Incorporated villages received the first half of their federal revenue sharing checks the past week, but unincorporated people are passed over in sharing this windfall. They help pay the bills but they ain't getting any kickbacks, like we city

In Niles a check for \$140,416 was received from Washington while Morton Grove received a check for \$72,979. By the first or second week in January another check for an equal amount will be distributed to incorporated towns thruout the country. Subsequently, checks will be forthcoming each quarter and will be divvied up according to a towns' population, its own tax burden, and according to the average income in its community.

Ken Scheel, our favorite former fullback from Colgate U., and Niles village manager, spoke the words of many famous men, when he said he believed revenue sharing "was a lot of B.S.". He said Uncle Sam operated the country by means of deficit spending, and adding this additional tax burden merely means the government will have to borrow more money, pay additional interest on the loan, which drives the deficit ever higher and higher. It is Ken's thinking income taxes should be lowered, and loopholes should be tightened and eliminated, rather than passing out money in this

OCC to Grant Credit for Learning Experiences

Community College for learning struction in an accredited or recognized college, according to John Donohue, Dean of Student Personnel. The college credit can be earned through six different programs, he pointed out.
They include the College Level Examination Program, service credit for health and physical education, armed forces study, Advanced Placement Program, transfer of credits earned at nonaccredited or non-recognized institutions, and proficiency examinations through instructors.

The OCC policy for granting credit for these learning experiences was adopted by the Board of Trustees on Nov. 21. Oakton Community College recognizes credit by examination as a means of demonstrating college-level competence. The total amount of credit which may be accepted by examination is not limited, according to Mr. Donohue; however, credit equivalency may be granted only after an Armed Forces Institute(USAFI).

The College Level Examination
Program (CLEP) embraces both subject examinations and general examinations. The basic purpose of CLEP is to enable those who have reached the college level of education in non-traditional ways to assess the level of their competence and to establish college credit, Mr. Donohue said.

Any veteran who has completed a minimum of six months of active duty in the armed forces may receive credit for Physical Education 101. This credit will be entered on the student's record without a grade and will not be included in the computation of the grade point average, he explained.
