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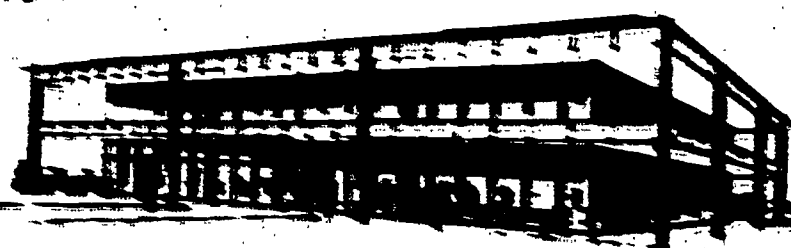
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## District 207 1973-74 School Calendar

Parents who must make long range plans for family vacations will be glad to know that school will not start for Maine high school students until after Labor Day next fall. The 1973-74 calendar approved by the District 207 Board is as follows:

Opening day of school for all students will be Wednesday, Sept. 5, two days after Labor Day.

Teachers are scheduled to attend an all-day Teachers' Institute on Tuesday, Sept. 4.

The official school calendar will include 185 days - 182 days of instruction, and 3 Institute Days. It will include 7 legal holidays and 13 school holidays. The legal holidays are Columbus Day, Thanksgiving, Christmas, New Year's Day, Lincoln's Birthday,

Good Friday and Memorial Day. The 1973-74 school year will end on June 14, 1974.

Thanksgiving will be celebrated on Nov. 22. There will be a school holiday the following day, Friday, Nov. 23.

Christmas vacation will begin at the close of school on Friday, Dec. 21, and continue until Thursday morning, Jan. 3. Spring vaca-

tion will consist of Good Friday, April 12, 1974, and the five school days following Easter Sunday, April 14. School will reopen on Monday, April 22, 1974.

Institute Days for teachers will be held on Tuesday, Sept. 4; Monday, Jan. 28, 1974, and Friday, March 1, 1974. There will be no classes for students on those days.

The District 207 calendar was developed by a committee made up of school officials from both the high school district and the elementary districts, student representatives, and representatives from the Maine Teachers' Association. While not identical in all instances, the high school calendar is coordinated with the calendars for the elementary districts in the area.

### Mid-Month Menderings . . .

Niles Mayor Blase, forever playing to the grandstand, proposed taking an Oak Park radio station into court, over what Blase believes is an obscene radio show. According to the news story Blase is concerned young people may be listening to the program which is aired between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m.

It's really all a lot of nonsense, since the main body of young people at home during these hours is under 5 years old. But even if all the young people in the area were home during these hours it seems a bit ludicrous Blase should be the keeper of what residents should or should not listen to.

During the first years of Blase's reign Niles police grabbed Henry Miller's Tropic of Cancer off the bookshelves in the village. We followed the American Civil Liberties Union took action, and the courts ruled immediately such action was illegal.

There's no need to give you the pitch about your civil rights since the argument has been banged away at continuously in recent years. Those who agree with us say, "Write On," and those who don't either don't give a damn, or don't understand the tenuous nature of the need for vigilance against such infringements.

What is always ironic about these cases is the gentlemen who try to apply their muscle. We commented last year Blase made an off color remark in a church in Evanston, which made his most loyal supporters cringe when he expressed it before an audience there. Here is a guy who has made hundreds of speeches before many audiences thru the past years. He has developed a style while in the meetings which can be described as glibness. But with such easy, free-going verbiage, there should always be a restraint, which we call "good taste." Unfortunately, hundreds and thousands of speeches can't reach this quality. Yet, he wants his taste to dictate to all of us what we should or should not listen to and read.

Is Niles going to have another indoor ice rink?

The Niles Park Board Tuesday night approved initiating an engineering study on the feasibility of constructing an additional outdoor rink at the Hallard Sports Complex.

Commissioner Bill Keener said the rink "will safeguard income to the park district if a possible failure occurs with the main rink. It would mean extra income and it will insure maintaining our present staff at Hallard, which could leave during the main rink's shutdown."

Park Director Helmut Dressler stated the actions show a response to the lobby of the people. He also added, "The taxpayer would not have to pay a single penny. The rink would be financed by revenue bonds."

The long dissident vote was called by Commissioner Jack Laake. "We've been in the construction phase for five years now," he said, "but we should reflect on what we've done and do more objective planning. More care should be given to maintaining park structures and facilities."

## LWV supports Equal Rights

The League of Women Voters  
of Morton Grove and Niles sup-  
ports the Equal Rights Amend-  
ment which states "Equality of  
rights under the law shall not be  
denied or abridged by the United  
States or by any State on account  
of sex." The League is not alone  
in advocating passage of the Equal  
Rights Amendment, others being  
Presidents Eisenhower, Kennedy,  
Johnson and Nixon, and the plat-  
forms of the major political  
parties, which have supported the  
Amendment.

The U.S. House of Representa-  
tives passed the Amendment by a  
vote of 354 to 23, Oct. 21, 1971,  
and the U.S. Senate approved it  
84 to 8, on March 22, 1972. In  
both cases, opponents tried to  
add qualifying language to limit  
the scope of the Amendment and  
were decisively defeated time and  
again. Illinois citizens voted  
overwhelmingly in favor of equal

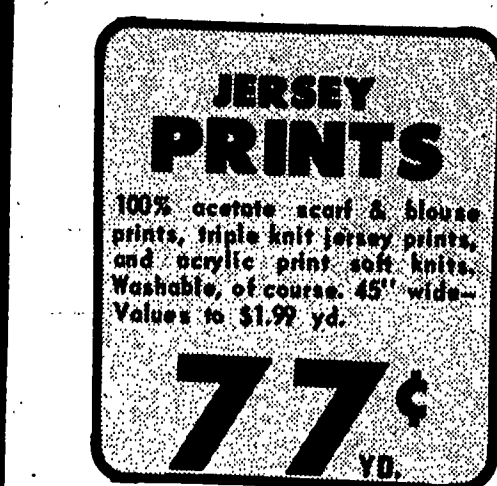
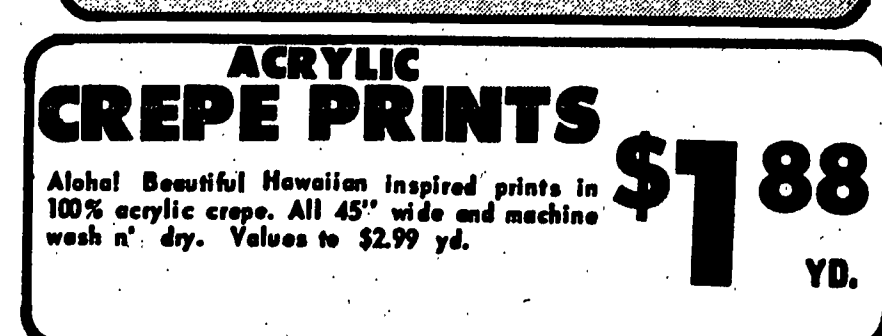
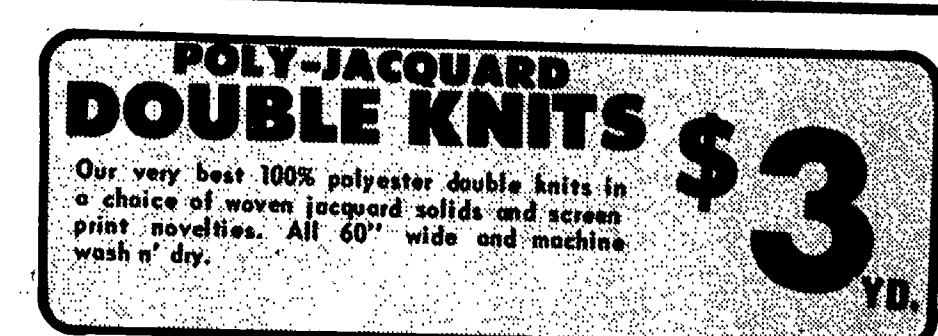
rights when they ratified our new  
state constitution in 1970. The  
Illinois Bill of Rights, Section  
18, contains an equal rights pro-  
vision that is stronger than the  
federal constitutional amendment  
now being considered because it  
extends to school districts and  
local governments. The fact that  
Illinois citizens are protected by  
their own constitution in no way  
lessens the importance of the fed-  
eral amendment which will insure  
that all citizens of all states will  
have the same assurance of equal  
rights. A vote against ratification  
of the Federal Equal Rights  
Amendment this session will be  
a vote against the wishes of Il-  
linois citizens. If the Equal Rights  
Amendment were to lead to all the  
frightening consequences pre-  
dicted by the anti-ERA forces,  
these consequences would have  
been evident in Illinois during  
the past 3 years. To assure pas-

sage of the Equal Rights Amend-  
ment, everyone is urged to write  
their legislators. Questions are

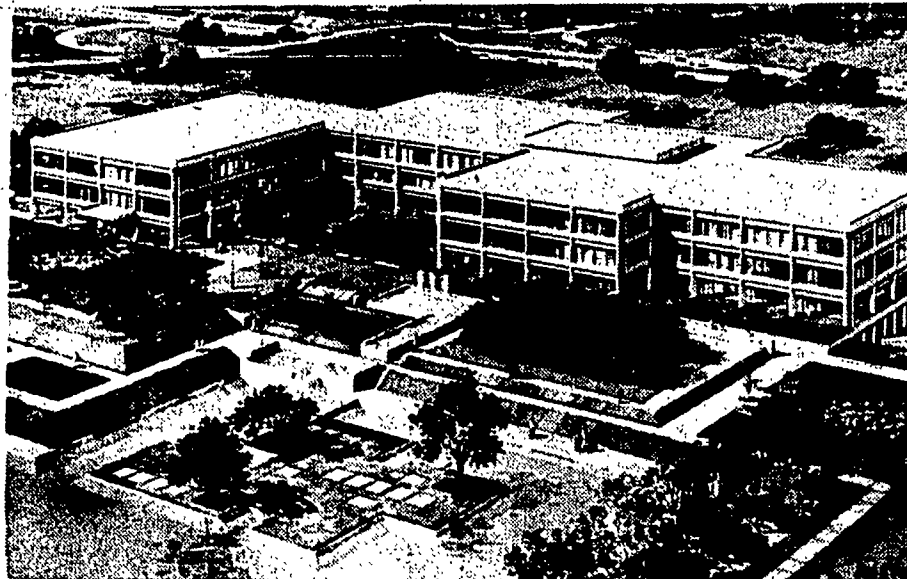

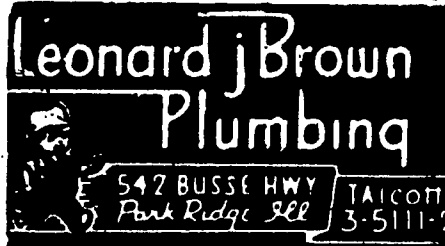

election. He is rightfully concerned by the apathy of the natives and he wonders if there really are any issues in the community.

While we haven't been paying too much attention what's going on down at the village store, nevertheless we could offer several issues which would bear consideration.

Even though we agree the utility tax is equitable still opposition forces could ask why Niles must tax its residents for utilities, while retaining a village property tax year after year. The village continuously receives increased amounts of sales tax refunds from the state (around 1.5 million dollars annually), and has received another bonanza with the returns from state income tax which is used in the village. If neighboring Morton Grove can get along without the utility tax, why must Niles continue to charge the taxes it does to its residents?

If I was running against the incumbents I would wonder if the \$5,000 used to finance their holiday in Hawaii last year indicates there's a great deal of money floating around the village.

A ticket opposing Blase would have to ask whether 3 terms in office is enough. There have been many abuses of the Mayor's office thru the years, many which are highly questionable. In his private practice the Mayor has used uniform police to represent him. And certainly, it must be deemed a fair question to ask how the Mayor could zoom from a \$20,000 home to a \$100,000 home in such a short time. Certainly, no other public official in this area has exploited the public office for private gain in any way comparable to Blase. In

his initial campaign he led the cry against public officials making money off their public offices. Yet, no official in Niles history could match the Mayor's take in taking advantage of this job.

I believe the annexation actions in Niles deserves closer scrutiny which could well be an issue. And the spending of \$80,000 for a fire truck which sat in the station for sometime for lack of personnel to man it questions the judgment of those involved.

A 60 year old businessman reported he was beaten up by a Niles policeman half his age in recent weeks. While Niles contends the businessman threw the first punch, which he denies, nevertheless, is pummeling an older man accepted practice down at the station?

The policemen involved in the arson case last year are still under suspicion. It seemed from here the village had an obligation to give these men lie detector tests to determine whether or not they should stay on the force. But Niles officials refused to do this, which seems abhorrent. If a law enforcement officer committed such an action it is the duty of the village officials to make sure these men are bone innocent. If they are not it places the entire community in jeopardy to have such men enforcing the laws they defy. We had the impression one of the policemen was "one of the boys" and the officials in the village family rallied around him. It seems an unbelievable action, and certainly would be an issue if there was alert opposition in this year's election.

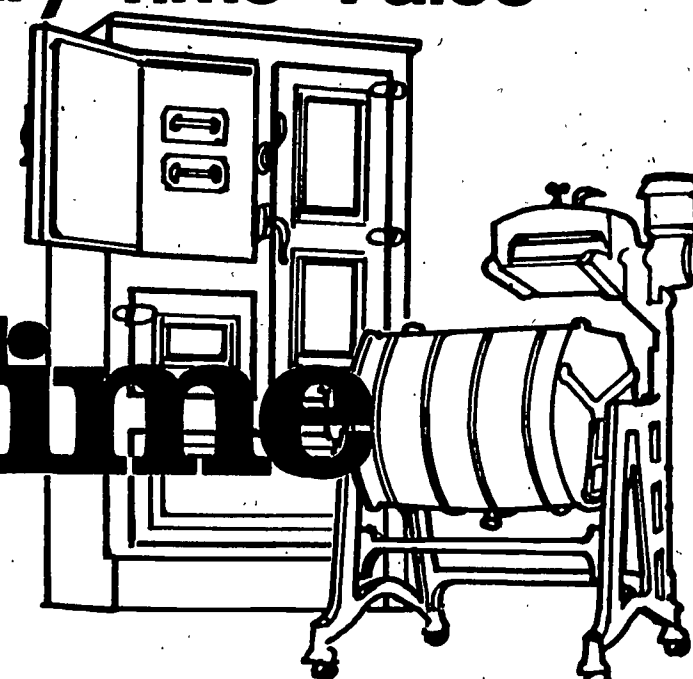
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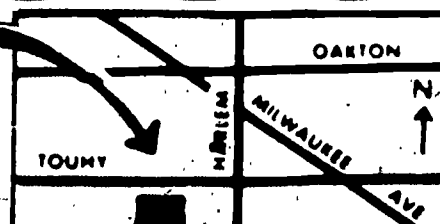

## Soviet defector to give concert

A Russian Jew who defected from the Soviet Union in 1969 will perform the cello in a special concert Sunday, March 25 to dramatize his continuing attempt to convince the Soviet government to free his mother, wife and 5-year-old son.

Victor Yoran, the 36-year-old cellist who staged a one-man protest concert in front of the Russian embassy in Washington, D.C. last week will perform at the Northwest Suburban Jewish Congregation, 7800 Lyons st., Morton Grove, Ill. His performance starts at 8 p.m.

Yoran decided to make the special appearance in Morton Grove after he learned that the Synagogue had "adopted" his wife Stella as its "sister" and makes phone calls to her in Moscow twice a month.

Now a resident of Israel, Yoran has been trying unsuccessfully to convince the U.S.S.R. to grant exit visas to his family for nearly

4 years. He has been touring Europe, performing in concerts and seeking help for his family from various government officials.

The Synagogue, through its Soviet Jewry Committee, began placing phone calls to Yoran's wife last year after receiving a list of persons who had expressed their desire to emigrate from the Soviet Union. Stella's name was picked at random.

There will be a nominal charge of 50¢ per adult for admission to the concert to help defray the cost of Yoran's travel expenses.

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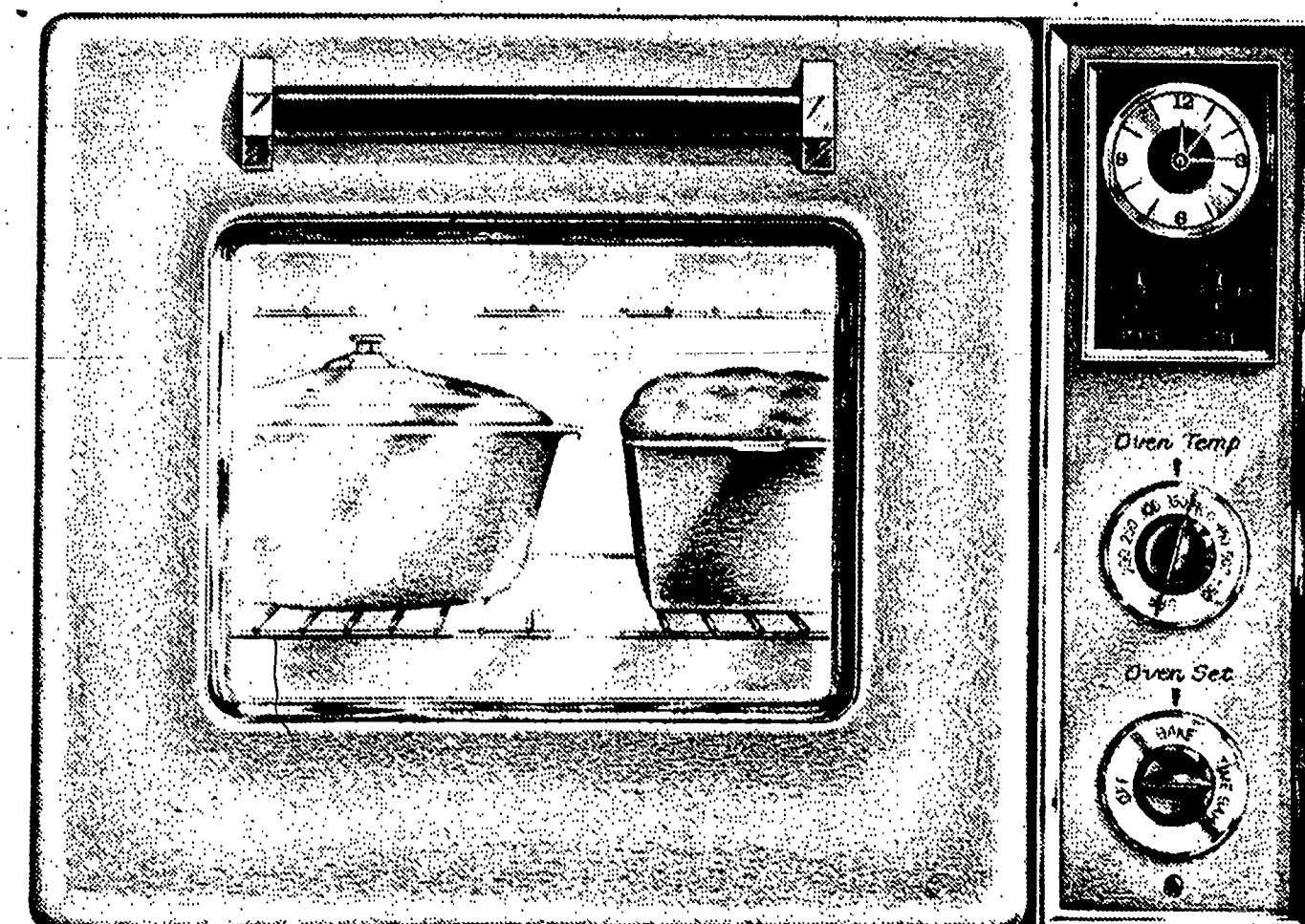

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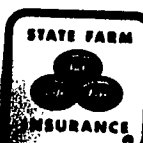

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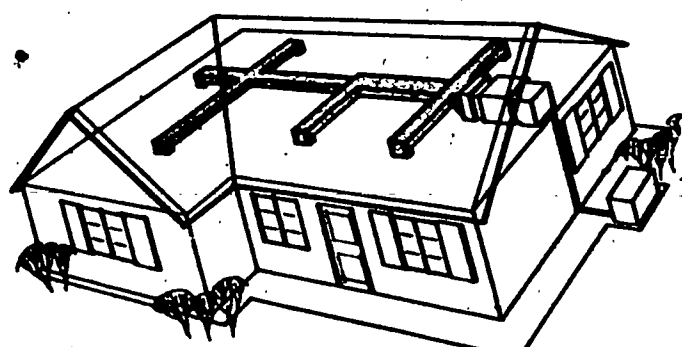

### One party election doesn't provide a true choice

Dear Editor:

As a resident of Niles for the last 10 months I have been duly impressed with the progressive atmosphere of the community in general and the vitality of its citizens in particular. However, of late, there has arisen a situation which I feel poses a present and very real threat to a continuance of that same progressiveness and vitality which has built Niles into a model community. That situation which warrants my concern is the lack of opposition to incumbent Nicholas Blase in the upcoming election.

Not only is Nicholas Blase running unopposed for the office of mayor, but his entire party, the New Era party, remains unchallenged for the 3 trustees positions and the office of village clerk. There can be but 2 reasons for the existence of the incredible situation. The first is that the candidates are so popular, so overwhelmingly strong, that opposition would be futile, if not ludicrous. Evidently, Mr. Blase and company must believe this to be true since the press reports that the New Era party, wishes to extend its thanks to the citizens of Niles for their support, the implication being that lack of opposition is proof of that support. Though I am a relatively new resident of this community and I cannot attest unqualifiedly to this popularity and/or strength, I find it difficult to believe that even one (and certainly not all 5) of the candidates is so universally well-liked and esteemed so as to warrant a free ride to the public office. The alternative reason for this lack of opposition concerns voter apathy. Is it possible that no one is interested in running for public office anymore, or that the public no longer cares who controls the forces of local government? I hope not.

It is necessary that we have opposition candidates for the office of mayor as well as for the lesser elective offices. Our entire democratic system is based on the hypothesis that the will of the majority as depicted by the vote of the individual is determinative of who indeed shall govern our future. Of what value is this vote when it can be exercised in only a single direction, for a single candidate, or not at all? Was such intended by the learned drawers of our constitution? Was such intended by the pioneers of women's suffrage? And more recently yet was that the intent of those who campaigned so vigorously for the 18 year old? Again, I hope not.

Fortunately there is a solution, though it is of limited utility. The law provides that every ballot must contain a space for a write-in candidate. Unless a bona fide candidate emerges before the April 17 election, this law would provide no relief to alleviate this distressing situation. A legitimate write-in candidate, one who cares about preserving the backbone of our political system, would give us our choice, and thus lend real strength to our vote. I would undertake this task myself but unfortunately I am handicapped by inexperience with regard to local government administration.

Therefore I call upon some concerned citizen or citizens to provide that opposition which forms the foundation of American politics. Some concerned citizen must emerge as a serious candidate so that the voter may exercise a true vote on April 17. This demand is meant as no reflection on the qualifications, or their absence, of Nicholas Blase

and the New Era party to hold their public office. Indeed, if they are as qualified and as popular as they represent, the emergence of a bona fide write-in candidate would only serve to drive more voters to the polls to show their support of the present administration.

Furthermore, I call upon this newspaper to publish, before election day, one or more articles detailing the correct ballot procedures for indicating the choice of a write-in candidate. Such publication may help initiate affirmative action on the part of some individual or individuals, thus providing a true choice of candidates for the voters on election day, April 17.

The smoking issue at the Matine schools is now settled and closed. However, the controversies revealed that everyone needs to look at the problems and issues of the District schools rationally and intelligently.

The extreme amount of emotionalism exhibited on all sides during this issue is proof that there is a gap somewhere that needs to be bridged.

For example, at the Feb. 19 meeting of the School Board, member William Bocek commented on the issue, "We had better not give in on this one (smoking issue) like we did on the dress code." (Reported in the Feb. 22 issue of the Park Ridge Herald.) Actually, the dress code controversy was decided by the courts, and not "given in" by the School Board.

On the other hand, the students have tried pressure tactics and violations of the rules. Little is gained. At times we tend to view the administration as "the enemy," as they apparently view us.

For example, Mr. Louis Grazien replied to Michael Bartos' request to investigate a ban on all smoking for everyone on school property, "I can't tell adults what they can do. Students, yes, but not adults." The students have asked for a ban on all smoking in the schools, based on the reasoning that smoking is as detrimental for a forty-year-old as a 17 year old. This would be fair and equitable.

The recent sit-down at South got people involved. But it seems that it usually takes walk-outs and sit-downs for the students to get people involved.

What I'm proposing then is that the students and parents get together and discuss the issues and problems of the District schools openly and rationally. The times are a-changing. With change comes many problems, but ignoring the problems will never solve them; it will only make them worse. It takes courage to face the realities of change. Smug complacency, or disdain, on anyone's part, is foolish ignorance, and ignorance only leads to misunderstanding.

The time has come to work together. What we need now is for everyone to get involved in the school processes in a constructive manner. Let's set up parent-student committees at the four schools and work with the Board and the Superintendent, in an attempt to deal with the numerous and varied problems in the District. Remember, we all have to understand and care.

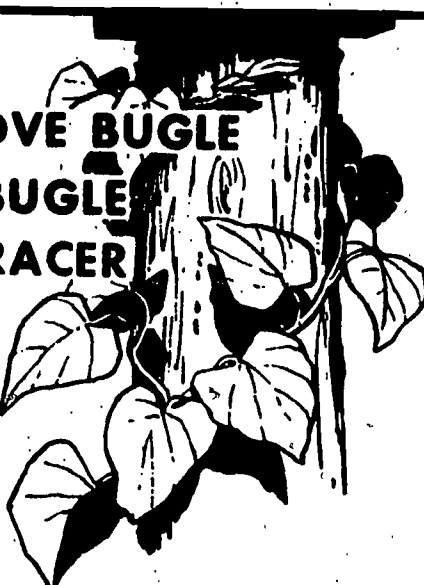

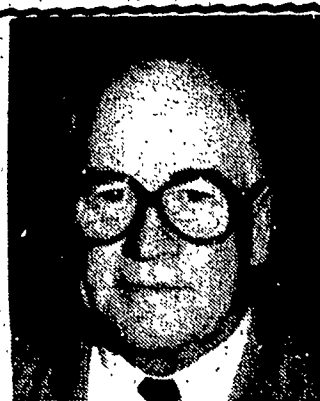

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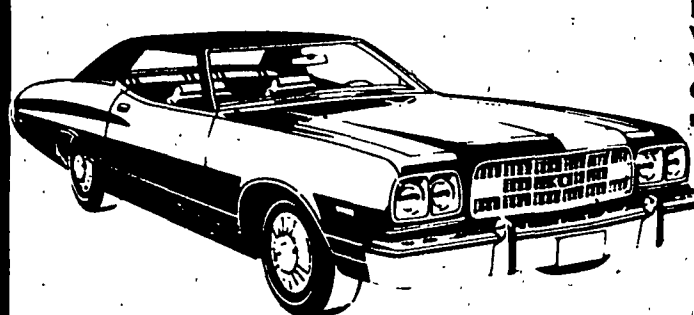
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## Notre Dame Fencers win State Title

### What Is Obscenity?

Dear Mr. Besser:

Sometimes I feel like a voice crying out in the wilderness, but I will continue to exercise my rational faculties trying to filter out prejudice and its corollary, fear, and let my opinion be heard.

I am very uncomfortable living in a community in which the moral climate is reactionary, self-righteous, and hypocritical. I had thought the pernicious idea of government censorship had been laid to rest sometime ago. But it seems that Niles has decided to join the Nixon bandwagon, the Mayor Daley bandwagon (re: movie censorship) and all the forces which are conspiring to deprive me and my family of our freedom to make our own judgments in the free marketplace of ideas.

I would like to quote from a classic work by John Milton called *Aeropagica* written in 1644, on the subject of censorship. The Great Books foundation considers it an enduring work, most applicable to this year 1973, and even to our "children."

1. "Read any books whatever come to thy hands, for thou art sufficient both to judge aright, and to examine each matter."

2. "To the pure, all things are pure; not only meats and drinks, but all kinds of knowledge whether of good or evil; the knowledge cannot defile, not consequently the books, if the will and conscience be not defiled."

3. "Bad meats will scarce breed good nourishment in the healthiest concoction, but here in the difference is of bad books, that they serve in many respects to discover, to confute, to forwarn and to illustrate."

4. "God trust him (man) with the gift of reason to be his own chooser."

5. "He that can apprehend and consider vice with all her baits and seeming pleasures, and yet abstain, and yet distinguish, and yet prefer that which is truly better, he is the true Christian."

6. "The state shall be my governors, but not my critics; they may be mistaken in the choice of a licenser, as easily as this licenser may be mistaken in an author."

7. "... and a forbidden writing is thought to be a certain spark of truth that flies up in the faces of them that seek to tread it out."

8. "How many other things might be tolerated in peace, and left to conscience, had we but charity, and were it not the chief stronghold of our hypocrisy to be ever judging one another?"

My questions to you are: 1. Who are to be the censors? What are their criteria? Don't forget the Supreme Court has been struggling with the legal definition of obscenity for years and must rule on each case individually.

2. How can we possibly interrupt the airwaves which indeed mirror our contemporary approach to life? Some would say we are afraid of Truth of our world as we've made it.

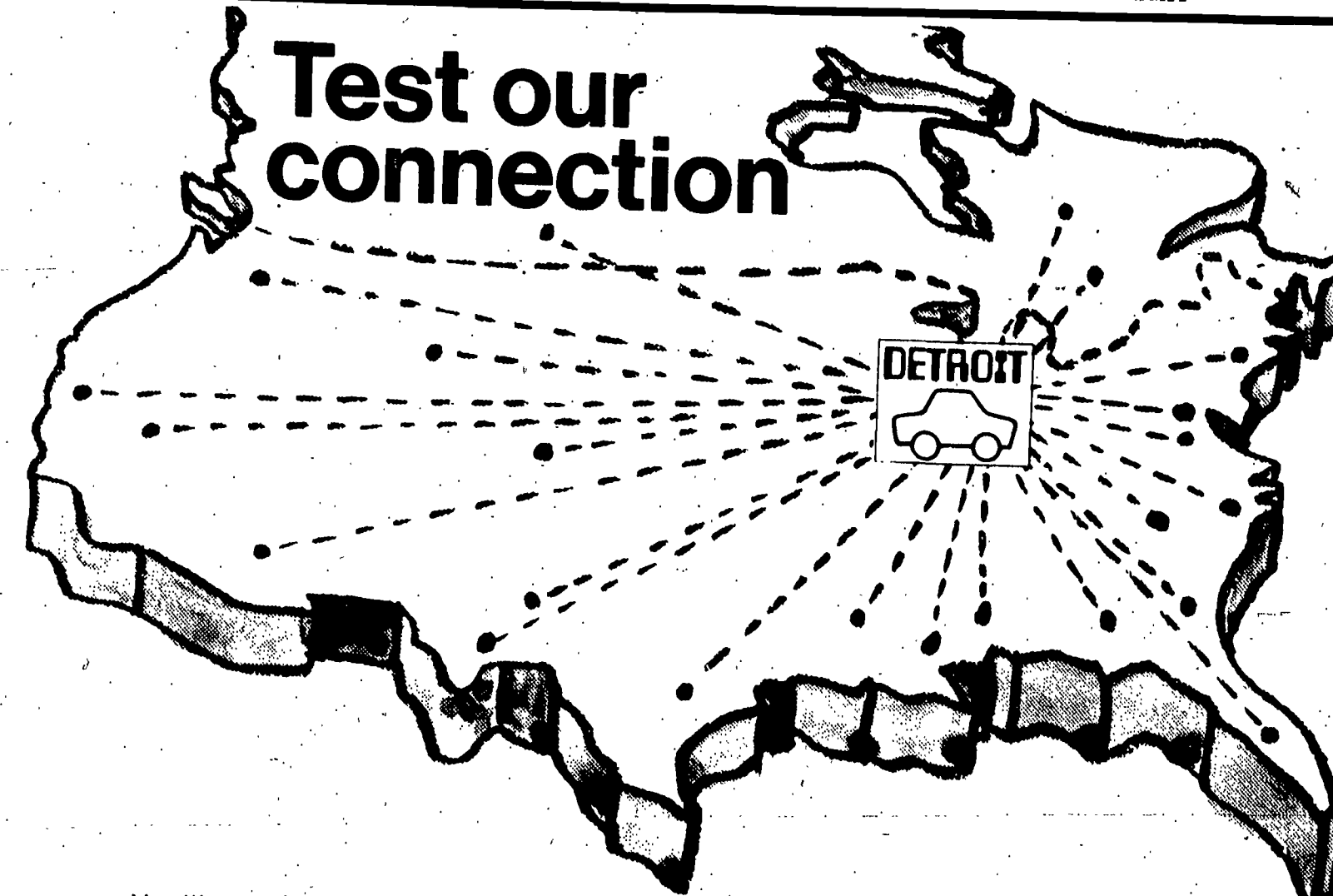

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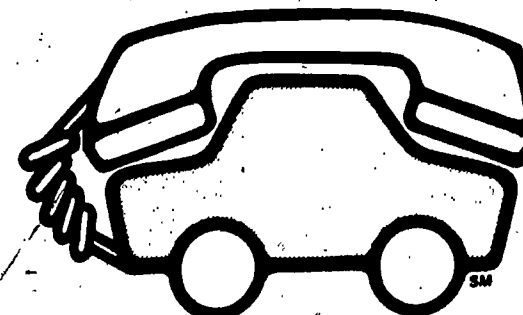

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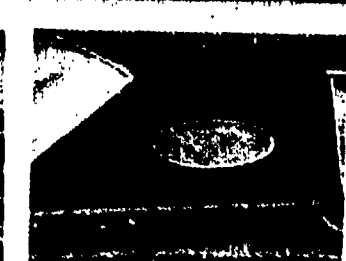

ides, I feel we owe the "little people" something."

Leske went on to say the district has been progressive enough to now take some time to look things over. He believes the Board should be concerned with preparing itself with the Fall referendum.

Keener added "the proposed rinks at Tam O'Shanter and in Skokie will certainly not hinder any future developments of an additional rink."

Board President Walt Bousse announced the Ballard rink will be closed for its three month shutdown on May 6th. This will be immediately after the ice show to be held that weekend.

Dressler said within a week after the shutdown, facilities will be set up for roller skating. A roller skating program similar to last year's will be instituted at this time.

There will be specific programs for children from the following educational areas: trainable mentally handicapped, educable mentally handicapped, learning disabilities and emotional disturbances. Eighty per cent of the camp's staff will be certified teachers with an additional strong corps of volunteers.

on June 26. The fee is \$30, with scholarships for those who need them. "Our rate is the lowest in the country," Reiner said.

Four camp sites have been selected, one each in Skokie, Morton Grove, Des Plaines and Park Ridge. School districts will provide transportation.
