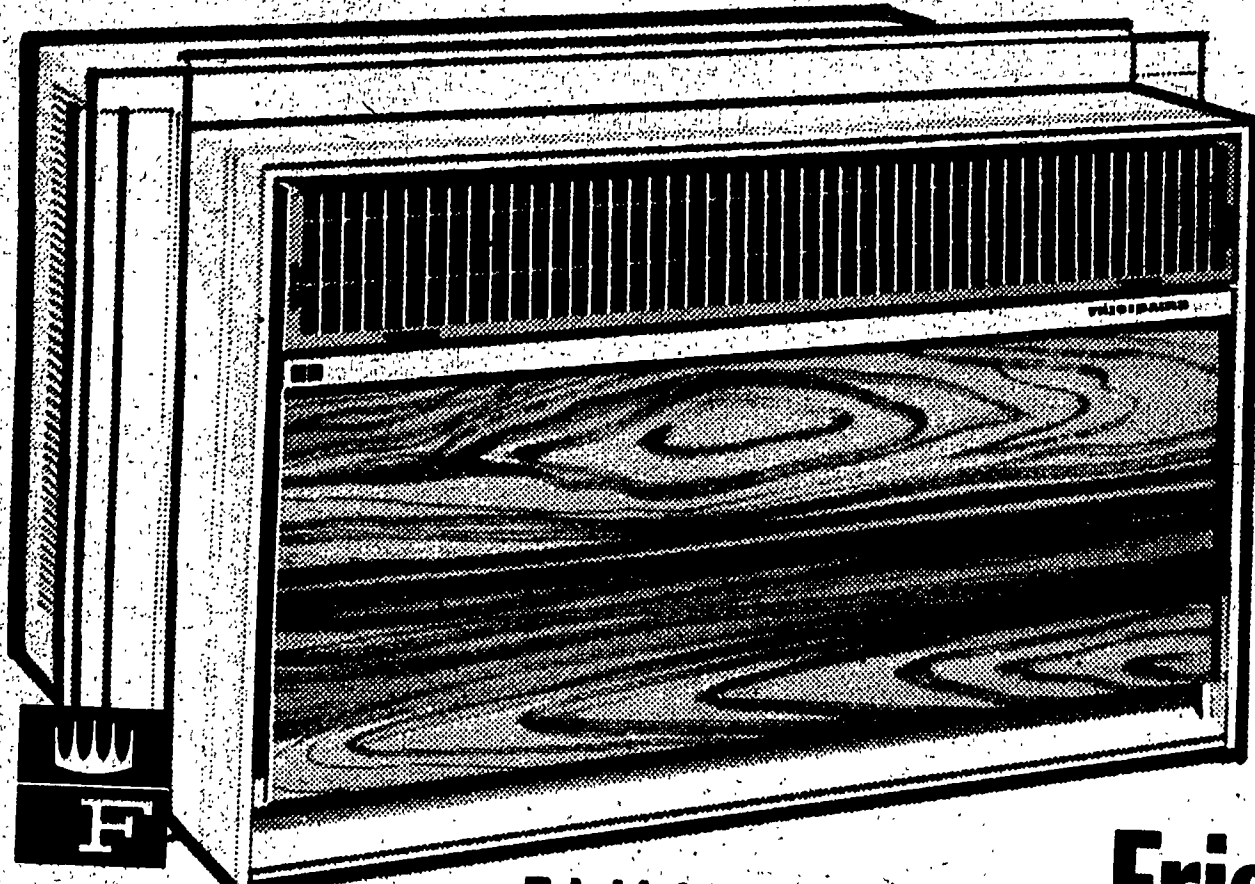

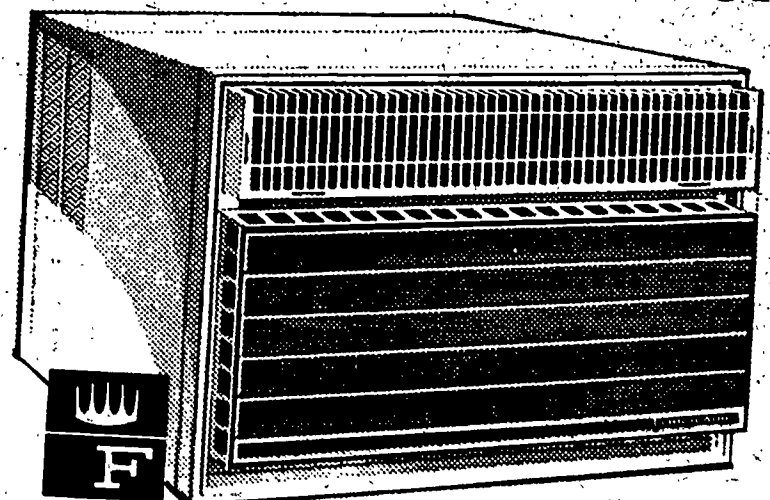

Des Plaines Studies Bus Co. Purchase

The Des Plaines City Council has ordered a study to determine if it would be economically feasible for them to purchase the United Motor Coach Co., which has been plagued by financial problems in recent years.

Des Plaines was approached in January, according to Mayor Herbert Behrel, to buy the ailing transit business, but is hesitant to do so until a complete study has been made.

The study will be handled by the consulting firm of Ernst and Ernst at a cost of \$8,500. The results of this study will determine whether Des Plaines would be better off purchasing the transit company rather than continue paying them a subsidy of \$16,500 a year.

The Village of Niles agreed to pay the United Motor Coach Co. a subsidy of \$9,000 a year in November, 1970. This was renewed and is in effect until November, 1972.

Mayor Behrel said the Des Plaines Mass. Transit District could acquire the company for approximately \$500,000, but the firm's 69 buses are too old to have any value.

The \$500,000 asking price of United Motor Coach would pay primarily for its garage facilities at 900 E. Northwest Hwy., Des Plaines.

United's president, John Hanck said the company has suffered huge rider losses in the last seven years and continues to hang on despite mounting financial problems.

The firm recently began a new route from the Jefferson Park CTA terminal in Chicago to the Randolph Shopping Center in Mt. Prospect and the route looks extremely promising. A similar route is being planned from the Jefferson Park terminal to the Golf Mill Shopping Center in Niles.

LWV Results of Niles-MG Library Study

The League of Women Voters of Morton Grove - Niles has recently completed a two-year study of the libraries of both communities. The results of the study and the League's recommendations have been presented to the administrations of both libraries.

In general, members from both districts are pleased with their local libraries and felt there have been definite improvements over the past few years. However, the League had several suggestions to increase library effectiveness.

1) Reference materials in many subject areas are limited and should be expanded with available funds.

2) Much public education and "in-service" education for library personnel is needed to encourage utilization of the North Suburban Library System. For example, library users should be informed of the need of having their cards stamped for reciprocal borrowing.

3) The League strongly urged the establishment of Sunday afternoon hours.

Dist. 64 Board Upholds Oakton School Closing

The original decision by District 64 School Board to close the Oakton School, Oakton and Northwest Hwy. in Park Ridge was upheld at the board meeting held on Monday, April 24.

Park Ridge parents urged the school board to drop its plans to close the school which would entail busing 100 children to other schools in Dist. 64. A fund-raising drive was started by the parents to keep the school open, but Supt. Raymond Hendee said the board acted from economy, safety and educational considerations. He also stated that the most pressing problem was \$60,000 in repairs required to the heating plant and roof in the school to meet requirements of the Illinois School Code.

The last three referendums in the district to increase the school tax rates have failed, hence the decision to close Oakton School. The district projects a declining enrollment from the present 253 students to 228 in the 1976-77 school year.

Oakton Pledges New Campus Search

Paul Gilson, Oakton site chairman during the board's first two years, was appointed by newly elected Board Chairman LeRoy Wauck at the April 18 meeting to seek a new site for the permanent campus of Oakton Community College. Gilson and his committee promised the search would be speedy, thorough, objective and informative.

The board abandoned the Maryhill Cemetery site as its first permanent campus proposal on April 11 when the trustees withdrew the condemnation suit against the Catholic Archdiocese of Chicago who own the 260 acre cemetery.

Gilson promised that all site study information will be public except when it possibly would force the cost of purchasing a particular site higher.

The site committee will include real estate consultant Neil King, architect Mort Hartman and education consultant Stan Leggett. All three served on the original committee. Tom Traves, an Oakton student will join the committee after a site is selected. Administrators Lena Lucietto and Walter Toporek also will be on the site committee.

Jewel-Turnstyle Planned for Fink's Links Area

PLAN 40-60 STORE CENTER AT GOLF AND MILWAUKEE

A 40 to 60 store shopping center is being planned on Golf Road on the site of the present Fink's Links and an animal hospital with Jewel-Osco-Turnstyle being the hub of the center, was announced at Tuesday night's Niles Village Board meeting. Two entrances to the center will front on Golf Road with a third entrance coming off of Milwaukee Ave. between the Goodyear Tire-Appliance store and the White and Cronen Ford display rooms.

While the center will be on a 22 acre tract only a portion of it was referred to the Zoning Board for the requested B-2 zoning, the remainder already having the desired zoning.

The announcement was the fourth new shopping center planned for Niles in recent months. A smaller approximate 10 store center is being planned on the east side of Milwaukee Avenue across from Golf Road and a 40 store center at Oakton and Milwaukee has also come before Niles village board in recent months. Combining all this com-

mercial activity with the Treasure Island Complex, a Penney subsidiary, planned in the triangular area of Golf, Milwaukee and Greenwood on the former Vinci property, will give money-rich Niles a tremendous addition to its plus million dollar annual sales tax revenue. During the past year Niles annexed the Dempster - Greenwood shopping center which added still more monies to the community's coffers.

Adding still a fourth center on the golf course west of Milwaukee on Golf Road will bring a tremendous increase in retail traffic to Niles.

While Niles will be busting at the seams with retail outlets it also will have a monumental traffic problem. At Tuesday night's meeting it advertised for bids for the widening of Milwaukee Avenue between Dempster and Courtland, in front of still another center, the MEMCO property which will likely open in about 120 days. The flooding con-

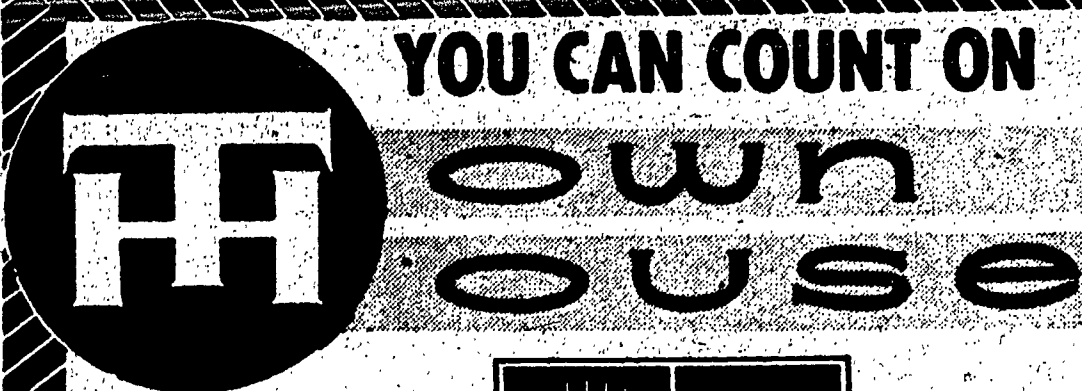

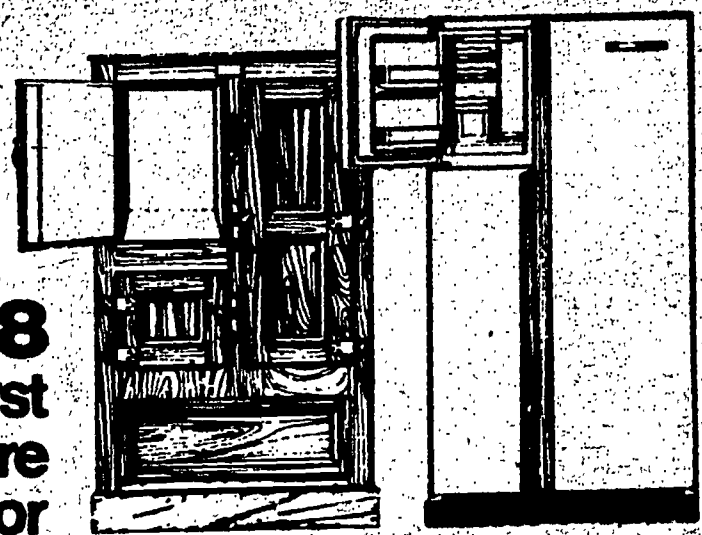

LWV Clarifies Voter Information

In its recent newsletter, the Morton Grove Village Board published voter information prepared by the local League of Women Voters. There has been a major change in Illinois election law since that information was compiled and printed. The League would like to clear up any confusion which may have resulted for the voters of Morton Grove.

Sometimes it is necessary to change the rules for elections in order to make sure all citizens get an equal chance to vote for the candidates of their choice. The courts recently felt that one of the laws governing primary elections restricted the equal chance of some voters. Formerly, voting for a party meant that a voter could vote only for that same party in any primary election held within the next 23 months. This is no longer true. There are now no time limits on crossing over in a primary. A voter may ask for the ballot of either party, no matter what he asked for in an earlier election. Illinois voters may still, however, pick from the candidates of only one party at a time in the primary. In a general election, of course, a voter need not declare his party and may vote for candidates of both parties at the same time.

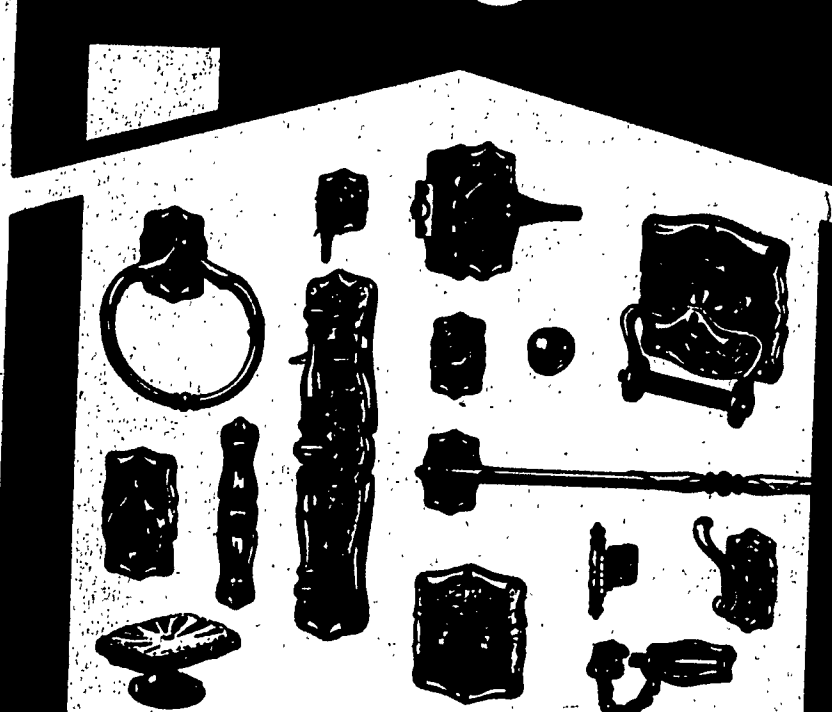

What plans are Maine high school seniors making for the years immediately following their graduation in June? A recent survey shows that unusual occupations and activities are ahead for several members of the Class of 1972. One student will live in a kibbutz in Israel; another is training to be a race car driver. A Maine South senior will put her skating skill to good use by performing in Ice Capades. One student has volunteered for the Peace Corps, another for Vista. Two seniors plan to move to another country after graduation; six will attend foreign universities; and 11 are looking forward to spending several months traveling in this country and abroad.

According to a survey of senior plans prepared by the office of Merlin W. Schultz, coordinator of pupil personnel services for District 207, the great majority of Maine students - 74% of the boys and 67% of the girls - intend to continue their education at a college or community college, about the same percentage as previous years. About 7.3% of the Class of '72 intend to continue their education in nursing, trade, technical or business schools, while 13.8% indicate they will seek full-time employment upon graduation. The remainder have made no firm plans for the coming year.

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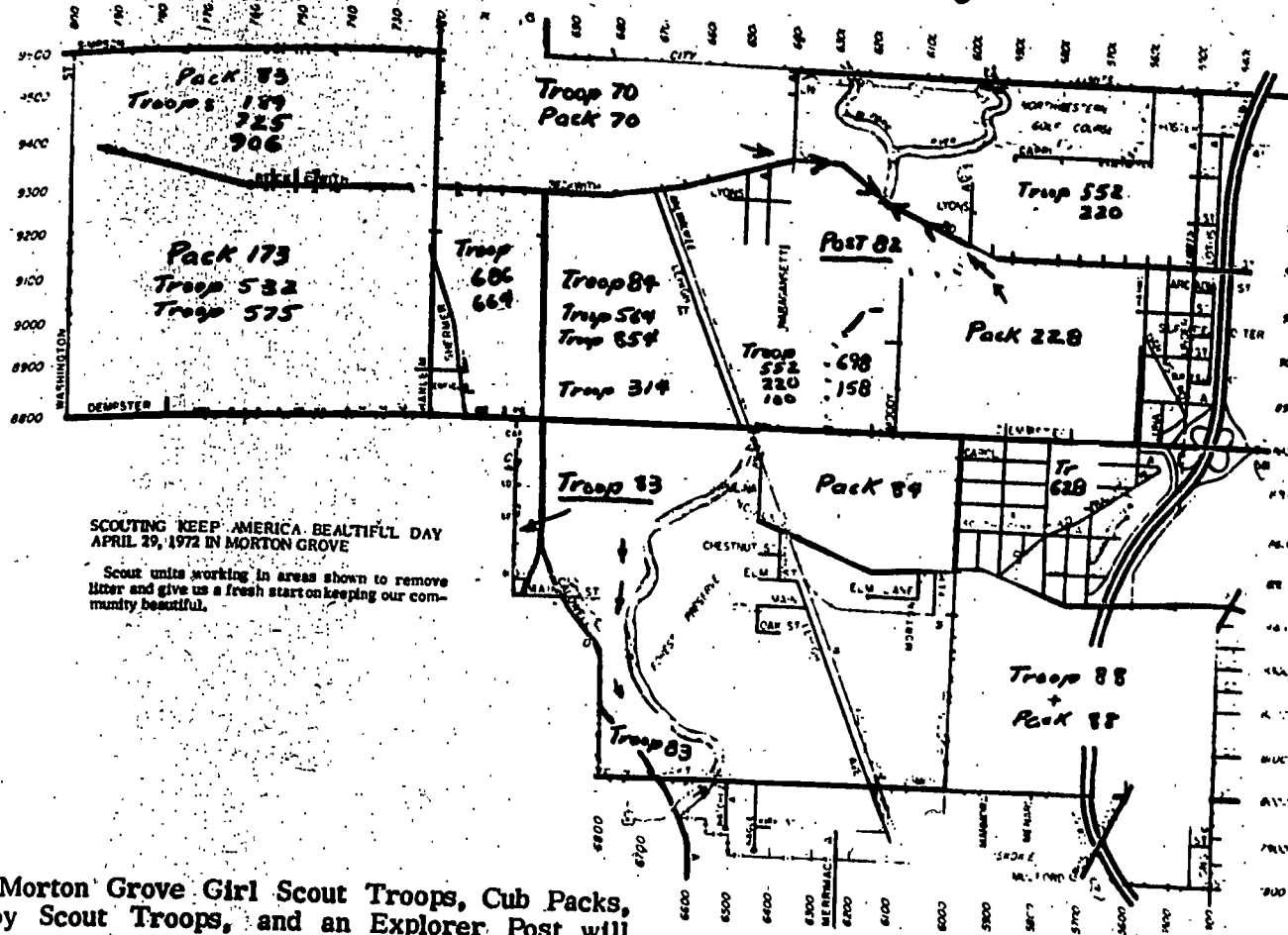

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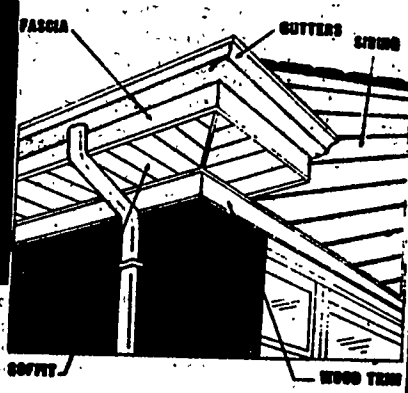

There will be no charge for the service. Genualdi stressed that the booth is designed to help the general public, and is not meant to be a precise appraisal service like that performed by professional appraisers for advanced collectors.

Also featured at the show will be a bourse section, in which some 25 dealers will show their wares, and exhibits of U.S. and foreign coins by club members. Winning exhibits will be awarded prizes.

Ample parking is available and food snack services will be provided. Members of the Morton Grove Coin Club come from all over the Skokie Valley and the Greater Chicago area. Meetings are held the third Friday of each month at the Oketo Park fieldhouse, 8950 Oketo, Morton Grove.

Walk Cards Available

Project '70 is organizing the 3rd North Suburban Hunger Hike Walk for Development. The route of the Walk, to be held May 7, begins at Niles North High School and goes for 30 miles through the northern suburbs.

People from the community will walk to raise money for projects. Six projects that operate within the United States are being funded; and four internationally operating projects will receive money. Those who walk obtain "sponsors", friends, businessmen, or relatives that agree to pay a certain amount of money for every mile the walker completes.

local colleges, high schools, and junior high schools have cards to pass out to their community. A Walk card is a sheet for listing sponsors and the amount of money they pledge. Also the Walk card contains general instructions to the walker, a map of the route, and a place to stamp the card at checkpoints to verify the miles walked.

Mosquito Fogging Halted Due to Ecology

The Board of Trustees of the North Shore Mosquito Abatement District, during the regular monthly meeting at the District's office, adopted the policy that fogging and/or mist spraying will not be used to control the nuisance mosquito this year unless specific requests are made by the residents of the district and direct evidence of the mosquito's presence is determined.

Leroy Krier, President of the Board of Trustees, explained that the ecological movement in this district has suggested the use of certain insecticides which the district uses for mist spraying, will not have any long-range effect upon our environment; the Board recognizes the fact that chemical spraying should be limited to extreme mosquito nuisance problems.

In the event that a resident believes an extreme mosquito nuisance problem has developed, the residents may request spraying by phoning the district's office. When the phone call is received direct evidence of the mosquito problem will be sought thru larval counts and/or mosquito light trap counts. When the mosquito problem is verified, treatment with malathion may occur.

Phil Schwartz, Superintendent of the North Shore Mosquito Abatement District, believed this procedure to be good, because a few of the residents indicated that they were willing to live with mosquito bites rather than have the area in which they live be sprayed with chemicals.

Mr. Schwartz further stated that the new state law requires

that only licensed operators shall be permitted to apply chemicals to any mosquito problem. 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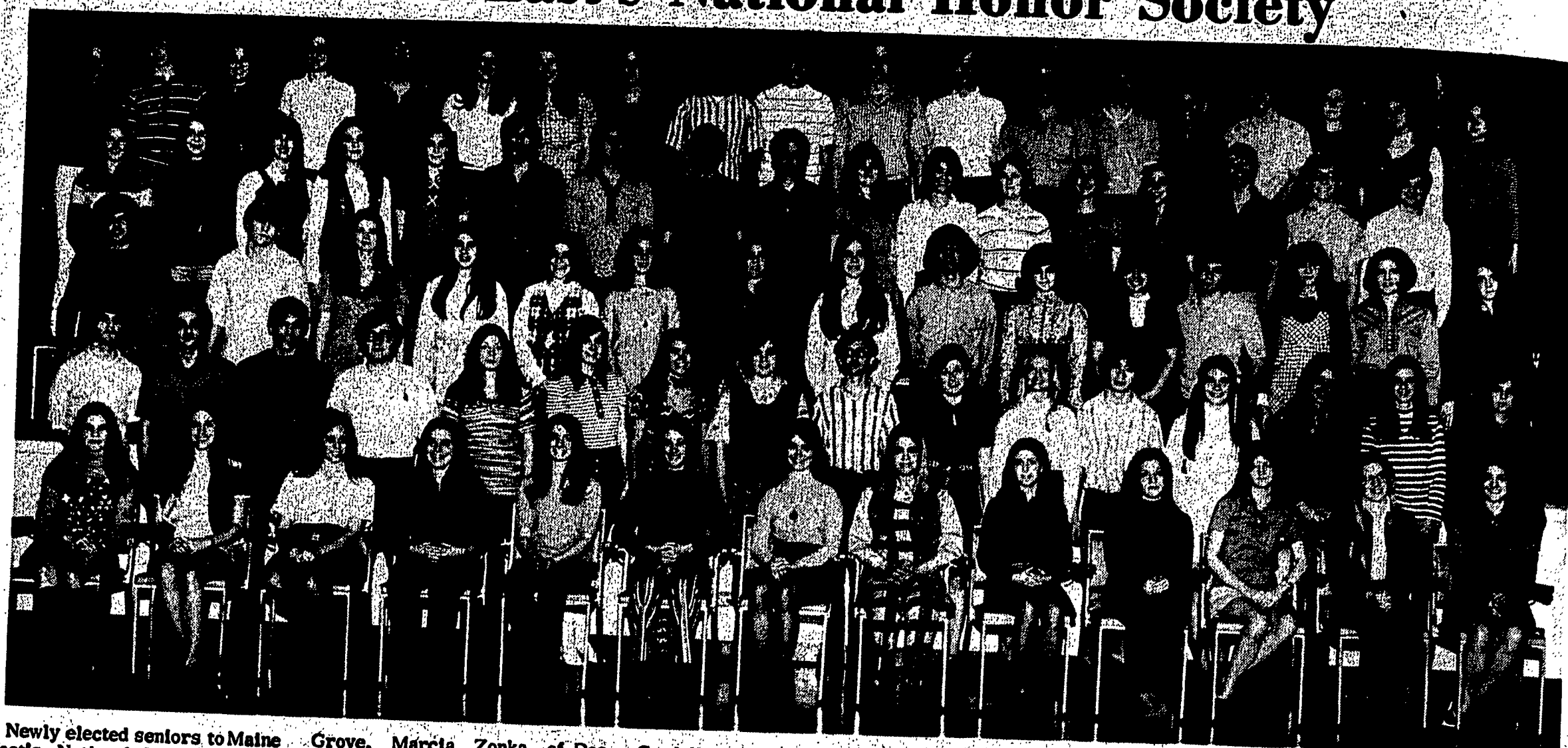

"Life is a continual process of growth, development, and change." Do you believe in this statement? Probably most people would say yes, but the important thing is, does your life reflect it?

When I speak of growth, I'm not talking about physical stature but rather your attitudes, values, awareness of your feelings, sensitivity to others, developing meaningful relationships, increasing in wisdom, developing the Art of Loving self and one another, and spiritual growth. Of course, there are other growths needed that you might enumerate such as marital and family growth.

Each person needs to see themselves as they are right now. I believe we can best do this by taking a good look at "me." I have a married couple now in counseling who had great difficulty in looking at themselves. As long as they could look at one another and project or displace the blame for their problems, they didn't get too uptight. Neither did they grow individually, nor in their marriage, nor as a family. Not until they stopped blaming, accusing, hurting and actually stopped destroying each other did they grow individually, as a couple or as a family.

Let me put it another way. If you think mathematically, it would go something like this: As you are willing personally to be open to growth, development and change, you will experience growth, change and development as a person, as well as in your marriage and family.

I have had the pleasure to know a number of elderly people that were still seeking the truth, open to change, wanting to grow. They were vitally alive and still had a tremendous impact on the lives they touched. On the other hand, I have had the pathetic experience of seeing younger people closing their minds, hearts and lives to growth and becoming dead for all practical purposes. Such a person also helps to bring death to a marriage and family. If you notice, I didn't say becoming old because old is greatly a state of mind. It is greatly accentuated when one stops growing, developing and being open to change. Also, I read the other day that medical science now recognizes that a person can live much longer than once believed by keeping his physical body in shape.

I agree with medical science, but also recognize the need for growth, development and change. Also, I find people dying emotionally or otherwise because they give up life has no more meaning, purpose or fulfillment for them. This can happen too easily if we truly are not open and receptive to change and growth as noted above. When did you last evaluate your attitudes - are they basically positive or negative, do they allow room for change? How aware are you of your feelings and of others - have you withdrawn as a turtle in a shell? Life requires risk and a willingness to be open and receptive to change. That also means being open to the hurts and heartaches along the way, but it is worth it!

A family I was working with put it like this: They had basically stopped interacting and were just reacting. They had become so concerned about themselves they forgot about one another. Once they began to really reach out for one another, they were then able to become alive again as a family and as a marriage. Why? Because they had really become alive individually. Rather than withdrawing from life or just hitting back, defending yourself, etc., try to genuinely reach out and touch significantly the life of your spouse, child or anyone else in a constructive, positive and, yes, loving way. Watch the miracle that happens, they will in turn usually respond in a loving and beautiful way to you.

That is what I believe life is essentially all about - being willing, open to growth, development and change as an individual, then in turn this will affect your marriage and family.

MG Scouts Plan Village Cleanup

Headline and lead paragraph of the April 20 edition of The Bugle reported "1600 Scouts plan river cleanup." April 29 is Scouting's Keep America Beautiful Day but no Scouts will be working in the river. A cleanup of the entire village is planned for that day by 1600 Scout units of Morton Grove. 1600 girls and boys will probably participate. Coordinating and directing will be by the Village Beautification Committee aided by Explorer Post 82.

The river will receive proper care later. As you also did report, the Federal Government, thru the Corps of Engineers has plans and appropriations for debris removal action in a section of the North Branch including the portion thru our village. There

will be no dredging and the debris will be removed with little damage to the natural values in the Forest Preserve. This action, the recent recognition by the Village of the North Branch as a resource for recreation and appreciation, the continuing effective activity of the North Branch Coalition plus the accomplishments of Project 82, will total up to eventual restoration of the river.

Litter cleanup action by all citizens on April 29 led by the original ecologists, the Scouts, will give us a fresh start on making Morton Grove a beautiful and pleasant village.

dition which is presently in the center's parking lot, is expected to be solved when the sewer tie-up with this new improvement is completed.

In other actions Tuesday night trustees opened bids for a new Presh fire pump, which will replace a 1941 pumper. Bids varied from \$57,946 to \$67,489 and will include tools and equipment, a foam system and a rapid water injection fluid which will give greater flow to the water which is ejected at 1500 gallons per minute. The previous fire pump purchased by the village was in 1966 replacing another 1941 truck.

In still other actions Niles will take over streets and sewers of the A. B. Dick Company, which have been owned by the company thru these years. F. R. Malmgren, representing the company, said they recently sold the last piece of vacant property in the area to the W. W. Grainger Company, and now being satisfied with the surrounding area properties, would like the village to take over these improvements. The company will repair and improve curbs and streets. Mayor Blase said the village is too large to continue to have private streets (such as Menard) in Niles and also pointed out the dedication to Niles would be a tax advantage to A. B. Dick. While Niles will own the water mains the company will continue to receive water from Skokie.

Ambrose Panico and Rhoda Salens were okayed as Youth Commission chairman and secretary. Money for the controversial wheel tax is being held in escrow. A recent circuit court ruling upset Niles plan to charge a tax on new vehicles sold in Niles, which the County has also planned on charging. Niles contended it should receive the money, rather than the County, but the court upset the decision of Niles, as well as other local communities.

Niles voted against participating in a drug program which is being undertaken in Niles Township. An intended tax would be levied for the project, but Niles said its Family Service program, plus its social service work, in its police department provided the village with this service. Tr. Pete Fesole said it was a political football in Niles Township, and the program was instituted to create a need for township government there. Mayor Blase squashed Fesole's contention, stating the political implications were not significant.

Well, I'm sorry Mr. Wagner, but I don't consider that much proof. It only takes a slight movement of the hand to make those statistics to one's own satisfaction. I also asked who checks up on that department, hesitation, and I don't know and an I guess the board of trustees was the answer. How many friends do

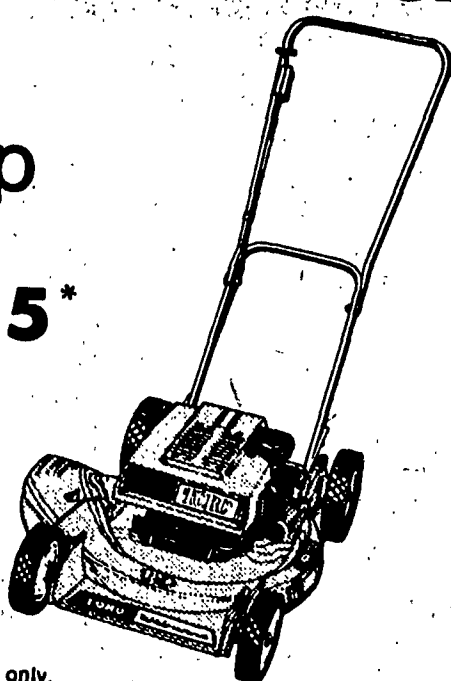

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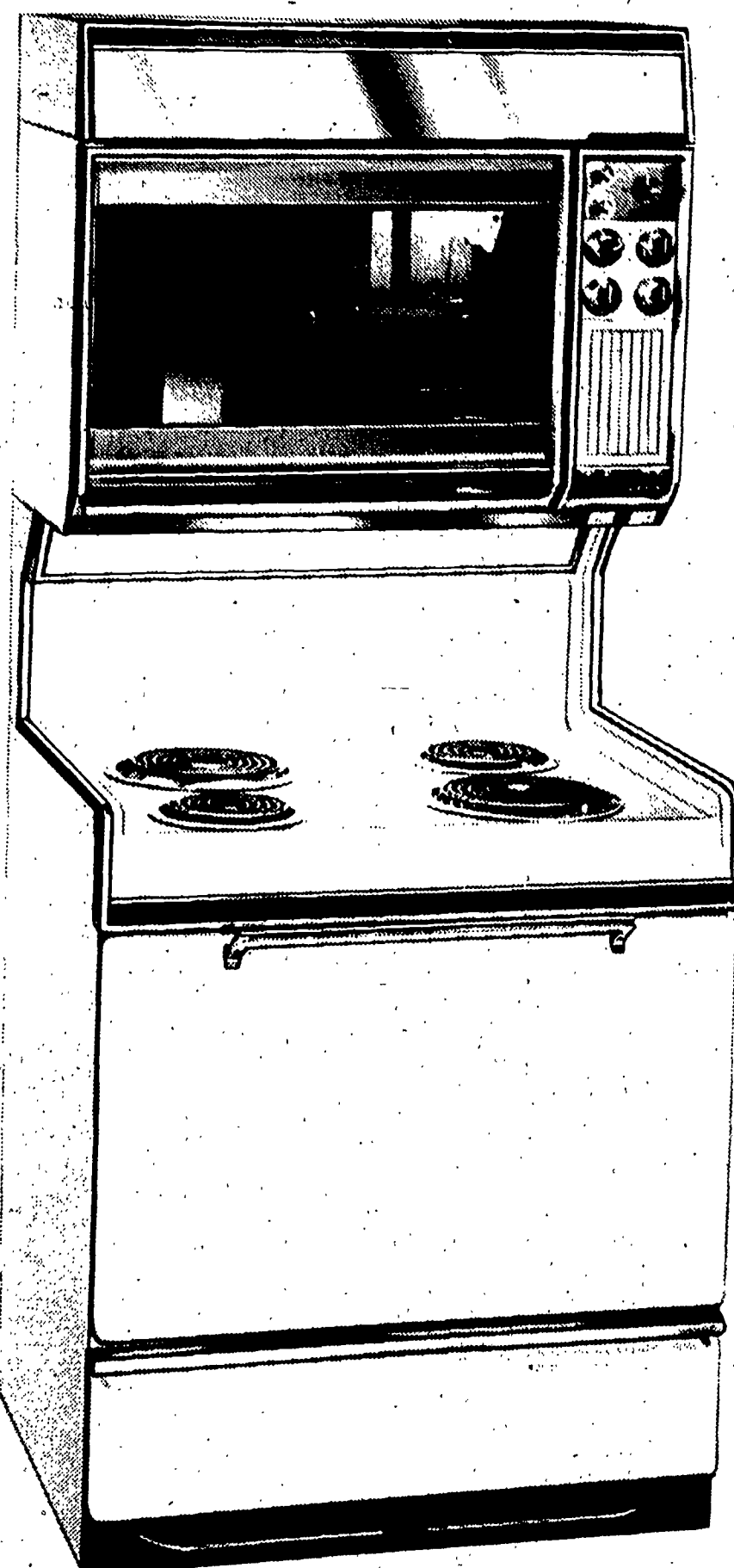
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
