

Dist. 207 Teachers Accept Salary Proposal

Maine Township High School teachers voted June 7 to ratify a revised 1972-73 salary package proposal endorsed by the Executive Committee of Dist. 207 Teachers' Association. The Package provides for a salary increase of 2.25% over the current salary schedule in addition to the annual one-step increment, plusfringebenefit increases.

According to the agreement, the starting salary for a begin-ning teacher with a Bachelor's degree and no teaching exper-ience will be increased from \$8,400 to \$8,590; an inexperienced teacher with a Master's degree from \$9,080 to \$9,285. The top scale for a teacher with a Master's degree, reached in 16 steps will be \$16,535. A staff member with a Master's degree plus an additional 64 hours of graduate credit will receive a top of \$19,110 reached in 20 steps,




demnation proceedings. The district paid \$50,000 for about 4.5 acres about 10 years ago.

In the 1972-73 park budget \$87,000 has been earmarked for land acquisition, which is the amount of money to be paid for the Jonquil Terrace property. Approximately \$8,000 will be paid to school district 64 for legal fees acquired by the district, and the remaining \$79,000 will be paid for the actual purchase. Niles park district had applied 3 or 4 years ago for a federal grant of 50% for the land, and park officials are optimistic the federal government will reimburse about \$40.000.

The huge 485% profit the school district will realize on the sale was assured by a last year court decision which okayed the school district's right to sell the land. Former landowner Ben Mattion was unsuccessful in his bid to re-acquire the property after the school district decided it no longer needed the land for a school, Originally, a condemnation threat by school district 64 resulted in the sale of the land in about 1963, at a price of about \$50,000. This cost breakdown of \$16,667 for the 1-1/2 acres the park disrict is seeking will now actual-Continued on Page 21

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
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

Family Enrichment (By Larry Renetzky)

A woman inquired of me the following: "What do I do to get my husband over this 'silent treatment?' I can't stand it! It is driving me battyl If he doesn't come out of it soon, I am going to have to leave him! What can I do to snap him out of it?"

I hear many wives and husbands say that the "silent treatment" hurts them the most in their relationship. Maybe some of you wish that your spouse was a little more quiet instead of yelling, screaming and hollering. Yes, it is refreshing to have some quiet and/or a time for meaningful verbal exchange, but not the "silent treatmenti 🕈

You might ask -- what is the "silent treatment?" It is simply but cruelly lack of communication. Usually one spouse will cut the other off verbally, physically and emotionally. It varies in degree, but the greater the degree the more difficult it is for the other spouse to take it, in time even to survive.

I don't believe there is anyting more cruel or inhuman as the "silent treatment." No wonder people in jail kill themselves and/or go crazy while they are in solitary confinement. The silence becomes unbearable. I have had many wives and a few husbands speak of the pain endured -- that it was like solitary confinement in their own home.

As destructive as fighting, yelling and even physical abuse is, it is not as unbearable as the "silent treatment." At least it is some expression and you can fight that in some measure, but how do you fight silence and passivity? I belive it is the most damaging and hard to accept mode of behavior that exists. Of course, I'm not advocating that you fight, yell and scream in place of silence, although it may be necessary temporarily to provoke at least your spouse to speak and involve themselves.

Also, I challenge you to evaluate your own past behavior and involvement with your spouse, your child or friend, etc., that you are experiencing the "silent treatment" with. When they were communicating with you how did you respond? Did you have a tendency to put them down frequently, ridicule them, cut off their communication Did you make them feel like what they said was important? Did you trample on their feelings when they extended themselves? Did you make your spouse feel inadequate and not appreciated in the sexual act?

The woman that I counseled came to discover that she had very much, helped to create the "silent treatment" from her husband. She began to recognize that she had been greatly responsive for his present behavior. She was always criticizing him, finding fault -he never seemed to do anything right including intercourse. Her husband indicated that he felt like he was being pounded into a rat hole so he just retreated into it -- the "silent treatment" was born. He also further indicated that she never seemed to appreciate any of his gifts or his attempts to do anything around the house. Most of all he felt that she really didn't appreciate him.

What can the woman do to "snap him out of it?" Something of what this woman mentioned above tried to do. She first took a good look at herself and began to see how she helped bring this "silent treatment" into existence. She then let her husband know in small but sure ways that she was greatly to blame, that she was sorry and began to show it through her actions. She began to recognize the slightest thing he did and praised him for it. She let him know he was appreciated.

It has been my experience in counseling and in my own personal life that people on the whole will respond positively to encouragement and recognition much quicker than constant criticism and/or lack of appreciation. Sure, we all have faults, but we all have some strengths and good points too. See if you can find them and dwell more on them than all of their bad points. Just ask yourself, when do I feel uplifted and better able to extend myself? When someone is constantly picking on me and tearing me down, or when they are trying to encourage me and build me up? I know that my wife is much more loving, sweet and responsive when I give her some praise and recognition. "Try it, you'll like it because you too will find that it works most of the time and that it can snap him (or her) out of the "silent treatment,"
