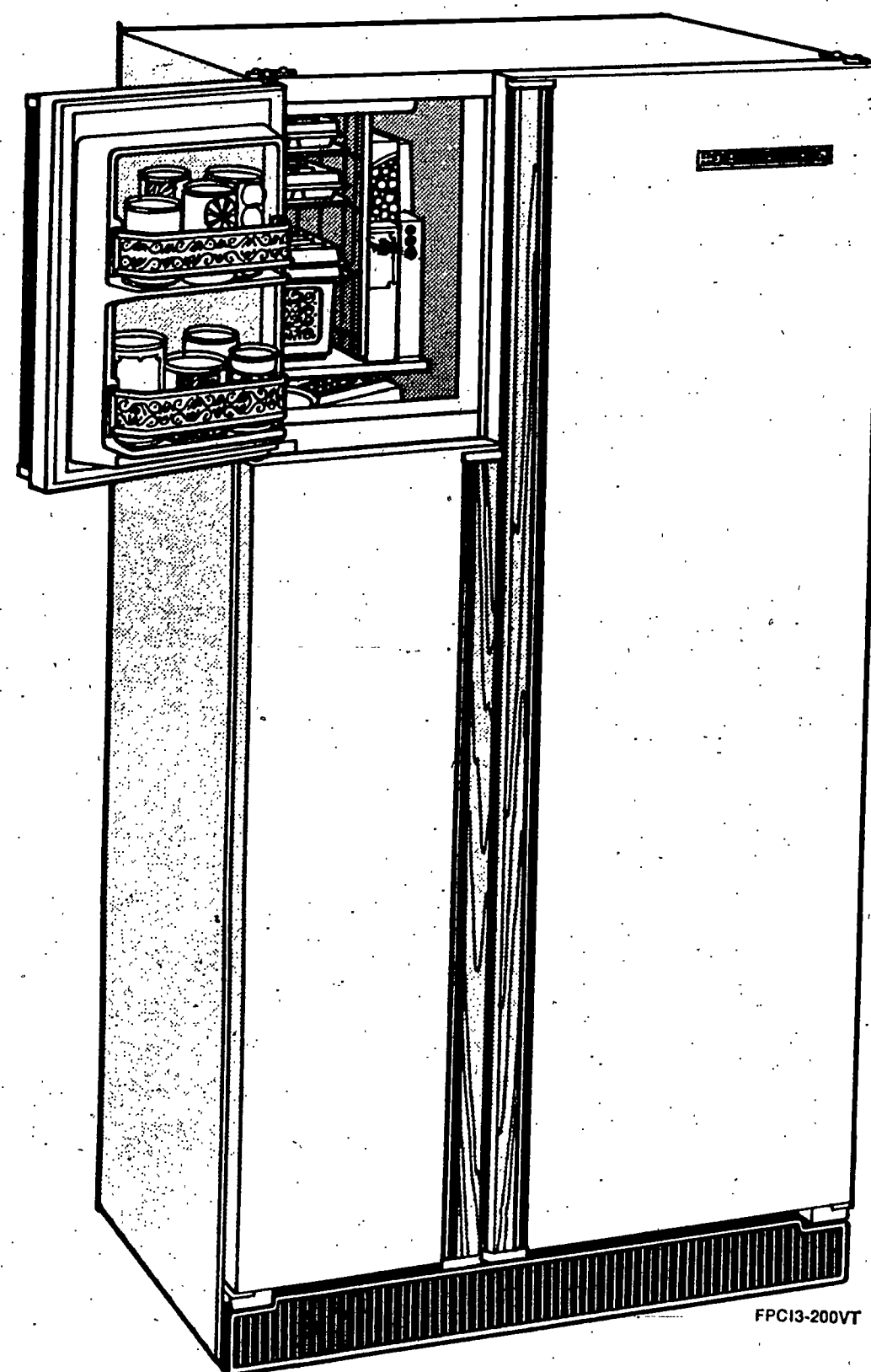


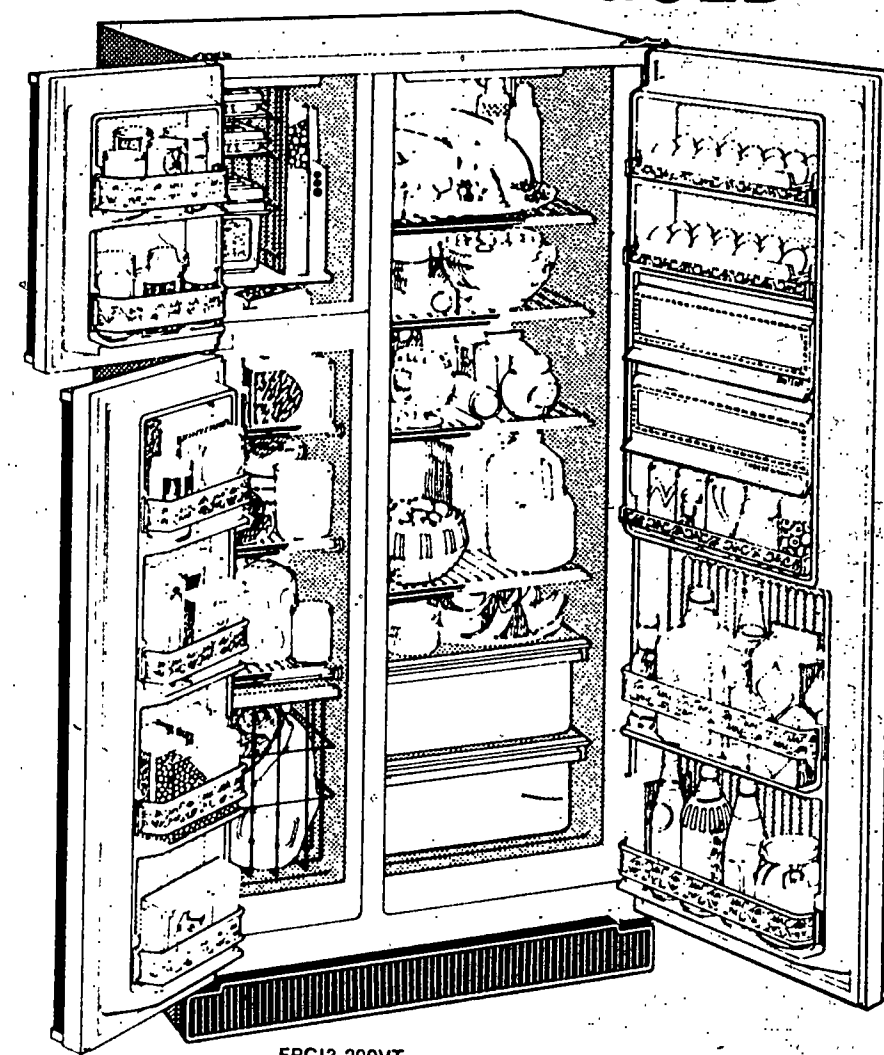

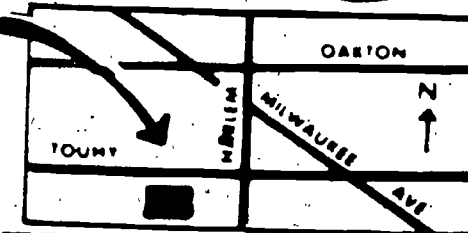

While several thousand journalists moved into Miami to send you first-hand reports from the convention front (95% of them really second, third and fourth-hand) The Bugle Newspapers sent its crack reporter and his staff to Michigan to try to ferret out the big big story.

On Monday morning, the day "hizzoner" would be making news on the front pages of every newspaper in the country, we awoke early, as all good reporters do, and quickly changed into our reporter's garb. We threw on a sweat shirt, last night's unpressed pants, and some old white keds. We then grabbed the wife, a bowl of grape nuts, and a walking stick we had carved by a friend at Jake's Restaurant (though we didn't grab in that order) and bounced out into the 6 o'clock mist which still hung low beneath the spreading Oak trees.

Pointing our stick north and east we set a pace which allowed for a bit of bird-watching and for throwing a few skinners atop the surface of the lake. The sun's beams streaked between the

Residents Oppose Golf Road Shopping Center

Further resistance developed to the proposed rezoning of the Pink's Links property on Golf Road near Milwaukee Avenue in Niles this week as area residents distributed literature door-to-door urging active opposition to it.

A group, hoping to persuade the Niles Zoning Board to allow rezoning of the property, seeks to construct a new shopping center to be named Four Flags Shopping Center. The board will conduct hearings on the matter at their regular meeting on Wednesday evening, July 19 at the Council Chambers in the Niles Police Station, 7200 Waukegan Road. The Four Flags group made an original presentation of their proposal at the zoning board's June meeting.

The opposition group headed by Ronald and Carol Verson, 8149 Davis st., Niles has the support of a number of residents and homeowner groups. Mr. Verson spoke in opposition to the rezoning at the June meeting and expects to continue when the matter comes up again in July.

The group maintains that since there are currently seven large and numerous "mini-shopping centers" in the area, no additional shopping facilities are needed. It further states that additional expense of sewer and drainage facilities and police and fire prevention is apt to cost more in taxes than the proposed shopping center will provide. It also objects to the covering of more of the Golf Mill area with

Annex Greenwood Area
North of Golf Road

'GO NORTH' YOUNG MAN 'GO NORTH'

Niles continued moving north Tuesday night when trustees unanimously approved annexing the Golf Mill Nursing home on the east side of Greenwood Avenue, about 1 block north of Golf Road, as well as a second parcel of land where a new 5-story nursing home addition will be built.

According to Niles village manager Ken Scheel, the annexation will square off Niles boundaries which presently jut in and out streets north of Golf Road in the Chesterfield Builders Golden 40 area. The exit for the contemplated new building will be at Maynard Road, which is the lone entrance into the Golden 40 area from Greenwood Avenue.

The new nursing home will be 5 stories, Attorney Michael Lavin, representing the nursing home interests, said the height for the 300 bed addition was necessary to conform to FHA specifications.

President Blase told Lavin the landowners would have to annex into the Niles Park District and the Niles Library District. If the land is contiguous to present districts' boundaries, before building permits would be issued.

In past years, particularly in the annexing of the Golf Mill Shopping Center area, the park district was not included in the annexation, and did not annex the

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Young Conducting Low Quality Campaign

Dear Editor:

It seems incredible to me that Sam Young, the Republican candidate for Congress in the 10th District, intends on conducting the same low quality campaign against Congressman Abner Mikva that he waged against Commissioner Fulle. Mr. Fulle is a credit to the Republican Party in that he discussed the issues and talked positively in the primary while Sam Young preyed upon fear, deceit and gossip. Having heard Mr. Young speak during the campaign I can honestly say that he was the personal architect of that "disgraceful river ward" tactic.

The first press release after the primary by Young stated he intended on making low and moderate income housing a major campaign issue. Evidently, he feels he can appeal to the fears of people in his quest for Congress by attacking people who cannot defend themselves. This tactic is clearly designed to establish a social

Mr. Young in his second press release announced that he would protect and enhance the useless and costly Township government. He did not mention that this was the backbone of suburban Republicanism. He did not mention that even John Nimrod of Skokie has basically accepted the demise of Township government by announcing he would not seek re-election as Township Supervisor. He did not mention that the Niles Township residents would shortly vote on abolishing Township government. 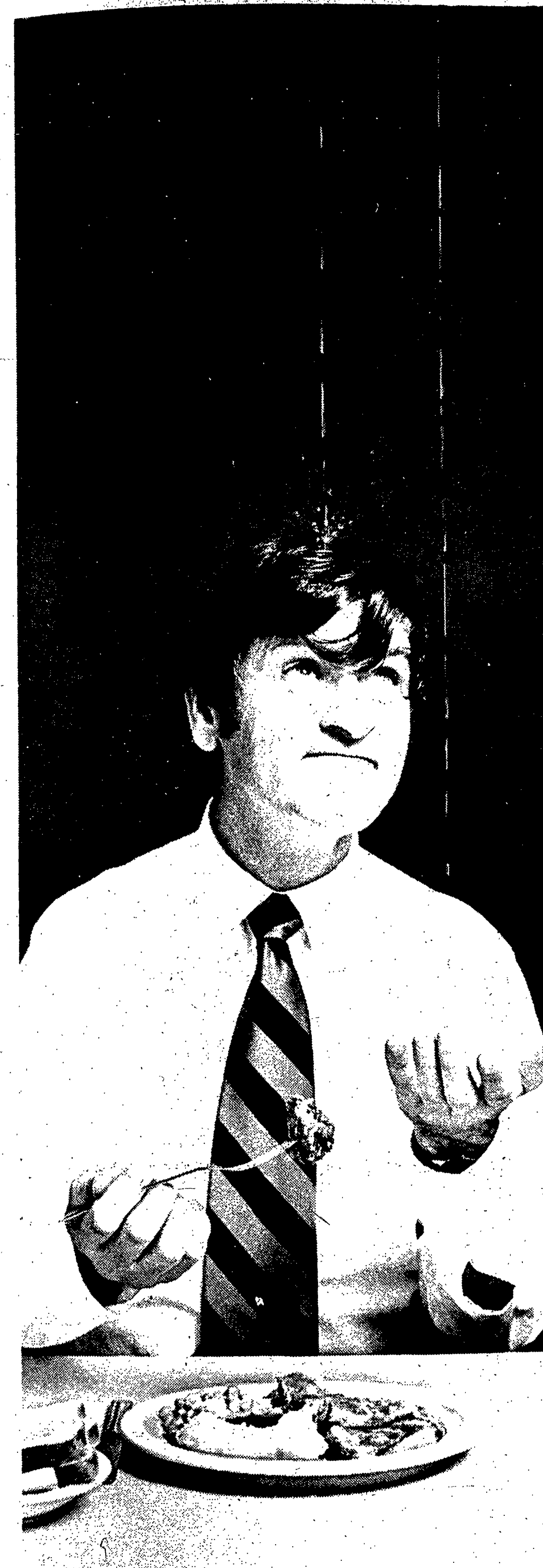
Legion Juniors Receive Prizes

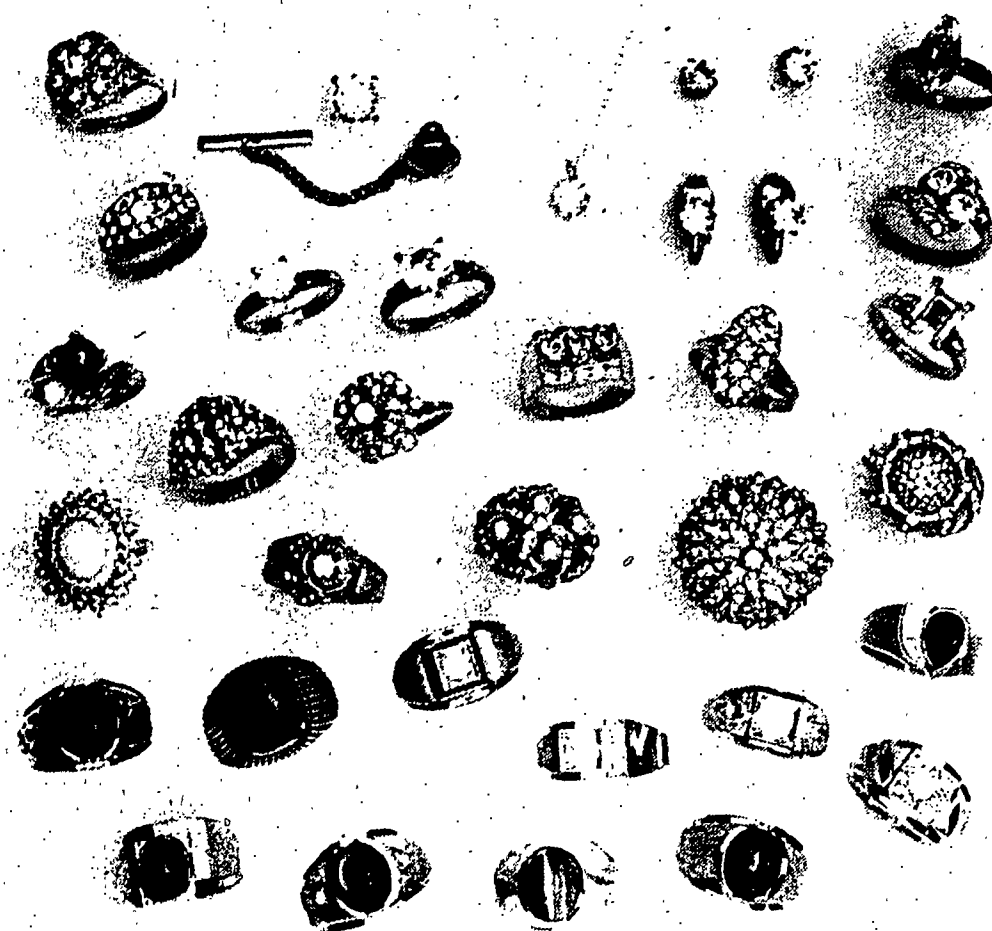

Republican headquarters in Washington received this query over the phone: "Can you please give us the name of the Democratic candidate for governor in Vermont?"

The clerk was temporarily stumped, then piped brightly, "Why don't you call the Democratic National Committee? I'm sure they'll be able to give you the information."

There was a pause, then a said voice replied meekly, "This is the Democratic National Committee!"

Anyway, the Democratic Convention should be a lot of fun and provide a lot of laughs and campaign oratory BUT whom ever they select as their BEST MAN won't win!

Speaking of campaign oratory — one can never be too sure. Can you guess what well-known personage mesmerized an audience with this rabble-rousing speech?

"The streets of our country are in turmoil. The universities are filled with students rebelling and rioting. Communists are seeking to destroy our country. We are in danger from within and without. What we need now is restoration of law and order. Elect me and I promise you that bringing back law and order to our streets, our courts, and our schools will be our first obligation."

The above words, which may have a slightly familiar ring, were a bit of campaign oratory by Adolph Hitler in Hamburg, Germany, in 1932.

Or:

"Anyone who doesn't believe in the American constitution or the American way of life should be deported. Me, I am a 100% American — all the way!"

So stated Al Capone, April 9, 1927, at the City Hall, Chicago. What politicians say in the heat of a convention, and what they mean is usually two different things. For example, once the Republican chairman of a bipartisan congressional committee said, "Gentlemen, permit me to tax your memories for a moment." area until years later. The experience led to previous resolutions by all the boards involved, which explicitly state annexing all three districts as part of the package when any annexation takes place.

While the attorney didn't hesitate to agree to the terms, a conference between Lavin and the owners prompted Blase to tell them there was no need to concern itself with the joint annexations since this is a requirement in the village.

In other actions discussion for creating the Environmental Control Board to replace the health and air pollution board was once again delayed and will be heard at the next Board meeting.

....The major discussion of the evening concerned amending the peddlers, solicitors and canvassers ordinance. The newly written amendments state all groups except "charitable" organizations would have to register with the village before they would be allowed to solicit in Niles. While the discussion wandered up and down the Board, it was stated the village would use the state

attorney general's files to approve outside solicitors. Trustee Ang Marcheschi, an insurance agent, cited several exceptions which he thought should be considered, and believed insurance men should not be categorized along with peddlers. He then cited political candidates, as well as little league representatives, as others who might be considered exceptions to the new law.

Village president Blase said a general ordinance rather than one with many specifics should be written, since finding exceptions to the law could cause much confusion. Because village attorney Richard Troy is in Miami at the convention, action was delayed until he returned.

In still other action approved \$3,420 of MFT funds for the Niles Mass Transit District as part payment of its total of \$12,432 to the North Shore Transit District. Niles now contributes \$7,800 to the United Motor Coach Co., and this money is distributed thru the North Shore District.

....Okayed vacating alleys between Nordica and Nottingham and Howard and Birchwood as well as between Birchwood and Fargo, and between the Forest Preserve and School Street and Fargo and Jarvis.

....Accepted the audit of Motor Fuel Tax monies for period ending December 31, 1970. Niles presently receives about \$26,000 monthly from the state for taxes paid by motorists for gasoline. The figure is based approximately on the population multiplied by \$5 per annum.

....Referred to committee and the VM bids for 2 van trucks and 1 dump truck for the Public Works Department. The vans will cost between \$11,636 and \$12,235 and the dump truck between \$6,144 and \$8,261.

....Bids for garbage stands, holders, and plastic bags were referred to the Manager for a recommendation. A purchase of 3,250 units, which added to the 1,500 now in use, will enable all homes north of Dempster to have this new facility. Holders and stand will cost between \$8 and \$9.50 and plastic bags will cost from 4 cents to about 6 cents each. The holders and stands are provided residents at no cost along with an initial 25 bags.

Manager Scheel said the bags make a cleaner village and he believed keep down the cost of collection.

trees, the lake was calm, almost free of even a ripple, and few dogs let out a whimper as we headed for the BIG story.

Summertime, we live in a 285 home community known as Michiana, which straddles the state line separating the obvious 2 states which its name is borrowed from. Living two blocks beyond Indiana, we traversed due Michigan-wise, as we moved in for our mission. Moving quickly now, we passed into neighboring Grand Beach, which is separated from our community by a stroke of sand and a wisp of grass.

Grand Beach is out of the twenties. The homes are mostly old frame buildings, which have been nailed onto, upwards, sideways, frontside and backside. Frank Lloyd Wright would have changed jobs had he seen the abortive attempts at making this community the poor man's Campobella. There are picket fences and lawns and a golf course, with uncleaned turf, which lies in rest waiting for its first golfer as late as 9 A. M.

As we wound our way thru the hills a few dogs began to stir, but were still too sleepy to let off a bark. The lone vehicle moving past us was the garbage truck, closely followed by streams of gnats, which escorted the truck along its route. Occasionally an old timer would stick his head out of his house, wave at the journalist with the walking stick, but say nary a word for fear of arousing the peaceful community. While the apocalyptic tales of small town USA tells of the early risers sticking their heads out the doors and taking in the milk, we only saw one fine old Irishman amble out from his house and deposit last night's booze bottle in the garbage. A second Irishman did walk down to the garbage truck, with a cup in his hand which carried coffee, but we suspected had a bit of morning eye-opener which included a dash of Jamiesons. We mention the Irish because as we closed in on our mission all the mail boxes read like they were borrowed from the County of Cork. There was a Hartigan and a Shannon and a Kelly and alongside the houses the license plates were from Illinois, with low, low numbers. There was a Congressional license, and a state representative's plates on two cars, and most of the cars had
