The GEMCO controversy regarding traffic in the Milwaukee-Dempster-Ballard area should be met head on by all concerned parties. The Bugle took its own mini-traffic survey Sunday afternoon at 3 P.M. Cars going south were stacked 94 deep at the Dempster-Milwaukee stop-light filing back to Schulte's Experimental Labs at 9201 Milwaukee, a 5 block backlog. It took us 7 minutes to cross the intersection. Autos going north were waiting in the 8600 block on Milwaukee. While Sunday was a pleasant day future week-end traffic will be even heavier when the warm weather comes. And when Norbert's swimming pool season is upon us traffic will increase even more. Add the Treasure Island Center at Golf and Milwaukee, plus the small shopping center planned for the east side of Milwaukee by the car dealers, and then add the GEMCO Center at the trailer park plus the increased business from the auto dealers and Niles will have a chaotic problem there.

In the Chicago Tribune's Tuesday Action Express column a Chicago resident complained she did not receive a \$200 deposit check she had placed with the Niles Police Department for a 1970 police car she had ordered. She said she cancelled the order after the auto strike delayed delivery of new cars for the police department. She re-ceived the return of a \$2,500 check for which she paid for the balance of the car but wrote the newspaper regarding the holding back of the initial \$200 deposit. Upon the Tribune's inves-tigation Niles Mayor Blase agreed the matter "should be settled pronto." The refund was held up because the intention of the purchaser was not known whether or not she still wanted a car.





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Maine Township Pays Double Tax

ship government, the Morton Crove-Niles League of Women Voters investigated the role of the Maine Township Highway Commission. Maine Township includes part of Morton Grove, and most of Niles, Park Ridge and Des Plaines.

The Highway Commission is responsible for the construction, care and maintenance of local streets in the unincorporated areas of the township. In Maine Township this amounts to approximately 27 miles of road, almost entirely located in the vicinity of northern Des Plaines and Niles. The cost of these services including the care and maintenance of equipment and salaries of all personnel except the Commissioner, is covered by a tax levy. Last year's levy was \$260,300. The tentative 1971 budget for the Highway Commission is \$431,700, and it can be assumed that the tax levy will approximate this amount. The Commissioner's salary is paid out of the General Town Fund tax

The amount of the Highway levy is determined as follows:

1. The Commissioner prepares a budget based on his estimate of cost for the com-

ing fiscal year. 2. This amount is then DOU_

BLED. 3. One half of this total tax levy is then returned to the municipalities in which it was collected, according

to Illinois State law. An inequity exists in this law, since portions of Niles and Morton Grove are located in Niles Township where there is no Highway Commission, and therefore, no tax levy. This windfall these village will receive for road improvements throughout the 'entire' village, will be provided only by those taxpayers residing in Maine Township. One half of the tax money paid by the residents of Maine Township for township roads will be used for roads

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residents who were not taxed. The electors, or residents of the township still have the right to make their voices heard on the budget and appropriation ordinance of the Highway Commission, in addition to making suggestions and recommendations. The opportunity to do this is at the budget hearing of the Highway Commission, which will be held at 7:30 p.m., Tuesday, March 30, at the Town-





The stand taken by our mayor on public housing in the suburbs is typical of the attitude espoused by many in this country, i.e., speaking out for the poor is fine so long as they remain a safe distance away. As you so aptly pointed out, too many citizens are concerned with property rights as the expense of fundamental human rights, including the right to decent housing for all.

The framers of the U.S. Constitution were well aware that under English law there was in progress a gradual erosion of individual rights. These same men were determined that in their new nation individual rights and liberties would be paramount. The result was the Bill of Rights.

Included in this Bill of Rights. under the Fifth Amendment, is the provision that no citizen shall be deprived of property without due process of law. While our courts have long struggled to determine exactly what constitutes due process. Mayor Blase seems sure that low cost public housing violates this provision. However, the other side of the due process coin holds that the poor should not be trapped in a ghetto merely because the existing power structure refuses to lend a compassionate hand.

Mayor Blase, as an attorney, should know better than to say that a judge's responsibility does not include determination of how to make the law right. The U.S. Constitution was purposely drawn with the greatest possible latitude. Inter-

The father of eight children who have attended or will at-. tend Maine Township shchools said that additional means of increasing revenue might also be considered at this time. He suggested the possibility of obtaining more revenue from the adult education program as one example and believes ways of obtaining better results on interest from school income should be explored.


