From the Left Hand

The League of Women Voters in Morton Grove-Niles has an important news item in the April issue of their newsletter which we would like to call to your attention. It concerns the annual meeting of our Township governments which takes place April 13.

While the League states it has a position on halting the expansion of township government, The Bugle has taken the position the past 3 years for eliminating township government. It has been our contention such government is superfluous and does not serve the people of our communities. Since our areas have increased their incorporated boundaries the villages and county sufficiently serve area-residents. Perpetuating a highway commissioner in Maine Township who has 30 miles of roads under his jurisdiction is indeed ludicrous and smacks at retaining a bureaucratic job at taxpayer's expense. The recent court ruling which denies township collectors are able to retain 2% of taxes, eliminates the need for a collector.

On April 13, if enough residents show up at the township meetings and turn down any budgets for township government, they will then die of their own attrition. Because the guys in these offices would like to retain them, it will take many interested residents to show up at this once-a-year meeting and counter the votes of the friends and politicians who would like to retain this boondoggle.

The following is the item from the League's newsletter which is headed: Attendance At Township Meetings Vital.

"In the year that has passed since our last annual Town Meetings in Maine and Niles Townships, many changes have been made in the structure and operation of township government.

Commonly called the "last bastion of democracy" by its proponents, township government was, until recently, the only form of local government where the taxpayer had a direct say in matters of budget, appropriation, and tax levy. Although legislation passed by the General Assembly has removed many of the powers of

8 TRUSTEE CANDIDATES AIR VIEWS

If you were the scorekeeper at Monday and Tuesday night's trustee candidates' debates you would have to conclude the score was 5 to 3, meaning the 5 out of office candidates were opposing the 3 ins (incumbents). And if you were a team member of either of the groups or a part of the independent's entourage you went away from the meetings saying your boy (or boys) was a sure fire winner.

First Party candidate Donald Johns was the major critic of the incumbents. He lashed out against what he called "spot zoning," opposed Niles' recent annexation, which he said no one wanted; air pollution action is relegated only to studies and not action; the newly formed Transportation Board spends \$15,000 (he was corrected, the figure is \$7,200 for a UMC bus subsidy for 1 year); demanded a political free government, contending officials are political puppets; improve traffic flow noting the 5,000 to 10,000 car flow at Milwaukee and Dempster is a joke (corrected by incumbent Marcheschi, the figure is 25,000) and concluded by saying how "bad" the incumbents are and he would like to show the residents how "good" his party can be.

Incumbent Dick Harczak, AIM Party, said he defined being a trustee as one who is trusted, reliable and dependable. He said his business experience should give "better insight" in aiding the village with its problems. He noted the low \$38.40 (per \$10,000 assessed valuation) village tax has been maintained thru his 4 years in office. He pointed to the new fire station, village hall, new courthouse facilities which were all built without any extra cost to villagers. He noted the consumer fraud division, which is unique only in Niles among its neighbors, has processed 100 cases.

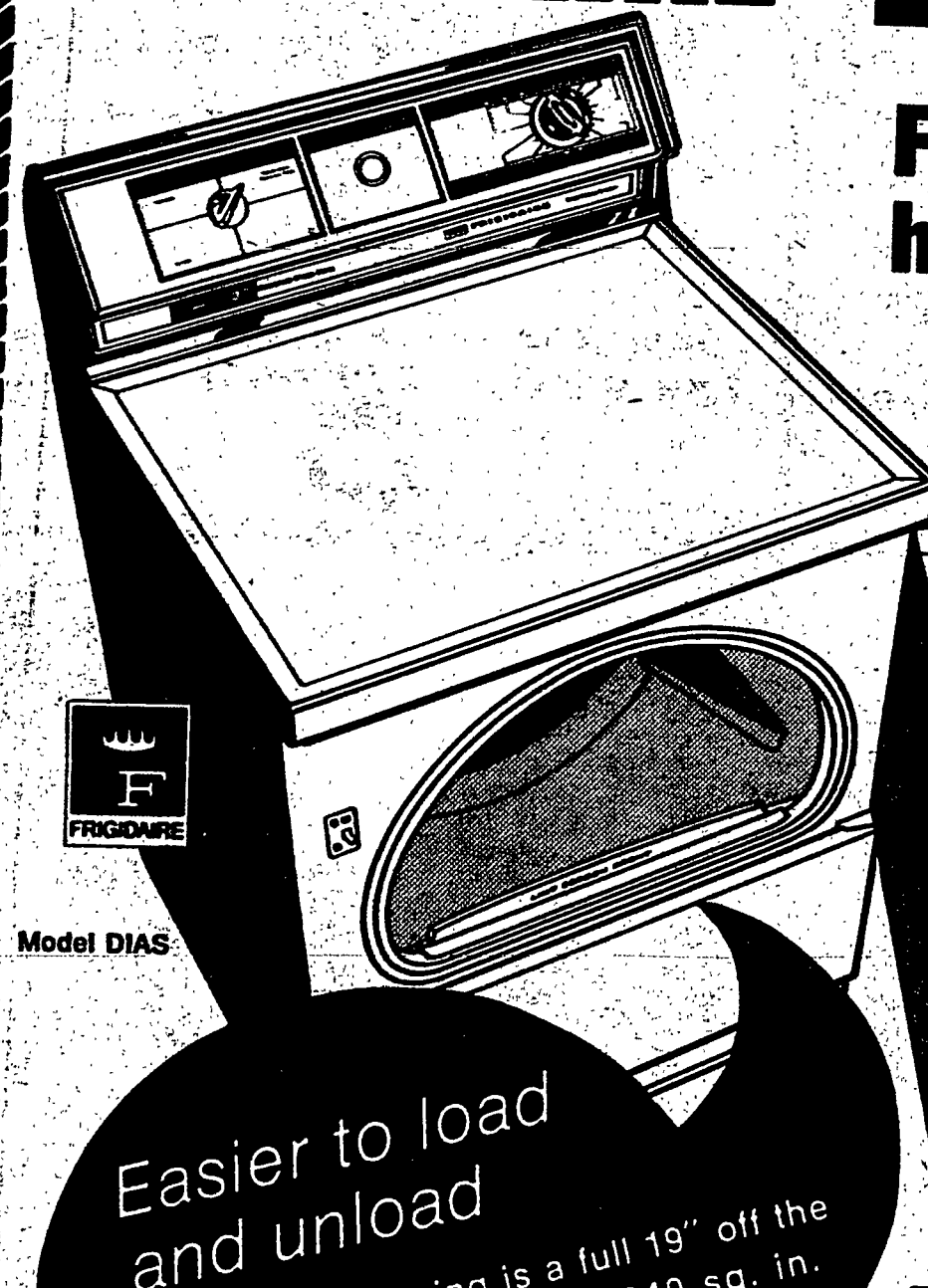

Conversations on Drugs

A 20-page booklet on drug use and abuse entitled "Conversations on Drugs," is being made available free of charge by Commonwealth Edison Company and WBBM-TV as a public service.

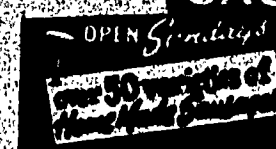

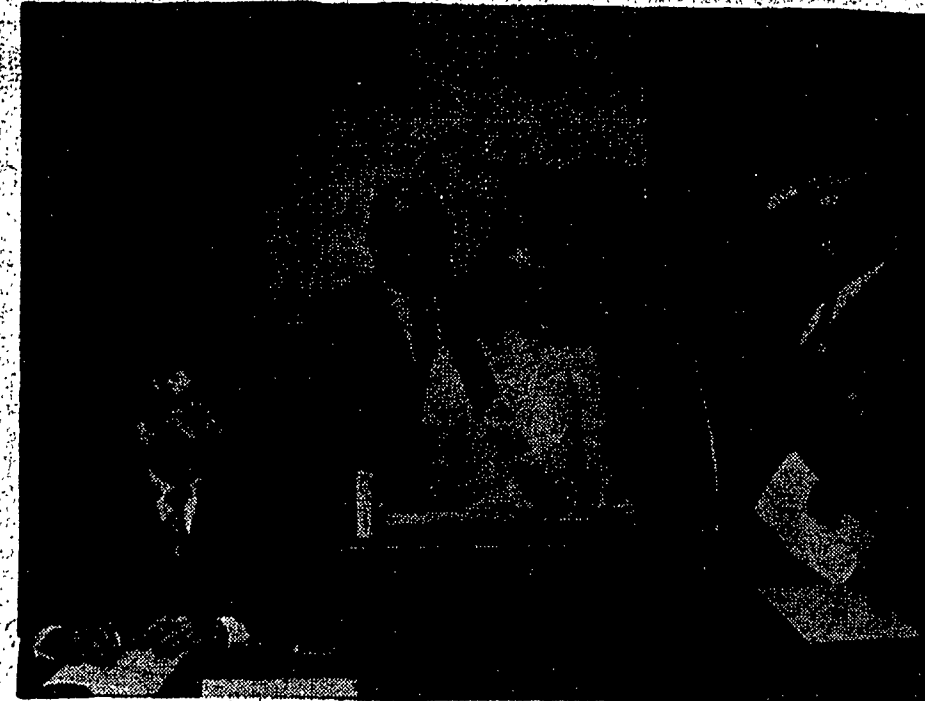
Maine East "Conversation on Drugs"

The Powers of Home Rule Units are as follows: "A home rule unit may exercise any power and perform any function pertaining to its government and affairs including, but not limited to, the power to regulate for the protection of the public health, safety, morals and welfare; to license; to tax; and to incur debt."

Since this new ruling will effect every Taxpayer in the POC-KETBOOK, I support the position that NO BOARD ACTION be taken on any major issue until it has been subjected to and approved by the Niles Electorate via a Referendum Vote.

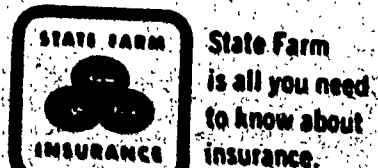

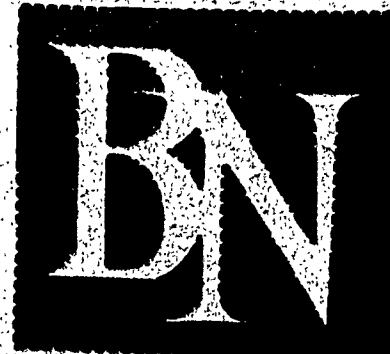

Dist. 64 Teaching Staff

The Board of Education for School District 64 will act on recommendations to cut more than 50 staff positions from the school system's teaching and administrative staff at a special meeting of the school board on Tuesday night, March 30.

Board members were told at a finance committee meeting on Wednesday night, March 24, that projected state aid for the school district's Education Fund during the 1971-72 school year would be \$500,000 less than this year.

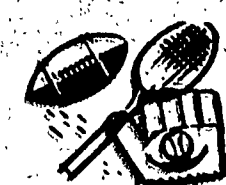
Dr. Raymond E. Hendee, Superintendent of Schools, outlined 4 alternatives for making the proposed cuts in staff. Special subject staff, such as French, physical education, art, general and instrumental music and special education would be drastically reduced or dropped altogether. The average class size would be increased from slightly over 25 to more than 31 in the intermediate and junior high grades. Closing one of the district's smaller schools was also suggested.

Mr. Robert Harrington, Finance Chairman, pointed out that the legal debt limit in the Education Fund in Dist. 64 was about \$2,300,000. This is 75% of the local tax bill. "If we go any further than this, we can't even sell warrants," he said. "And if we get too close, interest rates on warrants we do sell will go up. This is the way to bankruptcy, unless something radical is done."

Di Prima: Bring Board to People

A unique idea for bringing school board meetings to the people has been advanced by District 63 school board candidate John Di Prima, who declared that after attending board meetings for eight years, seeing the same problems remain year after year and watching the people in the area grow more and more apathetic toward assisting in finding solutions, he has decided to seek a seat on the board in this year's April 10 election.

A resident of the district for 17 years, Di Prima is particularly concerned with the poor parental attendance at board meetings and, immediately at-

ter becoming a candidate, proposed his idea for bringing the school board to the people.

The candidate's proposal is to have the board hold its meetings at a different school in the district each month. He believes this is one way the board could reach out to more people and invite their participation. "One of the best things accomplished with the board in recent years has been the open door policy and allowing interested persons to speak at the meetings," Di Prima said. "By going into the different schools, we could stimulate a greater interest among more people," he added.

School Board Candidates

Grazian's Areas of Primary Concern

Areas in which District 207 high school board candidate Leonard Grazian sees need for continued improvement are juvenile drug abuse, discipline, communications and the very pressing need for increased school income.

The unopposed, East Maine Caucus endorsed candidate is well versed in the district's drug situation and is credited with having brought the subject to light last year when, as a late entering candidate, he made a fine showing but failed to win a high school board seat.

Since his statements at that time, thousands in the area have gone actively into some drug abuse program, reams of literature have been distributed and drug abuse courses have been offered in the schools. Grazian believes, however, that all of these efforts fall short of solving the problem.

Grazian, a practicing attorney who also holds a BS degree in Chemical Engineering, is likewise concerned with discipline in the schools.

The candidate believes the prime responsibility for discipline then and now rested in the home. In bygone days, he said, the schools operated in place of the parents when it came to discipline in the parent's absence and in some cases the schools had the right to administer corporal punishment when it was deemed necessary.

"This theory was gradually disappearing and it became obvious several years ago that juveniles have constitutional rights as American citizens," he said. "Neither the Napoleonic ideals of the old guard nor these antics of the disrupters and destructors can be tolerated. We must recognize the rights of all," he stated.

Grazian said a great deal of public attention has already been focused on the other two areas he is examining. One is the increased cost of educating our young people and the search for improved methods of meeting these costs. He said he will continue to search for means, other than those now used, to increase revenue and will con-

tinue to work for a more equal proportioning of state aid for schools. He also pledged his personal efforts to explore every avenue toward improving communications between the high schools and the community. This is the other area in which there has been considerable concern on the part of parents and in which the candidate is especially interested.

Dist. 63 Absentee Voting

Any resident of East Maine School District No. 63, 21 years or older who is a citizen of the United States and has resided in the state of Illinois for one year Cook County for 90 days and District 63 for 30 days may vote in the School Board Election on April 10, 1971. He must, however, be a registered voter.

April 5th is the last day an application may be accepted by mail.

A voter must be absent from Cook County in order to vote by absentee ballot. He need not be absent due to business or duties to vote by absentee ballot; he may also be absent because he is a student, on vacation, or even imprisoned for a misdemeanor.

Dist. 67 Nominees

A. Ph. D. from Columbia University, an M.B.A. from the University of Chicago, and an M.B.A. from Harvard are the three nominees of the School District 67 caucus for the district School Board election of three members on April 10, a Saturday.

Stanley D. Frank, of Niles, is the Ph. D. with the doctorate in psychological testing and counseling. He is a new candidate with no previous board experience here. Frank is director of marketing for Science Research Associates.

The two incumbents from the seven member-board are: Fred Minkus of Morton Grove, board president ending a three-year term, who holds a master's degree in business administration and is an executive with Teletype Corp., and John Koonce of Golf, whose masters in business administration is from Harvard University; he is an executive with American Hospital Supply Corp.

The independent caucus in District 67 has for many years contributed heavily to the stability of the election process there in the northwestern Niles Twp. district. Each year in the fall 14 delegates and 14 alternates, named to the caucus by parent-teacher groups begin a series of meetings to select candidates for the school board openings in the spring.

Norbert Leach of Morton Grove is chairman of the caucus-group deliberations and interviews which named the three candidates for the April election.

Dist. 63 Caucus Endorses Candidates

Harold Schwartz, 2510 Golf rd., Glenview. The candidate for high school District 207 is Leonard R. Grazian of 9504 Oliphant, Morton Grove.

Mr. Davitz stated that the caucus, representing 26 organizations in the area, has held three general meetings and many committee meetings since last October. A search committee, chaired by Mike Conway, presented names to the nominating committee. The chairman of that committee, Mrs. Hermine Levin, presented candidates for consideration by the entire caucus, after personal interviews had been conducted with those expressing interest in the positions.

The membership of the caucus voted to endorse three candidates for the two vacancies on the elementary board, leaving it to the public to decide among Di Prima, Langer, and Schwartz.

Mr. DiPrima, a lawyer, has been active in District 63 affairs for 17 years. He has been a member and chairman of many volunteer committees in elementary and high school affairs. He has been a regular attendant at school board meetings and has two children in the district schools.

Mr. Schwartz teaches scientific subjects at various colleges in the Chicago area. He has been engaged in this work since 1961. He has also served as a consulting geologist to companies engaged in oil exploration. He is a member of science and science education organizations and is a major in the U.S. Army Reserves. He has two children in the elementary schools.

Mr. Schwartz is the director of the news bureau at the University of Illinois-Circle Campus. Previously he had been a newspaper reporter, feature writer, and editor. Active in District 63 affairs for several years, Schwartz has been a member and chairman of volunteer groups working on school

finance and zoning problems. He is a former Washington School PTA president, a member of the Social Concern Commission of the Methodist Church and is currently president of the Glenview Homeowners Association which opposes construction of 360 apartments in the Washington School area. He has two children attending school in the district.

Mr. Grazian, a lawyer, is the caucus choice for the District 207 school board. He has served as a member of volunteer committees dealing with the district's educational affairs. He has also been parliamentarian for the District 63 caucus. He has children in both the grade school and high school.

Schwartz Dist. 63 Candidate

Harold "Hal" Schwartz, 2510 Golf rd., in Glenview, has kicked off his campaign for member of the Board of Education in East Maine District 63 by outlining some of the key issues he will be dealing with in the next month.

"It is up to the School Board to develop what has been missing from this and many other school districts: a working partnership between the board, the public, administration and teachers," he said.

"To do this there must be two-way communications between the partners. At this time, such a partnership would seem like wishful thinking, but it can be achieved through special efforts by board members."

He then outlined ways for the board to demonstrate its interest in "its constituencies." The school board member should seek out the citizen, not the reverse. "This means regular attendance at PTA, homeowner association and parochial school board meetings to bring the school system to the public and be available to answer questions regardless of their merit."

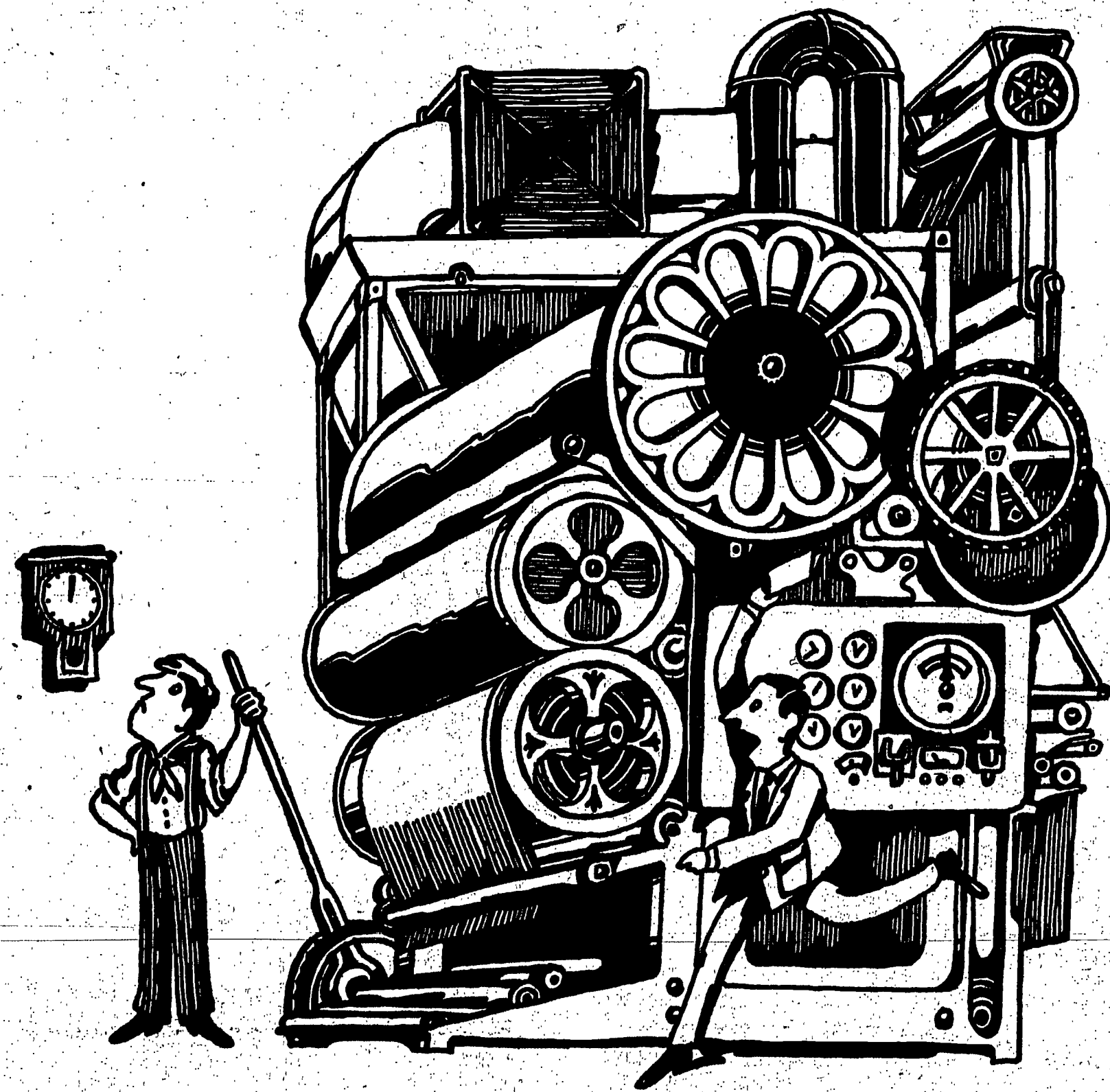
Board members should ascertain which, if any, of the owners of property in the area are not paying their fair share of taxes, thus resulting in the rest of us carrying their burden.

The board should see to it that every economy is employed in the school system without jeopardizing the educational program. This can be done through careful analysis of the system of purchases—seeing to it that one school is not short of a certain item while another has too much—and by joint purchases with other school districts, an activity that will be permitted under the new state Constitution.

It must always remain the goal of the board to provide each child with the utmost in individualized education. The school board must develop a coordinated program of language instruction with the high school district so that different approaches toward the studying of foreign language do not leave District 63 students "out in the cold, as has been the case with a number of District 63 students in recent years."

The board should work for parents and children by continually pressuring other governmental bodies to make travel to and from school a safe experience, not an adventure.

Finally—"and this to me is one of the most important points"—board members should listen to the groups, organizations and individuals it deals with. "No problem, however petty, should be lightly tossed aside by board or administration."

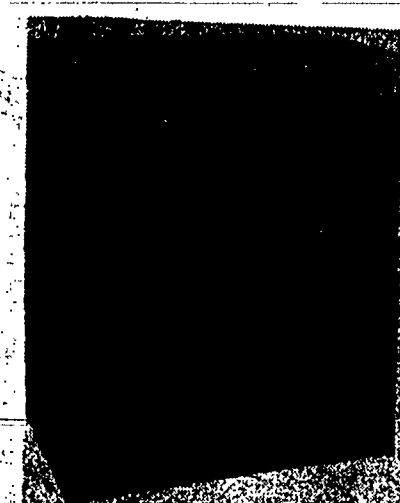

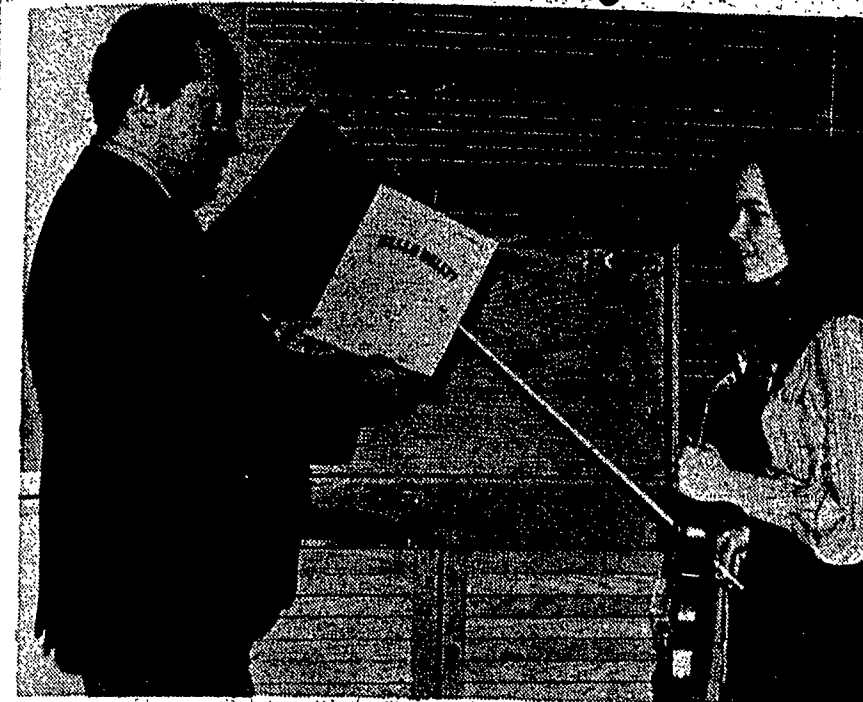

Dist. 63 Creative Art Activities

The boys and girls at Woodrow Wilson school, East Maine School District #63, are enthusiastically involved in various on-going creative art activities.

In Mrs. Eileen Brusso's class, the pupils have experimented with styrofoam meat trays and string and cardboard which produced varied and interesting prints. Mrs. Barbara Tuch, Art Coordinator of School District #63, who helped direct the lesson, explained, "These are the simplest and least expensive printing methods. The youngsters who like to experience quick results to feel successful, used the styrofoam printing method where a simple printed object such as a stick is used, to draw and incise scrap styrofoam material which is inked with a roller and printed.

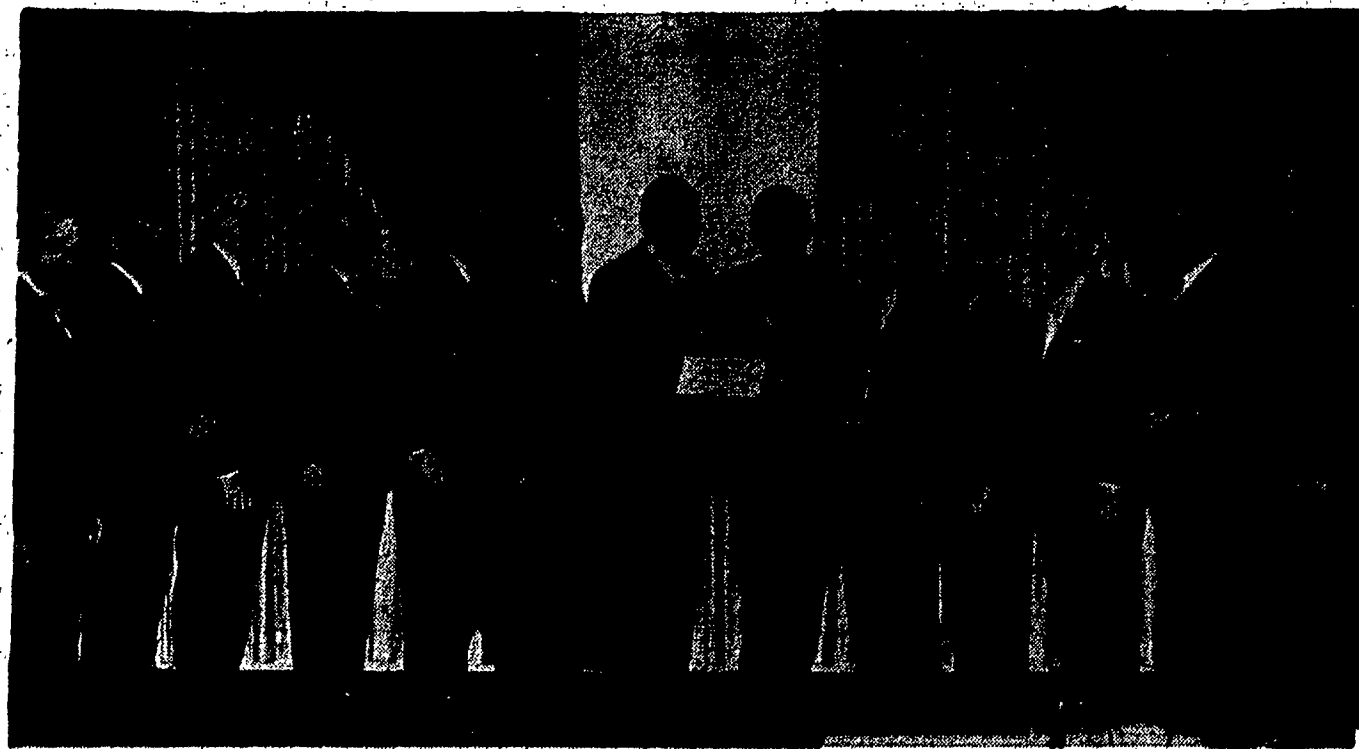

Maine East School Calendar

Parents who must finalize their plans for family vacations and other summer activities will be interested in knowing that the opening day of school this year for Maine high school students will be August 31, the Tuesday before Labor Day. District 207 teachers will begin the fall term by attending an Institute Day on August 30.

The District 207 calendar for the 1971-1972 school year includes 185 official school days (including two Institute Days), legal holidays and 16 school holidays. The 1971-1972 school year will end on June 14, 1972. Thanksgiving, one of the legal holidays, will be celebrated on November 25. There will be a school holiday the following day, Friday, November 26.

Christmas vacation will begin at the end of the school day on December 17 and run a full two weeks, with classes resuming on the morning of January 3, 1972. Spring vacation will consist of Good Friday, March

31, 1972, a legal holiday, and the five school days following Easter Sunday. School will reopen on Monday, April 10, 1972.

Other legal holidays included in the official high school calendar are: Labor Day, September 6; Columbus Day, October 11; Veterans' Day, October 25; Presidents' Day February 7, (which replaces Lincoln's Birthday); and Memorial Day, May 29, 1972. All of these holidays fall on Monday, enabling students and teachers to enjoy several "long weekends" throughout the school year.

The District 207 calendar was developed by a committee made up of school officials, representatives from the district's Teachers' Association, and student representatives. Many compromises had to be worked out to develop a calendar that would prove satisfactory to students, teachers and parents alike.

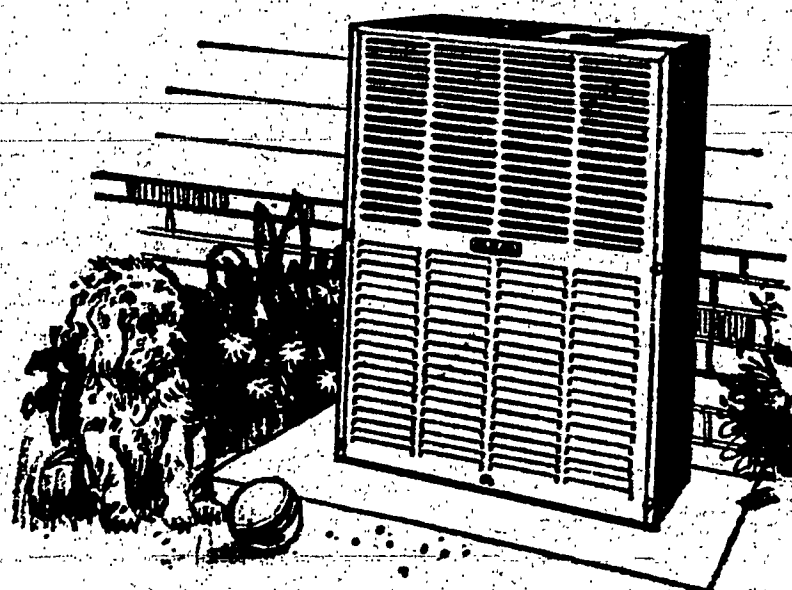

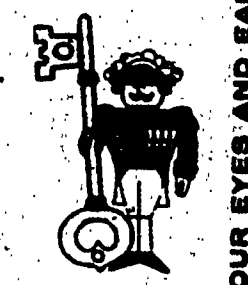

CAP Platform

Continuing improvements initiated two years ago in Morton Grove village government have been pledged by the Citizens Achievement Party in its campaign to elect three trustees to the village board on April 20. This was revealed in the CAP platform for 1971, released this week.

The three Citizens Achievement Party trustee candidates are incumbent Edward L. Wilander, Frank W. McTier and William Kramer.

Key planks in the 1971 Citizens platform are 1) continuing economy in Morton Grove government, with the objective of reducing taxes as was achieved in 1970, along with planks 2) pledging restriction of high rise apartment buildings in Morton Grove, 3) active and continuing pursuit of flood control programs, and 4) constant improvement of the Morton Grove environment and ecology.

the voter attending the Town meeting, and the budget and tax levies, other than that for Roads and Bridges, are now established by the Township Board of Auditors, voters who attend the meeting may still approve any policy decisions proposed by the Board as well as the Highway Commission tax levy.

Another change in the township organization is that the township can no longer retain the two percent commission on real property tax collections, which previously constituted the township's working capital. The cost of running the township must now be provided by a separate tax levy. Since the tax will not provide surplus funds, elementary school districts will no longer benefit from a vote of the electors to transfer funds for their use, the Township Collector now acts as a deputy of the County Collector.

The job of Township Assessor has also become practically non-existent with the abolishment of the personal property tax effective Jan. 1. It was his function to evaluate the personal property of individuals and unincorporated business; and the personal property tax on businesses will be discontinued by 1979.

Maine Township continues to provide General Assistance, or Emergency Aid, and to maintain its less than 30 miles of unincorporated roads. Niles Township also provides general assistance

and supports the Niles Township Youth Committee.

said "involvement" was the aim of his party for the best interests of the village. Marcheschi noted the budget has doubled to \$4,000,000 since 1966 with much of it going for village employees salary increases.

Independent candidate Joe Miller asked for the repeal of the utility tax, asked for strong zoning, open forums, programs for recreational facilities. He said Niles had inapt leadership and he did not intend being a "cog in a political machine." He said his livelihood did not depend on a political job. He questioned whether residents would be taxed for the transportation district and asked residents to elect officials who would listen to their problems and communicate with them. He also noted his opposition to multiples and said he thought the Lawrencewood area is under taxed.

Twelve year resident Chester Peterson, also an independent candidate, said taxation was a big problem. He noted schools have gone up 14% and 17% from 1967 to 1969 while Niles budget has doubled to \$4,000,000 during the relative period. He objected to the rent the village pays for Family Service (\$3600) noting the village built an administration facility and should use this for the FS offices. He said the Family Service spent \$106,000 (he was corrected, \$75,000) and objected to the 4 hi - rises saying Niles should build hi - rises for its senior citizens. He also criticized the intended post office building and emphasized taxes should be kept down.

Bill Winter, Niles First Party, said the major issue is to select trustees who can be trusted. He objected to secret meetings and said if elected he will meet monthly with all civic groups. Village planning should be brought before the public and he can't understand how trustees can legislate without knowing the interests of those they legislate for. He questioned whether Niles needed the annexation of the 4 hi-rises on Golf rd., and said Nilesites and the residents there did not want annexation. He criticized the building of the GEMCO store on Milwaukee ave., noting the increased traffic strain there. He questioned future annexation and a projected figure of an eventual 90,000 population in Niles was wanted by the citizenry querying the cost hikes for increased personnel and equipment. Winter noted the fire department has an \$80,000 fire truck which was recently purchased but is inactive be-

cause there is not enough personnel to man it. He said the Maine Fire district suit against the village may eventually cause Niles to purchase the district's equipment, etc., and thought the village is dragging its heels on pollution, saying it's doing nothing, noting the recent phosphate dilly - dallying was contrary to Chicago's quick action to ban it.

Incumbent candidate Ralph Bast, AIM, noted his background working with youth. He suggested a Rap Center for the youth of the village. He also advocated contacting national companies for sponsorship of vocational training programs for youth. He said he has been a liaison between the village board and the youth groups in Niles. Regarding the operation of the Village he said he did not feel there were any problems in Niles.

Nick Bavaro, representing his father Todd, Niles First Party, filled in for his incapacitated father listing the many organizations he has been active with, noting his Mr. Niles award, and the many activities which he has been involved in the village. Bavaro, Jr., an 18 year old, spoke eloquently, and closed by saying what he is "most proud of regarding his father is being his son."
