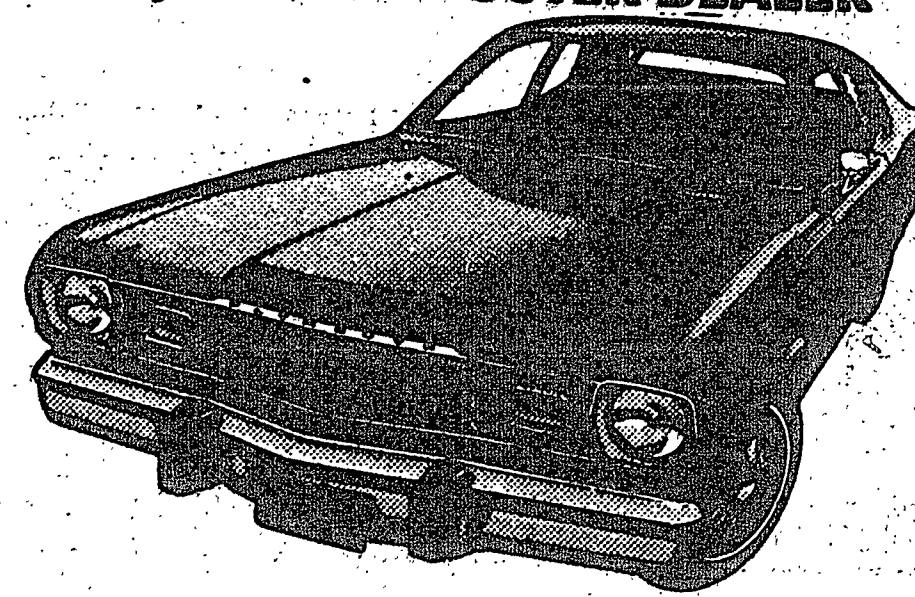

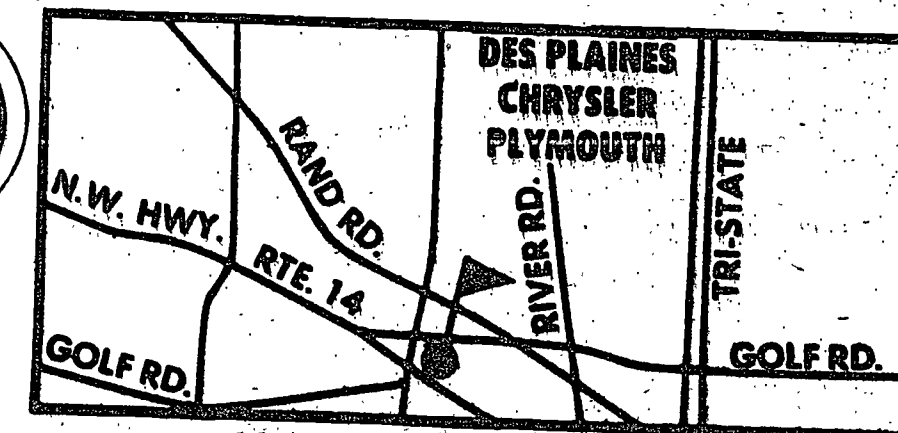

Public hearing on permanent Oakton site Feb. 6

A public hearing on the two proposed sites for a permanent campus for Oakton Community College will be held on Wednesday, Feb. 6, in Building 6 on the Interim Campus, Oakton and Nagle, in Morton Grove, at 7:30 p.m.

Anyone wishing to make public statements regarding either site is requested to write the Office of the President of Oakton Community College or telephone his office (967-5120, ext. 381) in advance.

The QCC Board of Trustees designated two alternative sites for a permanent campus for the college: (1) an enlarged site at the location of the interim campus, (2) a large undeveloped site on the Des Plaines River between Central and Golf rds.

The present interim site, located in an area zoned for light industry and manufacturing, consists of five leased industrial buildings on a nine-acre site. Recently the college purchased 2 1/2 acres adjacent to this site

for a parking lot. The site would be further enlarged by acquisition of additional adjacent property to form an enlarged site of about 23 acres for a permanent campus.

The Des Plaines River site would be bounded on the west by the Des Plaines River and on the east by Forest Preserve property. A site totaling 170 acres is proposed, with frontage on both Golf rd. and Central rd. for access to the campus.

Comparative analysis of the two

sites has been submitted to the Board of Trustees by business manager David Hiquist. It incorporates data from reports prepared by Neil King, Armond D. King, Inc., real estate consultant, Brian C. Johnson, Barton-Aschman Associates, Inc., Traffic Engineering Consultant, and Mori Hartman, Perkins and Will, architect.

The study made the following points about the Des Plaines River site:

1. The 170 acre site is mostly

wooded with 20 acres open meadow and 23 acres formed by former garbage dump. This large site would give the college long-range expansion potential for building, athletics, and parking.

2. Property is presently tax-exempt and owned by agencies of the Catholic Church who are reported willing to sell.

3. Cost of land and site improvements per acre is estimated at about \$37,100. This would include flood plain development and

From the LEFT HAND

At a meeting last Thursday night the ad hoc site committee voted 5 to 4 to recommend the Des Plaines River-Central Road site for Oakton College.

While the committee's report is not binding the recommendation will be acted upon at the February 19 college board meeting.

The most vociferous opposition to the Des Plaines site came from 2 Skokie ad hoc members. It's their contention since 60% of the student body now comes from the east end of the college district a more central location should be favored. The alternative to the Des Plaines site, the present industrial area complex, while not a favorite of anyone, still seems more suitable to this minority opposition.

Figures presented by the Barton-Aschman Traffic Engineers shows the average mileage traveled to the present industrial site is 3.46 miles as compared to 5.33 miles for the Des Plaines location. Driving time averages 13.03 minutes to the present interim site compared to 15.32 minutes to the Des Plaines site.

Aside from the above time and figures the evidence presented Thursday heavily is weighted in favor of the Des Plaines supporters.

The Des Plaines site has 170 acres compared to the present 23 acre site. 140 acres in Des Plaines is wooded, 20 acres is open meadow, formerly used as a garbage dump. The interim 23 acre site includes 10 acres of open meadow, 1.5 acres of residences on Caldwell and 12 acres including 7 buildings and parking lots.

The present interim site has a \$120,000 tax roll base while the 170 acre area, owned by the Catholic Church, is presently tax exempt.

While the Des Plaines area has a receptive seller the owners of the interim site are not prone to selling their properties.

Morton Grove's village board has openly opposed the college being located at its present site while it is undetermined as to local government attitudes for the Des Plaines site.

Topographically, the interim site is relatively flat. The Des Plaines area includes 147 acres, which is partly in

Village issues policy regarding 'Vegas Nites'

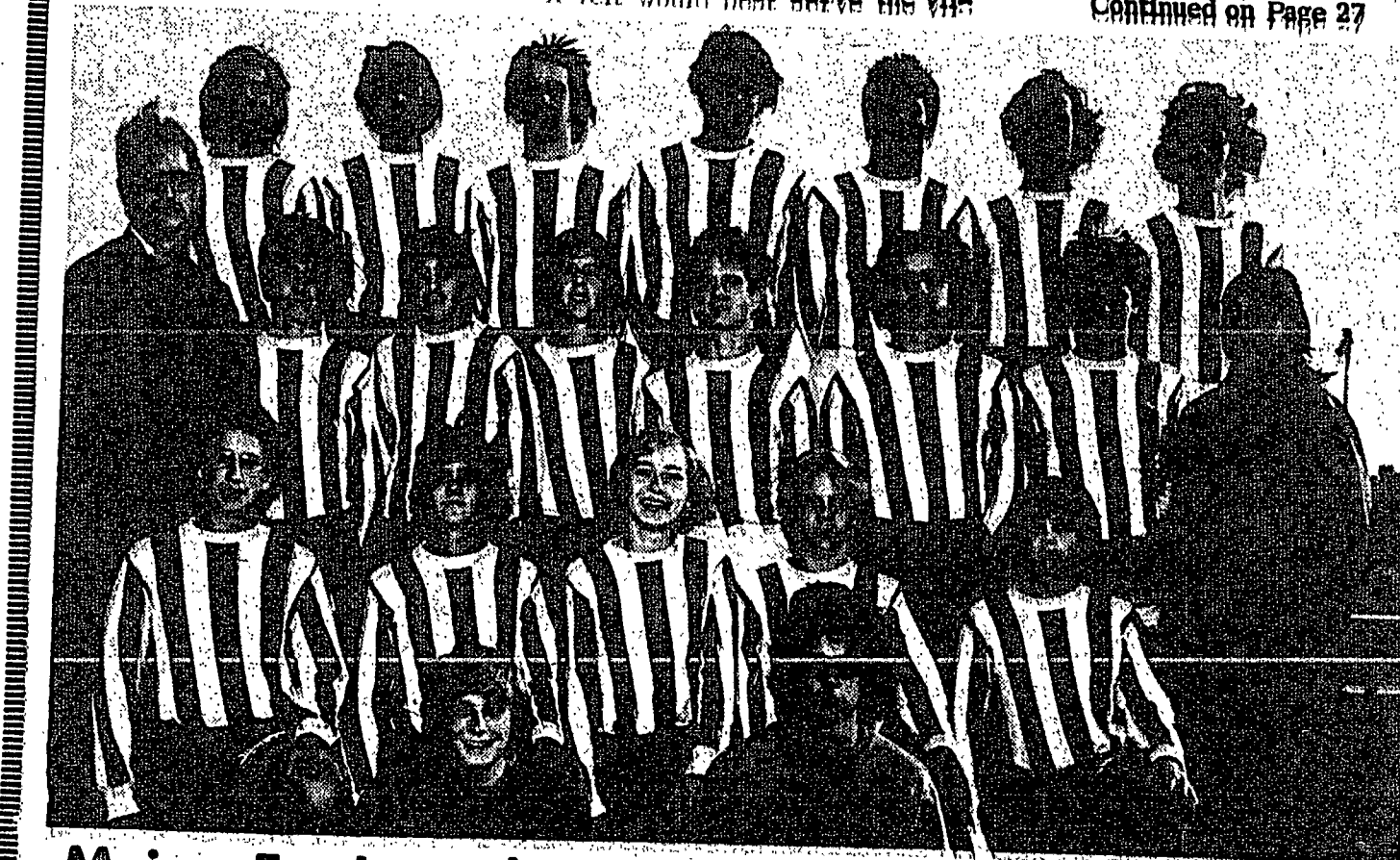
RECOMMENDED AGENCY LOSES VILLAGE'S INSURANCE

In a 4 to 2 vote at Tuesday night's village board meeting Niles trustees approved the low bidder for the village's insurance business, despite a recommendation by its own consultants the village retain its present company.

The Mel Jacobs Insurance Agency, 7132 N. Harlem, bid \$51,496 for the village's insurance business and was awarded the year's insurance business. Niles former agents, the Haines Craft Agency, serviced the village for about 7 years, and entered a bid of \$53,231. However, Stewart and Associates, a consulting firm, was hired to review Niles insurance needs, and recommended a company which it felt would best serve the vil-

lage. But despite its study and recommendation the split 4 to 2 vote favored the Jacobs Company. Trustee Pete Pasole told The Bugle he favored the low bid nothing anytime he could save the village money he would vote accordingly. But Tr. Ang Marchese, himself an insurance agent, said the difference in bids were minimal and it was likely after adjustments in rates the bids would be about the same. Marchese noted the Haines Company had served the village well, defending his reason for opposing the new company. Trustee Keith Peck stated similar reasons noting Haines had provided good service in the past. In other actions, trustees ap-

Cook County candidates

Eleven candidates for Cook County office, including a president of the Cook County Board, are scheduled to appear at the Cook County Regular Republican Organization at its January meeting. The candidates constitute "a truly balanced, highly-qualified slate," according to Township Committeemen Floyd T. Fulle who made the introductions.

The balance, Fulle stated, lies in the fact that both city and suburbs, men and women, whites and blacks are represented on the Republican ticket, in contrast to the opposition ticket which excludes some elements of the Cook County population.

Candidates for office introduced were: Lola Flannery, Evanston, County Clerk; Peter Bensinger, Chicago, Sheriff; Carl Hansen, McHenry, Treasurer; Wayne Anderson, Des Plaines, Superintendent of Public Instruction; and Joe Woods, former sheriff, Cook County Commissioner.

Also James Ryan, Arlington Heights, and Casimir Okes, Chicago, Metropolitan Sanitary District Trustees; and Arthur Waddy, Chicago, and Jerry Pals, South Holland, members of the Board of Tax Appeals.

Registration for Maine Highs 1974-'75

Registration for the 1974-'75 school year at Maine East is just around the corner.

Assemblies concerning registration at Maine East will begin on Wednesday, Jan. 30, for present juniors; Thursday, Jan. 31, for present sophomores; and Tuesday, Feb. 5, for present freshmen.

The assemblies will be conducted by Mr. Richard Van Scoyoc, director of guidance at Maine East. Each student will receive his registration form and booklet by homeroom at the assembly. Mr. Van Scoyoc will then go over the process of filling out registration forms, step by step, so that each student will be able to fill out the form correctly.

Changes and/or additional courses for next year will be as follows: In the art department a new course, Design and Materials II, will be offered to all those who have completed Design and Materials I.

The English department, along with the regular courses, will offer a wide variety of electives for juniors and seniors. The electives will be offered in two combinations - one course for one half of the year, the other course for the second half of the year. There will be no splitting of the combinations. Some of these courses are: Film Study/Teenager in Literature, Horror and Suspense/Film Study, Horror and Suspense/Satire and Comical Literature, and Journalism I/Journalism II.

In the speech department there will also be a selection of one

half credit combination electives. As in the English department electives there will be no splitting of combinations. Some of these courses offered are: Introduction to Drama/Acting I, Competitive Speech/Oral Interpretation, Debate A and B/Advanced Broadcasting/Radio Production, and TV Production/Advanced Radio and TV.

In the home economics department a new course entitled Clothing-Interior Design Occupation will be for juniors and seniors who are interested in a career in clothing and/or design and have passed or signed up for clothing or design. The course is worth two credits.

In the math department at Maine East a new course, entitled Computer Science, is being offered for both juniors and seniors. It is a semester course and is worth one-half credit.

Music Theory III will be offered in the music department. It is for juniors and seniors with approval from their previous music Theory II teacher.

In the history department some courses names will be changed. For instance, History of Civilization will be changed to History of Non-Western World. World History's new name is History of the Western World, World Geography (L) is now known as Introduction to Social Sciences (L). Democracy is being changed to International Relations, and Afro Studies is being changed to Ethnic Minority Groups.

More detailed course offerings are listed in the registration brochure. The counselors are also available to answer questions concerning registration.

Any students requesting early dismissal for the ninth period should fill in the spaces provided on the registration form.

This year if students do not turn in registration forms by the deadline, Friday, Feb. 8, they will simply not be registered for next year. This can mean a long and drawn-out process of re-entering school and maybe not being able to enroll in a needed course if it has been closed for registration.

Students are urged to remember that important date - Feb. 8 is the deadline for registration for the 1974-'75 school year.

Consumer Cautions

From the NILES COMMISSION ON COMMUNITY HEALTH

Sale of a glue so sticky it may be hazardous was ordered halted last week by the Consumer Product Safety Commission. CPSC asked nine firms to stop distributing and selling to consumers more than 1 million tubes of a cyanoacrylate adhesive that it claims is so strong it cements the user's fingers together or to other parts of the body. The glue is marketed under trademarks such as Permabond 102, Super Three Cement and Krazy Glue. CPSC also charged that two of the products, Krazy Glue and Permabond 102, are improperly labeled under the Hazardous Substances Act and should carry the warning that they are eye irritants. While most of the producers are Japanese, two U.S. companies, Loctite (Newington, Conn.) and Eastman Chemical Products, also make the glue. Loctite says it now derives only 10% of its sales from cyanoacrylate adhesives and that its consumer market sales are "negligible." Eastman states that it would be exempt from the ruling because its product is sold only for industrial use, an area not covered by the CPSC action.

Township officials form RTA committee

The Cook County Auditors Division of the Township Officials Association announced today the formation of a committee to study the Regional Transit Authority Bill and make recommendations to the people regarding the referendum on March 10.

George Miller of Leyden Township, President of the Auditors Division said, "We, as Township officials, are in a very unique position. We serve at that level of government which is closest to the people and can study the proposed bill and submit our recommendations, through our members and other township officials, throughout the area, directly to the people."

"We plan to have representation on our committee from all six counties affected by the proposal so that we will be able to have an overview of the entire transit area, something no other existing organization can do."

The chairman of the committee will be named in a few days and members of the committee will be available to civic and community groups as speakers.

Maine Township Committee studies alcoholism unit

Members of Maine Township's newly-formed citizens advisory committee on mental health and counseling are attempting to decide if and when the township should establish an alcoholic education program following their attendance at the directors meeting of the Milwaukee Council on Alcoholism in that city on Monday, Jan. 14.

The Milwaukee meeting was a follow-up to the committee's Jan. 3 meeting at Lutheran General Hospital chaired by John Sell executive director of the Milwaukee council, and hosted by James McInerney, director of adjunctive services, division of psychiatry, Lutheran General Hospital.

As explained by Sell in a day-long session, alcoholism is currently the nation's number one addiction problem. To combat the problem, Sell outlined a program wherein the township could work with mental health and counseling organizations, youth groups, school systems, police departments, social agencies, drug addiction agencies, and industry in

a program of preventive education. There are now 30 such councils in Wisconsin. Sell added, and they are achieving results.

Township Auditor Margaret Wirsén, Park Ridge, chairman of the township committee said her group would evaluate the results of the Wisconsin program, and would decide whether or not to recommend the establishment of the program in Maine Township. Attending both sessions with Mrs. Wirsén were Auditors Kay Korff and Paul Halverson, Des Plaines, and Assessor James Parks, Park Ridge.

Township Supervisor James Dowd, Des Plaines, said he would support a favorable recommendation of the committee, because it is a service that the township residents would find beneficial. Dowd also commended the three auditors, pointing out that they volunteered their time to attend the two day-long sessions, since their only compensation from the township is the nominal salary they receive for attending monthly board meetings.

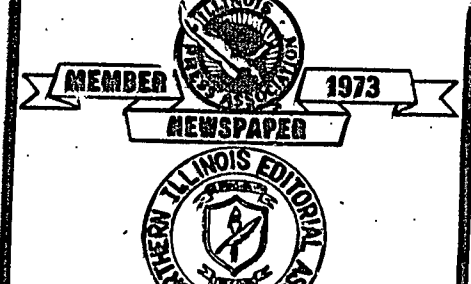

Northside fencers in meet

Four Notre Dame fencers along with about a dozen other suburban fencers entered the Gordon Tech Open on Saturday.

In Sabre, Gary Diamond, the league leader in U-20 fencing, took second to Al Acker, Univ. of Ill. Acker is a former state foil champion and former junior Olympic champion. The field was small, 12, but the competition was strong.

In Foil, there were only 30 entries, but most of them were strong and highly ranked. The meet was difficult inasmuch as the first round was by pools as usual, but the second and third rounds were 10 touch one bout eliminations down to a finale of 5.

All ND fencers made it up to the first elimination round. Gary Gronke drew John Nishimura and lost out; Ken Lavelle and Mike Sciortino drew each other and Mike won out. Mike then lost to John Nishimura in the second elimination round. Pat Gerard won

his two elimination rounds against Larry Labow from Niles East and Jim Herring from Maine South.

The finals of 5 were very strong and Gerard was the only prep fencer in the pool. Results: 1. Dave Littell, 2. Mike McCahey, 3. John Nishimura, 4. Dan Lehman, and 5. Pat Gerard.

The credits of these fencers are fantastic. Dave Littell—Univ. of Ill., State high school foil champion for 2 years, U.S. National U-19 foil champion, NC-AAA All-American, #1 on USA team to 1973 U-20 World Championships. Mike McCahey, former New Trier East fencer, State foil champion 1973, US National U-19 champion, 1973. John Nishimura, UICC grad., coach of UICC, All-American NCAA, foil. Dan Lehman—Ill. State foil champion 2 times. Pat Gerard, NDHS, 6th in Ill. state foil champs, 1973, 6th in US Nationals, foil, 1973.

The meet was an "A" competition with 2-A's, 2-B's, and 1-C in the finals. Nishimura, and Gerard with their "B's" would have to win to earn their "A's." Lehman by placing in the finals earned his "C."

Notre Dame travels to Maine South Thursday for a 4 p.m. meet with the Hawks, where the team will seek its 13th victory of the season and Mike Sciortino his 100th win of the season. Mike hopes to join Capt. Pat Gerard and Bill Kica, co-Capt. with their 100-plus victories.

St. Joe downs Dons 65-62

After a 1-1 week, Notre Dame still holds a good basketball record, but all hopes for a title seem gone. Center Pete Calabrese seems out of the picture for the season following a fall in practice.

His defensive prowess was missed last Friday when the Dons tasted defeat at the hands of St. Joseph, 65-62. ND led after the first quarter, at the half, and at the end of the third quarter, but they were badly outscored in the last stanza.

Even with giant Tony Dobbins (6'9") on the bench with 5 fouls, ND could not buy a basket in the fourth quarter. Forward Welmon Sampson kept ND outside, and guards Doug Copeland and Mike Morris couldn't miss. They had 24 and 8 respectively. Sampson had 17 points and 8 rebounds.

Mike English led all scorers with 25 points along with his 6 rebounds. Buzz Naughton had 16 points and five boards, Scott Franz 10 points and 9 boards, but they couldn't do it all themselves. Saturday Holy Cross entered Notre Dame, and the enraged Dons blew them off the court, 71-42. After a tight first quarter, it was all Dons. Cross' only bright spot was guard Rick Pullano's 15 points.

English again led all scorers with 22. Naughton had 14 points along with 10 rebounds. Franz scored only 5 points, but he held Cliff Augustine to only 4. Pat Parrish netted 10 points as Coach Hinger emptied his bench.

Are District 63 teachers
being harrassed?

Dear Editor:
Continuing harrassment of teachers in District 63 or administrative bungling? The invoices for personal phone calls sent to teachers last week appear as harrassment to some but they are evidence of administrative blunder to anyone familiar with effective cost control practices and handling of employee problems.

Let's assume that no harrassment was intended; the sole objective was to eliminate phone bills attributable to teachers' personal calls. Teachers were asked to write down their name, number called and personal or business on a list next to school phones. Last week hundreds of teachers received formal, printed serially numbered East Maine Public Schools invoices for amounts ranging from 15 cents to \$1 or so. Each invoice was individually typed with date, teacher's name, school name, date of each call, number called and the charge. The schools' assistant business manager then signed each invoice. Invoices, original and duplicate were then put into an envelope which was again addressed and transported from the central office to the various schools and placed into teachers' mailboxes. Checks are to be made payable to the Board of Education. Can you imagine several hundred checks for fifteen or thirty cents each.

Any businessman knows that the cost of this procedure vastly exceeds collection income. Instead

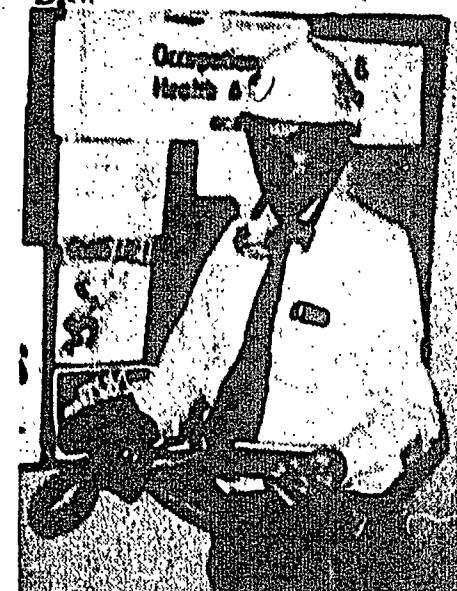

Social Security information

Some residents are receiving a different type of check from Social Security after the first of the year. According to Donald B. Schneider, Manager of the Des Plaines Social Security Office, the new checks will take two forms: one, a new gold colored check and the other, the familiar green Federal check but with several names on the face of the check. The gold check and the special green check will represent the first payments made by the Federal Government under the new Supplemental Security Income program which began Jan. 1, 1974.

"The reason for the gold colored check is simply to give us some quick ways of knowing which payment a person is talking about when they contact our office," said Schneider. "The other special green checks will be issued on an as needed basis to certain newly eligible applicants where there is an immediate and emergency need for funds," Schneider continued. Schneider added that banks, merchants and others who cash checks as a part of their regular business activity should feel free to contact the social security office if they have any question about the new checks.

The Supplementary Security Income program is a new program which began Jan. 1, 1974. It provides payments to aged, blind and disabled individuals up to \$140 or up to \$210 for eligible couples.

Oakton offering special programs for women

Oakton Community College is offering a number of courses designed specifically for women during the spring semester, according to college officials.

"Many women are unsure about returning to school and the direction they want their lives to take," Elaine Sullivan, assistant professor of psychology at O.C.C., explains. "They are fascinated at the prospect of broadening their horizons but feel apprehensive about their ability to perform on a college level after several years away from school."

Mrs. Sullivan spearheaded the planning of programs at Oakton especially for women. During the spring term in 1973 she offered the two-credit hour Human Potential Seminar (PSC105) for women returning to college. The class size was limited to 15, but more than 60 women applied for admission.

As a result, two sections were offered and 30 women registered for the course. The course was offered again during the fall term with equal success.

The program for women returning to college will be explained for the spring 1974 semester, Mrs. Sullivan said. She will again teach a Human Potential Seminar (PSY 105-14F) for women on Monday and Wednesday mornings from 9:30 until 10:45. This will be basically a transactional analysis, or the famous "I'm O.K.-You're O.K." approach to the human person.

In addition to this section of the Human Potential Seminar for women, Mrs. Sullivan and Theresa Harbin, instructor in communications in College Group I, will teach a five-credit hour tandem (two coordinated interdisciplinary courses): Human Potential Seminar and Communications 101 for women returning to college.

This Human Potential Seminar will also use the T.A. approach to the human person, developing self-confidence and self-direction, according to Mrs. Sullivan. Miss Harbin's communications class is offered to help improve ability to write clearly and effectively. It is offered with the Human Potential Seminar because it, too, is designed to help the student develop her own potential.

Although the courses are coordinated, Miss Harbin points out that each is a separate course. Students receive separate grades in each course at the end of the semester.

Dr. Fairlinda West, assistant professor of communications in College Group II, will teach a Communications course (102-103).

Section 19F) which will approach the acquiring of communications skills through the subject matter of feminism. The course is designed to acquaint students with the historical and present status of women. Enrollment declining
in District 63

1970 to Nov. 1973, the number of
children attending the schools has
declined from a peak of 7,220 in
1970 to the current figure of 6,253.
And enrollment projection figures
show a continuing decline over
the next several years.

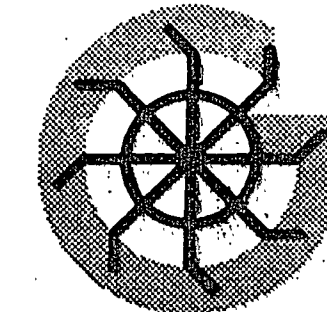

construction of on-site roads. 4. Traffic congestion would be minimal in this area but location would increase travel time for greater number of students. Access roads are good.

5. The River site would provide an aesthetically pleasing environment with education and recreational potential.

The following points were made about the Interim site at Oakton and Nagle:

1. The 23 acre site is industrially developed on relatively flat meadow. The site is not sufficient in size to permit expansion, fulfill program requirements for athletics, or adequate parking space.

2. The property, privately owned by different owners, is on the tax rolls and pays approximately \$120,000 annually in local taxes. The owners are reported unwilling to sell and the local government has expressed opposition to a permanent campus at this location.

3. Cost of the land and site improvements per acre is estimated at about \$309,000 because of the urbanized location.

4. The site is centrally located for most students in the college district but because of the urban location, traffic congestion would be severe.

a flood plain, 23 acres, a previous garbage dump, which would necessitate additional costs to maintain the flood plain.

"Ball park figures", which are meaningless, contend the present site would cost \$18,400,000 to develop while the Des Plaines area would be \$17,550,000. The state would pay for 70% of this total while local taxes would cover the remaining 30%.

The architectural advantages for the interim site include the more central location for the entire student body and the proximity of the campus to industry for College Career Programs. The Des Plaines site advantages include the larger site for long-range expansion potential for building, parking or athletic program. Also, this site has good road access and natural wooded area which is a more aesthetically-pleasing environment.

The architectural disadvantages at the Oakton site include excessive traffic problems, an aesthetically-poor environment in the industrial area and the site is not sufficient to fulfill program requirements, especially parking areas and outdoor athletic areas. Disadvantages at Des Plaines include the existing flood plain area, off site utility construction, roadway improvements and a high water table which must be considered in construction.

Traffic consultants note the interim area is centrally located, has a 45% flow of traffic from 1 direction, entrance and exit and inner traffic circulation are extremely limited and planned public external roadway improvements are none. The Des Plaines area is at the west end of the district, 65% of the traffic flow would be from one direction, traffic entrance and exit and inner circulation would be flexible and the widening of Golf Road between the Tri-State Tollway east to Greenwood would provide improved access to the site.

These facts and figures were provided by studies of the Armond King Realtors, Barton-Aschman Traffic Engineers and from information provided by David Hilquist, manager of business affairs for the college.

to replace and/or repair damage is easily recovered, by you and all the taxpaying citizens of the Park District. A part of the tax dollar is diverted from park programs to pay for these acts of vandalism.

the repair and replace category back into the activities category and not have to offer as an excuse for a cancelled or unavailable program the lack of funds. The Park District, therefore, is asking for the cooperation of all people in stemming what appears to be a rising tide in frequency and severity of these crimes. If anyone observes vandals in the act or highly suspicious persons in the parks please call the Morton Grove Police Department.

The proposed improvements will generally consist of providing full channelization of the intersections. Estimated costs of these improvements are: Lincoln ave. and Touhy - \$230,000; Cicero ave. and Touhy - \$400,000. Some property acquisition is required for these improvements.

proved a 3% motel tax for Niles 600 units. Village president Blase said at 5% the village might receive about \$10,000 more revenue. However, he emphasized neighboring villages requested Niles add the tax so their motels would not be under a handicap by adding a tax Niles would not have. Only new trustee Abe Selman opposed the tax. He told The Eagle he was opposed to the tax which was another addition to the already spiraling inflation which exists today.

Trustee Keith Peck reported about 400 Nilesites now use the free bus service daily. Niles was also cited in an article by the Northeastern Illinois Planning Commission for its bus service.

Tr. Pete Pesole received unanimous approval for his motion to vacate 9 alleys in the village.

Tr. Abe Selman stated this year's girls softball marathon will run for 55 hours and the money will go to the Julia Malloy School in Skokie. He also reported the Girls Softball League will begin June 10 and the maximum age has been increased.

Amended the "No Smoking" ordinance which is a part of the fire code but does not specify exceptions for buildings such as theatres. The amendment allows specific locations for smoking such as in movie theatres.

Amended the tax ordinance increasing the fares from 35 cents to 45 cents for the first eighth of a mile, from 40 cents to 50 cents for each additional mile and from \$4 to \$6 for waiting time. Robert Szafran, representing the Niles Cab Company, said the free bus service is likely to decrease the cabs reserve when the weather becomes warmer. These increased fees will place the Niles Company in line with neighboring cab companies. Szafran told The Eagle the cab company runs a 24 hour service with as many as 6 cabs operating during the day-time and one dispatcher at the 6638 Albion office on duty around the clock.

Approved a resolution to apply for interim transportation funds from the state, which is a routine matter in anticipation of the village receiving RTA funds. Niles officials also unanimously passed a resolution favoring RTA and Blase recommended the Niles resolution be distributed to its neighbors in hopes they'll take similar action. Blase and his handpicked candidate for the County Board, Norm Dachman, are leading the campaign among suburban leaders to support the upcoming RTA referendum.

The Niles Saints champion semi-pro football team presented its 4 foot trophy to the village to place on display in the village building.

Ed Krejcek, 7712 Wauke-

gan, a retired Chicago policeman, sought the aid of the village to clear sidewalks of snow thrown on them when the streets are cleared by Niles Public Works Department. He suggested a jeep clear the walks after the streets are cleared. Blase said this would require many workers and the cost would be prohibitive. However, if a resident has a senior citizen or someone who is incapacitated the village will clear their walks and driveways after the streets have been cleared. Residents requiring this service can call the village.

Ronald Bryski received special use zoning for an auto parts store at 7005 Milwaukee Avenue.

Okayed an ordinance for a 100 foot lot at 8726 Park Lane to be subdivided into two 50 foot lots known as the Di Paolo subdivision.

Awarded a bid of \$41,750 for traffic installation lights at Greenwood and Church.
