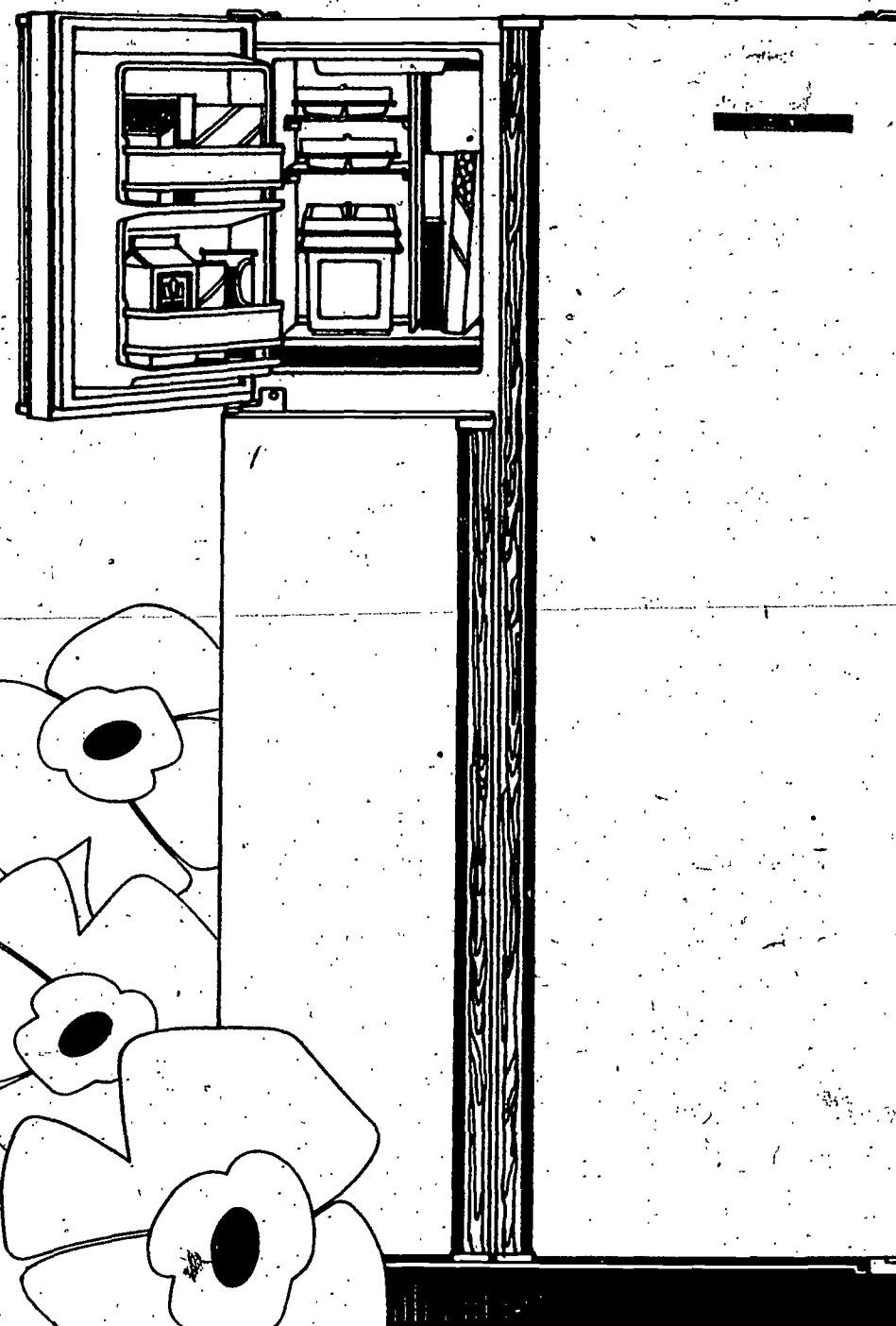

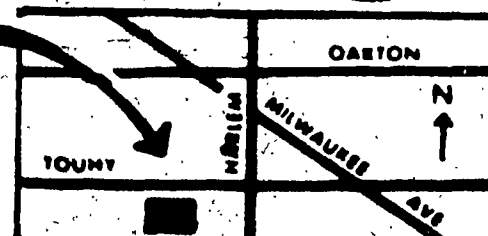

Mid-Month Meanderings . . .

The Mayor of Long Grove is feeling like a "lone-some end" these days. He had vetoed a liquor license for an alleged hoodlum-dominated country club in his town only to have it overturned by a circuit court judge. The Illinois Liquor Commission and the Chicago Crime Commission both supported the Mayor's action substantiating much of the evidence which the Mayor used in his decision. But after the court decision the Mayor became disillusioned with the lack of support he received from his community. Noting the general apathy from residents he concluded the people just didn't care for good government.

The incident reminded us of the time when Niles village president first gained office after vowing to eliminate gambling influences in the community. When he sent out questionnaires to residents asking them to relate Niles most serious problems, there was a lack of response regarding gambling from the community. According to Blase, no more than 1 or 2 persons even mentioned any gambling problem in Niles.

Having sat through battles big and small through the years we're keenly aware of the lack of response which comes from a community. How often we would

Pick-up Option
on Remaining 3 Acres

OK JONQUIL TR. PARK PURCHASE

Niles Park Board approved an ordinance Tuesday night to purchase 1.54 acres of Jonquil Terrace property from school district 64 for \$85,000, and will lease the remaining property for \$10 per year with an option to purchase the remaining 2/3 of the total acreage (about 3 acres) by January 31, 1975 for \$180,000. It was estimated about \$8,000 of

the \$85,000 is for legal fees incurred by the school district. The total \$265,000 figure is a windfall for the school district, which originally purchased the land for about \$50,000 approximately 10 years ago. Threatening condemnation proceedings it purchased the land from developer Ben Mattoon to build a school. More recently it abandoned the school plan and when it decided to sell the property Mattoon sought to have the land returned. The courts decided in favor of the school district which led to the approximate 500% windfall profit.

In other actions the park board received the sad news from its attorney it will have to pay property taxes on its 1 1/2 Tam golf course. Representing the landowner, attorney Paul Brandel sent two bills totaling \$10,966 for the 37 acre course which is presently being leased by the park district. The bill for 1971 is covered in an agreement, entered into by the park board. Park attorney Gabe Barrafato noted if the taxes were not paid the entire agreement between the park district and the TAM owners could be placed in default.

Park Commissioners, and particularly Jack Leske, thought the original agreement did not include any tax payment agreements. But Barrafato noted such an agreement was signed. Leske also said the assessment for the 37 acres was merely a figure Brandel submitted, disregarding the less valuable property. Park officials thought part of the lowlands should be assessed differently than land bordering on Caldwell Avenue and will seek a different assessment for future years.

In still other actions Washington Terrace Park is now having playground facilities installed. The baseball diamond was opened June 10 but there is still much work to be done. In the Kirk Lane Park along-side Lawrencewood two picnic benches have been installed and playground equipment will be installed next week.

The Woman's Club Historical building, which has been proposed on lowlands along the river in the Tam O'Shanter area, had four soil boring tests taken, and a 2 story full basement building will have to have a foundation begun down 12 feet.

An alarm system for the Grennan Heights gym will cost \$1,635 plus a 30 month service charge if it is to be purchased.

Total receipts in the bank are \$555,230.40 which is the highest it has ever been, according to Commissioner Leske. However, \$250,000 is from revenue bonds and \$120,000 from tax anticipation warrants.

.....Okayed a \$6,983 bid from the Hardin Company to pave the Sports Complex parking lot.

tion, but director Dressler whispered to Leske the park district was delinquent.

.....Okayed purchase of \$1,320 for cash register for TAM.

.....Approved low bid of \$3,074 from Golf Mill Chrysler for station wagon for park director's use. Dressler preferred \$3,400 International wagon but an exasperated Commissioner Sullivan cut off discussion by motioning for the low bid.

.....The roller skating program has begun on a successful note and the swimming program has 3,900 registrants. The inter-park bus service has also begun.

.....Extended agreement with Chesterfield Garden Estates for 2 years to lease its park at \$12 per year.

.....Agreed with carpenter for \$269 payment for replacement of dasher boards and other work at ice hockey rink.

.....The Niles Squares dancing group turned over \$800 to the park board, an annual contribution which has been made for the past 6 years. The group's donation is given in appreciation for the park district's cooperation in allowing them the use of the park facilities. Past years' moneys have gone for kitchen equipment and this year the Squares suggested the park board consider air conditioning park of the rec center.

In accepting the money park president Walt Beusse told them what a great group it is and

Enough Park Board Blunders - Time for a Change

Dear Sir:

Several weeks ago on a Tuesday, I (a Niles resident) went to Tam Golf Course to play golf in the afternoon, and was told I could not play as they had golf leagues on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, and if I wished to play golf after I finish working during the week, the only time open would be on Monday afternoons.

Last Monday June 12, 1972, I again went to Tam to play nine holes of golf before supper. I went to purchase my green fee and this time the starter informed me that they had a league on Monday's also. I inquired as to how many Niles residents are playing in these leagues and was told very few Niles taxpayers were involved. Over 70% I was told are non residents, playing in industrial leagues.

It seems to me something is wrong here. We Niles tax-

payers are being asked time and time again to sympathize and support the Niles Park District, for projects that do not serve the citizens of this community. Expensive feasibility studies are paid for time and time again, and not used, tax money is wasted in reckless abandon by your Park Board. People are hired and fired regularly, for unexplained reasons. Incompetency and inadequacy prevails at all times. Personal projects of individual commissioners get priorities of money and action. The citizens get a few crumbs tossed their way only if they come out, in a show of force at park district meetings.

It is about time for all of this nonsense to stop. It is about time for a new order of responsibility to the citizens of Niles. It's time to recognize what is the real purpose and

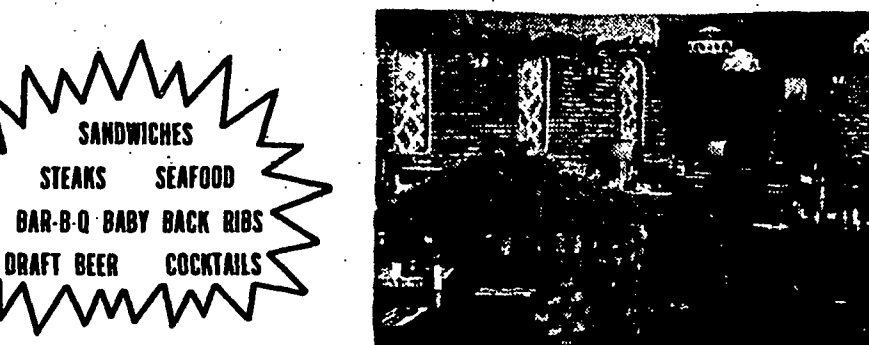

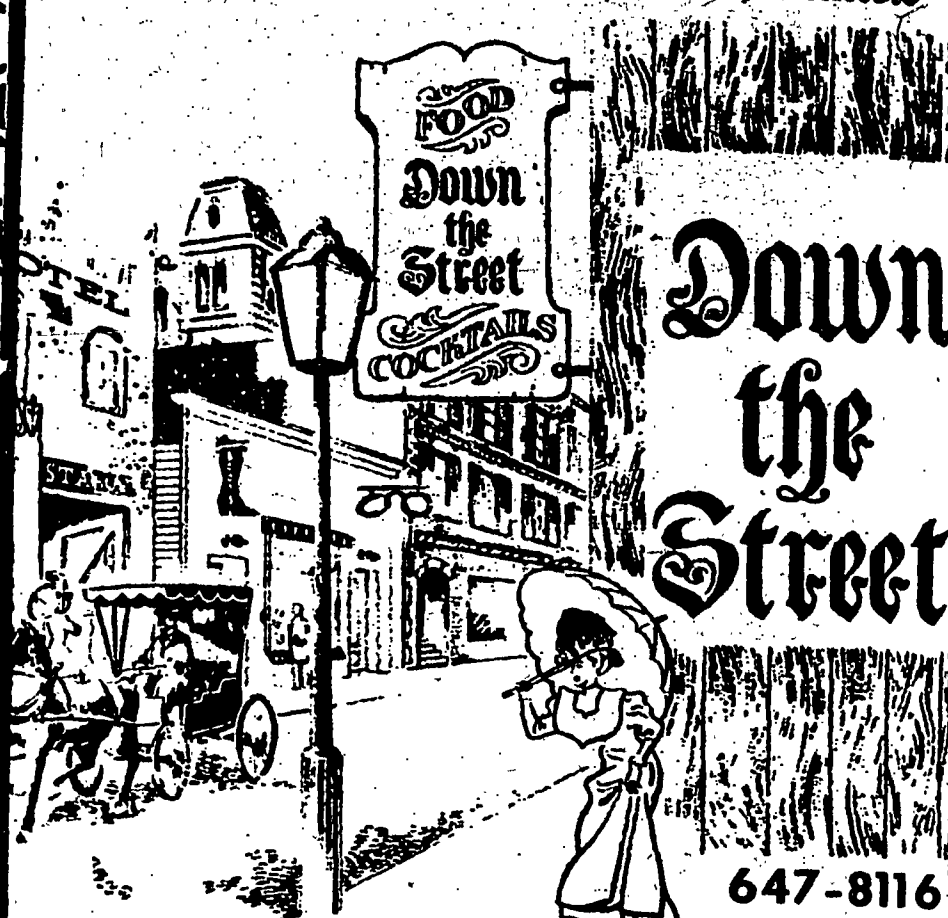

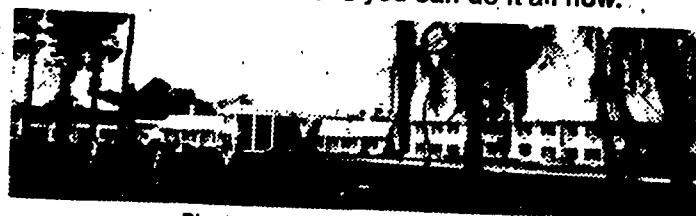

Excerpts from the tapes of a recent interview ... These are the Hanson tapes — should not be confused with the Anderson tapes.

On ... "First, Mr. Hanson, let me thank you for granting this interview. I understand you shun this sort of thing."

"Indubitably." "As one of the most brilliant minds of all time why do you constantly refuse to discuss the great issues of our time?"

"You phrase the question as tho I had a peer." "Sorry about that. Why have you refused to appear on the Kup show or the David Frost show or any of the other major 'talk' shows?"

"Simply that I feel 'talk' shows should be eliminated by an act of Congress."

"Why, Mr. Hanson?" "Because they talk about the Vietnam war, politics, ecology, preservation of animals, racism, revolution, crime, violence, vandalism, the secret of life, death and the hereafter."

"Is this bad, Mr. Hanson?" "Indubitably."

"But why?" "Because the constant 'talk' about these serious and almost insoluble problems gives the public the impression that something is being done about them. Where as nothing is really being accomplished and this provides the public with a sort of ersatz sense of accomplishment."

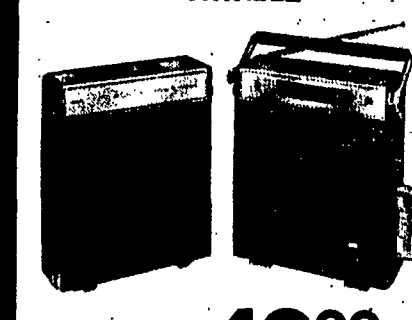

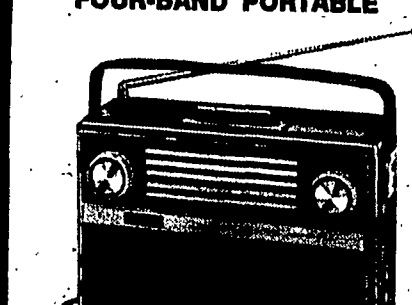

Becoming a part of radio and television is integrally involved in the Maine East course, Radio and TV. Students not only learn

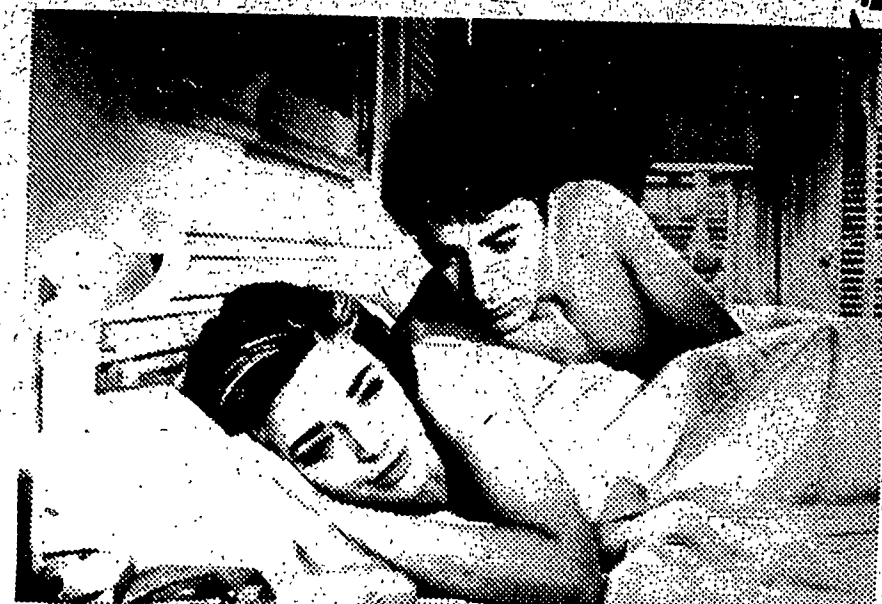

function of the park district. That my friend is to provide to our community the recreational land, and facilities for recreation to all our citizens.

It seems to me, everytime the park commissioners are challenged on their terrible record, they bring out a profit and loss statement or balance sheet, to explain the necessity for their improper actions. I suggest the park district function is not to show a profit, by putting our lands and facilities on the open market. It is not a business for profit, but to provide recreation to only our citizens. If our district cannot afford Tam, ice rinks, etc. without leasing them, to industrial leagues, to hockey clubs, to rock 'n roll promoters, then we shouldn't have them at all. Be-

cause citizens have not been afforded the use of their parks as they desire. I am not entirely unfamiliar with the methods the park district functions. Several years ago I was part of the citizens committee that worked hard to pass the last bond issue for the park district. (The issue that was to provide additional land, swimming pools, field house, and of course the ice rink Flasco at Ballard Park. So I have some experience in dealing with members of the park commissioners.

Let me tell you how that came about. The Niles Park District was in sad shape then, as it is now, they had lost their prior bond referendum, because the Niles citizenry had lost all confidence in them, mainly

because of their bungling efforts with Tam O'Shanter and other projects. So a citizens committee was formed to determine the needs of the park district, to make recommendations to the district, and to work towards, with the commissioners these goals. Sounds good? But it did not work in exactly that fashion. It was the park board's plan to use this citizen's committee as a front to give a plan, respectability that they had already formulated.

They planned to give each area of Niles a crumb in order that Niles would accept their plan to build an ice rink in Ballard Park, and an aquatic field house in Cressman Park. When members of this committee rebelled against their ideas, some of us were threatened and coerced. One of the commissioners, when I argued with his program asked by name and address, to attempt to scare me. When many of us told them we would not support this citizen's committee facade unless the communities we represented had a voice in the supposed recommendations, and compromises were finally reached, they tried to stuff down our throats for Ballard Park an ice rink and no pool. We wanted a pool and no ice rink. They said an ice rink would be profitable and a pool costly. They said Ballard Park was Niles park and every other park a neighborhood park. When we threaten total opposition to their stand, they allowed us to compromise to the present combination pool and ice rink.

I do not believe any of this is the way the democratic process is suppose to work. But because Ballard Park had no facilities at all for the previous ten years (due to the park boards incompetency) we compromised.

We worked hard and passed the bond referendum, and then what did the commissioners do, but waste our money, by waiting to do, what this mandate told them to do, fill the inflation of our times made the funds inadequate.

I could go on and on relating Park Board blunders, but it would not change what has happened. What I will say is, I for one have had enough, and am offering some ideas for change.

1. The entire Park Board of commissioners should resign immediately.

2. A new citizens committee should be formed to give the park district new positive direction beneficial to Niles residents.

3. New elections should be held to elect commissioners with the help of the committee to give our parks the leadership needed.

4. Make the park district responsive only to Niles residents needs.

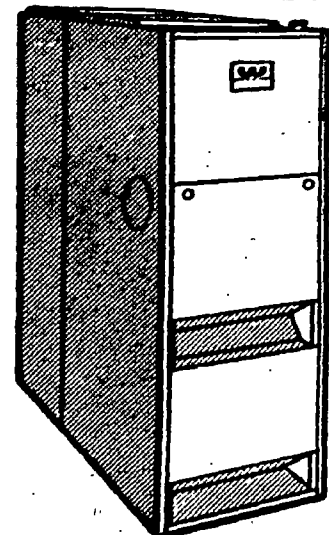
Edens Plaza Arts & Crafts Fair

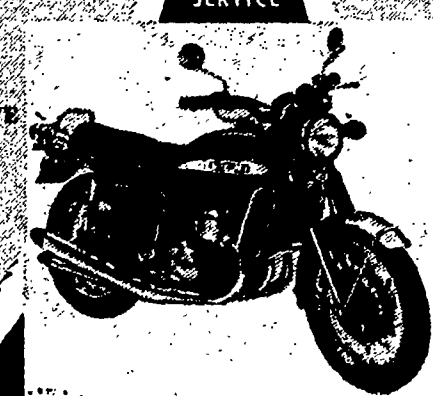

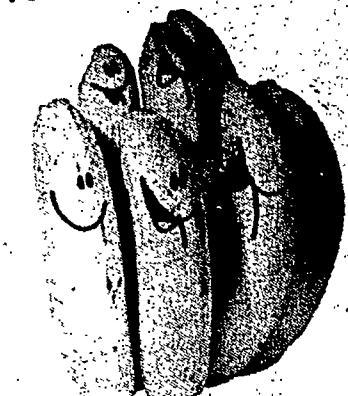

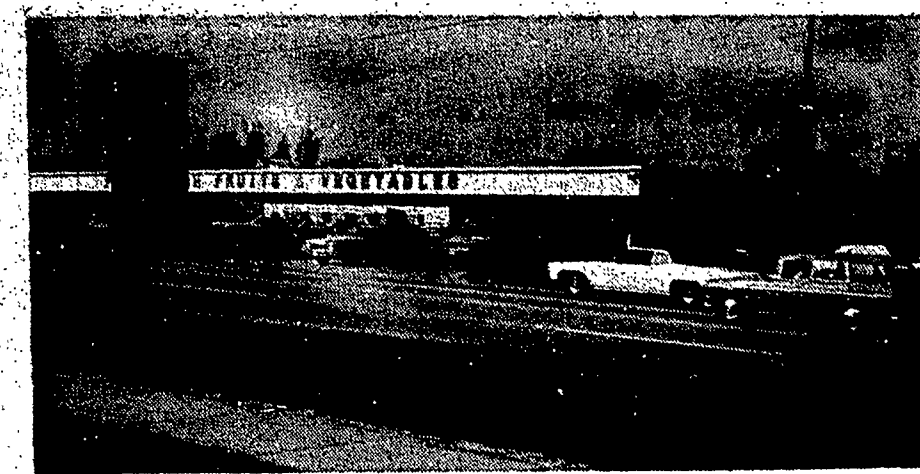
