The above expression comes from Erich Segal's book, Love Story, I believe this is fantasy - utopia or euphoria - not real life.

Some married couples and families try to live in such an unrealistic environment by their own making, but "it just ain't so!" Rather the opposite is more nearly correct - "love means you can say you're

I find in my counseling that many couples and families try to ignore and deny and/or to fantasize and be unreal about their true relation-

In continues this way until either the husband or wife, or one of the children, tries to upset the pie in the sky, dream world, Mickey Mouse World that has been created in the home, In my counseling I have noted that the children frequently help bring

this utopia to an abrupt halt through some unacceptable behavior that forces mom to look at dad, dad at mom, child at parents, and parents at child. At last the stage has been set for some honest gut level involvement and communication. I have a case where the parents called about one of their teenagers

without any intention, at first, of involving themselves. They thought the work would be with their teenager who was presenting some behavior they could not tolerate or understand, They were even ready to consider sending the child to an institution. Fortunately, the couple did involve themselves as well as their

The results were quite astonishing to them as they discovered

1. Their marriage was in serious jeopardy and they had grown apart rather than together in such areas as verbal, feeling, physical and spiritual communication.

2. Their other teenager added greatly to the family problem and did whatever was necessary to get mom and dad against this problem child. 3. That mom, dad, and the other child had used the family problem child as their scapegoat without really being aware or cognizant of what they had done or were continuing to do.

Is any of the above hitting close to home? If it is, then try to open up channels of communication with your spouse-see what really is going on in your marriage.

If you can look there first and help to remedy some of your relationship problems, then you will be a happier and more contented couple; then you can better handle your child's problems fairly and more If you find that you have helped to create an unreal environment

Revenue sharing funds suggestion

Dear Editor: The Village of Niles and Maine

Township Government will receive \$100,000 and \$199,000 respectively in Federal Revenue Sharing Funds in 1974. These funds at increasing levels are guaranteed for at least five years. The question must be asked if our two local governments are spending these monies in the total public interest? I will not quarrel with the past expenditures nor even question, their wisdom. In fact, we probably needed the new storm sewers, civic center and Township Government Building. However, I must question the future proposed expenditures and lack of agenerally well thought our plan. I offer the following suggestions to Mayor Nicholas Blase and Township Supervisor Dowd for

their considerations. The Village of Niles does not many other residents I'm sure. have a hospital nor a Public Health Clinic. The citizens of Niles must seek health services from local private institutions. I suggest that Mayor Blase consider the establishment of a "Preventative Medicine Program" for the citizens. This program will test for early diagnosis of such diseases as

diabetes, cardiac disturbance, cancer, and other maladies that can be cured or arrested with early treatment. It would appear to me that this type of program would benefit all the population willing to take advantage of it and at the same time be quite inexpensive to operate. Additionally, the detection of any disease will allow the citizen's doctor to act in time to save a life. believe that we need this type of program in Niles.

Maine Township Government serves all the citizens of the Township but is severly limited in what services it can provide to Niles, Des Plaines, and Park Ridge. It appears to me that the Township is the best vehicle to provide Public Health Services to all the citizens. I suggest the creation of a Township Public Health Clinic including a school children innoculation program. The Clinic can be located in the Township Building and there are abundant Federal and State grant in aid programs available for equipment, supplies and even salas long as the local mone share is from local taxes. I believe the need is real for such a Clinic and program. It was recently estimated that only 15% of all suburban school children receive flu shots. However, I am sure that any mother can attest that herchildren have the flu at least once each year. Additionally, the serums can be provided at extremely low cost by the U.S. Public Health Service. There is just no reason for our children to be exposed to disease today when we have the knowledge and resources to protect them.

I suggest that Mayor Blase and Supervisor Dowd appoint a study commission of local citizens to explore the feasability of these programs. The suggestions are separate and thus each should create his own commission. I hope they do so at the earliest possibility. Incidentally, wouldn't it be nice if the Township Government gave the \$24,000 to the North Maine Fire Protection District to buy their new ambulance. The new taxes will not be available for at least one year and the Township has a surplus of funds NOW. Sincerely,
