From the LEFT HAND

I turned to a young teen-ager on my left who was wearing a heavy head of bushy hair. "This is a heck of a way to choose a world leader of one of the great nations of the world." The bushy haired one disagreed. "It's a good way to hear his views. You get a slanted view when you read the newspapers."

The two of us were among 1,500, mostly young persons who were waiting for Senator Muskie to appear at Friday night's rally at Niles West High School.

Niles West's band was blasting away on stage, and some silly old men from our generation were running up and down the aisles yelling to the kids, "C'mon, we want Muskie." They were slapping their hands together and trying to arouse the enthusiasm of the crowd, as they bellowed out their rather empty chant.

There were Muskie balloons, hanging aloft from string like rubber kites seeking a breeze. And there were signs. There was, "Dump Nixon and Martha Mitchell," and there was "We're for McGovern." And the band played "It's a Grand Old Flag" and a sign streaming across the base of the balcony said, "Ed and Adlai Wouldn't Do Badly."

Onstage Niles Township Committeeman Aaron Jaffe was telling the crowd it was his son's birthday, but the 7 year old wanted to be here to-night, and behind Jaffe sat The Men. There was Congressman Rostenkowski, a fitz brother of a congressman, blond and tall and very handsome, with a sunlamp or a Bahama tan, which made him look like a movie-star congressman. And next to him was Congressman Al Miller, who would be flanked by Jaffe and Stevenson when the Great Man arrived. Behind Al sat our own Nick Elane, sartorially swathed in a beige suit with a black tie.

At 45 degree angles huge visuals of Muskie were projected on the screens, and down in front amidst the cameras, TV lines, and roving seconds for the political candidates, was Channel 7's Hugh Hill, talking toward the camera, while the speaker on stage was warming-up the crowd. Hill spoke for about 5 minutes which was chopped down to 20 seconds when Channel 7 reported these goings on on their 10 o'clock news.

Up on the podium came Adlai Stevenson, and the crowd greeted him with much enthusiasm. After handshaking the front row congressmen, he walked to the microphone amidst cheers from the crowd. But when Adlai began to speak he told a couple of anecdotes which would have to place him among the poorer raconteurs of our time. He hesitates, he drones, and he wrestles with a word or phrase, which makes the viewer want to help him thru his ordeal, and then when the punchline comes, you feel relieved he's made his point, but then another Adlai Stevenson begins to speak, and he becomes serious, and he's a different speaker. His theme is leadership and he commands a uniformed silence. Whereas, his story-telling is dull and dreary his theme on "leadership" elicits complete attention.

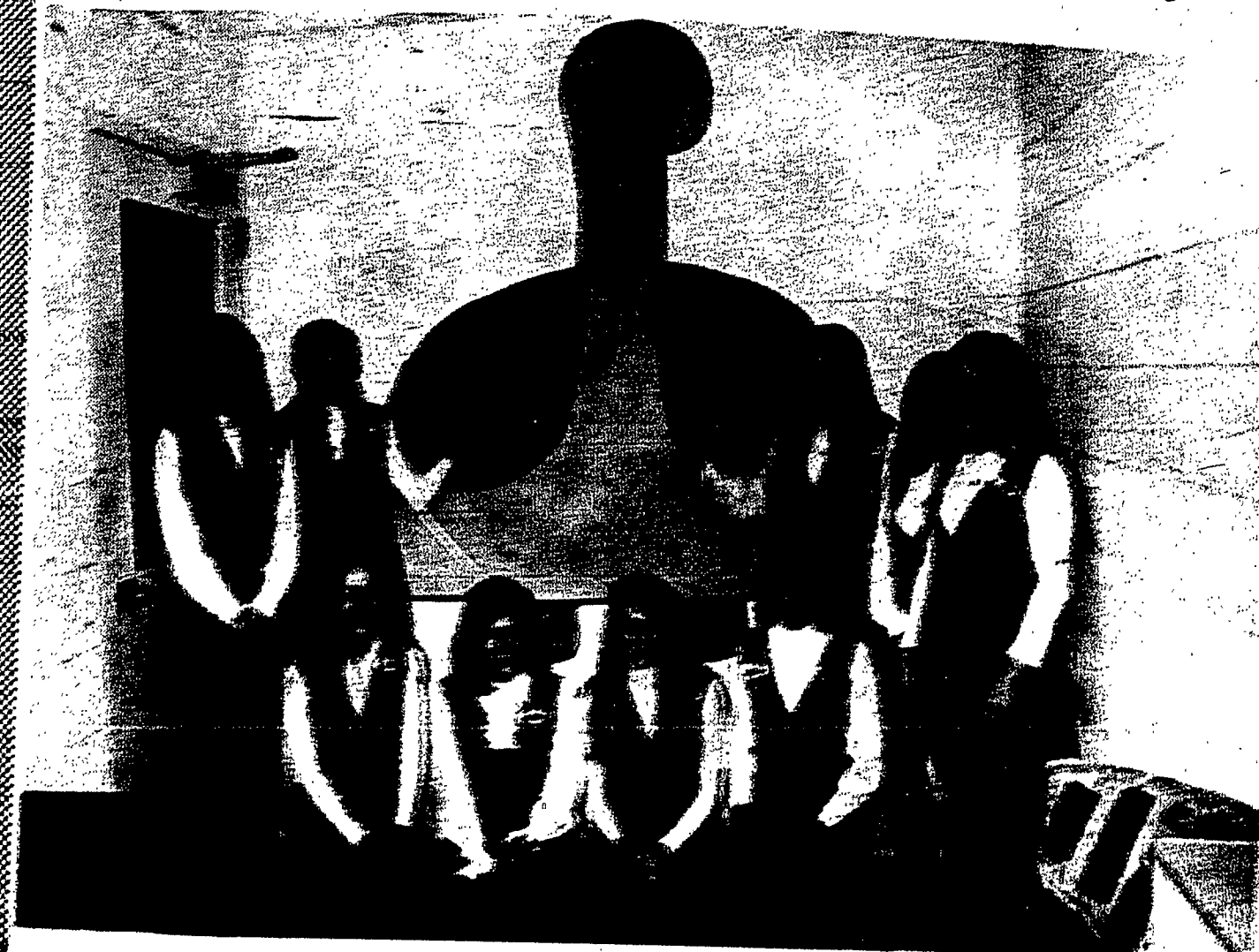

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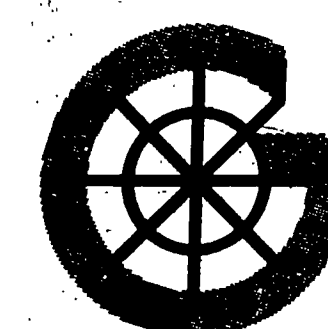

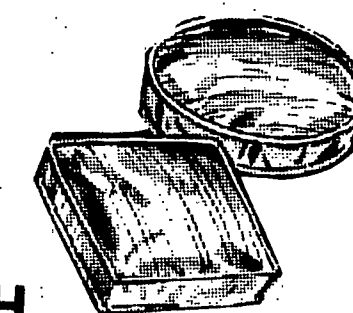
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BSA Leaders to Get Drug Abuse Training

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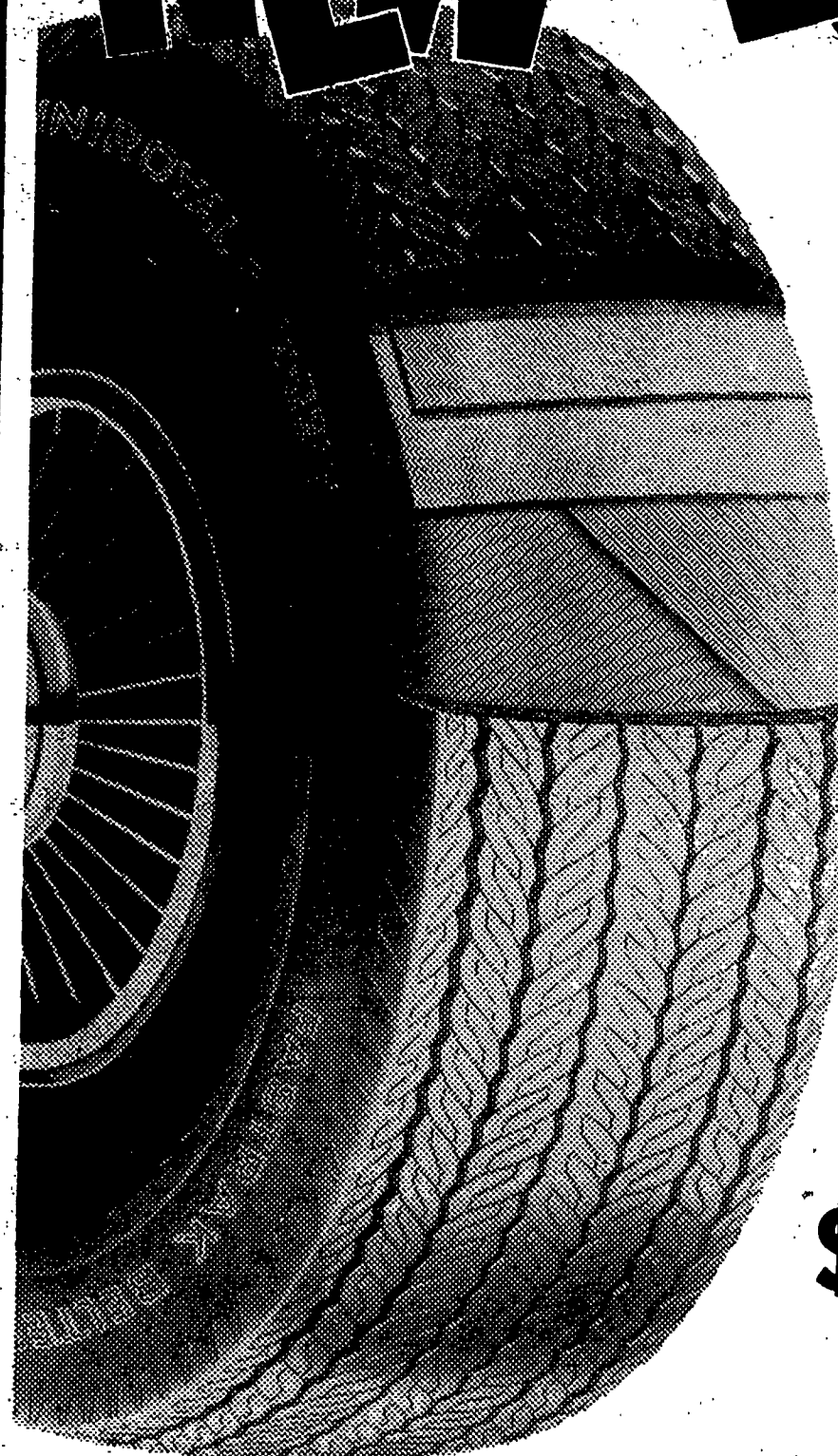
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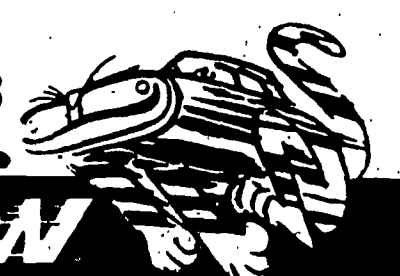
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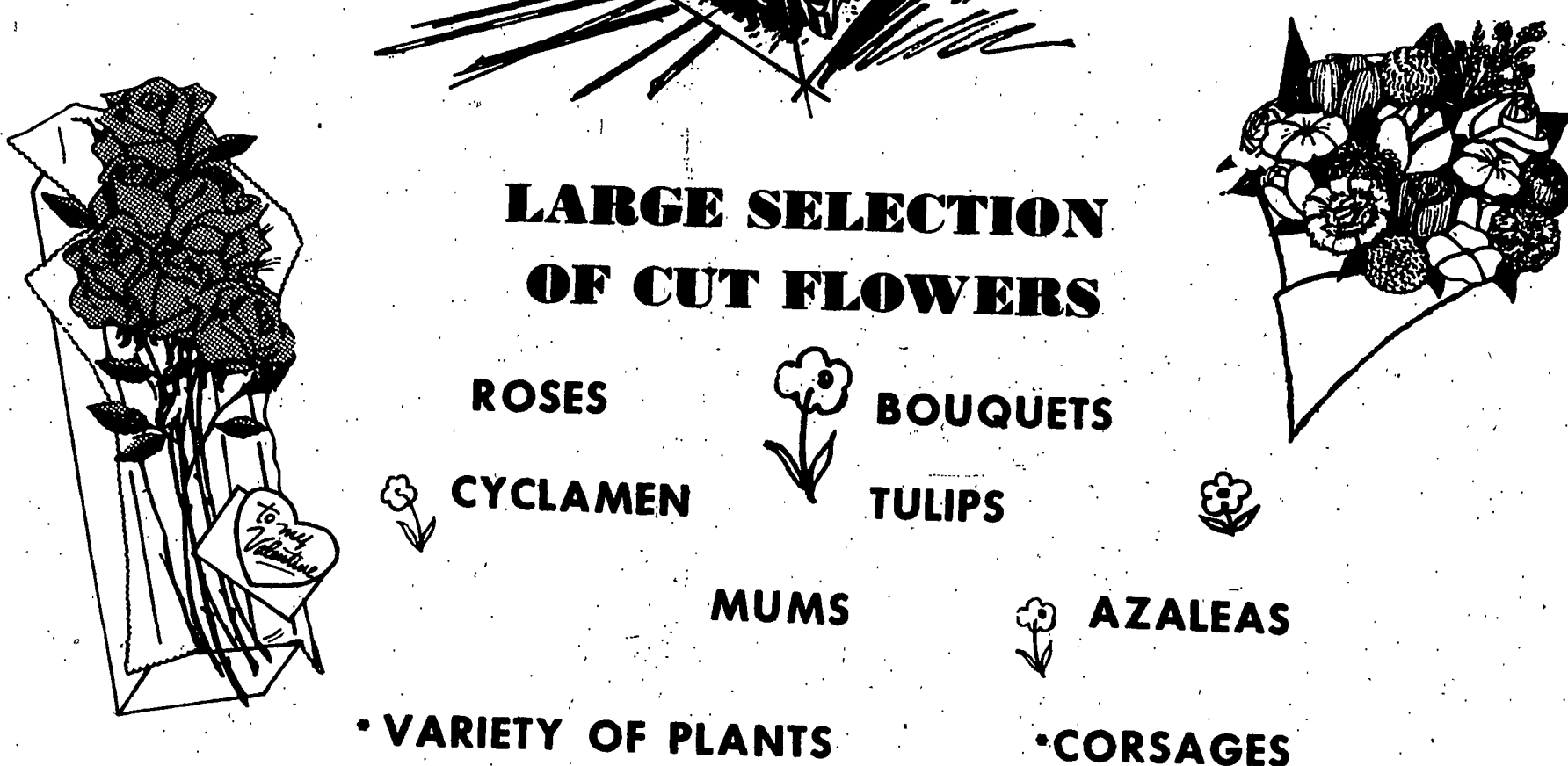
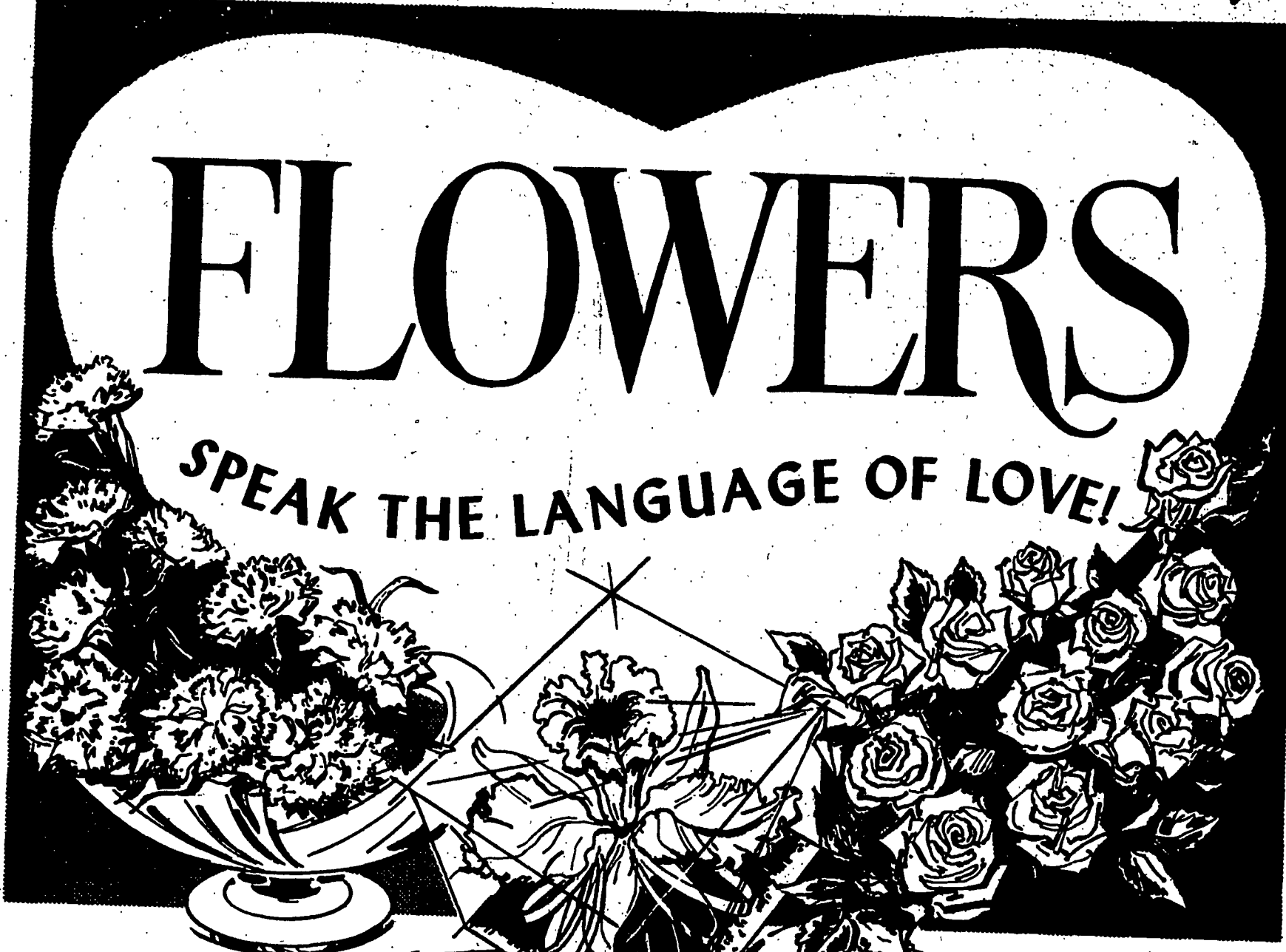


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N.D. Fencers Hold Record

At 8:25 p.m. in marches the Man from Maine. He handshook his way down the aisle, said a word to each of the beaming congressmen, and then grabbed Stevenson's hand and held it aloft, as if they were both in the winner's circle. When he saw the sign, "Ed and Adlai Wouldn't Do Badly" he readily agreed it might be right and the crowd cheered lustily.

There were more signs, "Don't tread on Ed," another McGovern sign, and one for "Hello Dolly," the upcoming musical at the high school. Balloons floated up against the ceiling, a couple exploded, and the candidate launched into a speech he likely said hundreds of times in recent weeks. He used words like "fortuitous" and he spoke about his Dad coming from the old country, and he spoke about the Kennedys, hoping a little of their magic might rub off on him, and he said, "Nixon is doing to the economy what Mrs. O'Leary's cow did to Chicago," and my bushy-haired neighbor said, "He does his homework." Muskie once again spoke about his father, who came to Maine from Poland, and told how he was a tailor, not unlike many grandfathers of those who were in the audience.

Muskie was calm and firm, an attractive candidate, who will be compared to a craggy, solid rock of a man from Maine. He has bright blue eyes, and when he mentioned he was governor back in the fifties, and Adlai Stevenson, Senior offered to campaign in Maine, either for him or against him, which ever would help the most among all those Republicans, the audience liked him.

Reaching for more of that Kennedy magic he reiterated JFK's "taking the first step," and suggested we have to start over again.

Another tall lean handsome man, Angelo Geocaris pushed onstage, but stood in the wings while the man finished his speech. He was among the

first to grab his hand when the speech was over, and then he faded into the background. Geocaris is one of those rich cats, who provides the fuel for these very expensive campaigns. He's the Illinois chairman for Muskie and he oils the wheels which makes this very expensive machine run. Geocaris is the guy behind the scenes, who like his counterparts in many other states, will be deciding on the 1972 leader of our country, and perhaps the world. He too is suntanned, tall and poised, and a good friend of Nick Blase. But as good a friend as he is his teenage son is working in the Mikva camp.

It's now 8:50, just 25 minutes after 'the man' walked into the auditorium. The Niles West band is banging away, Muskie is off the stage and handshaking his way down the aisle again. Delegate candidate Betty Ashman of Morton Grove said she experienced a momentary fright when a tall angular 6 footer confronted the candidate. The Kennedy tragedies have left all of us with much apprehension, and when the candidate is confronted, the danger signals seem to go up. But the young adult merely told the candidate, "Your speech didn't say anything." The Senator, obviously conditioned to the winds of travail, told him he was sorry it meant nothing to him.

While the cheering was subsiding the old men who were trying to lead the earlier cheers, were now applauding wildly, hands above their heads. The band played on, and the zero weather-outside forced many of us to linger longer than normally. I turned to my young friend next to me. He said he was Joel Elliott, he was from Glenview, and he was glad he came. After several most interesting observations he told me he was only 13 years old. I told him he was a very knowledgeable young man, certainly aware of what's happening in the now generation. And I saw the old men still hustling the crowd with their phony cheering, and I was glad I'd met the young man with the bushy hair.

retail stores and 60,000 square feet for offices. Beaulieu also said he has spoken to the Eagle Foods Company, which holds the Steinberg-Baum lease, which extends until 1981, as well as the Brooks Excavating Company to the south of the proposed center. Both interests said they might be interested in selling their property if the "price was right". Plans call for 45 cars parking in the rear of the center, 450 car spaces would be in the parking lot in the front of the center and 200 spaces would be built underground. The upstairs medical center would have an elevator extend from the garage enabling patients to go directly from the garage into the medical center. It was stated by Beaulieu the drawing of the plans plus the construction would take about 2 years to complete. He said if the second floor was not rented he would not build the second floor initially.

Two Kirk Lane residents, Ken Kaye and Earl Osenberg, objected to the project contending they preferred single family dwellings in the area. But when Beaulieu first presented plans to the village he desired to build condominiums, and the opposition from Jonquil Terrace resulted in his changing these plans. Beaulieu said residents then said they prefer retail stores to the condos, so when the objections were mildly presented Tuesday night public officials did not accept the objections with much interest. They unanimously approved the center plans.

seeking to become a Congressman from this district, another bit of artful dodging took place last month. With Blase leading the way Niles officials asked the attorney to prepare a resolution (or ordinance) which would make it mandatory to have a public referendum before any public housing would be approved for the Niles area. Again, attorney Troy said the U. S. Supreme Court approved such action and when a Bugle reporter questioned Troy he reiterated the legality of the position. But at the next meeting, Blase whispered to Tr. Bast, whose subsequent comments postponed any action on the matter. Why?

What is the point in all these bits of political subterfuge? Obviously, it ties in with Blase's congressional bid. The officials tell the attorney to draw up an ordinance or resolution, and it creates headlines in all the local newspapers. Two weeks later it's all forgotten, except a new resolution is created, which breeds more headlines.

In Washington, a politician there has often been nicknamed "Tricky Dicky." In Niles there's a guy we've long tabbed "Tricky Nicky." By comparison, the sleight of hand artful dodger was an amateur.

In other actions village officials said they would co-operate with Niles Women's Club in its proposed building of a historical and cultural center in the Tam O'Shanter area. Mandy Honold, spearheading the center's drive, said the park district had promised her about 1-1/2 acres of land by the river, and she desired the professional guidance of Niles engineers and other supervisors for the project.

The wheel tax in Niles was approved unanimously. The Harczak proposal will result in a \$5 tax for all new 2 wheel vehicles sold in Niles, \$10 for autos and \$15 for trucks. Motorized snowmobiles will also be included. The County had passed this law January 1 but under the new Home Rule provisions of the new Illinois constitution the village law would supercede the County law, enabling the revenue to come in to the village, rather than be paid to the County. It is estimated 380 vehicles a month are affected, with an estimated revenue as high
