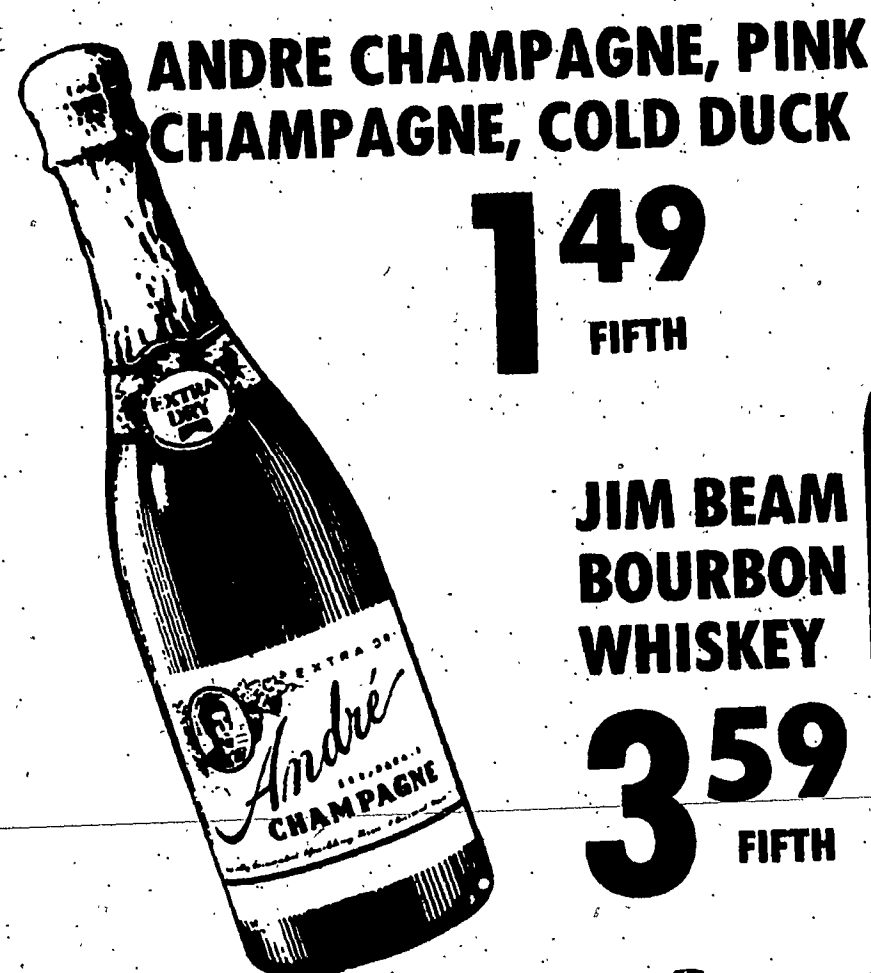

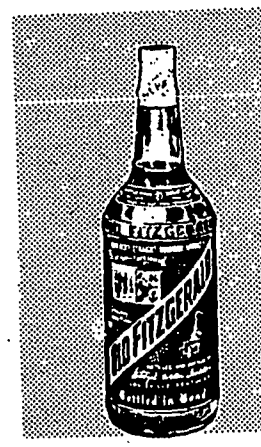

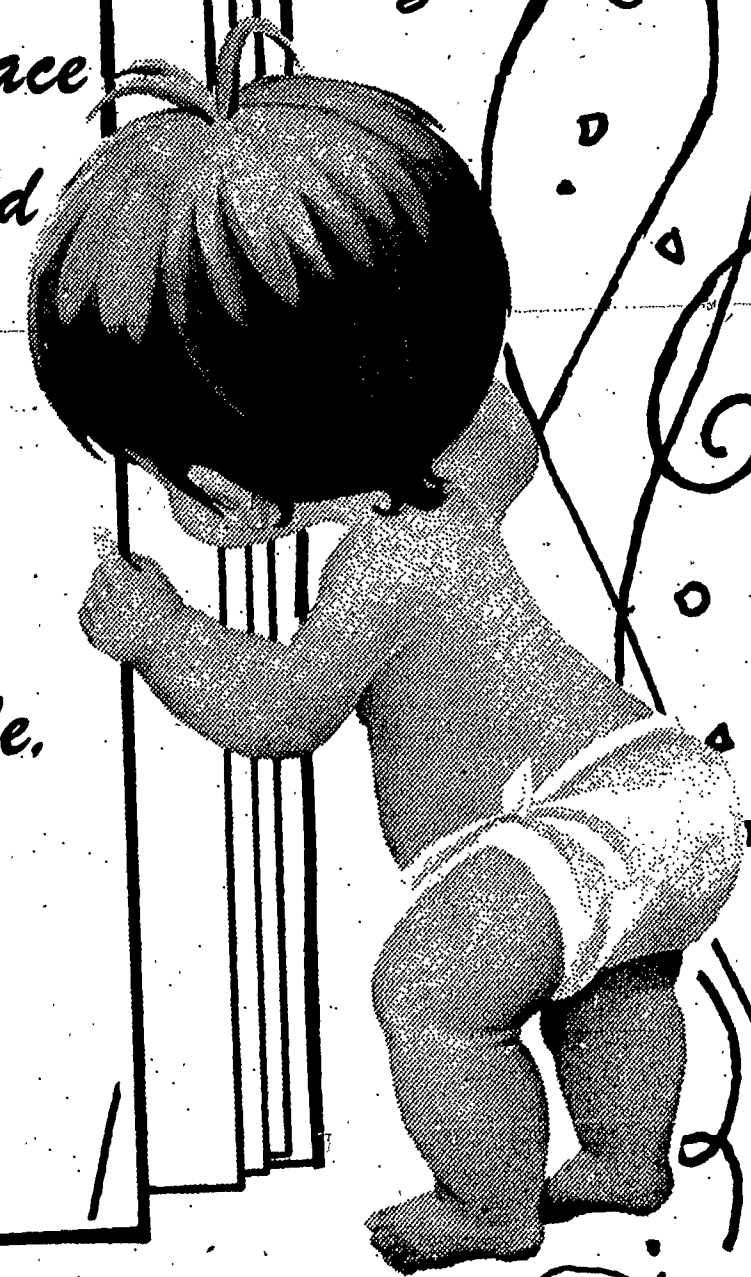

## Turn Signals on Harlem-Touhy

State Representative Ralph C. Capparelli (D-16th) has called for the Illinois Department of Transportation to install left turn signals on Harlem ave. where it intersects with Touhy ave.

In a letter to Transportation Department Director William Cellini, Capparelli pointed out that "during peak traffic periods (7 a.m. to 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. to 7 p.m.), the intersection of Harlem ave. and Touhy ave. becomes very congested for northbound and southbound traffic making left turns onto Touhy ave. At the present time, only one or two cars are able to make left turns

during these times because of the heavy flow of oncoming traffic during each light change cycle. If left turn signal lights were installed, a greater number of cars could complete their turns which would speed up traffic and reduce congestion."

Capparelli said this is only one of many improvements which could be made to maintain traffic flow. He believes that all arterial street intersections should have left turn signals, all synchronized to permit the minimum amount of waiting time at each traffic light.

## Candidates for Re-Election



Announcing their candidacies for re-election are (l to r) Keith Peck, Trustee; Frank Wagner, Jr., Village Clerk; Peter Pesole, Trustee; Jerry Skaja, Trustee; and Mayor Nicholas Blase, President of the Village Board of Trustees.

In a joint statement, Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase, trustees Keith Peck, Peter Pesole and Jerry Skaja, and village clerk Frank Wagner, Jr., have announced their candidacies for re-election to their respective offices.

Blase seeks his fourth term as mayor, trustees Peck his third term and Pesole his second. Skaja seeks his first elected term to the board having been appointed to fill the vacancy left by retiring trustee Richard Gruenwald earlier this year. Wagner is seeking his second term as village clerk.

Speaking for the team, Mayor Blase said, "The dramatic growth and progress of Niles from a rural farming town to our present thriving, all-American family oriented village calls for a united, well-knit effort from a team with proven leadership qualities. Our team will assure residents of Niles continued progress with economy, our byword these past four years."

Nicholas Blase has served Niles as mayor since 1960. During his administration, Niles earned the Look Magazine All America City award. He set precedence with the first Senior Citizen residence in all of the northwest suburbs. He is a member of the executive board of directors of the Cook County Council of Governments and is chairman of the Legislative Implementation Committee of the Illinois Municipal League. Both organizations seek methods of solving community problems through legislation and inter-government cooperation.

Village clerk, Frank Wagner, Jr., editor of the Niles Progress Report has resided in Niles since 1943. He is the grandson of former trustee, Anthony Zamafr. As clerk he has modernized the office procedures and introduced the data pack allowing Niles residents to purchase vehicle licenses thru the mall. He is a Niles Police Dept. veteran of 22 years.

As director of records he modernized the program to its present highly efficient stature and was consultant in the design of the ultra new communication center now in operation.

Trustee Keith Peck, Niles resident for 18 years has served as Niles Park Commissioner, chaired the Citizen's Committee for better Parks and has been active in many civic groups in this community, giving him excellent insight into its needs. A professional businessman, he is chief plant engineer of the Interstate Bakeries Corp.

Trustee Peter Pesole, a former Youth Commissioner brings his experience as negotiator to the village board. He presently serves as director of Committee on Political Education (COPE) for the states of Illinois and Indiana.

Trustee Jerry Skaja brings youth and business experience to the Board of Trustees. A Niles resident for 8 years, he has served as advisor to the Niles Youth Commission, a member of the Chamber of Commerce, and the Lions Service club.

At the recent Niles Days Committee monthly meeting, it was announced that any organization or person requesting funds from the Niles Days Festival for 1973 must have that request in to the Board of Directors no later than Jan. 31. Any such request must comply to the fundamentals, such as specifically stating what the monies would be used for, the exact amount requested, and if the request is granted, an accounting must be given the Committee.

This Festival has been quite successful and for the last two years alone over \$35,000 has been allocated to various activities and projects for the benefit of Nilesites. Over 26 organizations regularly participate in this annual function that brings together rides, booths, foods and drinks, and just plain fun.

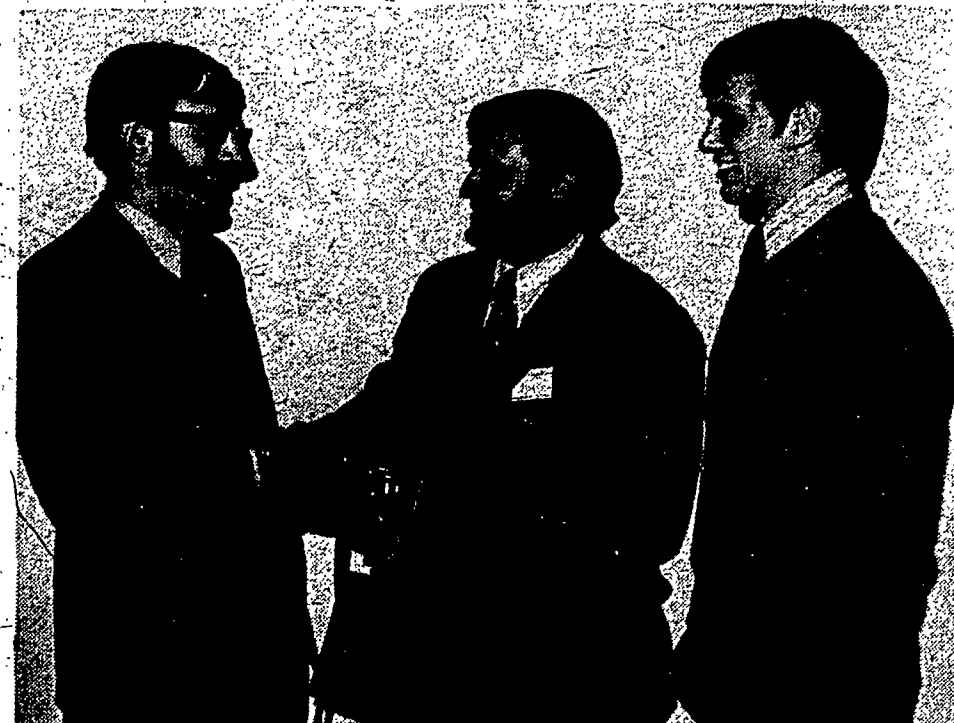

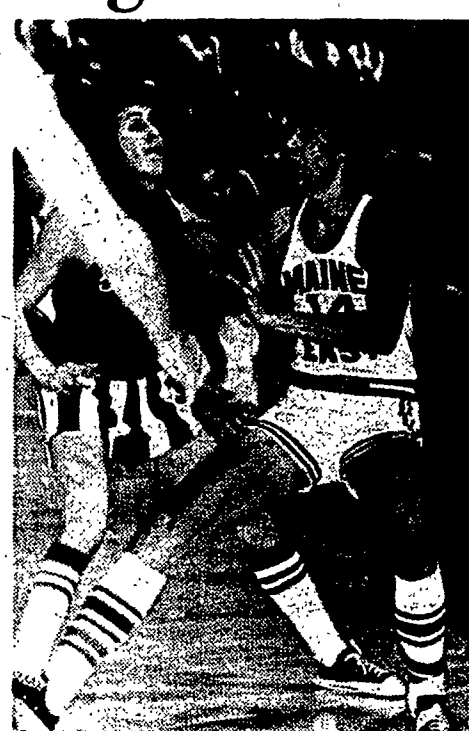

### Students Tour Universal Oil Products

Environmental science students from Oakton Community College recently toured the research laboratory of Universal Oil Products in Des Plaines. This was the seventh in a series of field trips arranged by Michael J. Matkovich, instructor of environmental science at OCC.

Students should see for themselves what work is being done to combat air pollution, Mr. Matkovich believes. So he took his class to Universal Oil Products to see some of the latest air pollution control devices for cars.

Ted DePalma, director of Auto-

motive Services at Universal Oil Products, led the tour of the company's research laboratories. Students were impressed with the sophisticated instrumentation used to analyze exhaust emissions, according to Mr. Matkovich. One device simulates a car moving at a particular speed, automatically analyzes all exhaust emissions, and, via computer, prints out the concentration of each chemical in less than a minute, he reported.

The students were also shown the new catalytic converters which will be introduced in 1974 model cars. These devices convert toxic carbon monoxide and hydrocarbons into relatively harmless carbon dioxide and water vapor, Mr. Matkovich said.

Other trips arranged for his students by Mr. Matkovich included tours of Commonwealth Edison Nuclear Power Plant in Zion, Ill.; the Chicago Sanitary District; the water filtration plant; and the Indiana Dunes National Lakeshore. Oakton Community College, serving the residents of Maine and Niles townships, is located at 7900 N. Nagle, Morton Grove.

### OCC Biology Speaker

Maureen Carney, biology instructor at Oakton Community college, frequently takes her insect collection and color slides to the elementary schools in the OCC area. A member of the Human Resources Pool at Oakton Community college, she talks to schoolchildren about "Insects" and "Social Organization of Insects." In recent weeks she has spoken to the fourth graders at the Melzer school in Morton Grove and the third graders at the Wilson school in Glenview. Miss Carney is one of more than 75 speakers belonging to the Human Resources Pool at Oakton Community college. ## Niles Delays Decision on Phosphate Ban

Niles housewives may not be able to buy phosphate detergents in Niles next year. The Niles Village Board discussed Tuesday night whether the phosphate ordinance, passed last April, should finally be enforced in the village. The Board could not agree on a decision.

The ordinance, which prohibits the sale of products with a high level of phosphate content, had not been enforced immediately to give the soap companies more time to adhere to the rigid standards the ordinance would allow. Village manager Ken Scheel advised the Board to give the companies more time with another six month extension of the non-enforcement.

Trustee Keith Peck agreed with Scheel, adding, "there are many other sources of phosphates, like fertilizers."

Trustee Ang Marcheschi wants the ordinance rescinded. "This ordinance penalizes the housewife for something over which she has no control," he said.

However, Mayor Nick Blase did not want to see the ordinance thrown out of the books. "Isn't this ordinance one way to pressure these industries? If this was rescinded, how would they act?"

Trustee Pete Pesole felt Niles should start the ball rolling. "Someone should take a stand against these companies, why not us?"

Despite these arguments, Peck moved the ordinance be rescinded. The Board's vote was deadlocked at 3-3 with Peck, Marcheschi and Ralph Bast voting for abolishment. Blase broke the tie with a "no" vote. Blase then

instructed the trustees to study thoroughly the ordinance and the effects it would have on the village, with a final decision to be made at the Board's next meeting, Jan. 9.

In other actions the Board delayed accepting taking over sections of streets owned by the A.B. Dick Company. The streets involved are Central, Jarvis, and Menard. The company had maintained the streets for 20 years, but now desires to give them to Niles. The Board expressed concern over who would pay for any malfunctions with the sewer and water systems under the streets.

"We don't sell the company water, yet we would have to fix the water lines, a very untenable position," Blase said. The Board will wait to hear from Skokie, who does sell water to A. B. Dick to see if Skokie would allow Niles to sell water to the company.

The Board approved a zoning change from M-1 to B-1 Special Use for property at 5960 W. Touhy ave. for the Henrici Steak House. An addition will be built to the building which is now the Red Balloon Restaurant.

Trustee Ralph Bast who heads the Niles Youth Commission made an end-of-the-year speech commending the people who work on the Niles Youth Commission and the Niles Family Service Board.

"The Youth Commission has done an outstanding job in developing worthwhile activities for the youth in the village. The Service Board has attended to many, many needs and have given of themselves for better service in Niles. These people are just sensational.

## Attends Atlanta Conference

Patrick Casali, assistant professor of foreign languages at Oakton Community College, attended the national meeting of the American Council on Teaching of Foreign Languages recently.

Sessions of the conference were concerned with the interest of the community and individual in the study of foreign as well as the current lack of interest in foreign languages.

Speakers pointed out that the community should look upon the language teacher as a community resource and the community college in particular should make the language teacher available to serve the needs and interests of its particular community, according to Mr. Casali. This country has a plural heritage and for-

eign language study is the best means to get to know other cultural and ethnic groups, he said. Mr. Casali, who formerly taught at Notre Dame High School in Niles, teaches Spanish and French as well as humanities at OCC. A graduate of Loyola University, he has traveled and studied extensively abroad.

## Dist. 207 Board Meeting

Dewane R. Barnes, social science instructor at Maine West and president of the new Maine Teachers' Association of District 207, addressed the Board of Education at its regular monthly meeting Monday evening, Dec. 18, stating that the newly formed organization seeks active participation in such major areas as curriculum innovation, class size, the length of the school day and district fiscal planning.

Reading from a prepared statement, he praised the school district for its quest for academic excellence and for the recognition it has received in surrounding communities as an educational system worthy of emulation, but declared that traditional assumptions concerning planning, curriculum development, use of teacher time, student involvement and other areas of concern are no longer adequate.

"Our current fiscal dilemma dramatizes for us the need for active participation in education planning at the national, state and local level," he said. "Our former teachers' association was

not technically equipped to meet this need, and affiliation with the National Educational Association and the Illinois Education Association is designed to bring expertise to those areas."

William P. Wuehrmann, Board president and chairman of the Professional Negotiations Committee of the Board of Education, stated that the Board recognizes the Maine Teachers' Association of District 207 as the sole negotiating agent for the professional staff. He added that providing the best education possible for the youth of this district is a joint responsibility of the Board, the administrative and supervisory staff, and the professional staff of the Maine Township High schools.

Michael W. Bartos, chairman of the Board's Education Committee, complimented the Maine South English department staff on an outstanding presentation made recently on the school's new elective English program. The new system allows sophomores, juniors and seniors to tailor-make

their English program according to their particular interests and abilities by choosing from among 28 elective courses. Bartos suggested that consideration be given to introducing the elective English program into the other Maine high schools. The Board commended the English staff at Maine South for its cooperation and dedication in developing and implementing the pilot program, and for their excellent presentation of it at a Dec. 11 Education Committee meeting.

The Board certified that monies received by the district through Title I, ESEA to fund activities and services for meeting the special education needs of educationally disadvantaged children are being used to supplement local and state funds, and that these funds are now being used in a comparable manner throughout the district.

Currently, the \$21,330 which has been allocated this year to District 207 funds a program for teaching English as a second language. The program is con-

ducted on a district-wide basis and presently involves eighteen students.

A resolution was passed authorizing the district to participate in a joint purchasing agreement with the State of Illinois and to participate in state contracts in accordance with House Bill 2116.

However, the Board made it clear that in implementing such a program the district will purchase through the State of Illinois only when the business office of

District 207 determines that such purchasing will be advantageous to the school district. It is also understood that the Board reserves the right to withdraw from the Joint Purchasing Agreement at any time.

## Maine High Schools Placement Tests

Placement tests, given annually in Maine Township High School District 207, will be given at the 4 Maine high schools on Jan. 13, 1973. The district will again administer the Differential Aptitude Test (DAT) for this purpose.

All students who plan to enter the Maine high schools next September as freshmen are required to take this test prior to enrollment. No other general testing date will be scheduled.

Students are to take the test at the high school they will attend next year.

Testing will begin at all 4 testing centers at 7:45 a.m. and should be completed by 12:15 p.m. It is important that students arrive and be seated before 7:45 a.m. Late arrival will jeopardize the individual's test performance.

At the Maine East testing center, students from the following schools will be tested: Gemini, Apollo, Emerson, Chippewa, parochial and private.

The Maine North testing center will test students from Apollo, Chippewa, River Trails, River Road, parochial and private schools.

The Maine South testing center will test students from Pennyroy, Emerson, Lincoln, parochial and private schools.

At the Maine West testing center students from Algonquin, Chippewa, Iroquois, Our Lady of Hope, St. Mary's, St. Zachary, St. Emily's, St. Stephen's, Immanuel Lutheran (Des Plaines), and all other parochial and private school will be tested.

Students should arrange for their own transportation to and from the testing center and bring with them two sharpened No. 2 lead pencils. Parents should arrange to pick up their children at 12:15 p.m. or shortly thereafter.

The testing program is identical in all Maine high schools and will be administered by members of the counseling department of each school. The areas covered by the test are: verbal reasoning, numerical ability, abstract reasoning, space relations, mechanical reasoning, clerical speed and accuracy, and language usage.

According to Merlin W. Schultz, Coordinator of Pupil Personnel Services for District 207, the DAT
