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



Raffe said his office hours for registration will be 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. Monday through Friday, and from 9 a.m. until noon on Saturdays. The Saturday hours, Raffe added, are a service that will make it possible for persons who work during the week to register locally.

Qualifications for registration, he said, are that the registrant must have resided at the registered address for at least 30 days prior to the day of election. The next general election is Nov. 5.

Raffe advises recently naturalized citizens who wish to register to bring their naturalization papers with them.

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Niles Family Service Thought For The Week

By Stan Levi THE MOURNING AFTER

Divorce, like death, signifies the end of a relationship. When any relationship ends one must go through a mourning process to put that relationship in proper perspective. The mourning that accompanies divorce depends on the nature of the relationship that preceded the divorce. That is, an individual who has wanted a divorce from a spouse is going to react quite differently than one who resented the idea of the divorce and the breakup of the

Often the first reaction when divorce is imminent is one of denial this isn't happening, this can't happen to me. This reaction usually represents the feeling of "if I acknowledge that the divorce is happening then there really must be something wrong with me," Immediately following the realization that yes, the divorce is happening and the relationship is over, the spouse often feels a sense of anger sometimes bordering on fury at the other spouse. The other spouse has been such a terrible person, the marriage really wasn't a very happy one. This reaction slowly leads into a more appropriate more realistic view of what went on within the relationship accompanied with some guilt and some remorse that the relationship is ending. Hopefully, by this time the person is able to see why the divorce is happening, what part he played in it and what this means for future relationships.

The actual mourning of the divorce is never quite put into perspective until long after the legal process is completed. Many people, upon divorcing, enter a period of euphoria where they're on a real high. This usually eventually ends in a crashing low, I think that the reason for the high is that the person has really entered the denying phase of divorce. The person is really acting as if the divorce has no impact on him, has no great meaning, and therefore he can just go on his merry way. As with any death, the lack of mourning catches up with the person and soon they begin to feel depressed. This depression is the appropriate necessary depression following divorce and should not be one that frightens someone. Often people spend so much energy trying to avoid depression that they overlook that however unhappy they felt in the relationship, nevertheless it was an extremely important and meaningful union with another person.

The mourning process after death is the equivalent of one after divorce. The person initially denies that anything has happened or that there has really been an impact of a loss. Then there's often a feeling of what could I have done to prevent the death, followed by a wish that the positive aspects of the relationship had been maximised when the person was alive. Eventually, this leads into an idealization of the person who has died, that is the remaining person thinks of the loved one as having been almost saintly. Following this reaction is often a reaction of anger, indeed sometimes rage, that the person who died is dead. How in the world could that person have the nerve to leave me? Why did he do this to me? What did I every do to him that I deserved for him to leave me. As the relationship starts being put in proper perspective this perception is modified to accomodate both the positive and negative qualities of the deceased.

Just as with divorce, the mourning process often takes many months, sometimes even years. Unfortunately, people are too quick to feel that their reactions are crazy and they shouldn't feel that way. Everyone around the widow or widower tries to cheer him up. Nobody wants to see anyone depressed because it touches our own sense of mortality. By inhibiting the mourning process, not only do we extend it, but we make it more difficult to deal with. What's important is allowing and in fact even helping the person to talk about his depression, to experience the depression and yet be able to go on and complete the mourning process with the people around


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GIRLS 12" SOFTBALL

OUR FAVORITE BOOKIE . . .

Each summer we recommend to baseball fans one book which we're sure they'll enjoy. We recommended **Boys of Summer** and **The Summer Season** the past years and if you haven't read either book, you're missing two of the best books every written about the summer game. **Boys of Summer** is selling in hardcover at a bargain \$1.98 at local book stores so we urge you to head to your nearest bookie for this story about the old Dodgers.

This year we came across a little-known book which deserves wider coverage. Destines Darlings by Martin Ralbovsky. The author sought the members of the 1954 Little League champions from Schenectady. 20 years after they won their championship. The men. now 32 years old, reveal what the competition in Little League meant to them.

Ralbovsky seeks a mini-biography of each man, following them from their 12 year old days of triumph, thru their teen days, and into their twenties and thirties. None of the men are particularly successful. And you close the last page of the book not convinced they've been greatly aided or harmed by their Little League experience. The Little League manager's tough guy 'win at all costs' philosophy is questioned by several of the former champions. But we were not convinced they were unduly scarred by his one-minded quest. And we were also not convinced the average humdrum lives the men now live are much different from other men with similar backgrounds.

Destinies Darlings is a most worthwhile book for all baseball fans and should be of particular importance to all parents, players, managers and coaches of Little League ball who I'm sure have questioned the value of this man-sport for boys.

We can't close out a Summertime . . . And The Livin' Is Easy column without recommending a couple of good eating spots in the area.

Young's survey to residents

To the Editor I returned Rep. Sam Young's gether with an explanation of why my wife and I could not in good conscience answer it. The reasons I outlined to him may be of interest to other 10th District

Most of the questions, which all required a simple YES or NO. with no room at all for comment are worded in a very restrictive manner, failing to allow for a choice along the broad scope of the issue, and appearing to reflect opinions already held by the Congressman. For example: Every question

on the energy shortage is worded in such a way as to infer that the crisis occured because of restrictions on the oil companies, and because our air quality standards are too high. There is no question which leaves room for suggesting the possibility of something like nationalizing all forms of energy production, or which asks us to ponder what can be done to prevent the outrageous rise in brices from which the oil industry has reaped such enormous profits. Had even one line been left for a comment, a person could make a suggestion such as, perhaps, the enactment of legislation providing that no car be manufactured exceeding a four cylinder engine.

The series on campaign reform is just as ridiculous. We are locked into accepting or rejecting public financing of \$90,000 for each major party House candidate. Plans call for a 50 percent increase in space over the current 24,00. sq. ft. that First National has occupied at the corner of Lee and Prairied Streets since 1957.


