PARK AND VILLAGE ELECTIONS

Polls Open 6 A.M. to 6 P.M. on Tuesday, April 20th

From the Left Hand

It's expensive to endorse candidates.

Back in 1959 The Bugle was the only newspaper to back candidates, and supported Ken Scheel, then an independent candidate for trustee. While Ken lost, his surprisingly strong vote resulted in Tr. John Stanley selecting Ken to the Niles Zoning Board. In 1961 Ken, along with fellow-ZB member Bob Wente, and Kirk Laner, Len Szymanski, chose Nick Blase to join with them in battling the entrenched forces, which held Niles in tight reign for the previous 20 years.

The Bugle once more was the only newspaper to endorse the Scheel-Blase ticket, and the upset turned a corrupt town around and led to its 1963 All America award. It also resulted in The Bugle receiving the top award for community service from the Illinois Press Association for weekly newspapers.

Thru the years The Bugle has continued to endorse candidates. The sole consideration was based on the candidate's ability and service to the community. We chose Republicans, Democrats and Independents, believing party affiliations were meaningless in local elections.

But as we noted, since the bigger newspapers do not endorse candidates, and we do, the result has become expensive.

In 1965 we suggested voters in Morton Grove throw out the incumbents. They chose otherwise, and we haven't received a legal notice from the town since. Meanwhile, the guys who play it neat, who don't endorse, continue to get the legal notices.

Since there are many newspapers in the community, it's always been our intention to have a newspaper which serves the community. To do so meant we should be independent and not be used by any persons or parties to further their ambitions. In our community 3 of the newspapers are blatantly partisan newspapers. We say blatantly, because they are unfair in their handling of the news, and try to further their political party. In so doing they short-change their readers, by an imbalance of news. They've got a personal ax to grind and they seldom fail to show it. The men who run the newspapers are poorly qualified, both by education and by their lack of objectivity. And I'm afraid marrying into, inheriting or exploiting a political position, are not the best qualifications for publishing newspapers.

At lunch Saturday one fellow-chow-hound said his wife was disappointed we didn't endorse school board candidates. Since we haven't attended school board meetings the past year we told him we weren't qualified to make recommendations. We had received a telephone call from a very partisan activist in one political party in Maine Township urging us to editorialize in favor of his candidate for the college board. The idea of political people sticking their noses in school elections always raises the hackles on our dignity, and the presumption that we should use the newspaper to further his cause is what we call a bit much.

AN EDITORIAL

For Park Board.

In Tuesday's park board election The Bugle recommends the election of BILL KEENER and GERALD SULLIVAN for commissioners.

In suggesting voters elect Keener we believe voters should defeat Ray Eagan, an incumbent candidate who is seeking his 3rd term on the park board. If Eagan should be successful he will have served on the park board from 1961 and will continue until 1977. We believe two 6 year terms totaling 12 years is long enough for one man to serve. Certainly, a third term prevents new men with new ideas to move onto the park board.

During Eagan's years the park board has made many grievous errors. Past recreation directors have told us many times Eagan was extremely difficult to work with and meddled in areas which they felt hampered their work. During his years on the board the director was changed 6 times and during one period the district went without any director for several months last year.

The park district lost more than \$40,000 on the TAM fiasco, according to present commissioner Jack Leske. The district also hired an architectural firm for its new buildings which had no previous park or park building experience and more recently was fired. Obviously, such mismanagement cost taxpayers extra money due to the change. The defects in the Grennan Heights gym (with its birds in the rafters), and the Oakton Manor building, all point to poor administration.

By electing Keener Niles will have a new man who has devoted much effort in this community. Sullivan, who has completed his first term, was instrumental in building the new gymnasium. We believe Keener and Sullivan are the best qualified among Park Board candidates to serve Niles Park District.

For Village Board.

In Tuesday's village board election we believe 4 candidates are well-qualified for the 3 trustee posts.

Independent candidate Joe Miller deserves voter consideration. He would be a most welcome addition to a village board which seldom contests the actions of the Mayor. Miller has been a long-time member on the Zoning Board and has been a conscientious member whose interests have served the village. He is fiercely independent, reminiscent of the first independent candidate The Bugle supported in 1959, Ken Scheel. We believe Miller's dissent from a Blase-dominated board would return the village board meetings to more open hearings, where controversy is seldom discussed publicly.

Incumbents Richard Harczak and Angelo Marcheschi and former board appointee Todd Bavaro also deserve voter consideration. While every candidate in Tuesday's village board election has been active in the community, serving in many areas, Harczak, Marcheschi and Bavaro have "paid their dues" many, many times in this community. The three men have been deeply involved in Niles long before any of them served on the village board, which

Niles Park District Candidates Raymond C. Eagan

In the past ten years, as a member of the Niles Park Board of Commissioners, Raymond C. Eagan has continually exerted his efforts toward expanding the Niles Park System with sound Park administration and diversified recreation programs for all age groups.

Raymond C. Eagan stands for re-election to a third term on his past record. In 1961, when "Ray" was first elected, the Niles Park District consisted of three park sites located at Grennan Heights, Oakton Manor and Touhy and Franks Avenues, and one small Recreation Building located in Grennan Heights Park.

Since Raymond C. Eagan has been on the Park Board, we have added a Recreation Center and Swimming Pool at Milwaukee Ave.; the Louis Schreiner Gymnasium at Grennan Heights Park and the Michael Wozniak Recreation Center at Oakton Manor Park.

Also, acquired during this period, was N.I.C.O. Park; Point Park; Courtland Park and Right-of Way; Kirk Lane Park and Ballard Park where construction is now in progress to complete for early fall, an Artificial Ice Rink, two Swimming Pools and a Recreation Building. Also, a 9-hole Golf Course on the old Tam O' Shanter grounds which is scheduled to be ready for play some time this summer. Also, within the past twelve months, open space land has been acquired in the Betty-Chester area off Greenwood and a portion of the Deer Park Trailer Camp. Development of these two park sites are already on the drawing boards.

Raymond C. Eagan takes pride in helping to make all this possible, and believes our goals

for the future should be to continue to:

1. Acquire and develop sufficient Park lands to serve each and every neighborhood in Niles.

2. Continue to improve and expand our Recreation Programs for all age groups. "Ray" and his wife Lucille, have two married daughters and four grandchildren and have owned their own home in Niles for the past twenty-one years. He is a member of St. John Brebeuf Parish and Holy Name Society; a Fourth Degree Member of the Knights of Columbus and a member of the Telephone Pioneers of America.

Steve Chamerski

"I haven't any political aspirations, as do some of our Park Commissioners," says Steve Chamerski, "and I'm not satisfied at all with the job the present Board is doing."

Steve Chamerski, a 17 year resident of Niles, lives at 7054 Seward with his wife Ann and daughter Carol, who is a teacher. Steve, a foreman for Croname, served as Park Commissioner for six years from 1961 - 1967, including two terms during which he was elected president. During his term of office, Golf-Mill and the surrounding areas were annexed into the Park District, and the first successful bond issue election was held, as a result of which the Niles Recreation Center and Pool on Milwaukee ave. was completed. Also a large land acquisition program was carried out, which almost doubled the acreage of Niles Parks, in addition to which the Forest Preserve District also gave permission to use its holdings in Niles for Park District purposes.

Why does Steve run? "Too many high salaried jobs, too little accomplishment on the part of the present board, an eyesore gym improperly located, and too much delay in getting needed park programs including Ballard Park Pool off the ground," Steve says, for example, that the present board has been talking for more than 4 years about acquiring the site of the old Jewish cemetery and the Jonquil Terrace park for playground purposes—but nothing has been done toward accomplishing either, and meanwhile the neighborhood kids grow up with no place to play.

One thing Steve finds hard to understand is why it is necessary to pay up to \$18,000 to hire a Park Director, more than the Niles Village Manager makes, and then not have the full time of the man hired. Niles is a workingman's town, says Chamerski, and if I ever hired a man for \$18,000, I would want him to work for me full-time, and not be a

August Pranske

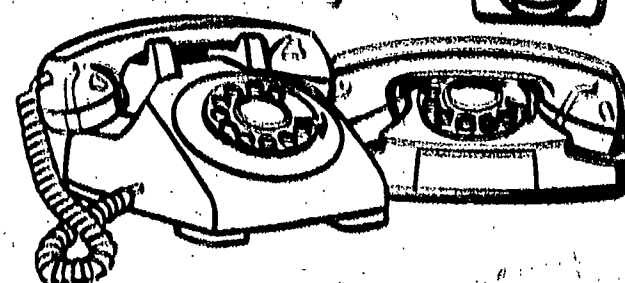

Niles First Party Vows Action

The Niles First Party has presented as candidates for Village Trustee Todd Bavaro, Bill Winter, and Donald J. Johns because they are men of achievement and proven integrity.

They are committed to the fact that the residents of Niles must have something to say about any problem affecting them and that the village trustees must keep in contact with the residents and listen to their viewpoint so that actions the trustees take will benefit Niles residents. This is why we call ourselves the NILES FIRST PARTY.

For many years Bill Winter, Todd Bavaro, and Donald J. Johns have actively and positively fought negative policies of the incumbent candidates as they adversely affected the welfare of our community. In recent months, because of the potentially disastrous conditions in the area north of Dempster, created by the incumbents, our candidates have waged total war in order to protect the lives of our children and the safety of all residents. Our fight is positive as is our demand for a moratorium on all zoning and building north of Dempster in Niles until such time as a comprehensive study can be made concerning how all projects- Gemco, 360 unit, high density development, on Washington St., Ballard Road Extension, and the widening of Golf Road will affect our existence.

3. A member of the Niles First Party has literally "screamed" for action for a full year as a member of the Pollution Control Board. He has made positive recommendations. The incumbent candidates attended one meeting- their decision, "change the

name to environmental control board."

4. A member of the Niles First Party was one of the original members of the Niles Youth Commission. He has many possible programs to improve it as presently constituted.

We have pledged, and feel it is important, to have monthly meetings with community groups in order to keep the lines of communication open between the residents and elected officials.

The incumbent trustees say they speak in the "positive." Nonsense, for in the past eight years their actions have been invariably negative as they affect our Village. CAP Candidates Emphasize Tax Savings

In a joint statement by Citizens Achievement Party trustee candidates Edward Wilander, Frank McTier and William Kramer, the predominant issue in the April 20 Morton Grove election is identified with the records of the present administration and that of the preceding one, beaten at the polls in 1969.

The Citizens Achievement Party candidates stated that "more progress has been made in Morton Grove on all fronts during the past two years than were made in the previous ten years by the party now attempt-

ing to get back in power. Why go back?"

"It gets a little ridiculous when one of their candidates says he would like to enlist support in fighting zoning practices," said William Kramer, CAP candidate. "All he needs to do is to see the present mayor, Jule Bode, and the present village board. They will give him more support than did the previous administration, which was on its way to permit undue expansion of apartment building. The Bode administration has passed new ordinances to restrict high rises and to prevent zoning changes. Witness the recent attempt to rezoning the Dempster-Oak Park area. It got nowhere, and we intend to see such projects continue to get nowhere."

Another major area of progress by the present village administration involves flood control, according to Citizens Achievement Party candidate Frank McTier.

"Again, the Citizens Achievement administration has made more progress in two years than the previous administration did in ten," McTier stated. "In the past, this was mostly conversation and relatively little action, but now there are several projects in work which will definitely relieve flooding problems in Morton Grove. From all other state, county and regional agencies, Morton Grove is now obtaining all possible help to solve the problem. In addition, a new storm sewer along Golf rd. will be installed, and work is in process with the North Branch Drainage District to clear out the North Branch river and to arrange for flood water detention ponds."

"I would like to add a point in connection with another water project in Morton Grove," McTier stated. "One of our opposition friends, who is a one-time trustee seeking to return to the board, has promised to 'roll back water rates.' He does not seem to remember that water rates are determined by the City of Chicago, which bumped them up by 25% in 1970. Nor does he remember that Morton Grove has a bond issue to pay

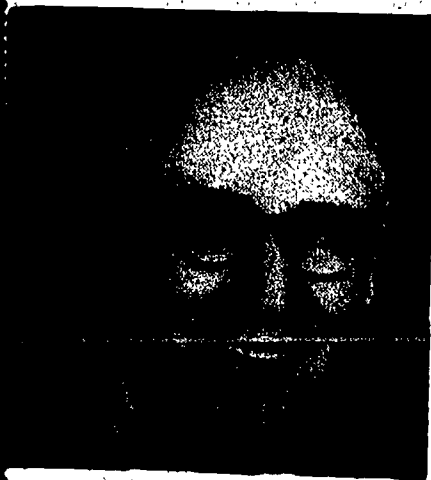
off for water main improvements, and that until two years ago the village was in danger of eventually defaulting on those bonds unless something was done to correct deficiencies of the previous administration. The corrections were made, and that's another achievement for the Bode administration."

Former Village President Robert Schreiber recently visited Morton Grove and upon arriving back in his home town said that "my twenty years of public service to the residents of Morton Grove have left with me a feeling of deep concern for the welfare of the community and our many friends."

He and Martha are enjoying their retirement years; but it was only natural that when he visited back in Morton Grove, the upcoming election would be on his mind also.

Schreiber said, "Since the incumbent administration has

chosen the title of Achievement Party, the obvious question is "What have they achieved? Aside from a so-called beautification program, ask yourself what other innovations they have inaugurated."

He then added, "In the past two years, they have contributed village funds for paying a state hi-way, which ultimately would have been done completely at state expense. They levied a 45% higher tax increase for the village without increasing services and imposed an unprecedented and unjust increase in water rates (33% based on con-

sumer rates, rather than the 25% wholesale rate from Chicago).

Schreiber told a group of localites, "I am confident you will support the Action Improvement Party candidates, Martin Ashman, Edwin Brice and Richard Hols; each of whom is pledged to restore non-partisan dedication and integrity to Morton Grove."

"The man who cannot forget the village where he spent so many years served as mayor from 1961-69. He resided in Morton Grove since 1942 until his retirement last year to a warmer climate."

Brice Speaks Out on Water

At a recent Action Improvement rally, Ed Brice stated that there was no reason whatsoever for the recent 33 1/2% increase in water rates. It may be true that Chicago raised the rates to Morton Grove, but only 25%.

"Why our village raised you and I, 33 1/2% is unreasonable," stated Brice.

"Of course, our present administration has been foolishly using water funds to pay for part of the operating cost of many of the other village facilities," continued the candidate.

The trustee-stated April 20 hopeful added, "If water funds are used to supplement real estate taxes, then our real estate taxes should be reduced; but, as you know, they too have been increased — to the tune of 45%."

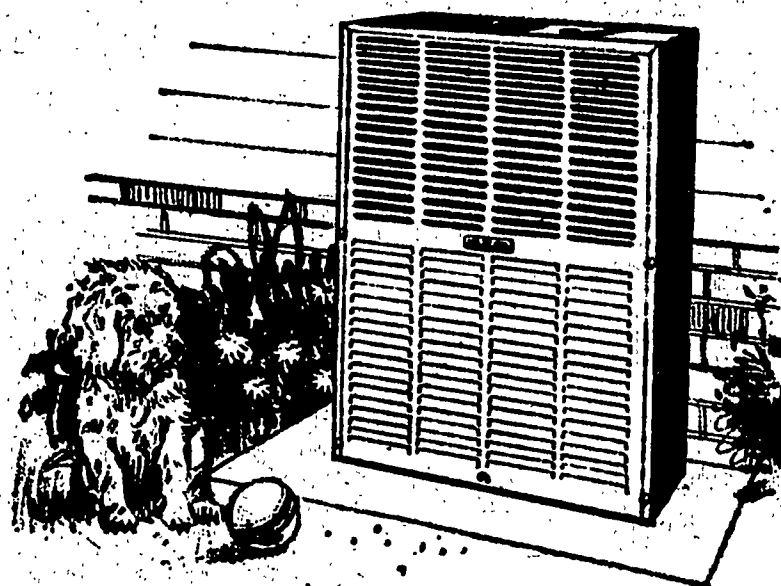
Brice then asked, "What are they applying the state income tax revenue to?" By applying some of this money to our local school boards, they could reduce your real estate taxes considerably.

There will be prizes for the highest flying kites, the biggest and the smallest kites that fly.

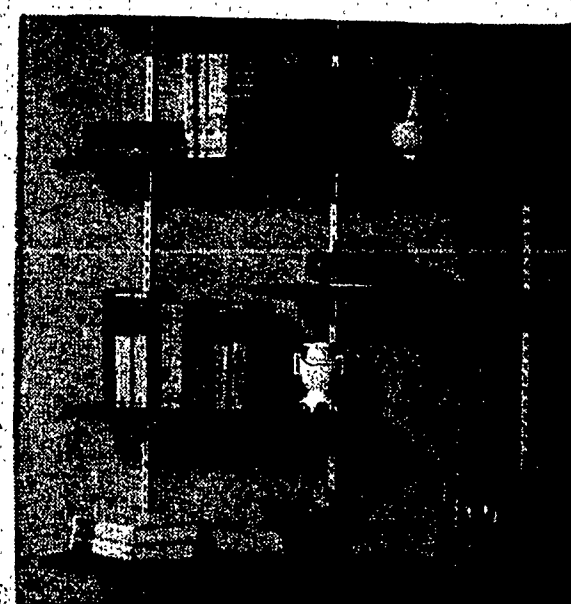

MG Homeowners Oppose Proposed Multiples

A decision regarding the proposed rezoning to apartments of a site at Washington Street and Foster Lane, adjacent to Morton Grove, was postponed today by the Cook County Board of Zoning Appeals.

In an unusual procedure, the Board allowed residents of Morton Grove to present additional information to the Board regarding the rezoning.

Martin C. Ashman, a Morton Grove Resident and candidate for trustee of Morton Grove, was spokesman for a group of Morton Grove home owners who attended the meeting. Mr. Ashman presented statistics showing the existing hazardous traffic situation and predictions of what traffic and safety problems would occur if the proposed 360 apartments are put in. His remarks were put into the record by the Board and the Board

promised to consider the additional information. Mr. Leon Mandel, Mrs. S. Balter and others spoke urging the Board to rule against the proposed rezoning to apartments.

Mr. K. Selth, Chairman of the Board of Zoning Appeals, thanked the home owners for their presentation and informed them that the Board would rule on the rezoning application at the next regular meeting in approximately two weeks.

EXISTING SITUATION: In the morning, there is a very large group of children walking along and crossing Washington st. on their way to Washington School (Northwest corner of Washington and St. Isaac Jogues School (1/2 block West of Washington on Golf rd.). All of Washington st. is a pickup point for school

buses for the above named schools plus the Gemini Junior High School. There are hundreds of children waiting, walking and running along the area of the proposed apartment complex every morning. During vacation times, there are children constantly crossing Washington st., due to the fact that the area already contains many young families with school age children.

EXISTING SITUATION-VEHICLES: A traffic count was conducted by members of the Glenmore Home Owners Association on February 18, 1971. Between 7:30 a.m. and 8:30 a.m. - 1 hour only - there were 515 vehicles passing the proposed site, broken down as follows: 176 vehicles going South on Washington st., 275 vehicles going North, 57 vehicles entering Washington from Foster Lane and 7 school buses. In the evening, between 5 p.m. and 6 p.m. - 1 hour only - 530 vehicles passed the site, broken down as follows: 215 vehicles going North on Washington, 245 vehicles going South and 70 entering Foster Lane from Washington st.

As can be seen from these hour only statistics, combined with the children going to the two schools adjacent to the area, the situation is even now extremely hazardous and indeed almost impossible.

What has been the result of this congestion? The answer is that in 1969, there were 50 automobile accidents along Washington st. and in 1970, 77 accidents, including 1 fatality. (There were probably even more minor accidents that were unreported).

EFFECT OF REZONING: Adding 360 apartments to the area which will exit on Washington st., will add anywhere from 540 to 700 vehicles to the street, plus innumerable service trucks, delivery trucks, visitor's cars, etc. The existing hazardous safety situation will be made immeasurably worse by the proposed apartment complex. After children are injured or killed, it is too late to be sorry. The time to ameliorate the problem is now by preventing the complex from going in.

OTHER PROBLEMS: This paper is devoted only to the traffic and safety problems. However, mention should be briefly be made of sewer back-

up problems which are already severe in the area and which could be made worse by the proposal, school problems in a school district already taxing itself at or near its limit and the deterioration of the value of homes on the East - West streets intersecting Washington, which up to now, have been fairly quiet residential streets but which will inevitably become busy thoroughfares by vehicles using their streets for short cuts to avoid the traffic congestion on Washington Street.

COMMUNITY INTEREST: Every affected governmental agency has objected to the proposal, including Niles, Morton Grove, Glenview and School District 63. Four home owners associations have objected, including Golf Mill Home Owners Association, Courtland Park Home Owners Association, Woodland Estates Home Owners Association and Glenmore Home Owners Association.

All of the local newspapers have condemned the proposal, either in editorials or favorable news columns.

SUMMARY: For all of the above reasons, we ask this Board to reject the proposed rezoning.
