

Niles residents will vote Sat-urday, Nov. 17 on a \$2,715,000 trips over enough screets in each referendum to buy 48 acres of precinct to provide easy access park land and to improve 13 existing and potential parks. Niles Park District director Helmut Dressler said \$840,000 would be used toward the purchase of the 9-hole Tam O'Shanter golf course which the district now leases.

The district's option to buy the 36.5 acre golf course at Ho-ward and Caldwell in Niles will run out next year.

Dressler said the remainder of the bond money would be used to buy five smaller parcels of land for \$1.3 million to improve park facilities and for administrative and legal costs.

Village Manager Kenneth Scheel said the new rates will go into effect in the December billing. However, those billed in December will have their bills calculated at two-thirds the old rate and one-third the new rate or 71 cents per 1,000 gallons. 
The price of water in Niles is going up beginning Dec. 1. The village board voted Tues-

day night to increase the price of water to homes and businesses from 65 cents per 1,000 gallons to 84 cents per 1,000 gallons. Churches and schools, which are now charged 55 cents per 1,000 gallons, will be paying 74 cents.

The increase was prompted primarily by a recent like in the rate the City of Chicago charges suburbs for their water. Increased costs in running the water department were also taken into consideration.

The move by Chicago to increase the water rates drew sharp criticism by Mayor Blase. He said none of the 72 communities had been consulted before the increase was announced.

"Chicago must sell water to us under the law," Blase said. "so we should be considered partners not customers." He said Niles has initiated a meeting between the 72 communities served by the Chicago Water District and the head of that department for the end of November, in hopes of resolving this problem for the future.

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At the meeting. Blase recommended that Bondi and the committee remain at least until January — the dead-line for forming a community college district.



The candidates came out of the political woodwork announcing their quests for jobs in Niles Township, Springfield and Washington. Cal Sutker vowed his affections for the Democratic Party last week with his announcement he would seek the head job as township committeeman. And then Oakton trustee Tom Flynn hosted a coffee and donut breakfast and said he would run for the third time in recent months, this time seeking the Democratic seat in the state house of representatives. Tom coined the word 'Schlickminism' in denigrating Republican Gene Schlickman, who he believes should be ousted from his job in the state house. Meanwhile, Congressman Sam Young held a dinner Thursday night in which he referred to himself as the "underdog" in his race next year against Ab Mikva, who Young beat by 7,000 votes in 1972.
