Arrangements have been made with the Village's Scavenger Service to pick up just about everything a homeowner wants to dispose of every week. All that the resident has to do is set out the unwanted item with his garbage on his regular garbage pick-up day and the scavenger trucks take

There are a few exceptions. The scavengers will not take branches over four feet long or stumps over three inches in dia-meter, large amounts of building materials such as drywall, lath and plaster or stucco, broken up concrete or containers of dirt. They will take all types of items which are left stored in the garage or attic and become fire hazards.

Captain Huscher also asked that residents remember that there are several organizations in the Village which collect bundled papers and rags. Most of these organizations will pick up these items. There is also a metal and glass recycling center at Austin and Oakton on the west side of Niles Township West High school Athletic Field.

Recycling and Conservation are very important to all of us, but please don't store up large accumulations for pick-up or recycling as you are then creating a serious fire hazard.

Many physicians entering the Air Force are now eligible to receive up to a \$13,500 annual bo-

This could bring the total yearly salary of a physician joining the Air Force upon completion of residency training to as much as

The new law authorizing the bo-nus was signed May 6 by Presi-dent Richard M. Nixon and becomes effective June 1.

All military physicians in the grade of colonel and below are eligible for the bonus, exce those undergoing intern or initial residency training and doctors fulfilling an initial obligation of 4 years or less. A physician who has served 4 years of his obligation will be e for bonus consideration regardless of the length of obligated service remaining.

Physicians who have incurred obligations are those entering the Air Force through the draft motivated Berry Plan, Health Professionals Scholarships, or other military scholarship programs.

The bill also provides that physicians will receive \$100 amonth special pay during the first two years of active duty and \$350 a month thereafter. Formerly, a physician was required to serve 10 years before receiving the full \$350 per month.

Continuation pay for doctors below the grade of brigadier general expired with the signing of

Instructions for award of the bonus, by all services, are now being formulated by the Department of Defense and the implementation date will be announced
