If someone from a far-away land was to ask you what America is like, your answer might be quite unlike answers of a farmer from the mid-wheatland, or the craggy taciturn New Englander, or the white-haired suntanned retiree from Arizona. Similarly, our 3 weeks in Israel saw our viewfinder find many faces in Israel.

On Ben Yehudi Street in cosmopolitan Telaviv the Deborah Hotel was a huge picture window which allows passersby to see the flickering sabbath candles of the Friday night residents. Inside, a sign above the elevator tells you it's "automatic", it stops at every floor, which is balm for the religionists who strictly observe the sabbath rules.

Farther south on the communal kibbutz, Ramat Yochanan, my wife's cousin Rachel observes none of the religious ritual. But she has a feeling for this land, which is every bit as spiritual as the sabbath observers at the hotel. She has devoted her life to the land. She gave up her Boston abode in 1932 and pioneered this then-desolate area. Perhaps we might compare her to our western settlers whose love for the land made today's America. She lives in a small 3 room house which includes a 17 x 7 living room, a 7 x 10 bedroom, a service kitchen and an 8 x 10 enclosed porch. Her bathroom is 6 1/2 x 5 3/4 which includes the toilet and shower. A squeegee resting against the shower wall presses the excess water down the drain, since the shower room is not separated from the rest of the bath-room. And hanging light bulbs scrawnily stretch down from the ceiling.

The life on the Kibbutz is unlike 96% of the way other Israelis live. Only 4% of the populous reside in communes. Yet, the Ben Gurions and a disproportionate number of the country's leaders come from the Kibbutz. While only 4% reside there, more than 20% of the Army Officer Corps.

'Do you think a person can be loving and still show anger?'

hope you were at least able to answer this question. "Yes, I can." Too often a person believes he cannot be loving and still sor of chemistry at Oakton Community college. The class will

As a consequence, he tries to bury his anger and become physically meet daily, Monday through emotionally or mentally ill. Or a person gives off distorted ex-Thursday, from 11:30 a.m. to 12:40

I can't stress too strongly that it is just as natural to be angry at times as it is to love, eat or sleep. It is not "sinful" or "bad" to be angry once in a while. I'm afraid that it has been the general feeling in our society that it is "bad" or "sinful" to express anger.

Don Tastad, Chaplain to alcoholics, Lutheran Welfare Services of Illinois, said at a recent Al-Anon meeting that the alcoholic and his spouse usually have difficulty handling and expressing their anger, but so do a lot of other people. It is a misunderstood and misinterpreted expression of our times.

It is not uncommon that a spouse, parent or child will interpret the person's expression of anger as hate. The fact is that nobody can really be sweet, smiling and happy-go-lucky all the time.

I know because I tried. I had come to believe that it was sinful or bad to express anger, so instead I displaced it or distorted the expression of anger in other ways.

As a consequence, I hurt others, especially some loved ones who were very close to me. Maybe you too are hurting someone through a distorted expression of anger without realizing it.

Take a good look at yourself and review some of the following ways, that Tastad and I think you may be displacing or distorting your expression of anger:

Anxiety, depression, guilt, overeating, starvation, no sleep, sleeping too much, chronic anticipation, obsessive thoughts, obsessive and compulsive phobias. Denial, self sabotage and subtle sabotage, supersweet talk and

easy talk, rambling on, no talk.

"Let's pretend," bullying, tearing down, over working, save up things for an argument, "Don't worry about me."

Telling the truth, taking it out through things, always tired, I'm so sick, phony peace, temper tantrums, joking, being uninvolved, never changing.

These are a few of the ways we distort, displace and project our anger. Now ask yourself, "What can I do or how should I express anger?" Here are a few suggestions:

Recognize that it is best to feel anger, accept it as a natural feeling and try to express and share it. (Remember it is not bad or sinful to feel anger or express it -- just don't overdo it.) The day-to-day expression of anger doesn't kill. Distorted anger

is explosive and may kill because it is stored up frequently becomes hatred and thereby uncontrollable. Timing can be very important. When you are in the heat of an argument or have built up anger all day, it is best to "cool it" unless

you and the other person are mature enough to handle it and not make more of than you should. Don't try to make it black or white. It is seldom all the other

person's fault. See the part you play also.

Try to forgive and forget the anger expressed by your loved one or friend. Otherwise, it eats at you like poison or cancer. Work as hard at trying to forgive and forget as you were or are in displacing or distorting the anger.

Christell letter 'incorrect and inconsistent'

In reply to Mr. Christell's recent letter opposing the Equal His letter is factually and legally incorrect in several of its statements and in my opinion contains some logically inconsistent statements.

Let us carefully look at his argument against the ERA. He states with authority that the 14th amendment gave full substantitive equality to women. He is wrong. The 14th amendment was passed in 1868 and the 19th amendment giving women the right to vote was passed in 1920. inbetween we had 5 US Supreme Court decisions that said that women were not persons within the meaning of the 14th amendment in relation to voting.

In his very next sentence he states that the 14th amendment gave women certain benefits over men and he points to labor laws, support laws and draft exemptions as examples. I submit that it is illogical to say that the 14th amendment gave absolute equality to women and then in the next sentence state that women enjoy certain discriminatory benefits over men. If women are equal to men then men must be equal to women. The fact of the matter is that he is confusing two different legal principles. Additionally, his statement points out the problem for women relying on the 14th amendment. Each woman or other person must bring suit in her or his name to rectify a discriminatory action and then and only then are the class of persons that the person falls into given benefit of a positive court decision. All other classes of

court decision. Mr. Christell states again with authority that ERA would subiect women to the draft. He is wrong. The US Supreme Court has said on many occasions that reasonable classifications (discriminations) of persons are permissable. Cont'd from Niles-E Maine P.1 side cabinets to protect them from the elements, new oversize, intake and pump gauges on a nonglare pump panel, and 200' of l' booster hose. Although the engine sports more compartments than the other department pumpers, the overall size of the rig has not been increased.

The engine also carries a split hosebed, separated by a walk through catwalk, to make hose loading easier, and carries a to-tal of 1700° of 2 1/2° hose, and 300' of 1 1/2" hose. A portable deluge gun is mounted on the top of the engine with tips ranging from 600 GPM to 1100 GPM. Also included is Elkhart's new 'Thinking Nozzles' in both 21/2" and 1 1/2" sizes. These nozzles maintain automatically an adequate supply of water regardless of the pressure.

Other apparatus presently in service in the department includes another 1500 GPM Pirsch pumper. with automatic transmission purchased in 1966, a 1970 100' Pirsch senior aerial ladder, with automatic transmission, and two 1250 GPM pumpers in reserve, a 1956 and 1961 rig. Niles purchased their first




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



