



The Mayor of Long Grove is feeling like a "lonesome end" these days. He had vetoed a liquor license for an alleged hoodlum-dominated country club in his town only to have it overturned by a circuit court judge. The Illinois Liquor Commission and the Chicago Crime Commission both supported the Mayor's action substantiating much of the evidence which the Mayor used in his decision. But after the court decision the Mayor became disillusioned with the lack of support he received from his community. Noting the general apathy from residents he concluded the people just didn't care for

The incident reminded us of the time when Niles village president first gained office after vowing to eliminate gambling influences in the community. When he sent out questionnaires to residents asking them to relate Niles most serious problems, there was a lack of response regarding gambling from the community. According to Blase, no more than 1 or 2 persons even mentioned any gambling problem in Niles.
