BLASE AND LOW COST HOUSING

Niles village president Nick Blase is a politician in the best and worst sense of the word. In past elections he has said it is important area past elections he has said it is important area residents elect him because of his close ties to the Chicago and Cook County Democrats. On other occasions, when it was politically expedient in suburbia, he has blasted Mayor Daley. When Blase served as a delegate to the Democratic convention he did just as Mayor Daley told all the Illinois delegates to do, not once deviating from the Daley axis.

This very political man has also been a shining example on 2 separate occasions of standing ten feet tail. When 1 negro family moved into town Blase stood against the tide of public hysteria by defending their rights to live here. Again, when Niles passed an open housing law, against a similar hysteria Blase stood against the tide in backing the local ordinance.

When Niles led the way for the senior citizens building on Milwaukee Avenue, this very political man again showed another side, when he condoned a ruling which prevented any negro families from moving into the building. Niles okayed a resolution which gave Niles residents, and parents of Niles residents, first priority in moving into the building. While the money for the senior citizens building. ing was financed 90% by the federal government, still. Niles passed this regulation, which eliminated negro residency in a building which negroes contributed to thru their own federal taxes.

Blase was seen on television this past week and then immediately issued a news release on low cost housing which we are publishing this week and which we believe is not in the best interests of our country. (See Below)

Howard St. Scheduled

At the Niles Chamber of Com-merce meeting held March 10 County Commissioner Floyd Fulle reviewed the project to widen Howard Street from the Howard Street bridge over the north branch of the Chicago

The schedule calls for the completion of the bridge in 1972 by the County at a cost of \$180,000. Niles will provide sewers and streets from Milwaukee Avenue to Lehigh Road.

Village manager Ken Scheel told The Bugle the improvement is on schedule. The widening from Milwaukee Road was completed in 1970 and the entire 1970 to 1974 project should be completed as planned.

A special assessment will be used for the 48 inch storm sewers which will accept water from lateral sewers leading into them, as well as for the street widening.

As Mayor of the Village of Niles it is my responsibility to protect the property values of my constituency and to encourage only those projects that will serve their best interests. In it's present form, low cost housing will depress realestate property values and cause undue financial stress upon the home-owner. We must first define low

cost housing in its present form.

Board Hears Ballard Park

Tuesday evening, the park board was notified that the scheduled June 1 completion date for the Ballard Park Sports Complex is now twenty days behind schedule due to the adverse weather conditions. Excavation proceed ings have been delayed due to the 2 to 2-1/2 feet of frost still in the ground. With the use of heavy duty space heaters, a portion of the floor area in the east half of the bath house and the chimney pad have been thawed enough to permit the pouring of cement in that area the latter part of this week. Masons are scheduled to begin errecting the parcitions in the bath house this week and the arrival of the arches for the ice rink structure is scheduled for Monday, March 22, It was also noted that although there is now a 20 day delay in the completion schedule, this time can possibly be made up providing there is a break in the weather.

The board also approved for payment \$34,650 to the general contractor for the Ballard Park complex, \$4,246,87 to the plumbing contractor and \$6,030 to the electrical contractor.

Commissioner Beusse noted that on April 20, two new park commissioners are to be elected for six year terms and since the park board elections will be conducted in 25 of the 28 polling precincts used by the village, a resolution was passed requesting the secretary to check the feasibility of combining the legal notices of polling places with the village and splitting the cost.

A representative of the Courtland Park Golf Mill Homeowners Association questioned a letter her association had received from President Gerry Sullivan regarding requests they had made for additional park facilities in the Courtland Park area. Commissioner Eagan replied that all requests from homeowner associations would be considered in April when meetings will be conducted on the park board budget for 1971-

Commissioner Eagan presided over this meeting in the absence of President Gerry Sullivan who is now recuperating a fall on the ice two weeks ago when he was entering the gym of St. John Brebeuf.

The meeting was postponed until next Tuesday, March 23, at 8 p.m. due to the fact that Commissioner Eagan, in the absence of President Sullivan and Park Director Webbs Norman had to attend the meeting at the Council Chambers regarding the GEMCO project and the 2-1/2 acre park which is being errected in that area.

violating their rights and taking away property from them without due process of law. To further encourage this violation of due process of law we have Judges who have gone beyond the imitations of their office.

We have always had separate divisions in our government, the executive, judiciary and legislative branch. Each of these bodies has a separate function. A Judge's responsibil-ity is to state whether the law has been violated or not, but never to determine how to make it right. How to turn wrong into right is the job of our legislative branch of government

and should remain that way. I believe Judge Richard Austin in his ruling in the Chicago Housing Authority has over stepped the bounds of his judicial capacity; however, it will be up to higher courts to decide whether in fact this is true. Mayor Richard Daley attempted to throw the responsibility of low cost housing on the suburban communities but is not realistic in his approach. Suburban communities have not borrowed money from the gov-ernment for urban renewals and are not subject to government demands for low cost housing. Unfortunately Mayor Daley has never really understood the pro-blems of suburban Cook County.

As a Mayor I want to suggest a positive approach rather than just being critical of what is being attempted. I believe that the government must do two things in order to at least be able to start discussion of this problem without getting any immediate negative effect from all suburban communities. First, to this point, there has been no person whether he be in the U. S. Government, part of HUD and for that matter no one from the Chicago Housing Authority that has contacted me or any mayor that I know of in this immediate area to discuss the problems presented in so-called low cost housing. All we keep reading about is the fact that they are going to put up low cost housing in the suburbs, which immediately puts up negative wall in front of me because I feel, as I am sure other mayors feel, do not like to have something jammed down my throat.

If the government is seriously interested in projects of this type, they should start discussions with local mayors to discuss the feasibility of such programs and not let us read about their plans in the newspapers. Secondly, since the government has not been able to show the successfulness of this type of program they must be willing at the beginning of this program in Chicago, or someplace else, to guarantee the values of all homes within a one mile radius of where a low cost housing project is to be built. If the value of these homes was guaranteed it might eliminate some of the negativeness of impact on some of those people living in these areas. In conclusion, I am sure that

as Mayors and Village Boards we have an obligation to listen to any positive program that would make our cities a better world in which to live, but we do have a responsibility to our citizenry. This responsibility is to insure them and their families a good place in which to live, free of problems that make living intolerable and with a guarantee we will never do anything that will jeopardize their livelihoods or property. values.

About 5 years ago we heard a Loyola University professor state the inner city was seaming with discontent. He said the hemming in of blacks in the inner city, while whites flee to suburbia, is an ominous sign of inevitable chaos. He noted whites come into the city for employment, and then take out moneys back to suburbia, exploiting the city, but not willing to contribute there. Meanwhile, blacks who live there were forced to stay in a ghetto, where their opportunities were limited. Such a conflict, he said, manifested an explosive

More recently we spoke to attorney Louis Ancel, who is a foremost authority on municipalitles. He mentioned suburbia has to open up to those trapped in the inner city. Only this past week we heard from a priest working in the Garfield Park area, who said the housing situation there has continued to deteriorate during the past year, as those ghettoized compound the prob-lems they live under.

Niles Mayor Nick Blase's entire thesis is, the lowering of property values and the ability to maintain a standard of living, as the criteria which he objects to low cost housing being placed here in suburbia. He then states "suburban communities have not borrowed money from the federal government for low cost housing", forgetting that the only federal senior citizens building in north suburbia is in Niles, and that was financed by 90%federal monies, for low cost

Niles Mayor Blase, backing up acting chairman Tr. Ralph Bast, handled the proceedings with much humor, obviously placating much of the pent-upfeelings of the residents.

Blase said the village was committed to the project but emphasized the public officials would respond to the best interests of its residents. He said the safety council and another committee will accept members from the area to study the plan which all trustees agreed should be tried. There will be 1 right turn exit from the parking lot into Washington Street going toward Dempster Street and one left turn entrance into the parking lot from Washington Street approximately eight (8) lots from the Dempster Street corner.
