Artificial reefs can be ouilt from worn-out tire

Some 200 million tires are discarded each year in the U.S. While a number of disposal methods are available, one of the simplest, at least along the coasts, is to drop the tires onto the ocean floor. Placed at appropriate spots, they can become the home of fish and provide new fishing grounds close

Sunken ships are the most common beginning of an artificial reef. The many hiding places they provide make good homes for fish. The process starts with the growth of small animals and vegetation on the surface of the ships. Small fish invade the area to feed on the animals and vegetation and are followed by the larger fish.

Most objects rust and disintegrate, and often are expensive. Tires, on the other hand have long life in the sea. Tests so far give no indication of deterioration, the tires do not release harmful chemicals and are inexpensive. Artificial reefs seem to be the simplest way to get rid of large volumes of tired tires.

MG firemen in LGH emergency training classes

Thirty-eight firemen from nine communities are in the first class to receive emergency medical technician (EMT) training at Lutheran General Hospital (LGH), Park Ridge. They will complete the 81-hour course in April.

Two members of the Park Ridge Fire Department along with 30 Chicago firemen are in the second EMT class which began on March 4. Lutheran General is now the only suburban hospital besides Loyola University Hospital, Maywood, to provide EMT training for Chicago firemen.

"We will also be giving clinical" training to paramedic students. We are very happy to do this and help provide some of the most urgently needed health care per-

"The value of having someone who can start Mfe-saving care at the scene of an emergency is demonstrated in the case of the heart attack victim alone. About 60 to 70 per cent of all heart attack victims die before reaching a hospital. It's estimated that

competent, on-scene care could cut this mortality figure in half. "In the case of ventricular fibrillation, another serious heart emergency, if treatment is delayed for one minute, 98 out 100 victims have a chance to recover. After five minutes, only 25 out of 100 stand a good chance of re-

The EMT course is taught by Dr. Anzinger and Deborah Buckley, R.N., emergency medical systems coordinator. Paramedics assist at some sessions. The course is approved by the American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons, the Illinois State Trauma Network and NSAHR.

Like most other hospitals, LGH is conducting its first class free

Upon completion of the course, students are eligible to take the national registry examination and be licensed as an EMT. EMT's work under the supervision of a paramedic and are eligible to take the advanced training to become paramedics.

Charge Andros with Tax evasion

James R. Thompson, United States Attorney for the Northern Judicial District of Illinois, and Roger C. Beck, District Director of the Internal Revenue Service, announced today (Mar. 26, 1974) the return of an Information charging James G. Andros, 2600 Golf Road, Glenview, with willful failure to file Federal Income Tax Returns for the years 1967, 1968 and 1969. During the first two years he resided in Morton Grove.

The information alleges that Andros, a 45 year old attorney with offices at One North LaSalle in Chicago, had income during the prosecution years totaling over \$215,000.

If convicted, Andros could be sentenced to a term up to three years and fined up to \$30,000.



The right of Cook County to impose such a tax has been opposed by townships and other parties, but upheld by the Illinois Supreme Court. The matter is currently pending the outcome of an appeal for a rehearing by the Supreme Court.



You men know what I mean because we dads greatly see ourselves in our sons.

I reached out for my son and said, "Son, what do you want to do?"
He brightened up a little, wiped away his tears and said in a broken voice, "Dad, I would like to go for a walk." This we did. I managed to get lost a couple of times and my son found our way out. This certainly helped restore his deflated ego. In fact, the first thing he said to his mother when we got home was "Hey mom, you know what? Dad got lost twice and I found our way out.

Dads, be careful not to push your sons too fast or to be too concerned about how you are going to look to others through your son's performance. Each child as every adult has certain gifts and talents. Let them develop naturally with some encouragement and recognition. Be open to their needs and their particular stage of growth and development. Fortunately, I was open to my son and got a glimpse of what I was really doing with him. Hope you are open and ready to shift gears if need be. Don't forget to seek out and ask, "Son, what do you want to do."


Photography exhibit

Applications are now available in the four Maine Township High Schools for parents wishing to register children for preschool classes to be held at each of the schools during the first semester of the 1974-75 school year.







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It wasn't until 7th grade we received our first uniforms, Scrawny arms and legs sticking outfrom these itchy uniforms made a 12 year old uncomfortably self-conscious, especially if he knew his 7th grade girl friend would be in the stands. By eighth grade you knew all there was to know about the game, only you played at a disadvantage, when nature had you growing more slowly than the 6 foot thirteen year olds, who'd tear you apart under the basket.

In high school Chicago teams were divided into players under 5 foot 7 inches, and teams over that height. In your first two years of high school you walked with a slump, developed a hump-back, in your desire to stay under the 5-7 mark, When measuring time came, you hooked in your knees, sucked your stomach in, and placed your head for out from your body, while the guy measuring you attempted to knock you upright against the wall to messure your full height.

In your junior year it was time to move up to the Senior team, and you suddenly stood 6 inches taller than you had the previous years. The first game we played on that team was against De LeSalle, and a guy named George Connor, late of the Bears. He hadn't grown to his full size then, but we could spot him a hundred pounds, and he'd still stomp on our shedow.

The first gome we storted in was a Christmas tourney game at the old Stagg fieldhouse. We made baskets which bounced 20 feet off the rim and plunked back into the basket, and committed fouls so quickly the Coach pulled us out of the game, to save us from the mayhem of the opposition, and the wrath of the referee.

In our Senior year we looked forward to this Stogg tourney during the holiday break and were disappointed when it was cancelled, It was December. 1942, and they cheated a bunch of kids, who longingly waited for the annual tourney. It was 3 years later, while wandering around Berlin, that I first read some guy named Fermi and his friends, had setoff the first nuclear reaction in December, 1942. at this exact location where the basketball tourney was scheduled to be played. It was a lousy reason for cancelling a basketball tourney.

During the early war years we formed a team which wandered around the city and played in many odd ball gyms. The team was composed of a Japanese boy, a black boy, Jewish boys, and other beleaguered ragemuffins, who endured the eers of the enemy crowds thruout town, in South Chicago one audience-dweller spewed out a racial epitaph, which caused our one fighter to go up into the stands after him. The game stopped, and while we stood alone on the court, we felt the 2,000 bleacher-dwellers were about to descend on us wayfarers from another neighborhood, Out in the Amundsen area a similar epitoph, resulted in a wild meles, and we had to have an adult escort to get us out of the gym.

During our service days we wandered around kethall courts halfway around the world. We once played on a ceramic tile court in London, and in several gyms, where the 10 1/2 foot ceilings compelled you to shoot the ball in linedrive fashion. There were many courts which had wells directly under the baskets, which required a ballet-like effort, with a protruding foot saving you from becoming etched in the wall.

At Gettysburg College we played against the star hotshot of that conference, and he was just another ballplayer. And we later played against a bunch

of over-ripe over-aged Air Force mechanics, and they wiped us off the court.

in Bremerhaven, while walting for ship to take us home, we won 5100 in one game, and blew it on one meal, in the over-inflated black market restaurants there.

Playing the game didn't make you on expert. But grazing with many of the hangers-on, was great fun, and was a side benefit you quickly understood. Back in high school we always had 3 or 4 men in their 20's who'd always drive us to the gemes. They never worked, but they plied a trade which kept them in spending money. Besides winning

in the poolhalls, these blg spenders used to very casually find out what condition we were in, while riding to the gemes with them. They were maste nsychologists and after 20 minutes in the car with us, they were able to make point spreads which ker them in breed, until the next week's gomes. The had no loyalty. But, whether we won or loss somehow, they seemed to win, and shared their bounty by treating us to a good steak dinner

In later years we'd still see these small time gamblers plying their trade. They were good guys and often were friends with the Chicago high school coaches. At tourney time down thru the years we would see these same coaches at afternoon games in Chicago, and evening playoff-games in Arling-ton Heights. The next night down at the stadium these same basketball addicts would be attending the college double headers there.

As a youngster we used to hitchlike into indiana to see a state tourney playoff there. And when we were at the U. of I. we once hid among the mats in the gymnastics room, in order to evade the guards who checked Huff gymnasium, to kick out all the fans who didn't have the prized tickets for the tourney. The next year we became an usher, but once inside the gym, made sure we had a seat for the tourney, discarding our usher badge in favor of being just another basketbal

In Indiana we saw games played on auditorium stages, and once saw a ball bounce off the top of the square backboard and come to rest balanced atop it. We've mentioned this to many fans, none of whom ever saw it happen, or believed we had ever seen it.

About five years ago we were sitting in a restaurant outside Gary, when we spotted our old high school coach sitting at a nearby table. He told us he worked the Notre Dame game that afternoon, and that evening he asked us to drive him to the Gary Tolleston stadium, where he was refereeing that night. This 60 year old more said he'd coached his team Thursday afternoon, refeleed Friday at Eckersell Stadium, had the Notre Dame and Gary games on Saturday, and had a Catholic game at Eckersall scheduled for Sunday, In amazement we turned to him and said, "Don't you ever take a vacation . . . or at least a break?" And in younger, and said, "Bud, this is my life. There's nothing I'd rather do."

I guess he summed it up for all the basketball fans who'll be trudging to the gyms thruout the country this week. Like our coach, they're addicted, hooked, perhaps transfixed when they hear the roundball bounce against the gym floor, and pause on its way thru the net. And I guess they wouldn't have it any other way. have it any other way.
