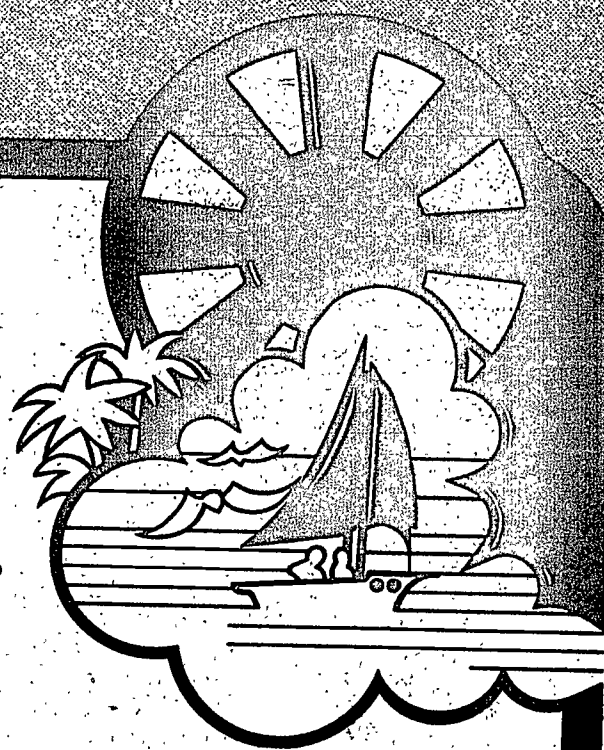

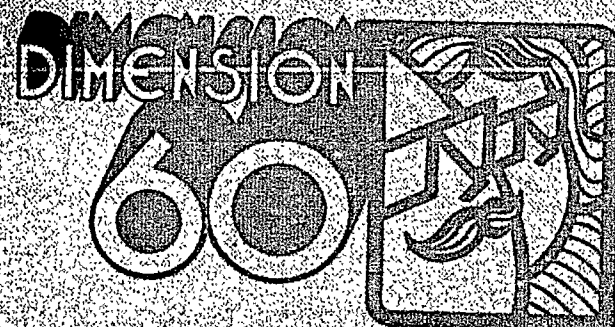

From the LEFT HAND

If someone from a far-away land was to ask you what America is like, your answer might be quite unlike answers of a farmer from the mid-wheatland, or the craggy taciturn New Englander, or the white-haired suntanned retiree from Arizona. Similarly, our 3 weeks in Israel saw our viewfinder find many faces in Israel.

On Ben Yehudi Street in cosmopolitan Tel Aviv the Deborah Hotel was a huge picture window which allows passersby to see the flickering sabbath candles of the Friday night residents. Inside, a sign above the elevator tells you it's "automatic", it stops at every floor, which is balm for the religionists who strictly observe the sabbath rules.

Farther south on the communal kibbutz, Ramat Yochanan, my wife's cousin Rachel observes none of the religious ritual. But she has a feeling for this land, which is every bit as spiritual as the sabbath observers at the hotel. She has devoted her life to the land. She gave up her Boston abode in 1932 and pioneered this then-desolate area. Perhaps we might compare her to our western settlers whose love for the land made today's America. She lives in a small 3 room house which includes a 17 x 7 living room, a 7 x 10 bedroom, a service kitchen and an 8 x 10 enclosed porch. Her bathroom is 6 1/2 x 5 3/4 which includes the toilet and shower. A squeegee resting against the shower wall presses the excess water down the drain, since the shower room is not separated from the rest of the bathroom. And hanging light bulbs scrawnlly stretch down from the ceiling.

The life on the Kibbutz is unlike 96% of the way other Israelis live. Only 4% of the populous reside in communes. Yet, the Ben Gurions and a disproportionate number of the country's leaders come from the Kibbutz. While only 4% reside there, more than 20% of the Army Officer Corps.

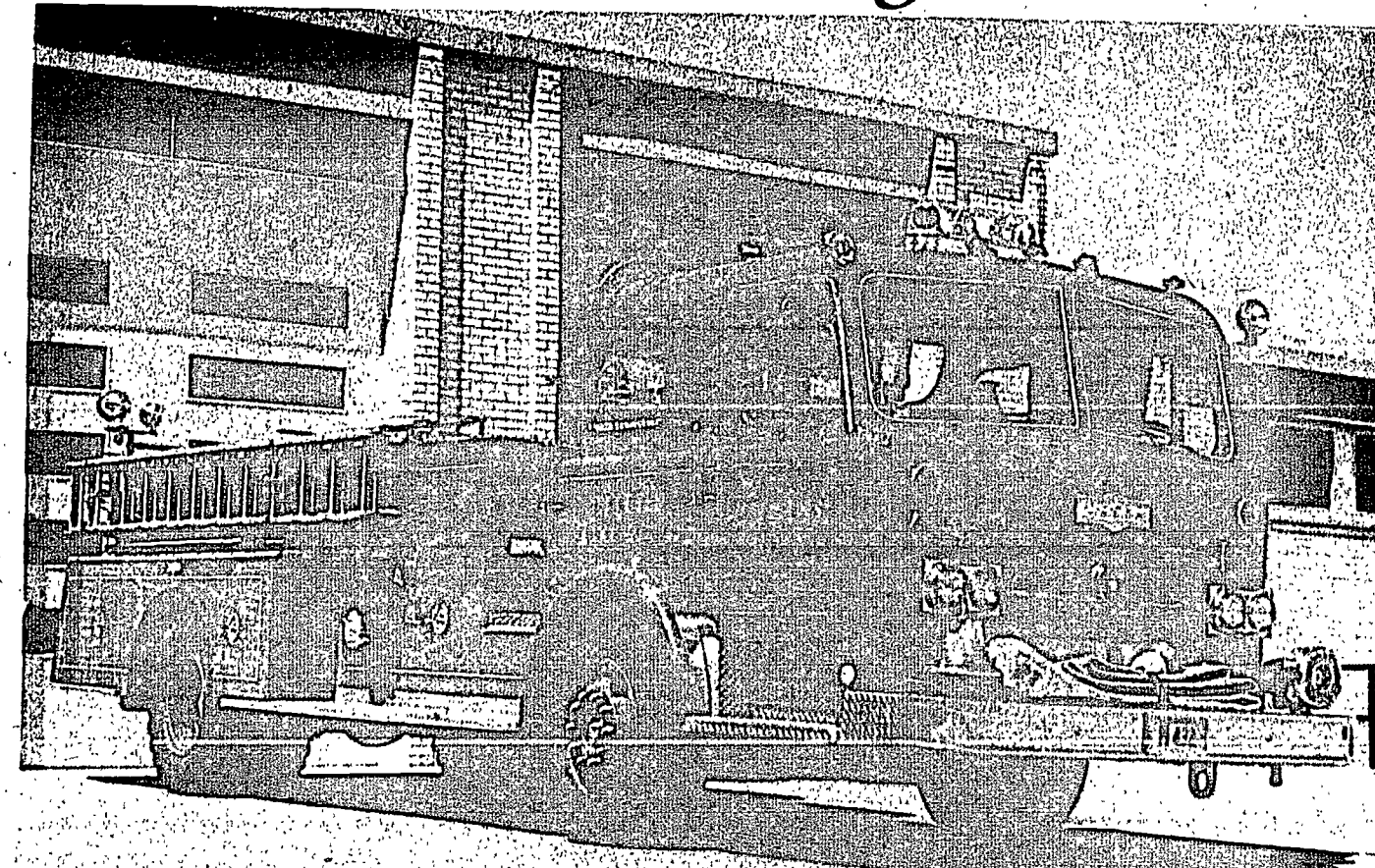

A new 1500 GPM, diesel powered Pirsch engine was recently placed into service by the Niles Fire Department. This makes the fifth Pirsch apparatus presently in service by the department.

The canopy cab engine, designated Eng. 6, replaces a 1942, 500 GPM pumper. It is housed at Fire Station 1, at 6611 Jarvis ave., in the industrialized south end of Niles.

MAINE DEMOS 'DELEGATE ELECTOR' MEETING



The Maine Township Regular Democratic Organization will hold a special "delegate elector" meeting Monday, June 4, for the purpose of electing 10 persons to represent the township at the June 18 10th Congressional District meeting, at their headquarters, 8070 Milwaukee ave., Niles, at 8 p.m. Those "delegate electors" elected will join with those persons from Niles, Northfield, New Trier and Evanston Townships at the June 18th special meeting to then elect the delegates to the Democratic National Conference to be held in Kansas City, Mo., Dec. 6-8, 1974. The announcement came from Nicholas Blase, Democratic Committee of Maine Township.

Blase announced that any person who is a Democrat, a qualified voter and a resident of Maine Township may participate in the meeting by stating he is a Democrat, a qualified voter and a resident of Maine Township. 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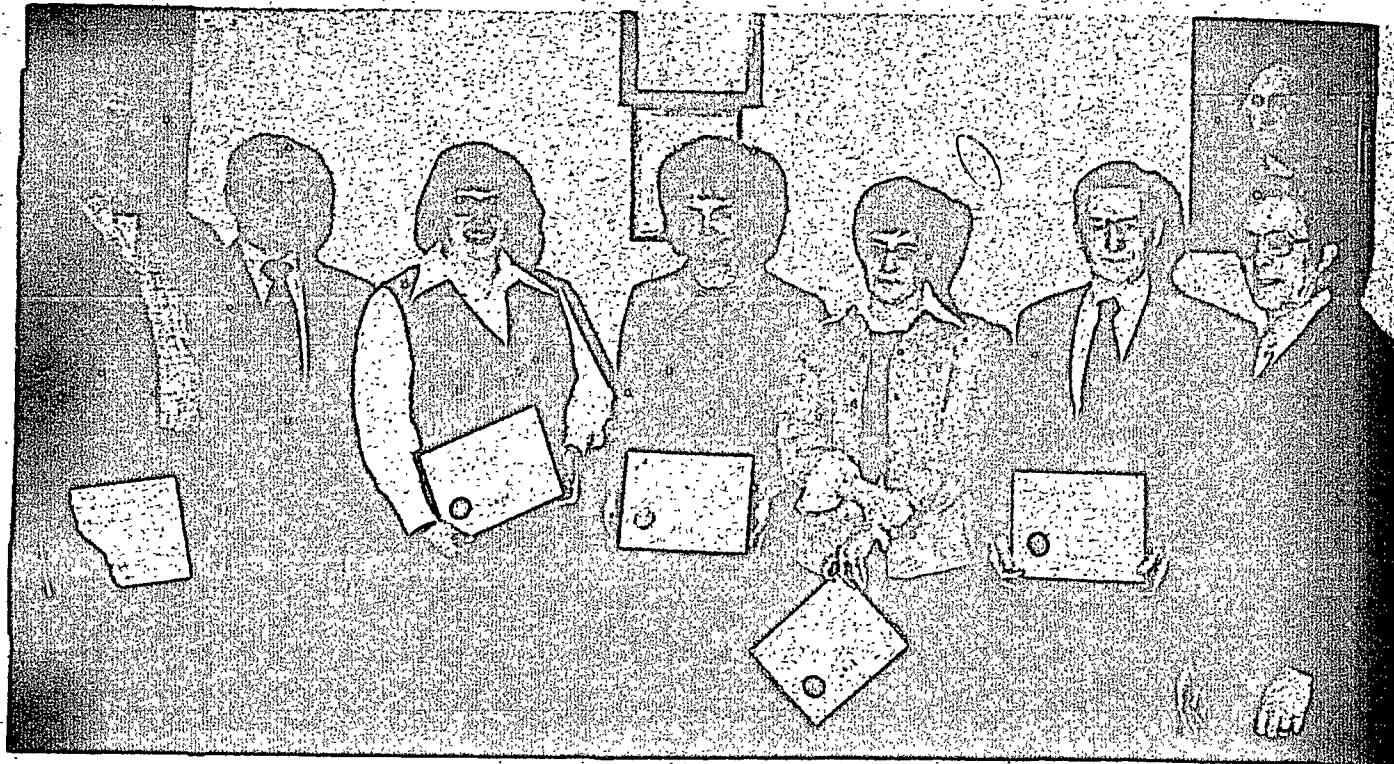

Special meeting to save RTA

Operation Yes! the RTA committee sponsored by the Council of Governments of Cook County Wednesday, May 1 reorganized its suburban Cook County Mayors committee to work towards the defeat of House Speaker Robert Blair's proposal to dismantle the newly established Regional Transportation Authority.

Norman Dachman, Director of the committee during the campaign for passage of the RTA will work along with the suburban

Mayors in order to help preserve the newly established referendum.

Joining Dachman at the special press conference held at the Sheraton-Chicago Hotel were Mayors Fred Dumpke, Oak Lawn; Nicholas Blase, Niles; William Hawkins, Phoenix, quadrand leaders during the campaign. Also in support of the committee are Mayors Ralph Johnson, Park Forest; Edgar Vanneman, Jr., Evanston; David White, Maywood; Sig Davis, Bellwood; Edward Patten, Glenview; William Mathieu, Homewood; Robert Lavidge, Western Springs, who is also Chairman of the Council of Governments; George Janchenck, Summit and Ottmar H. Becker, Administrative Assistant to Joseph Stuk, Mayor of Country Club Hills who also serves as Transportation Chairman of the South Suburban Mayors and Managers Association.

Working in cooperation with Operation Yes! the Mayors committee will be two fold:

1. to organize Suburban Cook County Mayors on behalf of the RTA to let the Illinois legislators know that suburban Cook County will fight Blair's proposal and remain in the RTA along with the other five counties.

2. to let the Suburban Cook County Board of Commissioners know what suburban officials want from the RTA and to be a committee working along with them to help supplement their work.

"We will not allow suburban Cook County taxpayers to finance House Speaker Blair's political future," stated Dachman. "It is obvious that Blair has been talking from both sides of his mouth and has done a complete turn-about on the RTA because he is in a position to lose his house seat in the November elections, thus stifling his future political ambition."

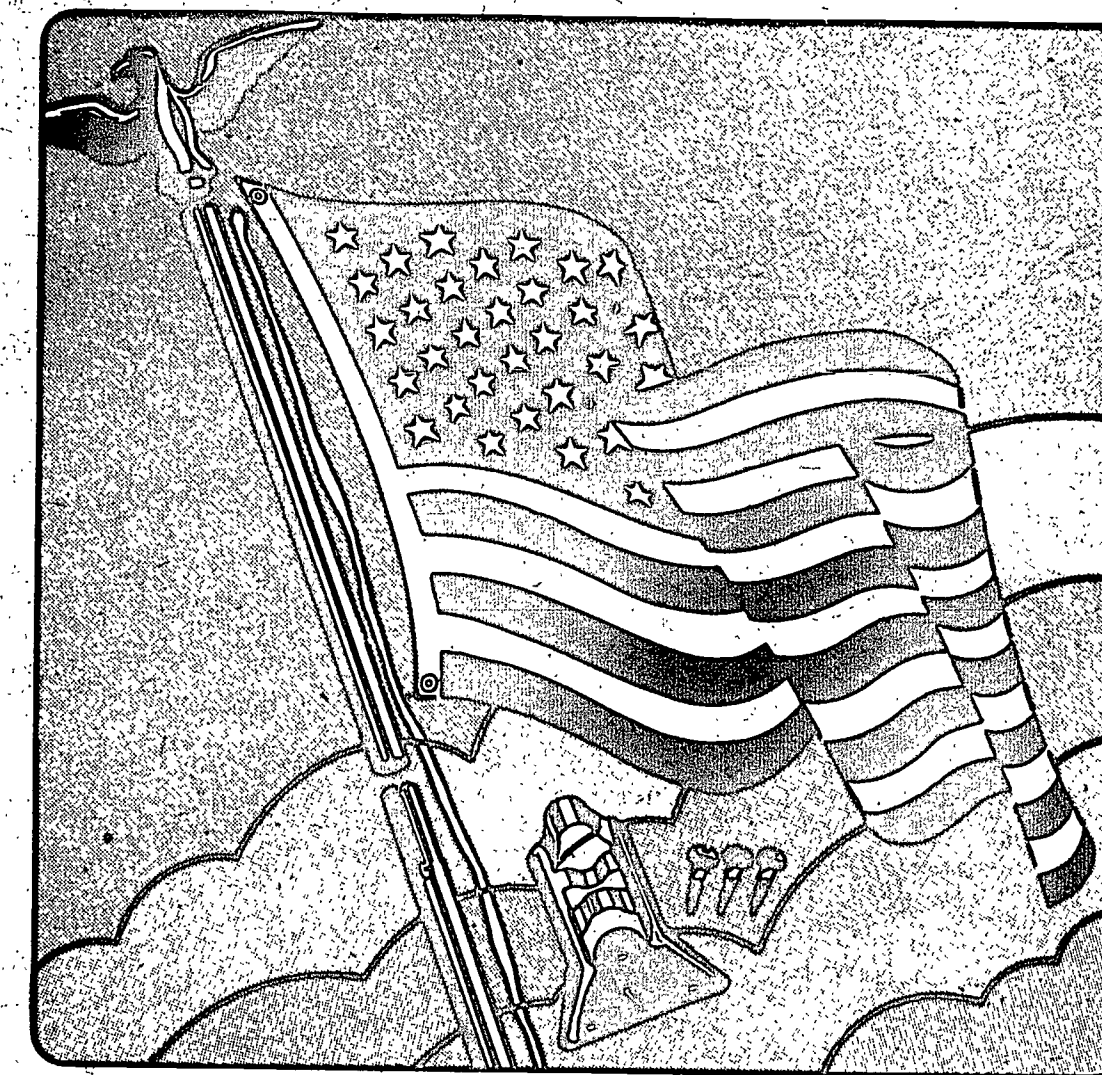

Thought For The Week

'Do you think a person can be loving and still show anger?'

I hope you were—at least able to answer this question. "Yes, I can." Too often a person believes he cannot be loving and still show anger.

As a consequence, he tries to bury his anger and become physically, emotionally or mentally ill. Or a person gives off distorted expressions of anger.

I can't stress too strongly that it is just as natural to be angry at times as it is to love, eat or sleep. It is not "sinful" or "bad" to be angry once in a while. I'm afraid that it has been the general feeling in our society that it is "bad" or "sinful" to express anger.

Don Tastad, Chaplain to alcoholics, Lutheran Welfare Services of Illinois, said at a recent Al-Anon meeting that the alcoholic and his spouse usually have difficulty handling and expressing their anger, but so do a lot of other people. It is a misunderstood and misinterpreted expression of our times.

It is not uncommon that a spouse, parent or child will interpret the person's expression of anger as hate. The fact is that nobody can really be sweet, smiling and happy-go-lucky all the time.

I know because I tried. I had come to believe that it was sinful or bad to express anger, so instead I displaced it or distorted the expression of anger in other ways.

As a consequence, I hurt others, especially some loved ones who were very close to me. Maybe you too are hurting someone through a distorted expression of anger without realizing it.

Take a good look at yourself and review some of the following ways that Tastad and I think you may be displacing or distorting your expression of anger:

Anxiety, depression, guilt, overeating, starvation, no sleep, sleeping too much, chronic anticipation, obsessive thoughts, obsessive and compulsive phobias.

Denial, self sabotage and subtle sabotage, supersweet talk and easy talk, rambling on, no talk.

"Let's pretend," bullying, tearing down, over working, save up things for an argument, "Don't worry about me."

Telling the truth, taking it out through things, always tired, I'm so sick, phony peace, temper tantrums, joking, being uninvolved, never changing.

These are a few of the ways we distort, displace and project our anger. Now ask yourself, "What can I do or how should I express anger?" Here are a few suggestions:

Recognize that it is best to feel anger, accept it as a natural feeling and try to express and share it. (Remember it is not bad or sinful to feel anger or express it — just don't overdo it.)

The day-to-day expression of anger doesn't kill. Distorted anger is explosive and may kill because it is stored up frequently becomes hatred and thereby uncontrollable.

Timing can be very important. When you are in the heat of an argument or have built up anger all day, it is best to "cool it" unless you and the other person are mature enough to handle it and not make more of than you should.

Don't try to make it black or white. It is seldom all the other person's fault. See the part you play also.

Try to forgive and forget the anger expressed by your loved one or friend. Otherwise, it eats at you like poison or cancer. Work as hard at trying to forgive and forget as you were or are in displacing or distorting the anger.

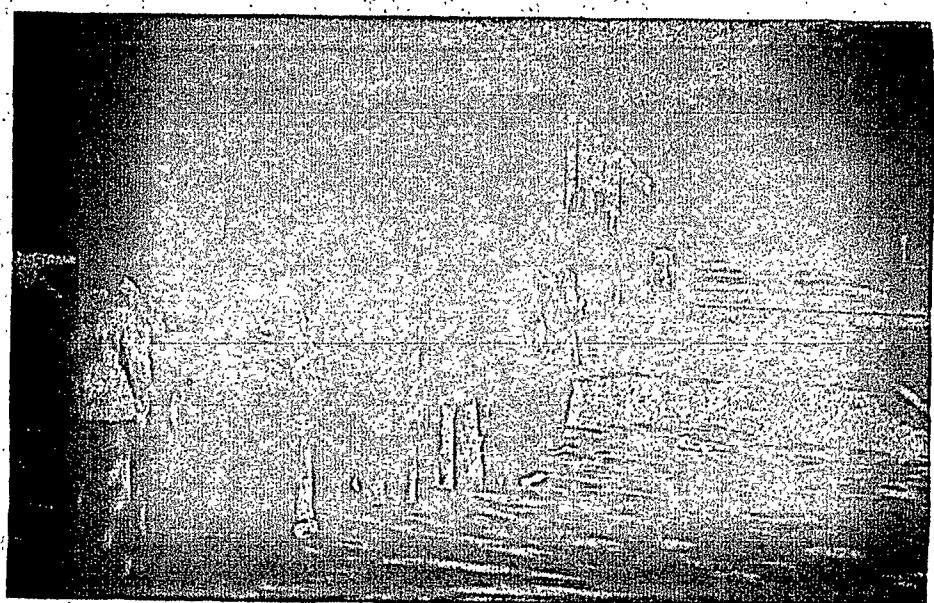


Park purchases land

Christell letter 'incorrect and inconsistent'

In reply to Mr. Christell's recent letter opposing the Equal Rights Amendment for women: His letter is factually and legally incorrect in several of its statements and in my opinion contains some logically inconsistent statements.

Let us carefully look at his argument against the ERA. He states with authority that the 14th amendment gave full substantive equality to women. He is wrong. The 14th amendment was passed in 1868 and the 19th amendment giving women the right to vote was passed in 1920. Inbetween we had 5 US Supreme Court decisions that said that women were not persons within the meaning of the 14th amendment in relation to voting.

In his very next sentence he states that the 14th amendment gave women certain benefits over men and he points to labor laws, support laws and draft exemptions as examples. I submit that it is illogical to say that the 14th amendment gave absolute equality to women and then in the next sentence state that women enjoy certain discriminatory benefits over men. If women are equal to men then men must be equal to women. The fact of the matter is that he is confusing two different legal principles. Additionally, his statement points out the problem for women relying on the 14th amendment. Each woman or other person must bring suit in her or his name to rectify a discriminatory action and then only then are the class of persons that the person falls into given benefit of a positive court decision. All other classes of persons are not affected by the court decision.

Mr. Christell states again with authority that ERA would subject women to the draft. He is wrong. The US Supreme Court has said on many occasions that reasonable classifications (discriminations) of persons are permissible. Examples: Draft exemptions for women, farmers, religious, students, etc. and in charging a higher license fee to out of state truckers than one does to in state truckers or in charging higher or lower fees to different classes for any reasonable reason under the "State Action" legal theory. Next he states that the ERA language and the 14th amend-

ment language are "worded exactly the same." Once again he is wrong. Just read the language and see the difference. Additionally, if one reads the Illinois Constitution, he or she will find that Article I sec. 17 and 18 contain clear and concise language in conformity with the national ERA. It is Article I and 2 that compares with the 5th and 14th amendments of the US Constitution and both were written in relationship to due process of law and equal protection of the law and not with women's rights in mind. In fact the 14th amendment was concerned with free slaves and women were not even under discussion, unless they were black women. Finally, I would inform Mr. Christell that there is no enforcement provision necessary for any state of federal law to be enforced. Enforcement provisions are written to clearly mandate the intent of the legislature and it is up to the state or federal agency charged with responsibility for enforcement to draft the actual guidelines. Example: the EPA Act and the US Environmental Protection Agency Guidelines or the 1968 Safe Streets Act and the LEAA and LLEC Guidelines.

Let me end this letter with a personal comment. Mr. Christell mentions that the "weaker sex" deserves respect and must be protected. In my opinion, this is the nexes of his argument. He cannot accept the fact that women are his equal. I wonder if it ever occurred to him that women do not want his protection and that they are willing to fend for themselves in this world. I appreciate his concern as I have two daughters, but I am also raising them to take care of themselves and not rely on others.

Finally, I would like to say that opposition to ERA is not grounded on law or fact but rather economic considerations. The leaders of ERA opposition are the businesses that employ large numbers of women. Equal Rights means Equal Pay to business and this is why business opposes ERA. The emotional arguments they use such as fear, are simply tools of ignorance, prejudicial stupidity and intellectual absurdity. Discrimination in any form is morally wrong in anyone's religion and it is time practiced what we preach. Pass the ERA this year and let us move on the more important issues facing our nation.

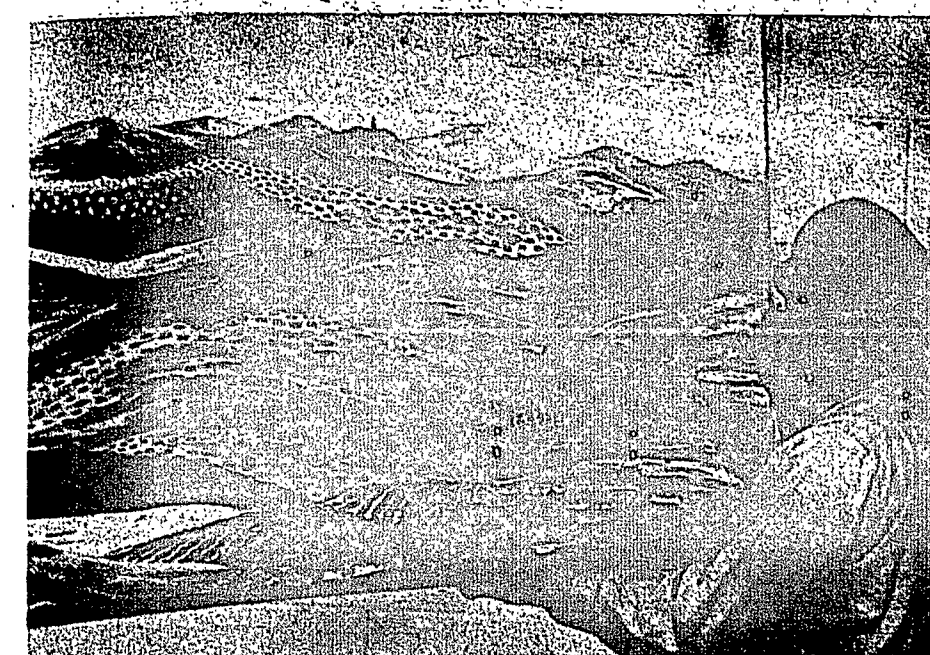

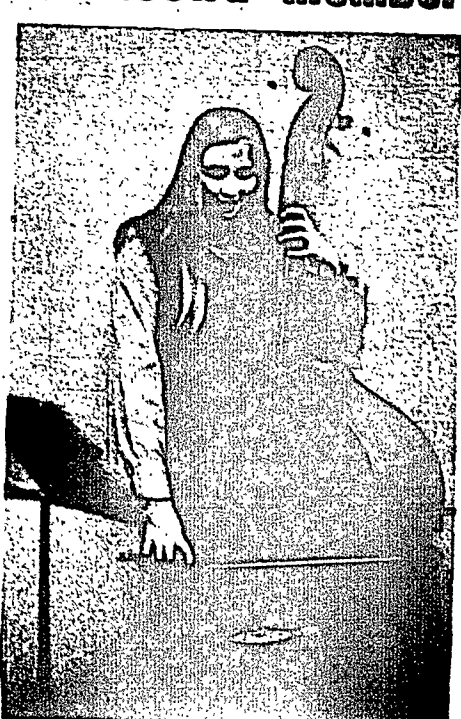
