since GEMCO might be considered landlocked and the property might be curtailed. He explained because there was no egress to Dempster Street the GEMCO people must have at least 2 entrances and exits.

Whether we like it or not, the Kerner Commission report spelling out America as being a racist society is proven over and over again when we restrict a group from living where they choose. Contrary to Blase's thesis, property values cannot take precedence over human values. The rights of all people to live with dignity anywhere in this country is fundamental to what America is all about.

Whenever we contemplate the holding down of blacks in America we contend its no different than holding down the Jews who were ghettoized and destroyed in Europe, the Poles and Catholics who were destroyed by the Germans and Russians, the repressions caused by the Crusades, the jailing of dissenters in Greece and the cruelty of the tsars and the Stalin thruout history.

This past week New Yorker magazine featured an article which depicts the Chicago ghetto with its restrictive suburbs, as being among the worst in the nation. Coupling this with the words of political leaders who bow to the more popular policy of restriction reminds us of the parable Ernest Hemingway used for a title for his most important novel: "Any man's death diminishes me, because I'm involved in mankind; and therefore never send to know for whom the bell tolls; it tolls for thee."
