

District 63 votes for change

A call for change was clear in East Maine Elementary School District 63 as two challengers who have been critical of board policies easily won over the only incumbent, according to the Chicago Tribune.

Incumbent Milton Langer trailed challengers, Mrs. Penny Larson and Mrs. Barbara Kipnis, by more than 600 votes. The challengers had complained about

poor communication between the board and parents and had charged that school board positions concerning teachers needed flexibility.

In Park Ridge Elementary School District 64, three caucus-endorsed candidates were easily elected, also write-in candidate William J. Coscioni received more than 100 votes. Coscioni announced his candi-

dacy last week after learning that Ronald Youngberg, who was elected, would be unable to serve because he is being transferred to New York City. Altho Coscioni admitted his chances of winning were remote, he said he hoped his demonstration of interest would improve his chances of being appointed to the vacancy. In Oakton Community College District 535, Mrs. Harriet Ritter

won with 2,351 votes in a four-candidate race for two board seats. Incumbent Stephen Loska also won with 2,211 votes.

Loska said this is to be his last term on the board. Voting results are as follows (asterisks denote incumbents): Junior College District 535 - Oakton Three-year terms (two elected)

Lotus, Morton Grove, who resigned Apr. 2 from the seven-member board after being charged by police with illegal possession of drugs. Wauck will serve the remaining one year of Gutschick's term.



State income tax distribution

State Senator John J. Nimrod (R-Skokie) recently announced the distribution of nearly \$415,000 to municipalities within the Fourth Legislative District as their share of the state income tax collection for February. Nimrod noted that the total distribution for fiscal year 1974 beginning July 1, 1973 is over \$2.2 million. The total distributed for fiscal year 1973 in comparison was \$3.2 million.

Each municipality receives, on a per capita basis, one-twelfth of the revenues paid under the state income tax sharing program. The distribution for February is as follows: Des Plaines, \$89,961; Lincolnwood, \$13,545; Morton Grove, \$27,626 and Niles, \$93,978.



'Love Means Never Having to Say You're Sorry'

The above expression comes from Erich Segal's book, Love Story. I believe this is fantasy - utopia or euphoria - not real life. Some married couples and families try to live in such an unrealistic environment by their own making, but "it just ain't so!" Rather the opposite is more nearly correct - "love means you can say you're sorry."

I find in my counseling that many couples and families try to ignore and deny and/or to fantasize and be unreal about their true relationships with one another.

In continues this way until either the husband or wife, or one of the children, tries to upset the pie in the sky, dream-world, Mickey Mouse World that has been created in the home.

In my counseling I have noted that the children frequently help bring this utopia to an abrupt halt through some unacceptable behavior that forces mom to look at dad, dad at mom, child at parents, and parents at child. At last the stage has been set for some honest gut level involvement and communication.

I have a case where the parents called about one of their teenagers without any intention, at first, of involving themselves.

They thought the work would be with their teenager who was presenting some behavior they could not tolerate or understand. They were even ready to consider sending the child to an institution. Fortunately, the couple did involve themselves as well as their other teenager.

The results were quite astonishing to them as they discovered several things:

1. Their marriage was in serious jeopardy and they had grown apart rather than together in such areas as verbal, feeling, physical and spiritual communication.

2. Their other teenager added greatly to the family problem and did whatever was necessary to get mom and dad against this problem child.

3. That mom, dad, and the other child had used the family problem child as their scapegoat without really being aware or cognizant of what they had done or were continuing to do.

Is any of the above hitting close to home? If it is, then try to open up channels of communication with your spouse - see what really is going on in your marriage.

If you can look there first and help to remedy some of your relationship problems, then you will be a happier and more contented couple; then you can better handle your child's problems fairly and more appropriately.

If you find that you have helped to create an unreal environment with little or no gut level involvement, then try to remedy it and, if necessary, seek out professional help.

Be able to express true love and say that you are sorry and go about correcting the situation between you and your spouse; then the two of you together help your child or children.


In other business, the Board announced the District-wide Bus Committee's decision to accept Scholastic Transit Co.'s bid to provide a three-year bus service beginning this fall; of three bids received, Scholastic's rate for the 1974-75 school year was the lowest at \$72 per child (an increase of its current price of \$70), with no more than a five per cent increase—rounded off to the nearest dollar—in each of the consecutive years 1975-76 and 1976-77. If the fee is paid by Aug. 15, a \$3 reduction will be given. Martin Bus Service submitted the second lowest bid at \$90 per child per year.

In May, the Bus Committee will begin holding monthly meetings to facilitate cooperation among parents, bus authorities and schools in solving transportation problems.

Candlelight Courte plans Sept. 1 opening

When Edmund Beaulieu bought four and a half acres of vacant land in Niles in 1971, he had plans for a residential development. Nearby home owners had different ideas.

They feared more homes would congest their neighborhood and they opposed the development. Village officials, after a lengthy series of hearings, denied Beaulieu permission to build and he turned his energies to another project for the site.

The result — a 130,000-square foot enclosed shopping mall — is under construction at Milwaukee ave. and Oakton st. Called Candlelight Courte, the center is scheduled for completion Sept. 1.

Beaulieu, of Beaulieu & Sons, Inc., 8058 N. Milwaukee ave., Niles, acquired additional land adjacent to his original parcel. Candlelight Courte, a \$9-million project, now covers 11 acres.

The all-electric building will be on a "master-metering" program that should result in energy bills 20 to 30 per cent less than what they would be if individual stores were metered, Beaulieu said.

Basic rents in the center will run from \$6 a square foot annually for users of at least 4,200 square feet to \$11 a foot for small tenants renting up to 499 square feet. Also, the developers will receive a percentage of gross sales revenues. Maintenance of interior and exterior common areas will cost \$.65 a square foot and tenants will pay their own utilities.

To cut front-end cost to tenants, Beaulieu said, all work in leased space except decorating will be done by the developers.

Republic Realty Mortgage Corp. of Chicago arranged for \$5.4 million in construction financing. Travelers Insurance Companies, Connecticut, is providing the end loan.



PRE-DICT director to speak at principals meeting

Richard W. Framke, director of PROJECT PRE-DICT, a federally funded program operating in this area to serve small children with developmental problems, has been asked to speak to members of the National Association of Elementary School Principals at the association's annual convention, scheduled to take place April 27 through May 2 at Anaheim, California.

Mr. Framke has been asked to give an overview of PROJECT PRE-DICT, giving information about the diagnostic screening services available to three and four year old children to identify any delay in mental, physical or emotional development or in speech or language ability. He will also talk about the diagnostic testing that is done, and the remedial programs that are planned, developed and implemented by the project staff to fit the particular need of each child. PROJECT PRE-DICT is the only pre-school program to

be included in the NAESP convention program.

The convention is expected to be one of the largest educational meetings in the United States, with about 6,000 educators planning to attend. Its purpose is to acquaint elementary principals with the innovative programs that are available to them for their schools.

PROJECT PRE-DICT, now in its second year of operation, is a Title III, E.S.E.A. program conducted through the Maine Township Special Education Program, and administered by Maine Township High School District 207. Its screening, testing and remedial services are available to all prekindergarten children living in Maine Township, whose parents request the services and register their child at their local elementary school. The project center is located at 2101 Oakton st., Park Ridge, in the Oakton school building. There is no charge for the service.

Parent seminar MONACEP offers driver education

A panel of four medical specialists - Dr. Seymour Metrick and Dr. Richard L. Marks, pediatricians, Dr. Jerry G. Seidel, ophthalmologist, and Dr. Philip J. 



lieve we should select a person who has had board experience, particularly at Oakton, and at the same time has a student viewpoint," board vice chairman Ray Hartstein said.

The timing of the board appointment which occurred two days before last Saturday's general election for two three-year board terms, was criticized.

"Two people in the election Saturday will be disqualified from this position," Harvey Kriloff, 3724 W. Walden, Lincolnwood, said last week. "These people tonight have not presented their credentials to the community while the people in the election have."

In response to Kriloff's charges that the board was "circumventing the democratic process," board chairman Paul Gilson said the board is required by law to fill a vacancy within 30 days. "We invited anyone in the public who believed they had the qualifications to apply, a practice not often followed in such cases. We interviewed all 13 applicants and we think we followed the democratic process."

Gutschick's position wasn't filled Saturday because election law requires 45 days to file petitions and publicize the opening, Hartstein said.

Niles Library receives state grant

Michael J. Howlett, Secretary of State and State Librarian, has announced a \$60,000 grant to the Niles Public Library District for the first phase of its Project PLUS program.

Howlett said the program will provide demonstration library services to 12,467 residents of Niles Township and Northfield Township.

First year funding of the project will lead to a referendum later this spring which could result in the annexation of the area to the Niles Public Library District.

Funding is based on \$5 per capita from Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA) funds and \$0.4 per capita for library materials from the North Suburban Library System.

Funds from LSCA grants are administered by the Illinois State Library.

Revenue sharing funds suggestion

Dear Editor:

The Village of Niles and Maine Township Government will receive \$100,000 and \$199,000 respectively in Federal Revenue Sharing Funds in 1974. These funds at increasing levels are guaranteed for at least five years. The question must be asked if our two local governments are spending these monies in the total public interest? I will not quarrel with the past expenditures nor even question their wisdom. In fact, we probably needed the new storm sewers, civic center and Township Government Building. However, I must question the future proposed expenditures and lack of a generally well thought out plan. I offer the following suggestions to Mayor Nicholas Blase and Township Supervisor Dowd for their consideration.

The Village of Niles does not have a hospital nor a Public Health Clinic. The citizens of Niles must seek health services from local private institutions. I suggest that Mayor Blase consider the establishment of a "Preventative Medicine Program" for the citizens. This program will test for early diagnosis of such diseases as diabetes, cardiac disturbance, cancer, and other maladies that can be cured or arrested with early treatment. It would appear to me that this type of program would benefit all the population willing to take advantage of it and at the same time be quite inexpensive to operate. Additionally, the detection of any disease will allow the citizen's doctor to act in time to save a life. I believe that we need this type of program in Niles.

Maine Township Government serves all the citizens of the Township but is severely limited in what services it can provide to Niles, Des Plaines, and Park Ridge. It appears to me that the Township is the best vehicle to provide Public Health Services to all the citizens. I suggest the creation of a Township Public Health Clinic including a school children inoculation program. The Clinic can be located in the Township Building and there are abundant Federal and State grant in aid programs available for equipment, supplies and even salaries as long as the local money share is from local taxes. I believe the need is real for such a Clinic and program. It was recently estimated that only 15% of all suburban school children receive flu shots. However, I am sure that any mother can attest that her children have the flu at least once each year. Additionally, the serums can be provided at extremely low cost by the U.S. Public Health Service. There is just no reason for our children to be exposed to disease today when we have the knowledge and resources to protect them.

I suggest that Mayor Blase and Supervisor Dowd appoint a study commission of local citizens to explore the feasibility of these programs. The suggestions are separate and thus each should create his own commission. I hope they do so at the earliest possibility. Incidentally, wouldn't it be nice if the Township Government gave the \$24,000 to the North Maine Fire Protection District to buy their new ambulance. The new taxes will not be available for at least one year and the Township has a surplus of funds NOW.


