Niles Family Service Thought For The Week

By Stan Levi LOSS OF SPOUSE = 2 - ?


Most people tend to view the loss of a spouse either by divorce. separation, death or incapacitating event as affecting the family equation by only removing one part. Unfortunately the loss has a profound and lasting effect on the entire family's functioning, particularly the remaining member who is left with the responsibility for the children. Just as a basketball team with only four players must dramatically alter its game plan, so too a family faces quite an adjustment when a parent is absent. Following a loss, every time an important decision is made a spouse is reminded of the absence of the missing spouse. All to often after a loss the remaining spouse feels a lasting burden of making up for the absent spouse, a pressure which tends to drive the remaining spouse to unrealistic goals particularly with the children, and adds to his or her already sometimes overwhelming feeling of loneliness.

I am emphasizing the loss of a spouse but with the important qualification that the remaining spouse need not feel driven to make up for the loss. Regardless of whatever guilt the remaining spouse may feel, that person can only give to the children to the best of her ability. The more he pushes himself to do what is actually unreasonable, the more he detracts from the best for the family. I'm reminded all too often when families come in with only one parent of the devasting effect a child's problem has on the parent responsible for him. The parent often feels that the burden that has been placed on him is unfair and impossible and the only way that he can deal with his circumstances is to try to please the child in every way possible. The net effect of this kind of adjustment often is to promote rather than prevent

Just try to remember if you happen to be solely responsible for your family that you too have a right not only to get pleasure for yourself and enjoy your children, but also to expect that you cannot do everything for your children and not make up for your loss spouse. His or her memory is going to be with you and is going to always affect your memories of the family the way it was. Don't try to overcome that memory; rather, try to get used to its presence, and allow yourself the human experience of making mistakes.

Because of our concern about the pressures single parents feel, we are planning to offer a series of group discussions in September about the normal problems in being an only parent. The room is fully air conditioned with a separate 15,000 ton capacity unit. Temperature is kept at a constant 72 degrees and humidity at 50%. The computer room also features smoke detection devices with a direct hook up to the fire

The First National Bank runs a two-shift operation. There are two operators handling the day shift and one at night. Phillips added that the system enables the bank to process more data using the data using the same number of people and provides them with greater processing skills.

"Use extra care in keeping your eye on your checks, credit cards, and other personal financial information, because check forgers are very ingenious about getting money out of your bank account," warns Jack Lavold, vice president and cashier of the First National

"For example," said Lavold, "30 billion checks are written every year. Over half of them are personal checks, not business checks, and 40% of the personal checks are for amounts of less. than \$25. 

Mortgage money expensive, but available

W.C. Walters, Sales Manager of Callero & Catino Realty, Inc., a local Realtor, Builder and Land Developer, is confident that soon the cost of borrowing money will drop, however, not too signifi-cantly unless the Usury Rate ceiling be raised.

"It is interesting to note, says Mr. Walters how misconcepted some people are over the Usury Rate issue." Many an Illinois politician seems to be concerned over the little man's dilemna in facing a higher interest rate, failing to understand that higher rates don't necessarily cost the consumer more money. To exemplify, he states, "The present charge on a residential mortgage is 7.7% interest with 7 points (premium in cash to enable to borrower to make a loan) over 25 years is quite common among the Cook County lenders. This computes an annual percentage rate not exceeding 8%, however, it should be noted that the charges for the loan inasmuch as payable in one lump sum at the closing are spread over 25 years, the duration of the loan. However, assuming the exemplified loan was repaid in 7 years, the average longevity, the effective annual percentage rate would increase to 8.7%. Again, records show that numerous transactions required refinancing within 3 years of its last transaction, which in our example would increase the rate to over 10%."

The foregoing clearly indicates the disadvantage an Illinois borrower is at as compared with borrowers in States where there is no limit on interest charged or where the limit is 10% or over. we have recently negotiated a mortgage at 8½% with a fee of 2 points premium without difficulty.

Another inequity in the matter is the federally insured loans under the titles of FHA and VA which are exempt from Illinois Usury Law and as such can be ad-
