The Bugle, Thursday, February 22, 1973 Niles Days Funds to Purchase **Kidney Machines**

The 1972_Niles Days request for \$10,000 to purchase 3 dialysis (artificial kidney) machines has been modified to start up a kidney center here in Niles. Recent surveys by the Niles Days Committee indicated that it was cheaper to rent the machine, because of the constant changes made to improve the units. At this time it was also learned that state funds are available machine rental. As a refor sult of meetings and discussions with various hospitals and medical staffs engaged in operating kidney dialysis centers it was decided that the greatest need was to establish a satellite kidney center to handle patients from Niles and immediate surrounding areas.

Existing centers and hospitals are already taxed for space and a satellite center would provide the greatest benefit to the patient. As a result a Kidney Satellite Center will be opened very shortly at 368 Lawrencewood hopping Center.

This will result in a very significant (approximately 85%) saving to the patient served by the center. Dailysis is the only source of life that a person with damaged or diseased kidneys has. There is no cure except by a successful kidney transplant operation. This is the ultimate hope of all dialysis treatment patients that at some time a donor kidney will be made available for this operation. Meanwhile they must undergo dialysis treatment sessions (approximately 8 hours) once or twice a week.

The purified blood is then routed back to the patients body through the vein. In an average 8 hour session the kidney machine removes one to three pounds of excess fluids and wastes that accumulate and could kill the patient. According to the National Kidney Foundation there are 4,700 persons on dialysis waiting for a transplant.


Diving
