visit. It features a large salad bar. Combining the buffet help-yourself salad and the huge bowl of soup, which is a house specialty, is about all you can eat.

If you're an old 16 inch softball player you should head for Chicago's Kelly Park, 4150 S. California, where the best teams in Chicago play on Tuesday & Thursday nights. The Sobies and the Bobcats have been national champions year after year and they're playing weekly. More important, you'll be seeing guys in their late 40's and early 50's still playing better ball than many of their teammates half their ages. There's a pitcher 59 years old who's a legend in Chicago softball circles, still pitching several nights a week in Chicagoland. They also play Sunday mornings at Kennedy Park at 113th and Western.

If you're in a downtown mood, take the Northwestern train and ride the boat up the Chicago River to Michigan Ave. On a warm sunny day it makes it double your pleasure to boat in the shadows of the Wrigley building and its many neighbors.

If you head for the Art Institute there's a very fine outside summer restaurant you can enjoy. If I can break my rule briefly, a walk on north Michigan will take you to Jacques (900 N.), a fine expensive French restaurant with a lovely dining room. In the same area the Magic Pan on Walton serves great crepes, strictly a lady's luncheon spot, with a pleasant garden atmosphere indoors.

Reputed to be one of the 3 or 4 truly fine restaurants in Chicago is Berghoffs on Adams st. And again, you don't have to be German to enjoy the great food. A tall stein of dark cold beer and a kalter aufschnitt lunch or dinner makes a day in the loop worthwhile. Berghoff's has perhaps the most professional waiters in Chicagoland, who make this experience most pleasurable. This restaurant is now the lone Berghoff's. We used to stop for supper at Berghoff's on Wabash, but the falling off of their evening business forced its closing last month.

Good waiters often make a dinner experience memorable. Long one of our favorite restaurants, located behind the Sun-Times building, is the Corona. While the Italian dishes are great, the very relaxed atmosphere, with great service, is our ideal for a good restaurant.

Summertime is also the time for theatre. Last night the Chicago Symphony performed at Ravinia, and this fine evening included bringing a supper basket and enjoying a meal on the Ravinia greens. You can enjoy the music, see some very fancy eating and drinking, as the natives eat their gourmet foods washed down by fine wines, picnic-style on the Ravinia lawns.

In late September we remind you to head for the apple farms on Rand rd, for an apple pickin' afternoon in the Wauconda area. In August we suggest you take your blueberry pickin' self to the farms in Michigan, some 75 miles away. And this time of the year you should head for Bristol, Wisconsin, where an afternoon of strawoickin' is a great way to spend an afternoon. Take I-94 to Wisconsin Highway 50, 1 1/2 miles west of I-94 in Kenosha County, which is 5 miles north if the state line. There you'll find Thompson's Fallbrook Farm where you can pick to your stomach's content for 35¢ a pound.

"Phase II of the building is pro-ceeding on schedule, and by fall, the entire plant, including a multi-level parking facility, will have been completed. At that time, we will have the most complete, as well as one of the largest, banking facilities in the entire north suburban area."

However, the new building is only one of many recent accomplishments at First National Bank of Skokie. A number of new and improved services were also introduced.
