

Buglenotes

It was state representative Tony Scariano who pushed thru the public-right-to-know statute which forbids public officials from going behind closed doors when discussing the public's business. It is the intent of the law in a democratic society the give and take of public discussion by elected of-ficials is in itself a check against the abuse of power. Rather than hide any dirty linen from the public, Scariano's statute implies the business of elected public officials must air the public's business in front of the public. Two exceptions are allowed. If the discussion concerns the hiring or firing of employees, or the acquisition of property, elected officials can then go imo "executive session". There are no other exceptions. This is the way the ballgame is to be played within the borders of Illinois.

The underlying philosophy behind the law is the public can best decide on a given issue if they're informed about what confronts public bodies.

Unfortunately, there's one set of rules for the ball game and another set for the way it is played. And in most public bodies pre-meetings, postmeetings, and executive sessions are a way of

Not to be outdone, the town which prides itself on economy in government, Morton Grove, also has had a past propensity for public officials meeting outside the public eye.

We'd like to say that great bastion of journalists, who defend the public's right to know, are out there battling the arrogance of public officials over this issue. But the milquetoasts, milkesaps, and other wishy washy souls, who are little more than newspaper stenographers, never raise their voices at the meetings we attend. And since the public seldom attends public meetings, there's no one around to blow the whistle on the closed-session-

For old-time Bugle readers there's little new in these comments. But it's now Tuesday at nountime, and it's a lousy day, wet and Londonish, and sort of blue funkyish, and I thought you might like to share this first snowy day by helping me vent some spleen on an old pet peeve.

#### Blase Criticizes **GOPTax Plan**

Mayor Nicholas Blase of Niles. whose law suit challenges the system for financing education in 11linois, criticized the GOP texreform plan regarding the abolition of the personal property tax. Blase stated that of the 300 million dollars in personal property taxes presently collected. 80% of it comes from corporations. where the cropping would take place. Off we went to meet Dr. Stresser.

Stresser.
The Stresser Animal hospital was started by Dr. Stresser's father in 1891. At that time the older doctor treated only horses, as taking care of dogs at that time was not done. The horse was a beast of burden and had to be taken care of, as most of them were used by the people in their businesses.

In 1925 the senior doctor stopped treating the horse and started to concentrate on the dog. It became quite fashionable to take a pet or working dog to the veterinarian. Dr. Stresser then became a licensed veterinarian. He worked at this job for several ulize in the cropping of ears. He told me he has been cropping ears since 1935. He also claims to have done over 100,000 ears

in that period. Surgery takes about one-half hour as he works quickly and with confidence, I got the impression that he could do the job with his eyes closed if he had to. The first thing I had to do was sign a release giving him permission to crop Kricket's ears. After that he weighed her. Then he gave her an injection of Pentobarbital Sodium, and in a matter of 10 seconds, off to dreamland. Then they shaved her ears void of hair and cleaned them with alcohol, from the inside to outside, from the back to the front tip. After he cleaned them he took a colored pencil and outlined the inside of her ears showing how the ear

would be cropped. After doing this he took a very sharp scizzor and cut the ear along the pattern he drew. Then he cleaned the ear and tied off the arteries. Laying the cut piece of ear on the uncut one, he cut that ear the same way, again tying the arteries off making sure there was no hemorrhage. He then started to stitch the cropped ears. At this point the

harder it is for them and the longer it takes for the ears to

The doctor will not do a Dane or Dob. over three months of age. He also suggests if it's at all possible try to purchase a puppy who has had his ears cropped already as it spares the new owner the fear and worry of having to have his puppy's ears cropped. Pupples come to Dr. Stresser from all over the country to have their ears done. At one time he even took pupples which were shipped in by air but he stopped doing this because it got to be too much for him.

Making sure the ears are immaculate he then dusts them with a medicated powder and wipes the ear with ether. Then taking years before he decided to just cement glue he paints the inside hair dryer he blows the cement till it drys and stiffens the ear. He then takes tape and applies it to the inside of the ear going all the way to the tip of it. This keeps the ear from shrinking and keeps the ear in place. Laying gauze over the ears and powdered tape to hold them in place, he places a bandage over the ears and the head. This bandage looks just like a head band, and completely covers everything. The dog is then placed in a blanket you have brought from home, wrapped up and taken home, to be placed in a dark, warm corner to sleep off the Pen-
