## Niles Days Funds to Purchase Kidney Machines

The 1972 Niles Days request for \$10,000 to purchase 3 dialysis (artificial kidney) machines has been modified to start up a kidney center here in Niles. Recent surveys by the Niles Days Committee indicated that it was cheaper to rent the machine, because of the constant changes made to improve the units. At this time it was also learned that state funds are available for machine rental. As a result of meetings and discussions with various hospitals and medical staffs engaged in operating kidney dialysis centers it was decided that the greatest need was to establish a satellite kidney center to handle patients from Niles and immediate surrounding areas.

Existing centers and hospitals are already taxed for space and a satellite center would provide the greatest benefit to the patient. As a result a Kidney Satellite Center will be opened very shortly at 368 Lawrencewood Shopping Center.

This center will be under medical supervision by 3 local doc-

tors, and it will be operated by qualified nurses and technicians. Space rental, special plumbing, purchase of reclining chairs, beds and incidental support equipment will be funded out of the original Niles Days request. After a 2 year period it is anticipated that the center will become self supporting by available medical insurance reimbursement and state funds. This will result in a very significant (approximately 85%) saving to the patient served by the center. Dialysis is the only source of life that a person with damaged or diseased kidneys has. There is no cure except by a successful kidney transplant operation. This is the ultimate hope of all dialysis treatment patients that at some time a donor kidney will be made available for this operation. Meanwhile they must undergo dialysis treatment sessions (approximately 8 hours) once or twice a week.

The dialysis process is relatively simple. A small plastic tube called a cannula is implanted (usually in the wrist) with one tube connected to a vein and

another to an artery. Blood then flows out of the artery into the machine where it passes a cellophane type of filter which contains many microscopic holes. The waste particles are collected by the blood cells, pass through the filter, and are washed away by dialyzing fluid (usually ionized water). The purified blood is then routed back to the patients body through the vein. In an average 8 hour session the kidney machine removes one to three pounds of excess fluids and wastes that accumulate and could kill the patient. According to the National Kidney Foundation there are 4,700 persons on dialysis waiting for a transplant.

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

## H.S. Basketball






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

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St. John Lutheran's  
Outdoor Education Program

Under the direction of Frank Ahrens, the 7th and 8th grades of St. John Lutheran school of Niles have just returned from a week of Outdoor Education.

Although the concept of outdoor education is relatively new, its popularity among educators is increasing greatly due to the any valuable experiences derived from the program as well as the unlimited potential that such a program can offer.

A brief look at the St. John Lutheran program gives evidence of this fact. The 7th and 8th graders were at Walcamp, a camp operated by the Lutheran church-Missouri Synod and located one mile north of Kingston, Illinois, from Jan. 29 to Feb. 2.

During this time eight mini-courses of 2 1/2 hours in length were taught. Such courses included units in weather, soil and soil conservation, creative writing, survival, cooking, trees, animal life, and a trip to a cemetery to study life expectancy.

The activities of these units were many and varied. They included such things as using weather instruments to make their own weather predictions, to building a fire properly, to testing the acidity of the soil, to making plaster casts of animal tracks, to preparing a ham and pineapple shishkabob, to many other things.

In addition there were also many recreational activities. During the week, the group had a chance to try some archery, ice-skating, hiking, fishing, pool, ping-pong and many quiet games as well as group games.

That is a brief summary of activities in a week of outdoor

education, but it doesn't fully describe all of the benefits of an outdoor education program. It does point out the wide variety of learning activities, that are expected in a good educational program. However, it doesn't point out the opportunities in forming healthy attitudes towards man and his environment that the outdoor education program also offer.

Students come to appreciate one another more when they actually live with their friends for a week. They come to appreciate their families and other friends when they are away from them a week. They learn to appreciate the conveniences of home, the wonders of nature, and really get a chance to see (maybe for the first time) what ecology really means.

Outdoor Education — words to remember. A growing experiment in education that should help society grow.

### Smoking During Pregnancy Workshop

Latest research findings on the effects of smoking during pregnancy will be presented in a special workshop at Maine South High School in Park Ridge on Friday, March 2. This workshop for high school health educators will cover newly developed methods and materials in sex education and air pollution and will be sponsored by the Chicago Lung Association, the Illinois Superintendent of Public Instruction, Cook County Superintendent of Schools and Maine South High School.

In a report prepared for the workshop, Braddy explained that while the human placenta prevents many viruses and bacteria from reaching the unborn baby it does not filter out the effects of smoking. Nicotine and carbon monoxide enter the fetus through the bloodstream, he said.

As a result of mothers smoking, their babies will likely have: high concentrations of carbon monoxide in the blood, nicotine withdrawal symptoms during the first few months of life, symptoms of chronic intoxication from carbon monoxide, lower birth weight, diminished blood supply before birth due to the effects of nicotine with resulting impaired heart rates, blood pressure, inadequate oxygen supply and improper acid balance before birth.

Infant mortality is also significantly higher among the babies

of smiling mothers according to Braddy. He noted that women who smoke one to two packs a day during pregnancy have significantly more stillbirths than women who don't smoke, more babies of smoking mothers die within the first month of birth, smoking increases the risk of spontaneous abortion and premature birth, pregnant woman who smokes two packs a day blocks off 40% of the baby's oxygen, Braddy added.

Other presentations to be given at the teacher's workshop include: "Sex Education: The Importance of a Good Program" by Dr. Frank Hostader, professor of health education, Northwestern University; "V.D. You Got What?" by Dr. Don Klein, director, curriculum development, Educational Service Region of Cook County; and "Air Pollution: Why Should We Be Alarmed?" by Dr. Bertram W. Carnow, medical director, Chicago Lung Association.



the proposed expanded service. On Feb. 13, the Village Board decided it would handle the entire operation if the Park Board wanted it to do so.

In other actions, the Board dissolved the Citizens' Advisory Council because of the lack of participation from its members. Beusse said a 'Save Open Space Program' would probably replace it.

"Presently we have some new interest, so we can have some acceleration for this new program. We should have some definite plans in the next few weeks."

Commissioner Bill Keener said "We need this change to help stimulate thinking for the Fall referendum. We would like as much help as possible."

The Board has made to reductions in greens fees at the Tam Golf Course. Residents playing in the industrial leagues will pay \$2.75 as compared to last year's rate of \$3. Non-residents in the leagues will pay \$3, the same rate as last year. Rates for senior citizens who are non-residents was dropped from \$3 to \$2. This rate applies when playing Monday through Friday only, before 3 p.m. The rate for senior citizens who are residents remains at \$1.25.

A bid of \$18,130 by Oscar J. Berg was the lowest received by the Board for construction of a new bridge and new pump house at the golf course. All bids have been submitted to the District's architects and engineers for recommendations. The Board will receive the recommendations on Saturday and decide who will be awarded the contract. The target date for completion of the project is mid-April.

The Board also discussed a proposal to use the Ballard Sports complex basement as a teen center by the Niles Youth Commission. Beusse opposed the use of Ballard because "it's not centrally located, it's concrete walls are not conducive to music, it has no kitchen facilities and current programs could be disrupted."

John Hedges, assistant director said Ballard is the only place with enough room to handle a big turnout if one occurs. Beusse decided the Commission at this time should consider any other site except Ballard, perhaps Greennan Heights or Oakton Manor. The Board's meeting was preceded with a tribute from Beusse to the Niles Hockey League and its All-Star program. This past week in a state tournament in Pekin, the Niles Juveniles took first place, the Bantams second and the Midgets fourth.
