New eligibility standards

District 207's free lunch program

Because of higher food costs at the wholesale level, the price of Type A lunch for Maine Township high school students has been raised to 85¢ for the current school year -- a 5¢ increase over last year's cost.

A policy to provide free lunches to those high school students whose families cannot afford to pay the price of the meal has been developed by Maine Township High School District 207 in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Department of School Food Services. All children are treated the same in the Child Federal Lunch Program regardless of their ability to pay for their lunches. In the operation of the Child Federal Lunch Program no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color or natural origin.

These determinations are based on national guidelines used in participating schools throughout the United States and prescribed by the Secretary of Agriculture. In addition, consideration will be given to any unusual circumstances, such as family illness, unexpected expenses due to fire or similar disaster, seasonal unemployment, and similar emergency situations.

A letter giving information about the school district's free lunch policy has been sent to parents of all Maine high school students, along with an application form and information regarding procedures for application. Parents who believe that their children may qualify for free lunches are urged to fill out the application blank and return it to their child's school. Such applications will be reviewed within ten days and the family notified in writing of the decision made. Information provided on the application will be held in the strictest confidence, and the anonymity of each student receiving a free lunch shall be insured.

Those who qualify will be served a well-balanced, Type A lunch, consisting of meat or an alternate protein-rich food, a serving of 2 or more fruits and vegetables, bread, butter and milk. Planned to provide from one-third to one-half of the nutritional needs of school children, the meal will be identical to that served to paying students who will be charged 85¢ daily for the lunch.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size and income scale to assist them in determining eligibility.

Families falling within these scales or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships are urged to apply for free or reduced price lunches for their children. They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. The form itself is simple to complete and requests information needed to determine economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family and any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school lunches. There shall be no discrimination against any child eligible for free lunch because of sex, race, color, origin or nationality.

reick, Police Chief Norman Glauner, Fire Chief Christ Hildebrandt, Administrator Fred Huber, Wayne Adams & Supt. of Public Works, Jim Dahm, Both School Districts 67 & 219 and the Village of Niles have expressed their concern over the traffic problems at the corners of Sherman & Dempster and Mayor Blase of Niles has asked Morton Grove for its support in persuading the state to install traffic signals at this hazardous intersection. A letter will be sent to Mayor Blase informing him of Morton Grove's decision to cooperate fully on this matter. A group of citizens was present to complain about traffic problems on Oak & Greenwood and also down Elmfield, especially during the hours of 5:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. The committee agreed to study the problem and attempt to reach a solution. Mrs. Dick, Principal of Melzer School, asked the board if it would be possible to block off traffic around the school when and where parents come to drop off or pick up their children. There is an especially big problem during rainy weather, Mrs. Dick asked if barriers can Cohen answered, "I don't see why not. Just so long as they are taken down when not needed". He also suggested the public works department might supply the horses to be used. Jim Dahm, Supt. of Public Works said that it would be advisable to post STREET CLOSED DURING SCHOOL HOURS signs, and the committee agreed.

We've Been There Before Department

Niles village president and Maine Township Committeeman Nick Blase hosted a luncheon last Friday at the Millionaires Club for poor newspaper people. Obviously, since the guy was paying for the beef, he was also announcing he will run for a 3rd term as Maine Township committeeman.

After being engrossed in the Watergate brouha during the summer months, and being demoralized by the Agnew confession last week, we were hopeful some politician would give us some renewed faith in our political system. But listening to Blase answer questions, without any preparation, is the same old malarky. In discussing the Democratic Party he said Alderman Singer is too far to the left for him. When Lerner papers' Pat Fastin asked him to give examples of Singer's ultra-left views Blase sluffed the question. He went on to say he was more in the tradition of Abner Mikva and Tony Scarlano. Yet, if anyone can remember last year's fight for the battle between Blase and Mikva, the committeeman tried very hard to show he was far to the right of Mikva.

What Blase knows, and most newspaper people know as well, is the public has short memories, and really knows very little about the public business. The trick is to say most anything, but get elected. Once you're in office you're home free for the next 2 or 4 years.

In the wake of the Agnew imbroglio, how much more refreshing it would be to hear a politician like Blase tell it like it is. He could say, "Look, I enjoy being committeeman and that's why I'm running. I'm in a Republican area and no matter who wins this post he's not going to substantially change the make-up of the old line communities. I'm also a little guy in the Democratic Party, who has little chance of either going anywhere, or in making waves. Intellectually, I'm not in the same league with the Mikvas. And politically I'm small potatoes alongside the major domos in the Party. I can't attract the type of people Mikva attracts, and because of my political base I have little to offer the Party. I came into politics 13 years ago a young man making a living, and now 13 years later, I have become a wealthy man. I have built up a law practice exploiting my dual political roles... and that's what it's all about."

The newshens and newshawks would all drop their pencils if a Blase press conference was to bare these lines. But it would be much more refreshing. And the silliness of a guy with limited ability talking to people of limited abilities would not have such an aura of hokiness.

Hopefully, a new era might come out of the remains of the Agnew-Nixon difficulties. But not if local politicians like Blase continue to give out the same drivel they've been giving out during these past years.

Morton Grove Fire Fighters issue position statement

The following statement was issued by the Morton Grove Fire Fighters Local 2178 regarding the continuing dispute between the Village of Morton Grove and the Morton Grove Fire Fighters Union, Local 2178, IAFF AFL-CIO, CLC.

In June, 1972, the fire fighters of Morton Grove organized in to Local 2178, of the International Association of Fire Fighters, AFL-CIO, CLC. In December of the same year the local petitioned for formal recognition. It was denied on Jan. 14, 1973. In April of 1973, the local submitted a 2nd petition, it too was denied. In June the local submitted a 3rd petition for a secret ballot election to be conducted by the Illinois State Department of Labor to determine if local 2178 is the majority representative and should be the exclusive collective bargaining agent. This petition was denied in July. On July 12, 1973, a special meeting was held. The membership decided on three courses of action:

1. Circulate petitions in the Village for community support
2. Documentation of all grievances and to make these grievances public.
3. Elimination of all voluntary duties in violation of the 56 hour work week law. The grievances have been documented. They are as follows:
 - a. Grievances affecting safety and health.
 - a. The air compressor used to fill air mask tanks does not have adequate filters.
 - b. The para medics do not have continuous access to vital telemetry equipment.
 - c. The work environment is unsanitary and inadequate.
 1. The presence of rodents, insects, etc.
 2. Insufficient toilet and shower facilities.
 3. Inadequate eating area (food is prepared and eaten in the apparatus area).
 2. The department has violated the fire commissions rules against discrimination in promotions, access to salary increases and work assignments.
 3. The department has also violated the state's 56 hour week law.

Regarding the other grievances the local is prepared to negotiate a settlement if we were to receive

authorization from the village to have a supervised election by the Illinois Department of Labor, determining majority representation with collective bargaining rights.

Local 2178 requests the support of the citizens of Morton Grove in these issues. We also ask the support of the area firefighters and members of organized labor in the area.

Mediator

pin, one of the negotiators, who said "Both sides are under the gun. We'll meet anytime anyplace if we feel progress is being made. If we can't negotiate next Monday then we should invite a mediator into the meetings."

The negotiations began about one year ago. The major concern is not over salaries or financial fringe benefits, which were settled in a separate two-year contract last year. The main issues include reductions in staff, hours of employment, class size and avoidance of program cuts.

Dr. C. Allan Gogo, superintendent in District 63, implied Tuesday the number of people (teachers) to do the job in the district should be the prerogative of the school board since it must live within its budget and is answerable to the taxpayers.

Tuesday night's meeting, which lasted past midnight, had both sides using the term "impassable" as the point at which a mediator would be considered. School board members did not feel they had reached this point as of Tuesday, and preferred to have the Monday night meeting before agreeing to bring in a mediator. Board member Larry Reiss, a loner on end on the board, had proposed a mediator be used immediately, but had no support from other board members.

Former school board members Bill Gurolick and Sylvia McNair suggested a citizen committee be formed to sit in on these meetings, hopefully to act as a neutral in these confrontations. However, the board members individually noted they already had an advisory committee, and did not feel another group would aid in solving the dilemma. Mrs. McNair said, "There is a great polarization in the community and no one will win, only the children will

lose if the present course continues". She said the committee she proposed would act in good faith and try to offer constructive ideas to settle the problem. While the predominately partisan teacher audience applauded, the board turned down the suggestion.

An education administrator from Deerfield, and parent of students there, contended the quality of education at the school "has sunk" as the increased teacher load has raised the size of the average classroom.

Principal Lumm read figures which showed some classes there are now about 30 students but many classes, mostly with slower students, are as low as 12 students.

This rather arbitrary question of quality of the schools seemed to be at the center of the problem.

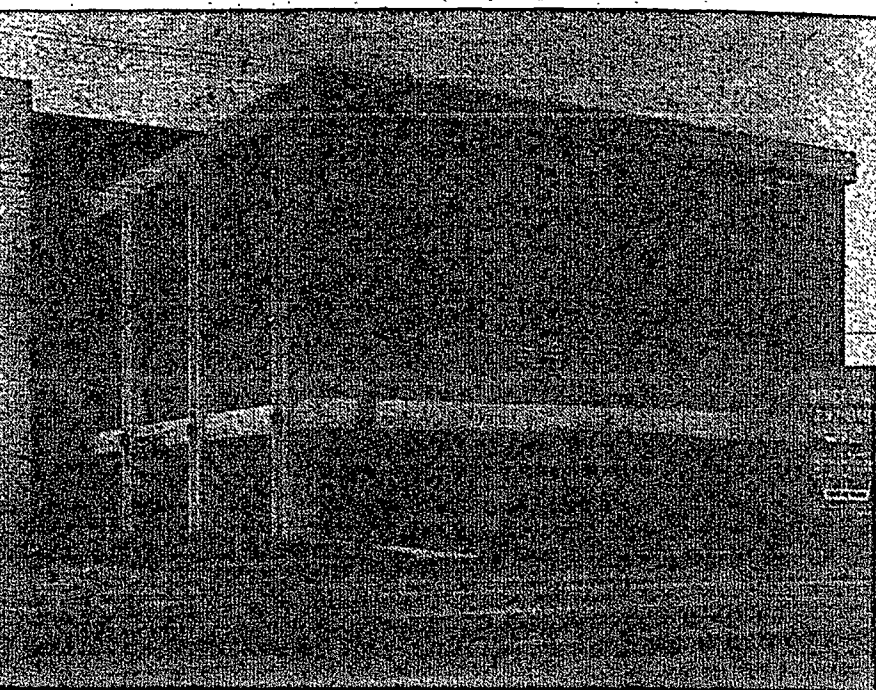
In the 4 hour meeting board president Irene Luck asked the Association members several times if the strike threat could be rescinded indicating the board resented working under this threat. But negotiator and teacher Ken Howenstein read the resolution the 250 teacher Association approved which gives the negotiators the authority to strike if they feel such an effort is necessary.

While the board was taken to task by audience members for using taxpayers money in "propagandizing" its constituents, and for the poor communications in the district, Dr. Gogo told The Bugle the parents neither understand the workings of the district and are unaware of the problems confronting the school board. He cited while there are now 1,200 less children in the district then in the past, the tremendous amount of state aid lost by the decrease has caused the board to tighten up its operation. He said the decrease means less money is now available to run the district, requiring the necessary staff cuts. To receive more revenue would require a tax increase which he said he's sure would not sit well with the very same parents who do not understand this conflict.

Resident Frank Kahn, who has been involved in school activities in the district for many years told the board he has never seen board members "so nervous" implying they are exceedingly uptight over this matter. Kahn's observation was most accurate since the board members' voices seemed to crack with emotion on several occasions despite their desire to avoid adding to the inflammatory tone of the emotion-packed audience. Teachers, comprising over 100 persons at the meeting were equally emotional. O'Neill the Association president, said he would have to have another member speak since he was too upset to pronounce a statement at one point in the meeting.

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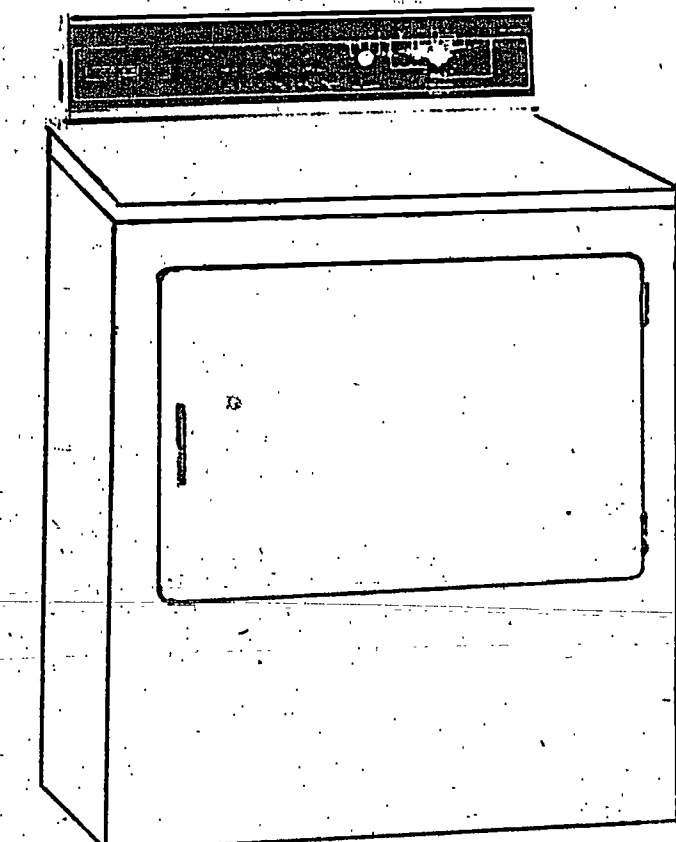
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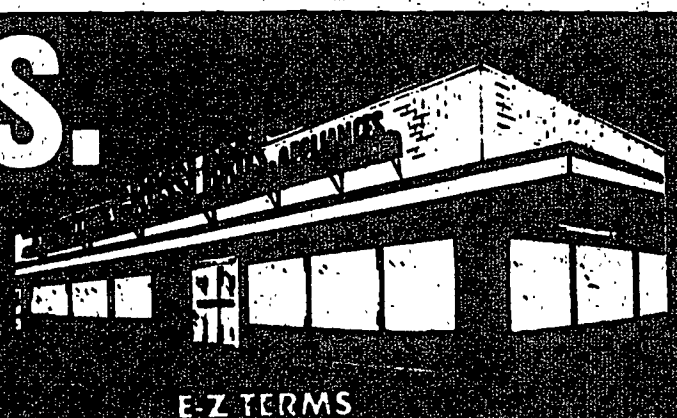
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
