




This week's column is for fledgling journalists and Bugle fans who enjoy watching a guy bleed drop by drop.

The restaurant-arson-Niles policemen story we ran the previous 2 weeks began many months ago. We were attending the christening party of Mayor Blase's daughter when we met one of the Niles policemen who appeared before the grand jury regarding the fire. His hands were heavily bandaged and he told us they were burnt in a furnace accident in his home. Some weeks later one of the inner circle in Blase's organization raised an eyebrow when we mentioned the policeman's accident, and implied there may be more to the story than what we'd heard. Since rumors, gossip, and backbiting pass our way several times every week, we thought little more about it until the week before last spring's primary.

A service station attendantwas shot to death and 2 Morton Grove youths wounded early Sunday morning by a well-dressed robber who drove into Dave's Standard Station, 8801 Waukegan rd.,
Morton Grove and inquired about

Jimmy Potts, 21, 5135 Touhy ave., Skokie, married and the father of a 1 year old son, was killed in a storage room of the station where the robber had forced all three to lie on the floor.



### Safeguards Against Check Forgers

To help combat the rapidly increasing number of fraudulent checks cashed each year, First National Bank of Des Plaines recently published a list of safe-

According to Arthur R. Weiss. president, the various sug-gestions are designed to help protect bank patrons from forgers through enforcement of bank regulations conbined with providing information to bank customers of certain simple measures each can personally follow to assure greater check protection.

Weiss explained that fraudulent check cashing has grown primarily due to the ingenuity of forgers and the carelessness of check writers. He said the bank is combating the problem through procedures to protect checking accounts such as: 1. insisting on proper identification and 2. requesting check cashers to endorse all checks in the presence of the teller. "However, there are additional measures," he added, "that the check casher may take in order to protect himself from being a fraud victim robbed at pen point. Some of these include, completing all blank spaces on the check with pen only; never endorsing checks until ready for cashing; when mailing checks for deposit, indicating for deposit only ahead of your signature; always report-ing lost or stolen checks, immediately, and many others."

In recent years, check fraud losses were almost eight times higher than losses from bank burglaries and holdups, and these figures have increased every



Mr. Young suggests that it was wrong for Congressman Mikva to oppose the so-called Obscene Mail Bill, but he fails to explain either the bill or what was wrong with it. Your readers are entitled to a full and accurate explanation.

The bill (H.R. 15693) was that bill. passed by the U.S. House of Representatives in April, 1970, and it was promptly shelved by the Senate. Congressman Mikva voted against the bill and the Senate killed it for the same reasons: it was badly-drafted and probably unconstitutional on account of violation of the First Amendment's guarantee of freedom of speech

But the people of the 10th Congressional District are entitled to courage and constructive leadership from their elected officials. We will be better served by a representative who does not hesitate to vote with a minority for sound constitutional reasons than by a representative who feels compelled to vote with the majority, irrespective of the merits of the issues involved

The Thursday Bugle edition before the following Thesday's election, we endorsed Blase's opponent and then received a telephone call from a reporter from the Chicago Sun-Times. He asked me what I knew about the arson charges and his questions were aimed at linking Blase with this matter. while Blase has long ceased to be one of our heroes, we told the reporter we in no way would smear Blase, would not be smudge him with the sketchy knowledge we had, and told the reporter if he was a professional, he would do a professional job, and not use innuendoes right before election time. We told the reporter we were opposing Blase in this election, were well aware Jack Mabley, in his Chicago Today column, had called the Blase campaign the "dirtiest" he'd seen in more than 30 years living in the area, but we wouldn't in any way aid anyone using similar tactics against

After the election we began inquiring from local people about the restaurant fire but ran against a stone wall. We contacted the state's fire marshall's office at least 10 times, and went around and round. Gus Mazzone, the state arson investigator held an arson hearing around the first of the year. When we told him we wanted to see the report from his office on the hearing, since it was a public hearing. he said we could see it. A couple of days later. he hedged on his original promise, saying the hearing excluded reporters and the public, and we would now have to contact the state's attorney's office for the report. Assistant State's Attorney Motherway said we couldn't see the fire marshall's report because his office was investigating what he termed several "gaps" in the investigative report. Meanwhile, the June Grand Jury had already been hearing witnesses even though we were never told the state's attorney's office had called for the grand jury hearing.

When we were denied the state fire marshal's report we contacted State Representative Tony Scariano, who had created the public "right to know" statute which has been an Illinois law for several vears. He said we absolutely had the right to see the report. But he acknowledged we might have to go into court before the report would be handed this stop, since the reporting ends here, there is a post script which should be added. In a

Along this route of many detours several people mentioned the politics involved in the case. The attorney representing the village in the fire marshall hearing was Dick Troy, Niles village attorney, a member of the inner family of Mayor Daley. His father-in-law, Matthew Bierczat, is one of the major domos in the Party, and Troy, was one of the attornies defending Daley at the Miami national convention. districts in creating a special recreation district for handicapped children in Maine and Niles

Townships. Eighty-one children within the Niles Park District would be eligible to participate in the program which would initially cost the NPD \$2.840. There are 67 Niles children living in Maine Township and 14 in Niles township who would make use of the new district. Commissioner Jack Leske, who

favored the concept of providing recreation for these children, was the lone dissenter. He said he thought such a project should be done on a state-wide basis and should be provided by the school districts, rather than park districts. He said there was more revenue in the school districts and the overall state program would be more equitable since many children are not within park district borders in the state and would be excluded from such a program.

Commissioner Bill Keener was most enthusiastic in support of the program. He thought it a worthwhile venture, and while some districts are not participating he thought all districts should Commissioner Jerry Sullivan
