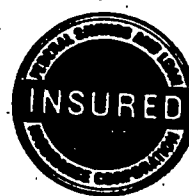

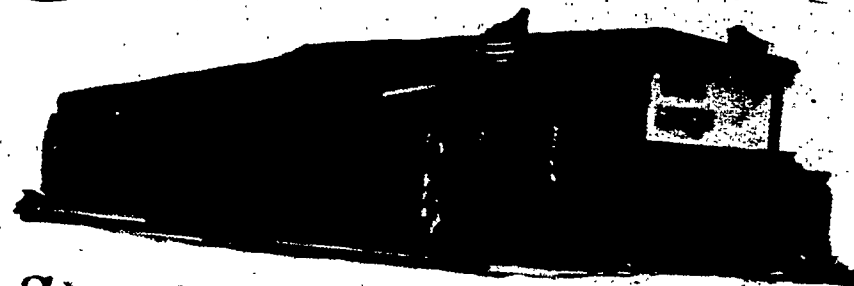

## From the LEFT HAND

The name of the game is roundball, B-Ball. It started with a peach basket in a YMCA gym by a guy named Naismith, and it's annually celebrated in country towns with rites which would make the old Roman fertility festivals seem like Cub Scout blue and gold dinners by comparison.

This is March, and it's the time of the year when shopkeepers lock their cash registers, and small town USA, closes up shop, when the closely-cropped kids head for the state championship tournaments.

If you're an aficionado of the game, you probably got hit in the head with a basketball early in life, and never quite recovered.

I managed to escape this madness until the age of 10 when a Sunday school buddy said he needed four other guys to form a team. When I raised my volunteering hand, I became hooked on a sport for which there is no cure.

During those first halcyon years we played a game quite unlike today's run and shoot sport. The ball was made of leather and it generally was badly deflated, which made its bounce travel half its normal distance. They had something called a jump ball which took place after every basket at center court, and resulted in 20 and 30 point games.

Usually the gym you played in was unheated, and the gym floor retained the dirt from the previous year. An open cut from that floor required a tetanus shot to keep you going until the following week.

It wasn't until 7th grade we received our first uniforms. Scrawny arms and legs sticking out from these itchy uniforms made a 12 year old uncomfortably self-conscious, especially if he knew his 7th grade girl friend would be in the stands. By eighth grade you knew all there was to know about the game, only you played at a disadvantage, when nature had you growing more slowly than the 6 foot thirteen year olds, who'd tear you apart under the basket.

In high school Chicago teams were divided into players under 5 foot 7 inches, and teams over that height. In your first two years of high school you walked with a slump, developed a hump-back, in your desire to stay under the 5-7 mark. When measuring time came, you hooked in your knees, sucked your stomach in, and placed your head far out from your body, while the guy measuring you attempted to knock you upright against the wall to measure your full height.

In your junior year it was time to move up to the Senior team, and you suddenly stood 6 inches taller than you had the previous years. The first game we played on that team was against De LaSalle, and a guy named George Connor, late of the Bears. He hadn't grown to his full size then, but we could spot him a hundred pounds, and he'd still stomp on our shadow.

## Urge Kite Fliers to Use Caution

Springtime's identified flying object — the kite — may appear harmless enough but it can be dangerous if a few simple rules of caution are not heeded. Commonwealth Edison, in a message on kite-flying safety, notes that hazards of the sport have been known to cause serious injury. Lowell E. Geffinger, Edison district superintendent in this locality, said the following rules can help assure a safe kite season.

1. Always use dry string, wood and paper in a kite — not wire or metal. Metallic fibers, tinsel or wire conduct electricity and should not be brought in contact with power lines.
2. Never fly a kite in the rain.

Wet string can also conduct electricity.

4. A kite should not be flown when the wind is freakish or changeable.
5. If a kite becomes snagged in a power line or high tree, leave it. Do not risk injury by climbing poles, towers or trees to retrieve it.

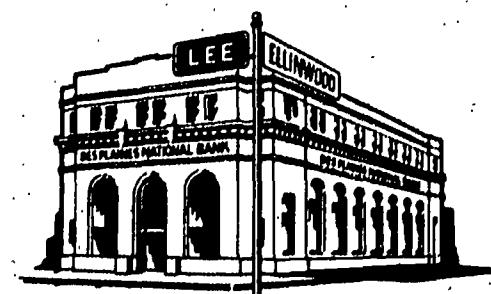

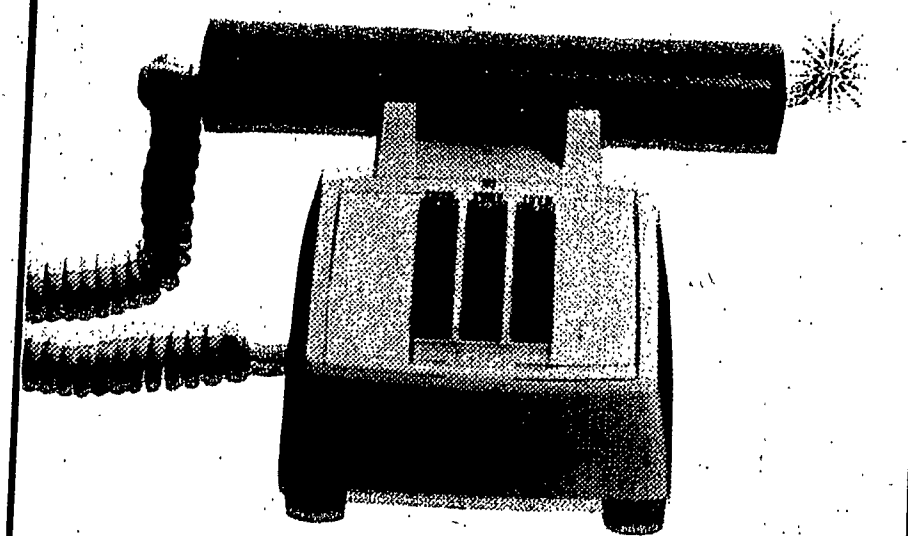

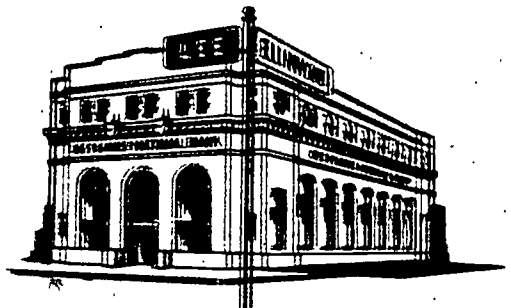

### 'Daily News Endorses Sam Young'

Another major endorsement for Samuel H. Young further strengthened his chances in the 10th District's Congressional race. The Chicago Daily News recently gave the nod to Young, pointing out that his "well-defined views on taxation, welfare, education, crime and other issues doubtless reflect those of many Republicans in the 10th."

The endorsement termed Young "more knowledgeable" than his opponent on questions of national policy and other issues confronted by a member of Congress.

In 1971, Young went on a 12-day fact-finding tour to Vietnam and the Far East for briefings with state department and foreign government officials to obtain an on-site inspection of U.S. — Far Eastern relations.

Young has been an active worker and fund raiser for the Republican Party since 1948. As Securities Commissioner of Illinois (1953-1955) and as Assistant Secretary of State (1955-1957) he won state-wide respect for his organizational ability. He served as President of the Illinois Young Republicans Organization (1951-1958) and as Northfield Township Committee member from 1962-1969. He was supervisor in 4 townships in the old 18th District in the 1969 Congressional campaign.

### Mikva Endorsed by Rep. Rostenkowski

Congressman Abner J. Mikva (D-Ill.) has won another important Democratic endorsement in his campaign for re-election in the new 10th district, gaining the support of Congressman Dan Rostenkowski, the chairman of the Illinois Democratic Congressional Delegation.

Congressman Rostenkowski has been in the House of Representatives for 12 years, representing Illinois' 8th Congressional District. He and Congressman Mikva have worked together on a number of projects for Illinois and several pieces of legisla-

tion over the last 3 years.

Referring to Congressman Mikva's membership on the House Judiciary Committee, Rep. Rostenkowski said, "It is safe to assume that with the recent reforms on the House Committee System, it will not be long before Congressman Mikva will be eligible to serve as a subcommittee chairman on that prestigious Committee." Congressman Rostenkowski nominated Congressman Mikva for a position on that Committee when he was elected to Congress in 1968.

### Flynn Supports Aid to Private Schools

Thomas Flynn, the Democratic Senatorial Candidate in the 4th District, announced that he will support "Aid to Private Schools" legislation if the aid is directed to the parent and limited "strictly" for non-religious instructional subject matter and textbooks, supplies and equipment. He stated, "I believe that this is not a religious issue but an economic issue. I also believe that the Constitutional issue is immaterial if the legislation fully excludes aid for religious instruction."

Mr. Flynn said, "The issues of Constitutionality and Religion are actually secondary in my mind. The matter is really economic. If the private schools of Illinois are forced to close then the State will face economic ruin because within the present tax structure it will be impossible to absorb the nearly 1,000,000 private school students into the existing public school system. School District #63 in Maine Township offers an excellent example of potential economic ruin. The tax rate is nearly \$3.00 now. St. John Brebeuf school in Niles has about 1,000 students. The operating expense of this school

is \$1.5 million. The plant, equipment and supplies cost about \$1.0 million and this combined with the operating expenses is a \$2.5 million savings to the taxpayers of District 63. To my knowledge there are at least 20 private schools in the 4th District. This means if these schools close then the 4th District's public school

districts may need an additional \$30 million for operating expenses and \$20 million for construction and equipping of new schools. The simple truth of the matter is that we cannot afford this additional monies and I personally doubt if a bond issue of this magnitude would pass anywhere in the 4th District.

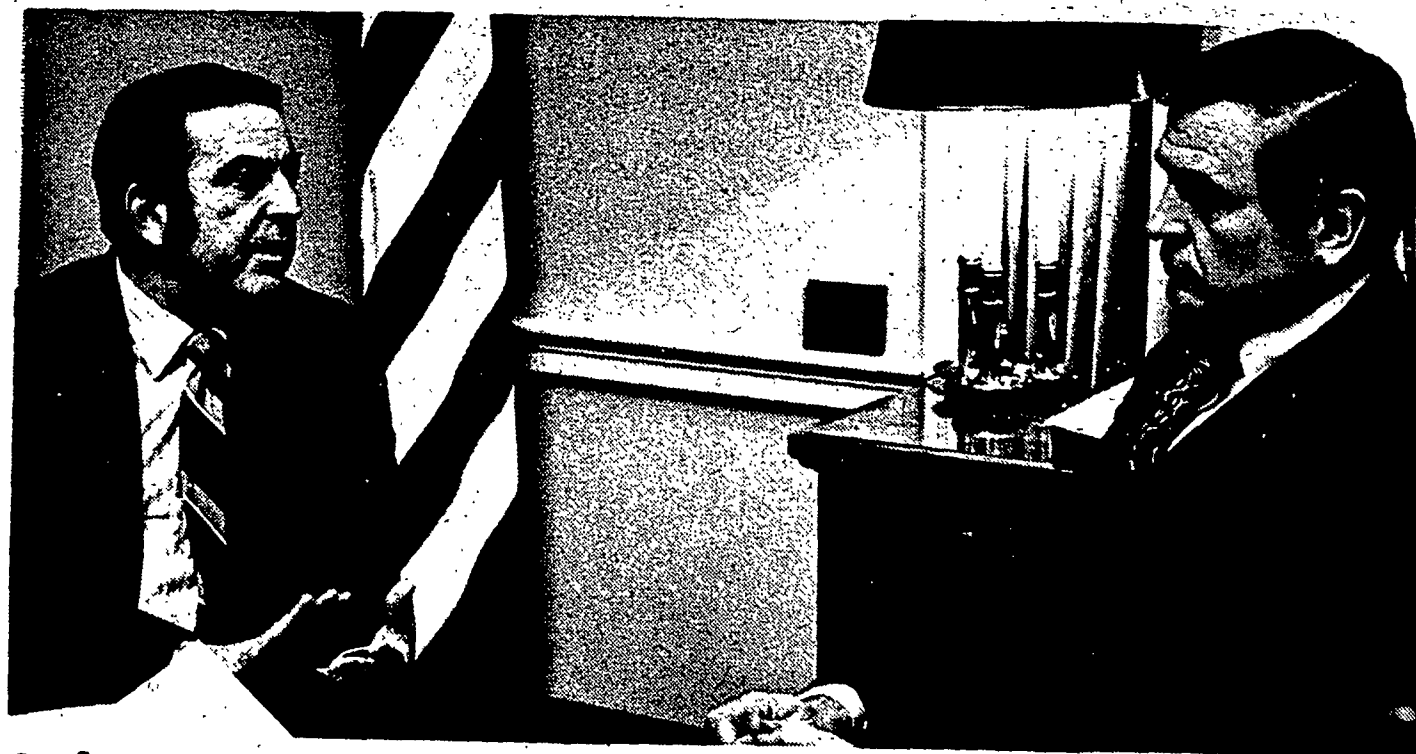

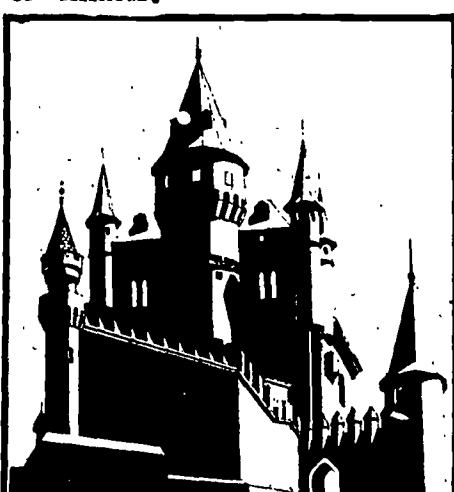

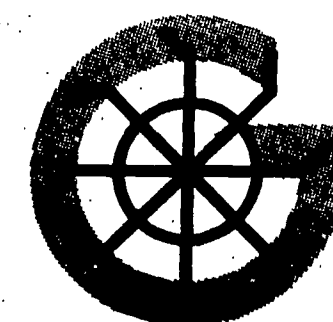

## Lutheran General Gets JCAH Accreditation

Lutheran General Hospital, Park Ridge, has again been accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals (JCAH). The accreditation is for 2 years, the maximum length of time for accreditation under the new standards which went into effect July 1, 1971. Lutheran General was one of the first hospitals to be surveyed under these new standards.

Accreditation by JCAH represents documented evidence that Lutheran General provides high quality patient care in a clean, safe environment. This also qualifies a hospital to receive payment for Medicare patients. Most teaching programs are also conducted only in accredited hospitals.

A survey team from JCAH inspected Lutheran General on Jan. 6 and 7. A hospital must request this survey. The Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospi-

tals is a voluntary organization whose members include the American Hospital Association, American Medical Association, the American College of Physicians and the American College of Surgeons.

The survey covers everything from the organization of the governing board and medical staff, credentials of staff physicians, utilization of facilities and medical staff review to the construction of the hospital and its mass casualty plan.

The survey team praised Lutheran General for high quality of patient care, its excellent infection control and high quality environment.

New JCAH standards require surveys every 2 years rather than 3. During the interim, hospitals conduct a self-evaluation according to JCAH guidelines and report these findings to the Joint Commission.

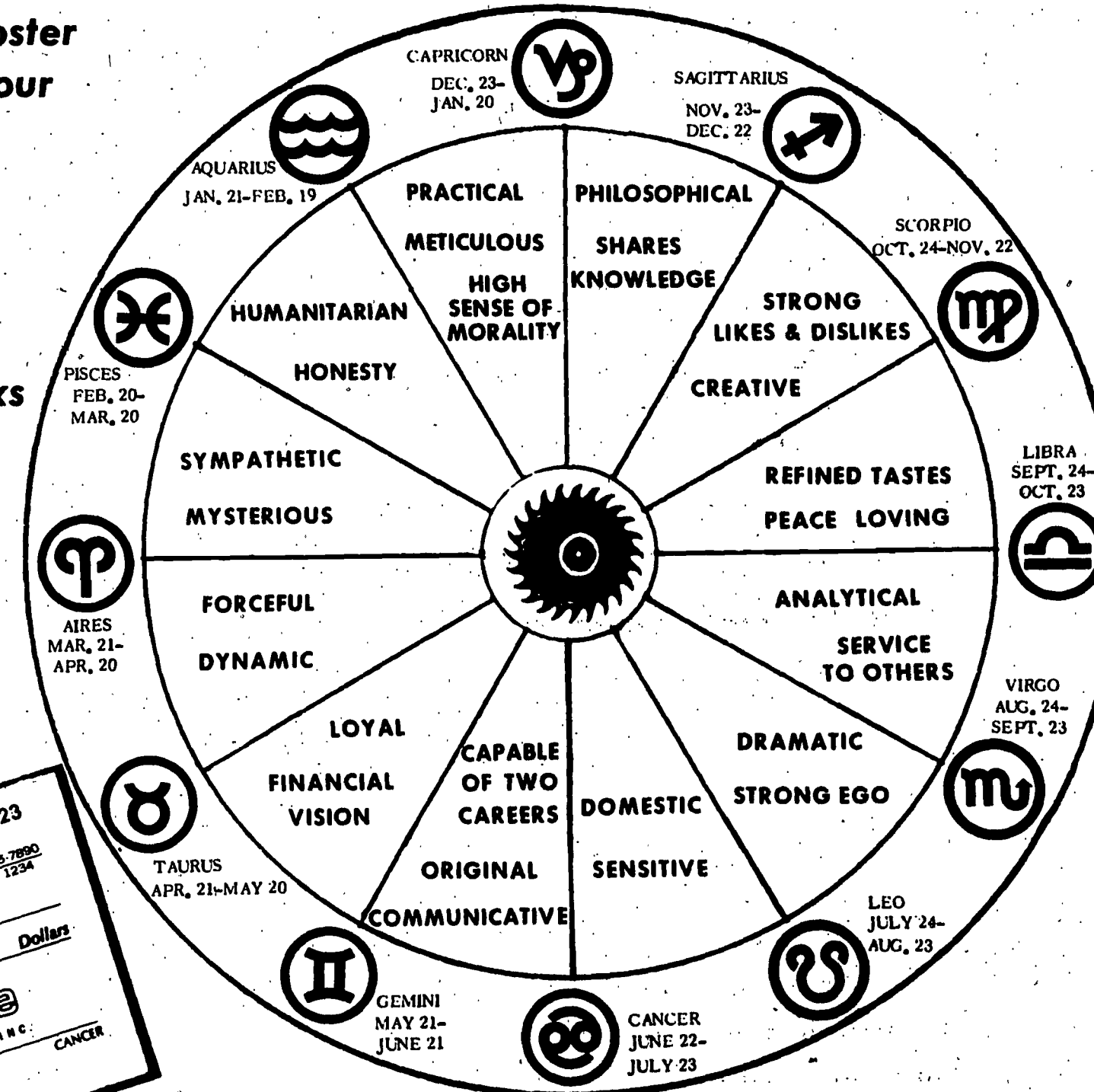
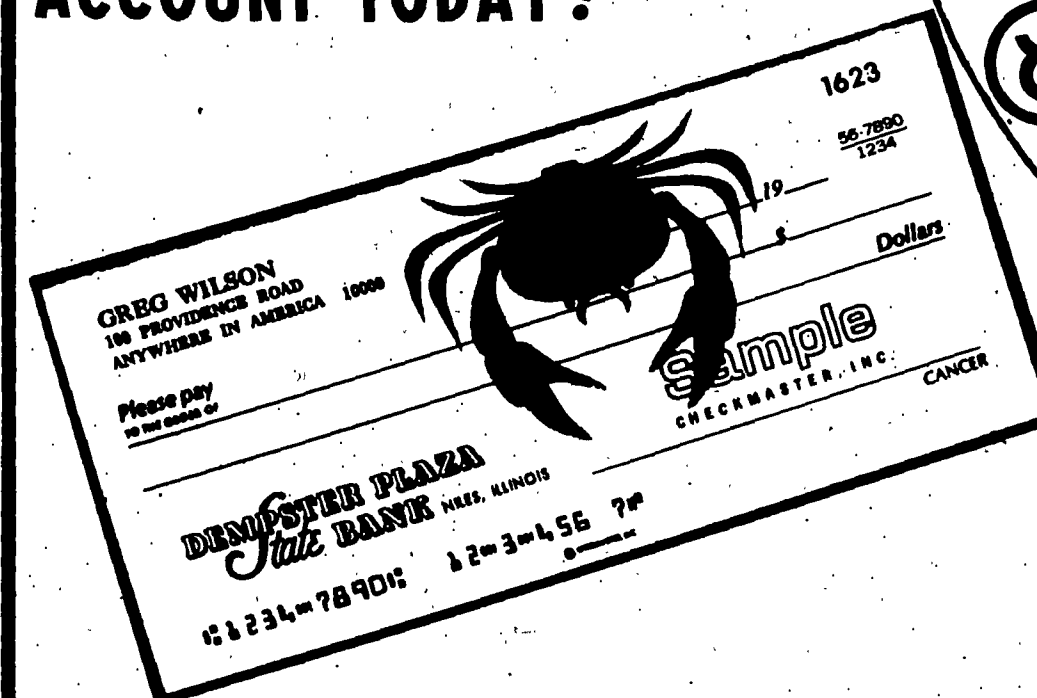

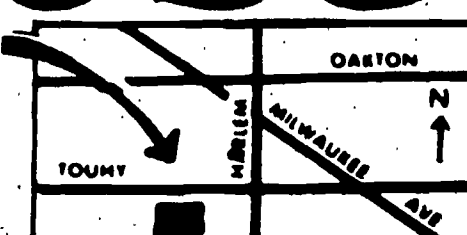

The girls results are not available at this time.

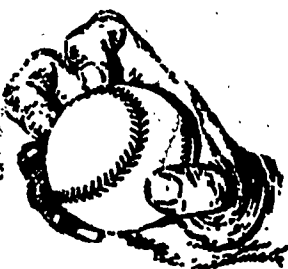

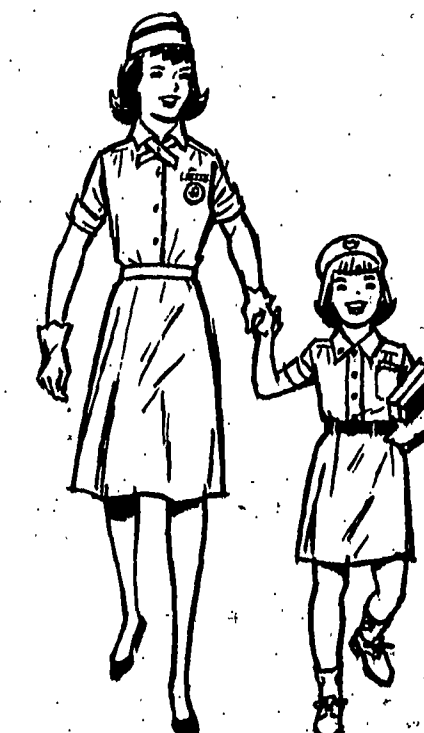

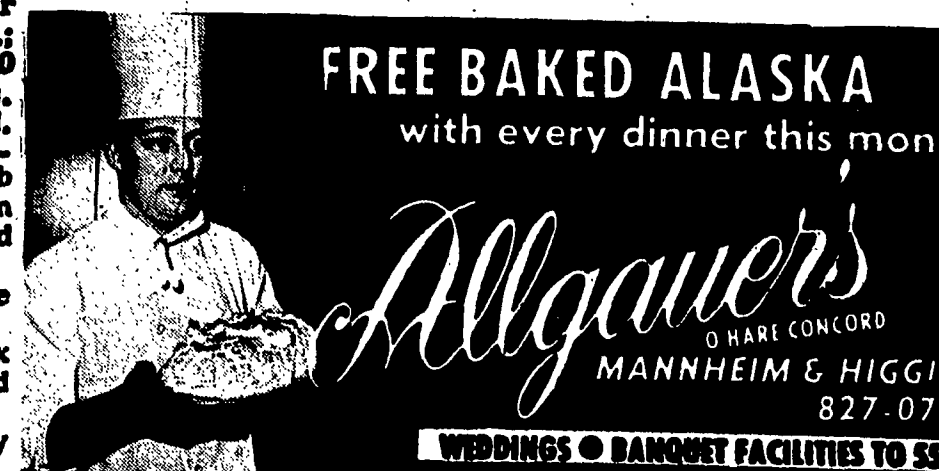

The first game we started in was a Christmas tourney game at the old Stagg fieldhouse. We made baskets which bounced 20 feet off the rim and plunked back into the basket, and committed fouls so quickly the Coach pulled us out of the game, to save us from the mayhem of the opposition, and the wrath of the referee.

In our Senior year we looked forward to this Stagg tourney during the holiday break and were disappointed when it was cancelled. It was December, 1942, and they cheated a bunch of kids, who longingly waited for the annual tourney. It was 3 years later, while wandering around Berlin, that I first read some guy named Fermi and his friends, had set-off the first nuclear reaction in December, 1942, at this exact location where the basketball tourney was scheduled to be played. It was a lousy reason for cancelling a basketball tourney.

During the early war years we formed a team which wandered around the city and played in many odd ball games. The team was composed of a Japanese boy, a black boy, Jewish boys, and other beleaguered ragamuffins, who endured the jeers of the enemy crowds thruout town. In South Chicago one audience-dweller spewed out a racial epithet, which caused our one fighter to go up into the stands after him. The game stopped, and while we stood alone on the court, we felt the 2,000 bleacher-dwellers were about to descend on us way-farers from another neighborhood. Out in the Arundsen area a similar epithet, resulted in a wild melee, and we had to have an adult escort to get us out of the gym.

During our service days we wandered around basketball courts halfway around the world. We once played on a ceramic tile court in London, and in several gyms, where the 10 1/2 foot ceilings compelled you to shoot the ball in line-drive fashion. There were many courts which had walls directly under the baskets, which required a ballet-like effort, with a protruding foot saving you from becoming etched in the wall.

At Gettysburg College we played against the star hotshot of that conference, and he was just another ballplayer. And we later played against a bunch of over-ripe over-aged Air Force mechanics, and they wiped us off the court.

In Bremerhaven, while waiting for a ship to take us home, we won \$100 in one game, and blew it on one meal, in the over-inflated black market restaurants there.

Playing the game didn't make you an expert. But grazing with many of the hangers-on, was great fun, and was a side benefit you quickly understood. Back in high school we always had 3 or 4 men in their 20's who'd always drive us to the games. They never worked, but they piled a trade which kept them in spending money. Besides winning

In the poolhalls, these big spenders used to very casually find out what condition we were in, while riding to the games with them. They were master psychologists and after 20 minutes in the car with us, they were able to make pointspreads which kept them in bread, until the next week's games. They had no loyalty. But, whether we won or lost, somehow, they seemed to win, and shared their bounty by treating us to a good steak dinner.

In later years we'd still see these small time gamblers plying their trade. They were good guys and often were friends with the Chicago high school coaches. At tourney time down thru the years we would see these same coaches at afternoon games in Chicago, and evening playoff games in Arlington Heights. The next night down at the stadium these same basketball addicts would be attending the college double headers there.

As a youngster we used to hitchhike into Indiana to see a state tourney playoff there. And when we were at the U. of I. we once hid among the mats in the gymnasium room, in order to evade the guards who checked Huff gymnasium, to kick out all the fans who didn't have the prized tickets for the tourney. The next year we became an usher, but once inside the gym, made sure we had a seat for the tourney, discarding our usher badge in favor of being just another basketball fan.

In Indiana we saw games played on auditorium stages, and once saw a ball bounce off the top of the square backboard and come to rest balanced atop it. We've mentioned this to many fans, none of whom ever saw it happen, or believed we had ever seen it.

About five years ago we were sitting in a restaurant outside Gary, when we spotted our old high school coach sitting at a nearby table. He told us he worked the Notre Dame game that afternoon, and that evening he asked us to drive him to the Gary Tollestson stadium, where he was refereeing that night. This 60 year old man said he'd coached his team Thursday afternoon, refereed Friday at Eckersall Stadium, had the Notre Dame and Gary games on Saturday, and had a Catholic game at Eckersall scheduled for Sunday. In amazement we turned to him and said, "Don't you ever take a vacation . . . or at least a break?" And in equal amazement he turned to me, some 20 years younger, and said, "Bud, this is my life. There's nothing I'd rather do."

I guess he summed it up for all the basketball fans who'll be trudging to the gyms thruout the country this week. Like our coach, they're addicted, hooked, perhaps transfixed when they hear the roundball bounce against the gym floor, and pause on its way thru the net. And I guess they wouldn't have it any other way.

## Village Revokes Carpet Business License

Mayor Nicholas B. Blase has permanently revoked the business license of the Industrial Carpet Company which was located in the Lawrencewood Shopping Center, Niles. In recent months, numerous complaints were received by the Niles Consumer Fraud Office from not only local residents, but also from persons residing out of the Village. Some complaints were received from as far away as Joliet, Waukegan, Elmhurst, Chicago, and some towns located in the state of Wisconsin.

Because of these complaints, a formal hearing was conducted by Frank C. Wagner, Jr., Commissioner of Consumer Fraud for the Village of Niles. The testimony given at this hearing warranted the revocation of this license. The action which prompted the license to be revoked was the issuance of bogus checks written by this company. Other complaints were that carpeting was of improper size or not delivered at all even though substantial deposits were given. In one incident, furniture was picked up to be reupholstered which was never returned to the owner. It was later learned that the furniture was sold to another party.

The Niles Consumer Fraud Division, which is a first in our area, was established approximately 18 months ago in order

to protect the residents of the Village of Niles from companies such as the Industrial Carpet Company.

Assistant Commissioner Thomas Flynn stated that the Village of Niles will continue to accept complaints from persons who have been victims of fraudulent dealings with this company. Any and all complaints received are being turned over to the Attorney General's office in an attempt to assist those innocent victims who have placed deposits and have not received their proper merchandise.

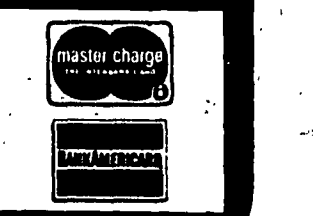
