




During the past year at our local level we first told you about Niles trustees taking a bag of your money and lolling on the beaches of Hawaii, under the guise of attending a municipal meeting. It was brought to your attention because there is no one who legally can prevent this story from being published.

In 1972 we first reported the Niles policemen who were under grand jury investigation for arson charges concerning a restaurant fire on Milwaukee ave. That story required certain officials at state and local levels to inform and aid us in receiving pertinent details. If they knew we could be hauled into court and be legally obliged to reveal our sources they never would have spoken to us. And you would have never known what was going on in your communities.

The battle between government officials and newspapermen is as old as our Republic.

We like to use the phrase "constructive hostility" in describing the correct posture newsmen should have toward government officials. Whether it's in Washington where the Watergate scandal causes abrasions between the President and the Washington Post, or here at home, where our pecking away at past Morton Grove officials resulted in our not





Most of the phone calls get through to Mrs. Goldberg in about 20 minutes, However, members of the committee report that the Soviet government monitors the conversations.

Although Mrs. Goldberg's plight is similar to the plight of about a quarter of a million other Jews who have sought permission to leave the Soviet Union, her situation differs from most of the others. The Soviet government allowed only her husband to leave the country even though the entire family tried to obtain exit visas.

"This is a form of psychological warfare - splitting the family and creating anxiety on both the one who emigrated and those who have to stay behind," says Mrs. Charney.

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
Lindsay, contacted in his New York office, said "the most moving experience" of his trip occurred during the morning he met with several recent immigrants from Russia, including Yaron.

"Their stories were heartbreaking because of the problem they encountered in attempting to leave Russia, the treatment they received in Russia and their inability to bring their families with them to Israel," Lindsay added, "This meeting confirmed that the Soviet government is now dealing with requests by Jews to go to Israel, not according to some general guidelines, but on an individual case-by-case basis. So the most effective way to help those locked up in Russia continues to be the slow and frustrating work on individual cases

North Suburban Library System Chairman







The never-ending need to watchdog your government at all levels, at all times, is all our jobs, and demands active vigilance on the part of all of us.

Since we're at the local community level, rather than in Washington, it's our job to ferret out local news stories, to ask the local questions needed to be asked, and to damn the hot breath of any government agency which attempts to put the squeeze on newspapermen, and newspapers and all the media,

This April we'll be having our every other year hiccup known as village elections which arouse a very small percentage of the brethren, it's the one time in two years when you should scrutinize the guys who're spending \$5,000,000 or more, ask them questions which should be asked, before trudging to the polls and balloting for your choices,


