MG Girl Killed by Lightning During Storm

Bugleland Residents Buck Mother Nature Once Again

Bugleland residents, still unnerved from recent storms, once again weathered another severe electrical storm on Sunday evening which reportedly dumped up to four and one-half inches of rain in Niles and Morton Grove. Lightning struck and killed a Morton Grove girl, Carol Dasinger, 21, of 8507 School st. as she was leaving her job at

Jo Jo's Restaurant, Austin and Dempster, Morton Grove. Investigators at first suspected she had been struck by an auto, but the coroner's report verified she had been struck by lightning. A Niles man, Humbert DeDom-enico, 39, of 8456 Roseview was struck by lightning as he got out of a car at Pensacola and Major ave. in Chicago. He was

reported to be in satisfactory condition in Northwest Hospital. There were several power failures in Niles and Morton Grove during the height of the storm and many intersections were not only without traffic signals, but were barely passable due to the deep water. At one time during the storm, there were approximately 25 cars stalled in the

intersection of Dempster and Harlem due to the depth of the water. Many residents once again balled water from out of their already water-logged basements. Niles police reported a garage at 8210 Monroe was hit by lightning during the storm and two homes, one at 8210 Monroe and the other at 8558 Olcott were also damaged.

On Friday night, area residents also swamped the police departments with calls inquiring as to a possible earthquake or an explosion in town. They later were sion in town after they felt the tremors. They were notified that although there was no emergency in the area, an earthquake had been recorded.

Niles Park Board officially accepted the deed from school district 64 officials for 1.690 acres of Jonquil Terrace land at Tuesday night's meeting. The property, between Oriole and Oleander, with Lahon Street ending at its perimeter, ends almost 10 years of controversy over the land. The cost of \$85,000 will actually only cost Nilesites \$42,500 since a federal grant for half the amount has already been approved, according to Niles park attorney Gabe Barratato.

In addition to this parcel, which is one-third of the land available from the school district, Niles has until 1975 to pick-up the remaining option on the other two-thirds, which is alongside the acquired piece. An announced 1973 referendum will give voters an opportunity to decide on the purchase of the remaining 3.4 acres.

Gunman Slays MG Service Station Attendant

A service station attendant was shot to death and 2 Morton Grove youths wounded early Sunday morning by a well-dressed robber who drove into Dave's Standard Station, 8801 Waukegan rd., Morton Grove and inquired about a "lube job."

Jimmy Potts, 21, 5135 Touhy ave., Skokie, married and the father of a 1 year old son, was killed in a storage room of the station where the robber had forced all three to lie on the floor.

The other two youths, Michael Hack, 18, of 7406 Arcadia, Morton Grove and Robert Romano, 17, of 7364 Lee st., Morton Grove were reported in fair condition in Lutheran General Hospital.

According to the youths, after cleaning out the cash register of about \$400, the killer herded the three of them into a storage room at the rear of the station and forced them to lie face down on the floor.

Warning them not to rise, he walked out only to return a few seconds later and fire his pistol point blank into the heads of all three, according to Morton Grove police.

One of the youths was able to struggle to a phone and call the operator for help.

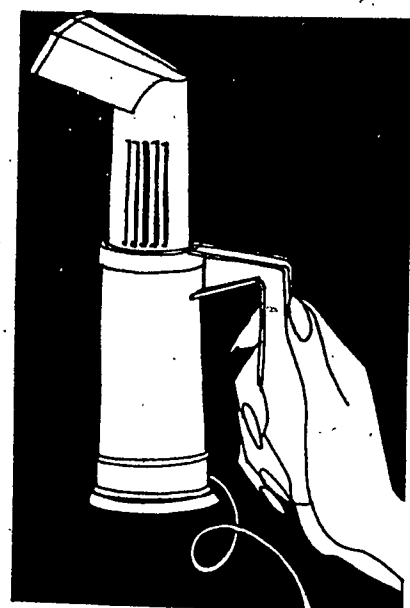
The killer was described as being a white man, about 25 years of age with black hair and driving a red 1970 model Oldsmobile or Pontiac.

Human Respiratory System Exhibit

Why the human body is so vulnerable to attacks from air-borne germs, noxious gases and cigarette smoke will be explained to the public in a mobile exhibit from the Chicago Lung Association which will be on display in Morton Grove at the Jewel Food Store, 5917 Dempster, on Thursday and Friday, Sept. 28 and 29. Hours will be: Thursday, 10 a.m. - 5 p.m.; Friday, 11 a.m. - 6 p.m. Sponsor of this Christmas Seal educational exhibit here is the Morton Grove Nurses Association which will also provide volunteers to man the unit under the leadership of its president, Mrs. Daniel Johnson R.M., 9123 Mansfield ave. The Chicago Lung Association was formerly the Tuberculosis Institute of Chicago and Cook County.

Dedicated to the human respiratory system the mobile unit contains larger-than-life illustrations of the human breathing system. By simply pushing a button on the animated display, a visitor can trace the path of oxygen in to the lungs where it is transferred to the bloodstream. Cross sectional views of the bronchial tree show how the tiny cilia lining this passageway guard the respiratory system against dust, dirt and germs.

Actual samples of lung tissue in the exhibit let people see the damage done by various respiratory diseases. Emphysema causes the small air sacs to balloon out of shape due to a loss of elasticity while TB literally destroys lung tissue. Carbon deposits from air pollution and cigarette smoking change the color of lung tissue from a healthy pink to a deep brown.

On hand to answer questions from visitors and guide them

through the displays will be Caryl Austin, health education consultant for the Chicago Lung Association. She will also make available free health educational pamphlets on lung health.

Christmas Seals provide this educational service as part of the Chicago Lung Association's program to protect the health of all citizens from the hazards of respiratory disease, air pollution and cigarette smoking.

"The U.S.A. vs. the Chicago Seven"

The Morton Grove Public Library will present "The U.S.A. vs. The Chicago Seven," a dramatization of the Chicago Conspiracy Trial on Friday, Sept. 22, at 7 p.m.

The film describes the trial of the seven leaders of the demonstrators who were charged with conspiracy to incite a riot at the 1968 Democratic Convention in Chicago. To most Americans their trial represented a clash between "The System" and some of the most conspicuous dissenting elements in American society.

The principal actors are American, and the set is almost exactly like the real courtroom in Chicago.

The Chicago Seven Conspiracy Trial is a British Broadcasting Company's T.V. production and has just won a blue ribbon at the 14th annual American Film Festival in New York. It will be shown in the meeting room at 7 p.m. Admission is free.

Maine East now goes on to competition in the semi-finals, but already the team has received \$200 in US Savings Bonds for M.E.

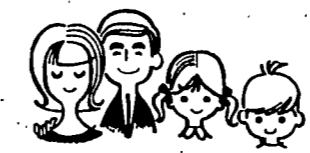
Orchesis Clinics and Tryouts

The Demon Guard, under the direction of Miss Verne Hoos, Mr. Paul Nelson, and Mr. Art Belmonte, hopes that the program, beginning its second year, will provide an accessible, inexpensive, and professional swimming program for the safety and recreational needs of the elementary school districts which Maine East serves.

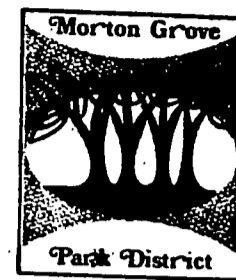
For \$7.50 a child is entitled to eight swimming sessions, scheduled as follows: 8:30-9:15 a.m. for girls age 9 and over; 9:30-10:15 a.m. for boys age 9 and over; and 10:30-11:15 a.m. for girls and boys age 8 and under.

Each session includes a general warm-up, 30 minutes of instruction, and a brief free play. Tickets are honored at any class during the year. Each time a student attends a lesson, the card is punched. Tickets not renewed by the eighth punch are collected and the name is replaced by one on the waiting list is one exists.

Classes are instructed by the Demon Guard organization. Lessons follow a six station pattern beginning with very basic skill, proceeding through all the strokes to advanced instruction in diving and water ballet as well as speed swimming. The child is initially tested and placed in his appropriate skill level. As he improves, he is graduated to the next station on an individual basis. Thus he is neither penalized for absences nor "held up" by slower students.

A child may take as many lessons as he needs, miss lessons as he must and return when he desires; however, regular practice reaps the greatest rewards. All youngsters who reside in District 207 who are at least 50 inches tall (if non-swimmers),

and who are capable of dressing and undressing themselves are eligible. Questions may be referred to one of the sponsors during the school day by phoning the main office at 825-4484.

Freshmen ITED Testing

Test results are used by the district for purposes of comparing growth of students from junior high school through the junior year in high school. In addition, results are used to evaluate curriculum and compare the performance of Maine East students with other students statewide and nationally.

Maine East counselor George Vukovich added, "These tests also help guarantee proper placement for students and to better enable the counseling staff to offer them courses of beneficial study."

After the ITED testing of 903 Maine East freshmen was completed, they toured the Learning Resource Center, familiarizing themselves with its use and materials, and had an opportunity to orientate themselves to the building before the first full day of classes on Aug. 31.

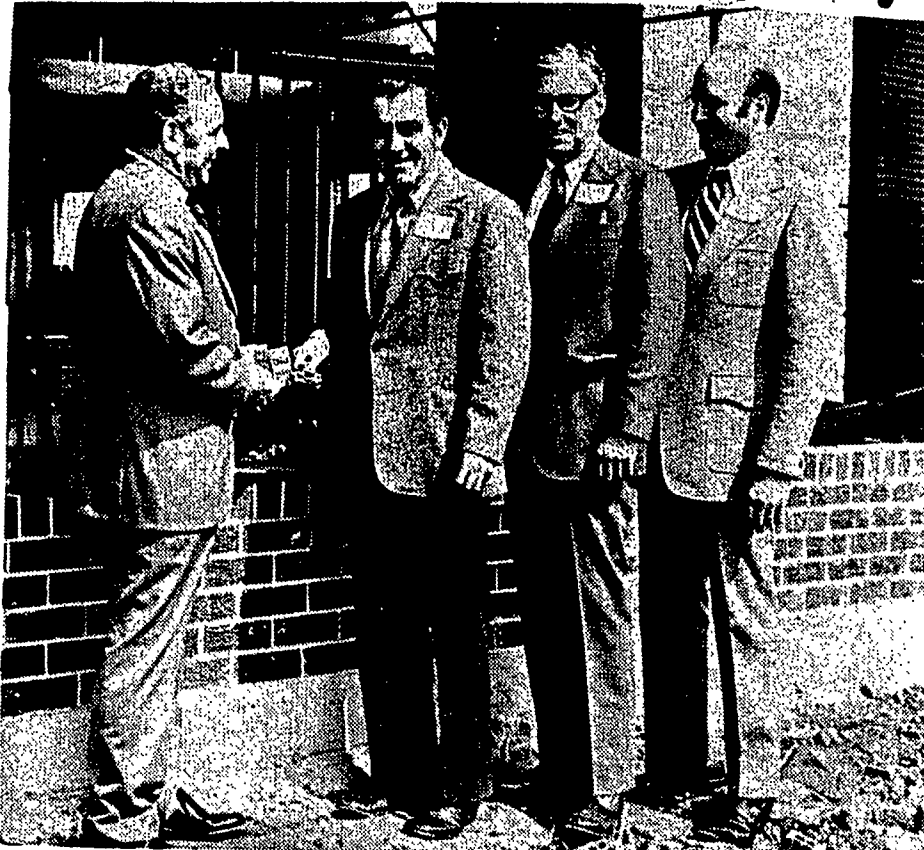

Safeguards Against Check Forgers

To help combat the rapidly increasing number of fraudulent checks cashed each year, First National Bank of Des Plaines recently published a list of safeguards.

According to Arthur R. Weiss, president, the various suggestions are designed to help protect bank patrons from forgers through enforcement of bank regulations combined with providing information to bank customers of certain simple measures each can personally follow to assure greater check protection.

Some of these include, completing all blank spaces on the check with pen only; never endorsing checks until ready for cashing; when mailing checks for deposit, indicating 'for deposit only' ahead of your signature; always reporting lost or stolen checks, immediately, and many others."

In recent years, check fraud losses were almost eight times higher than losses from bank burglaries and holdups, and these figures have increased every year.

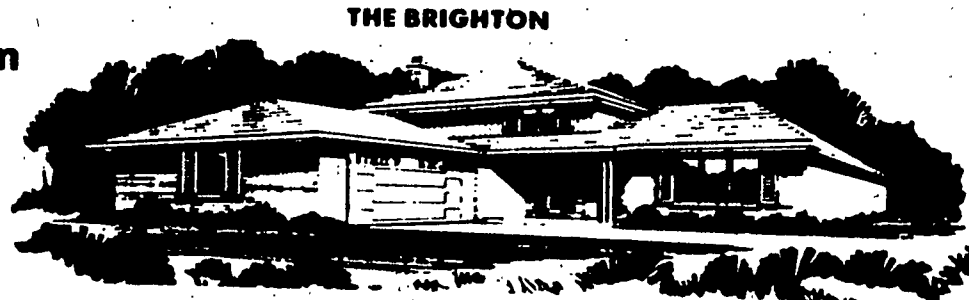

Young Shows 'Lack of Concern'

Dear Editor:

The letter about obscenity from Sam Young which appeared last week in your newspaper is interesting more for what it leaves out than for what it says. The Republican Candidate for Congress shows a remarkable lack of concern for the merits of the constitutional issues and the full story of the legislative process involved in the legislation to which he refers.

Mr. Young suggests that it was wrong for Congressman Mikva to oppose the so-called Obscene Mail Bill, but he fails to explain either the bill or what was wrong with it. Your readers are entitled to a full and accurate explanation.

The bill (H.R. 15693) was passed by the U.S. House of Representatives in April, 1970, and it was promptly shelved by the Senate. Congressman Mikva voted against the bill and the Senate killed it for the same reasons: it was badly-drafted and probably unconstitutional on account of violation of the First Amendment's guarantee of freedom of speech and press.

The bill not only failed to define adequately what was and was not "obscene," but it also would have inhibited the mailing of magazines and other material that

clearly are not obscene — whatever the definition. If the bill had become law, the courts, in all probability, would have overturned it. That bill was another example of Congress "pretending" to solve a problem by passing a law that most qualified lawyers regarded as unconstitutional.

A subsequent anti-obscenity bill (H.R. 11032) did pass the House — with Congressman Mikva's support. It was drafted carefully to avoid the same constitutional pitfalls into which H.R. 15693 stumbled. Congressman Mikva, himself an expert in constitutional law, was a member of the Subcommittee which wrote that bill.

We should be grateful that there are people in Congress who understand the Constitution and who resist efforts to undermine our basic constitutional rights. Mr. Young apparently finds fault with Congressman Mikva for being one of eight members of the House to oppose the bill.

But the people of the 10th Congressional District are entitled to courage and constructive leadership from their elected officials. We will be better served by a representative who does not hesitate to vote with a minority for sound constitutional reasons than by a representative who feels compelled to vote with the majority, irrespective of the merits of the issues involved.

The Thursday Bugle edition before the following Tuesday's election, we endorsed Blase's opponent and then received a telephone call from a reporter from the Chicago Sun-Times. He asked me what I knew about the arson charges and his questions were aimed at linking Blase with this matter. While Blase has long ceased to be one of our heroes, we told the reporter, we in no way would smear Blase, would not besmudge him with the sketchy knowledge we had, and told the reporter if he was a professional, he would do a professional job, and not use innuendoes right before election time. We told the reporter we were opposing Blase in this election, "were well aware Jack Mabley, in his Chicago Today column, had called the Blase campaign the "dirtyest" he'd seen in more than 30 years living in the area, but we wouldn't in any way aid anyone using similar tactics against Niles Mayor.

After the election we began inquiring from local people about the restaurant fire but ran against a stone wall. We contacted the state's fire marshal's office at least 10 times, and went around and round, Gus Mazzone, the state arson investigator held an arson hearing around the first of the year. When we told him we wanted to see the report from his office on the hearing, since it was a public hearing, he said we could see it. A couple of days later, he hedged on his original promise, saying the hearing excluded reporters and the public, and we would now have to contact the state's attorney's office for the report. Assistant State's Attorney Motherway said we couldn't see the fire marshal's report because his office was investigating what he termed several "gaps" in the investigative report. Meanwhile, the June Grand Jury had already been hearing witnesses even though we were never told the state's attorney's office had called for the grand jury hearing.

When we were denied the state fire marshal's report we contacted State Representative Tony Scario, who had created the public "right to know" statute which has been an Illinois law for several years. He said we absolutely had the right to see the report. But he acknowledged we might have to go into court before the report would be handed over to us.

Along this route of many detours several people mentioned the politics involved in the case. The attorney representing the village in the fire marshal hearing was Dick Troy, Niles village attorney, a member of the inner family of Mayor Daley. His father-in-law, Matthew Bleczyk, is one of the major domos in the Party, and Troy, was one of the attorneys defending Daley at the Miami national convention. Troy referred to the fire marshal's hearing as an "inquisition." The fire marshal is an appointee of the Republican governor, and thus there was the implication the abnormally-aged case, now 9 months old, was being held up by Democrat Hanrahan, after the Republican-appointed fire marshal had recommended there was evidence of arson. While the accusation was being placed, and without mentioning it, the case finally went to the grand jury, which meant the state's attorney felt the evidence warranted grand jury investigation.

The other conflict which clouded the matter concerned the attorney who represented the state fire marshal. Since the Republicans are holding the state offices and the attorney general's office represents the fire marshal, again the Republican accusation the Democrats were dragging their feet was mentioned time and time again. To add to the confusion, the Attorney General who handled the case in the fire marshal hearing was Bernard Carey, who is now opposing Ed Hanrahan for state's attorney.

Carey told us by telephone this was a good case, and he was confident the evidence would result in a "true bill." However, we were not satisfied with these several telephone calls, so we chased Carey down the campaign trail, sat thru an hour-long Kiwanis meeting where he was speaking at the Harris Restaurant on Irving Park Road, and

bought it in 1972 knowing the circumstances, Elliot maintained that if a house was built on this lot, the homes nearby would depreciate in value. Mr. Julian Cardiz said he wished to purchase this lot from Elrod in order to build a home on it. John Hillkin said, "We must sustain the ordinance as it is" and moved to deny the request. The trustees unanimously agreed with him. Dick Hobs said, "Property owners should consider buying the property themselves." David Cohen said "I'd like to see it maintained either by vacating in favor of the residents or by having a home built on it." John Nord-

managed to ask him a few questions in between his campaigning. He told us we had a good story, used a colloquialism we had a "tiger by the tail," and expected the grand jury would ask the Niles policemen to stand trial.

Amidst all this secrecy, we finally found a state's attorney who told us the sunglasses of one of the policemen was found at the fire, as well as a watch, which was not positively identified. He said the policeman admitted the glasses may have been his, after they were traced to him thru checking with the optometrist who issued them. The policeman said he lost them when he chased youngsters out of the building area where the fire took place.

The state's attorney said there was "strong physical evidence," the burnt hands of the policeman and the watch and sunglasses, led to their belief the case was a good one, that they had "a tiger by the tail."

After all the interviewing we then went to the police and fire chiefs in Niles. The police chief played down the case, and said there wasn't sufficient evidence to book anyone. He dismissed the case, implying there was no case. When we asked him how the fire marshal's office was brought into the case, he said he had no idea. We thought if a Niles official report indicated there was arson evidence then there was certainly cause to be concerned about the matter. But the police chief said he had no idea how the state got involved and knew of no statute which requires the case be reported. Inquiring of the fire chief he told us the state statute requires a report be submitted by him within a given number of days if the fire costs more than about \$100 fire damage, and certainly if there's a hint of arson.

As far as the story being reported, it was completed with our report a "No Bill" was voted by the Grand Jury. It meant they did not find sufficient evidence to recommend the policeman be tried on a state felony charge.

While the fledgling journalist can get off at this stop, since the reporting ends there, there is a post script which should be added. In a book written by William Garvey, a well known defense attorney, he emphasized a state's attorney can get an indictment nearly any time he desires. The implication is clear the desire of the state's attorney often determines the results of such a hearing. While we have no knowledge as to the efforts made to present all the facts, and as to how hard the state's attorney pursued the case, we do know politics and the state's attorney's office have long been hand-maidens. It is certainly in the realm of conservative speculation to believe that office could pursue with vigor, or with less than vigor, a case which they might prefer not to be tried.

The system we live under believes a man is innocent until proven guilty. Likewise, the evidence presented by the state's attorney was not sufficient to warrant a criminal court hearing.

Since the evidence was circumstantial it was considered "not sufficient." But it would seem Niles still must determine whether or not these policemen should continue to serve publicly. Since there is neither a "guilty" nor "not guilty" charge, the case is in limbo. It would seem Niles should ask a lie detector test be given these men, let's incompressible Niles would want men on the department who live in this grey area of "guilty or not guilty." If they pass the test the matter should be closed.

It would seem from here the morale and discipline of all public departments are at stake. So long as such a serious charge lays in limbo the upholding the law by those authorized to uphold the law becomes jeopardized.

districts in creating a special recreation district for handicapped children in Niles and Niles Townships.

Eighty-one children within the Niles Park District would be eligible to participate in the program which would initially cost the NPD \$2,840. There are 67 Niles children living in Niles Township and 14 in Niles township who would make use of the new district.

Commissioner Jack Leske, who favored the concept of providing recreation for these children, was the lone dissenter. He said he thought such a project should be done on a state-wide basis and should be provided by the school districts, rather than park districts. He said there was more revenue in the school districts and the overall state program would be more equitable since many children are not within park district borders in the state and would be excluded from such a program.

Commissioner Bill Keener was most enthusiastic in support of the program. He thought it a worthwhile venture, and while some districts are not participating he thought all districts should support it.

Commissioner Jerry Sullivan gave an eloquent and emotional speech which sealed Niles support for the program, Sullivan said, "We're very fortunate we don't have this cross to bear (noting their children did not suffer any handicaps)." He noted the district spends hundreds of dollars for vandalism repairs, for bus service and \$1,000,000 for an ice skating facility; He then said, "I don't know how we could go to bed tonight and sleep if we were not able to endorse this program", contended it was a golden opportunity, that the district should stand by their side (the handicapped) and other districts participating have small minds. The Board immediately backed the plan, and Keener unabashedly wiped away tears from his eyes after Sullivan's plea.

In other actions announced a fall 1973 referendum required homeowners and residents aid the Citizens Advisory Committee suggesting sites be acquired by the park district.
