From the Left Hand

Twice in recent weeks I commented upon competing newspapers. In the area, or more precisely on the people behind the newspapers, April 15 I noted 3 of the newspapers are "blatantly partisan," I droned on that the "men who run the newspapers are poorly qualified, both by education and by their lack of objectivity."

On April 20 I received a letter from Louis Lerner who wrote he would be perfectly delighted in comparing his credentials with anyone I wish.

The Lerner letter was most welcome and opened up an avenue pertaining to local newspapering which I've long thought about. It deserves comment.

While this may sound like a cop-out to the Lerner, the 3 newspaper owners I was referring to, were publishers of 3 partisan Republican newspapers here, which make no attempt to hide their partisanship. On many occasions Nick Blase and his cohorts have told me they cannot gain space in any other newspapers to further their cause. And as late as the past campaign independent candidate Bill Winter told me ours was the only newspaper which was giving him fair coverage.

Following the lead of local TV stations, which are belatedly recognizing their brethren by mentioning their stations and networks, but which is still a no-no in the newspaper business, I'd like to take note of the local papers.

There is no doubt among professionals the Lerner newspaper chain (48 newspapers) is among the very best in the country. And at our local level The Life newspaper is by far the best business organization, as well as journalistic enterprise here. On a 1 on 1, day-to-day basis, the competition from the sales force from this newspaper, is greater than all other newspapers combined. Their salesmen in the field are well-trained, and the guy who runs this sales force, Gene Calabrese, is far and away the best sales-business manager we've seen in publishing. In the news area, The Life also far surpasses all the rest of us.

The superiority of these people is a reflection from the very top. No organization is better than the men who run the company, and obviously, the men on top are most competent.

It was announced at Tuesday night's park board meeting the Ballard Park swimming pool should be ready by July 4 or before, weather - permitting. Resident architect Len Wisniewski said the Ballard Park plans are presently "20 days down" but he expects with good weather the entire park project should be close to being on schedule.

Park president Jerry Sullivan, indicating the park district must watch every penny it expends, was the lone dissenter for the 3 session summer day camp which was approved by the 4 other commissioners. Because of the lateness of the tax bill collections, plus the inability of receiving the assessed valuation for the park district for the fiscal year, plus the possible loss of revenue from personal property taxes, the park board was playing it close to the vest in forseeing what could be expended during the coming year. A figure of \$43,000 is being budgeted for the recreation program for the coming year of which about \$21,000 will be used for a summer program. But, faced with the uncertainty of what monies the entire Board manifested an air of "go slow" until they were sure of the revenues forthcoming.

It was explained unlike the village board, which received revenue from in state income tax, sales tax returns, and fees from licenses and permits, the park board only receives money from property taxes and personal property taxes. Because the personal property tax controversy is in question, with taxes which may be received only from corporations, the Board must wait until (July or August) before the assessed valuation will be known, which determines the revenue to be received.

Since money matters dominated the meeting attorney Barafato readied a tax anticipation ordinance which allows the park board to borrow \$50,000 until the new tax money becomes available. A second ordinance provides the park district can borrow the money from its own referendum account, which presently is \$573,000. The loan will be at 4% rather than a higher rate which would be obtained thru normal bank channels.

In other actions secretary-treasurer Olson, attorney Barafato and recreation director Norman were approved to serve the district for the coming fiscal year (May 1).

A request for 21 football nite games under lites will be reviewed after it was stated the lite bill would be at least \$25 per game.

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
That's the number to call for scheduling Illinois Bell's free films and talk-demonstrations. All of them are as educational as they are entertaining.

RICH HARCZAK

Niles off-year election was a whopper... the winners whomped the losers good. Matter of fact, they whomped the losers better than Nick Blase and his cohorts did in 1969.

What do the results mean? What can Niles look forward to as the result of last Tuesday's village election? And how does the overwhelming victory affect the present village board make-up? And a question which can no longer be buried is, Will top vote-getter Rich Harczak contest Nick Blase for the Mayor's post in 1973?

Answering the last question first, Harczak's second straight leading-his-dick-to-victory begs the interesting political question concerning 1973's election for village president. Would Harczak take on Nick Blase and his well-organized political machine next time out and if he did how well would he do?

In reviewing both off-year elections which Harczak ran in, one undeniable fact exists. Harczak wins all over the village, in the south end as well as the north end. His carrying his running mates in both elections attests to his popularity. Everyone in Niles knows Rich Harczak. And well they should. He's a director in a local bank. He's been active in the largest church in the community, in the Lions club, Chamber of Commerce. The name Harczak has been written across more bowling shirts in the area than any other name. The baseball leagues, donations to all local groups needing funds, have all been supported by Harczak's company. And it's the company itself, Harczak's sausage shop, which has given Rich a one-on-one relationship with Nilesites. The most casual customers to his shop all know "Rich."

You put all these pluses together and it cannot be denied Rich is a very attractive political force in Niles.

Despite Rich's assets Buglescope sees a 2-headed coin in looking over Harczak. On the one hand he doesn't seem to have that political gnawing which many candidates possess when they reach the village hall. He's not a John Stanley (a former trustee who ran for Mayor) who served the community well and thought he had the Mayor's job in his hip pocket. On the other side of the coin there is little doubt Rich is one of the most ambitious people in Niles. He is one of the most involved men the community has ever known. In addition to his previous mentioned activities he headed a committee promoting the welfare of the newly-elected state treasurer. In addition to his Niles shop he has other shops in the surrounding areas. He also manufactures and distributes sausage to independent stores thruout the Chicago area. His financial energies have taken him into fields which would exhaust an entire corporate group, let alone one man. And these energies seem inexhaustible.

The man he would oppose, Nick Blase, quietly stood behind Harczak and his friends in this election. There's little doubt many of the Blasesmen in the community were working the precincts and getting out the vote for Harczak and friends. This effort alone might prevent Harczak from taking on Niles village president. But it would prove interesting. Harczak, perhaps the most popular name this town has ever known, competing against a Mayor who does it all, Blase, with the All America award still tied to his belt, continuously adds more people to his organization. A new appointment here, a concern for resident problems there, and Blase continues to add to an organization which knows how to get out the vote.

Harczak would have many, many politically inexperienced Nilesites rallying around his flag. Blase would have many, many politically experienced Nilesites rally to his cause. While the odds seem to be tipped in favor of Blase it is not impossible for amateurs to upend professionals. It happened once in Niles. It happened in 1961 and Blase was the recipient of the upset.

HOW ABOUT MARCHESCHI?

While Harczak seemed to do it all his running mate, Ang Marcheschi, also well-outdistanced all the remaining candidates. Since this is Marcheschi's third-go-round as trustee it must be asked if Ang might not seek the top rung again in 1973. From this vantage point it is doubtful he would ever buck Blase again. The wounds caused by his 1969 opposition have still not healed. Last Tuesday many Blasesmen said they refused to work for Marcheschi, because they believe Ang betrayed them by opposing Blase in 1969. But if Blase was ever to move on you can bet a bob or two Angelo Marcheschi will be throwing his hat in center ring.

Trying to place his feet in both ends of two sides he has made enemies. But he also has a legion of loyal friends who are always willing to go the route with Ang. If Mayor Blase should become Judge Blase, or State senator Blase, or who the Blases knows, you can look for Marcheschi to be reaching once more for the top spot.

WHO HE, JOE MILLER?

Independent candidate Joe Miller's amazing 1,300 plus vote total last week indicates he should be selected to serve the village in some appointed position. Battling two organizations with the

We also like the Life's major Skokie competitor, The News. It's a feisty newspaper, though highly partisan. Nevertheless, it is willing to stick its neck out when it champions a cause.

The other newspaper we have affection for is The Journal in Des Plaines. The news editor and the guy on top are far superior to the newspeople you normally find on local newspapers. There is little doubt they could both write their own tickets on most of the leading national and metropolitan publications in this country.

About 8 or 9 years ago a newspaper called The Villager was published in Skokie. It was a handsome publication and was headed by a former editor from Associated Press. It's handsomeness was the talk of the local printing industry, but it lasted only 9 months. And I learned a lesson from this publication which has never been forgotten. With few exceptions, publishers whose primary interest is in the news end of the newspaper, generally make poor newspaper owners. Perhaps because of a creative ability, they lack the temperament of the more stoic businessman. The guy with a \$ computer in his head is certainly at opposite ends of the pole from a guy who has a pencil, typewriter ribbon, or even a paint brush in his cerebrum.

Since this is sort of a journalistic catharsis there are a couple of other points to be made. The remaining 2 publications here are also excellent business operations. Often their news stories are a week late but their business acumen makes them highly successful. The Pickwick chain (Spectator-Champion) was almost sold recently for a reported 1.8 million dollars to Time magazine. Uncle Sam stepped in and prevented the sale because of anti-trust implications. It is expected a sale to another buyer is imminent. The Review, out of Des Plaines, has recently been expanding which may indicate it may be sold, possibly to the Chicago Tribune, which already has local publications in the west suburbs.

Lastly, I was a bit nasty in sneering at local newspaper owners who've inherited their business properties. I'm afraid I've a hang-up on this score which dates back to my younger days in South Shore. While we kids were depression's children we rubbed elbows with much wealth which was around us. Today I catch myself looking down my nose at magistrates and judges in the area. Remembering the Schnackenberg, the Hugo Friends, the Harringtons and Daughertys, whom we knew well, we intolerantly think the instant judges we've met in recent years are bush league by comparison. And when we speak to lawyers we remember Charley Bellows, from Euclid Avenue, who was and still is, among the foremost trial lawyers in the country. Among other wealth surrounding us included Chuck Komiskey, a Capone bondsman, whose son was an intimate friend, and many many more. And like many of our younger friends we spoke disparagingly of the wealthy, accusing them unfairly of being captain of the team, getting the prettier girls, and generally having what we regarded was an unfair advantage.

In retrospect, it was a kid hang-up which should have ended some 25 years ago. But when we snail away at those who inherit newspaper properties, we're merely carrying over a childish weakness. A psychologist would have a field day with

many workers, Miller's vote total was most significant. His vote was only 300 less than the top man, Todd Bavaro, on the losing party's ticket, which indicates Miller has a future in Niles.

Miller, an open foe of Nick Blase, was not re-appointed to the Niles Zoning Board by Blase, who originally placed him there. It had been said his refusal to work for Blase in the 1969 campaign was the reason for the village president's action.

A supporter of Miller, Tony Guarnaccio, former village sanitation, was alleged to have been dismissed for the same reason. Yet when Blase needed an expert to discuss the recent phosphate problem, Guarnaccio was asked to come back to the village hall to aid the village.

If the above is accurate it manifests a picaresque attitude on the part of a village official who does not normally show such pique.

Borrowing a favorite word of the village president, it would "behoove" Niles officials to appoint both these men to significant posts in the village. They are highly qualified and would enhance the village by their involvement.

STEVE CHAMERSKI

Watching the returns come in Tuesday night the most surprising vote total was rung up by park commissioner candidate Steve Chamerski. Half-way thru the count, Chamerski was running neck and neck with the eventual winner, Bill Keener.

Chamerski, who was in the center of the TAM issues for so many years, obviously made points with many Nilesites who favored the acquisition of the golf course. While one park commissioner was quoted in another newspaper as saying, "Thank God, the other guy didn't win," referring to Steve, it must be said independent candidate Chamerski rang up a sizeable vote.

As one guy who works around Clark and Addison might be prone to say: "He ran SOME kind of race."

NILES ISSUES

While there can only be the number of winners equal to the political positions open in an election the dialogue caused by campaigning can serve a worthwhile use if the winning candidates will heed what had been discussed in the pre-election days.

Bill Winter noted many times he was opposed to the pre-meetings which are held before regular village board meetings in the rear of the council chambers. While Niles Mayor Nick Blase has commented many times the meetings are open to the public, still the pre-meetings seldom have the public present and we believe are illegal.

Representative Tony Scariano has a state bill named after him which forbids any meetings other than public meetings be held by public officials. If a meeting other than a regular meeting is held then it is the obligation of the public body to notify IN WRITING as to the hearing. Since the pre-village board meetings are held without notification we believe they would be deemed illegal.

While the GEMCO controversy was being discussed at the village hall some 50 residents trudged thru the snow to ask public officials about the GEMCO plans. When village president Nick Blase first refused to discuss the issue at that meeting, he said answers could not be received then but a special meeting would be held for this purpose. He noted no responsible representatives from GEMCO were available to answer the charges.

Within 5 minutes after Blase made that statement, the architect from GEMCO walked out of the room behind the chamber room, after having met with village officials at a pre-meeting. The following week he was on stage center to answer questions from Washington st. residents.

While the matter might be considered moot, nevertheless the public's right to know was abused by such a tactic. It was the most bare-faced reason why such pre-meetings should be barred, and is a fair example why the public has the innate right to have EVERY action and meeting of the men representing them appear only in front of them.

While Niles was having its every-other-year-shoot-out quiet staid Morton Grove was doing its thing . . . in somewhat sensational fashion.

Maine 'Open Campus' Proposal Under Study

About 75 parents of Maine high school students attended the District 207 Board of Education meeting Monday evening, April 19, at Maine East High School, to voice their strong disapproval of a proposal by students for an "open campus" policy at the Maine schools. Students are requesting a change in school policy which will allow them to leave the school buildings and school grounds during their free periods and at lunchtime if they desire to do so. A proposal to this effect was presented to the Board by the Maine East Student Council at the regular meeting in March. Board members assured both

parents and students attending the meeting Monday night that many aspects of the "open campus" idea will be investigated and considered, and the views of many groups taken into account, before any decision is made.

Following the recommendation of its Education Committee, the Board authorized the formation of an ad hoc fact-finding committee to study the proposal. The committee will be instructed to report to the Board at the May meeting regarding the investigative procedures it will use to obtain information on the proposal. The Board anticipates that the findings of this committee will be presented for Board consideration before the opening of the Maine high schools in the Fall.

The ad hoc committee will be composed of 24 persons: 8 adults, to be selected from parents of Maine students, local business people, parents of elementary students, and local law enforcement officers; 8 students, 2 from each high school; 4 classroom teachers, one from each Maine high school; and 4 administrators, to be selected not only from Maine high schools but also from local junior high schools.

Students contend that "open campus," with proper safeguards, would encourage student responsibility. The parents in attendance at the Board meeting Monday night were obviously of a different opinion.



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Pre-School Registration at Maine High Schools

Anyone wishing to register his child for pre-school classes to be held at all four Maine Township High Schools this Fall may make application beginning May 3 at the high schools. The classes, conducted by junior students under the direction of a certified child development teacher, are part of the "on the job" training program for the schools' Child Care Occupations course.

About 10 to 12 youngsters of pre-school age will be enrolled in each class. To be eligible for acceptance, children must between three and one-half and four and one-half years of age on Sept. 20, 1971. The Fall semester pre-school classes will be held four days a week from 12:30 p.m. to 2:30 p.m., beginning the week of Sept. 20. Because the "on the job" training of the Child Care Occupations class will be dependent upon the presence of pre-school age children, regular attendance by the children will be expected. The official District 207 calendar will be observed for holidays. Parents must provide transportation to and from the schools.

Maine East is located at 2601 Dempster st., Park Ridge; Maine North is at 9511 Harrison st., Des Plaines, in the unincorporated area between Golf rd. and Central rd., just east of the Tri-State Tollway; Maine South is located at 1111 S. Dee rd., Park Ridge; Maine West is at 1755 S. Wolf rd., Des Plaines.

Applications will be available in the main office of all four high schools on May 3. Anyone wishing to enroll his child in these pre-school classes may come in person to the Maine high school in his area and obtain an application blank. These application blanks will not be sent through the mail. The deadline for them to be returned is May 12.

All those applying for enrollment will receive notification the first week in June concerning the possible enrollment of their children. To defray the cost of supplies and refreshments, a registration fee of \$20.00 will be charged.

A registration day will be held in September to enable children and parents to visit the facilities and to meet with the coordinator and members of the Child Care Occupations class. Children selected for enrollment must have obtained a physical examination before registration.

The Child Care Occupations course was developed in response to strong student interest in exploring careers in the care and teaching of children and to a growing need for pre-school child care and for teachers' aides.

The pre-school classes at the high schools enable Child Care Occupations students to observe the growth and development of young children and to gain experience in supervising their activities. Seniors in the program receive "on the job" training as paid, part-time employees in private nursery schools, day care centers, pediatric wards, and hospital nurseries in the area. All students receive related classroom training in the care and teaching of children.

The "Walk Card" is actually a sponsor sheet listing pledges made by relatives, friends, or businessmen in the community. The sponsor pledges a certain amount per mile. Then the walker goes as far as he or she can along a pre-set 30 mile

route. This year the route begins at Niles North High school across from Old Orchard Shopping Center. Afterwards the walker collects the amount of money pledged per mile multiplied by the number of miles walked.

The important part of this year's Hike is the education of the community on the problems of Hunger and Underdevelopment. Included with each walk card is a summary sheet which describes where the funds go.


