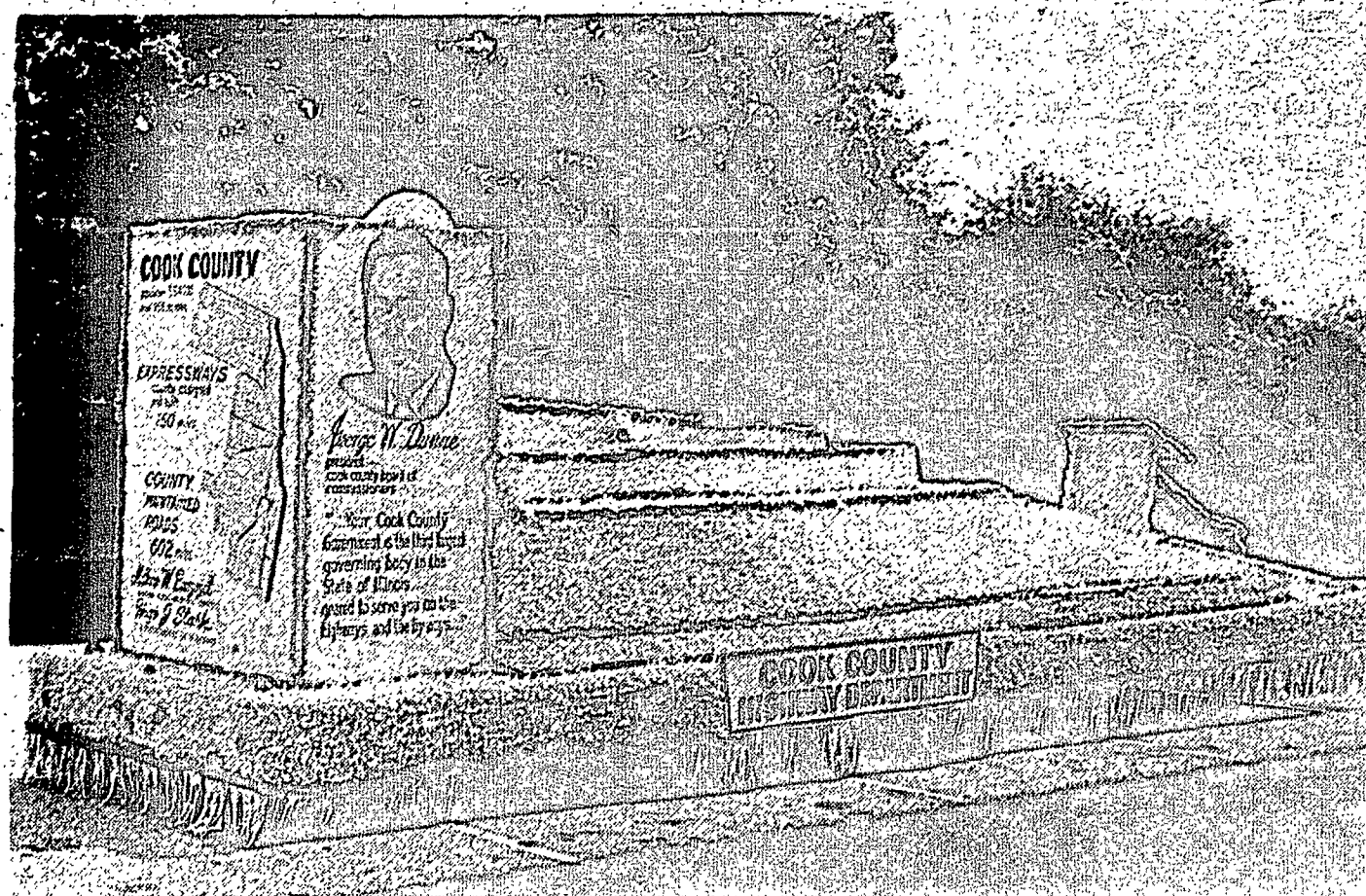


Giant Jubilee Parade on Sunday

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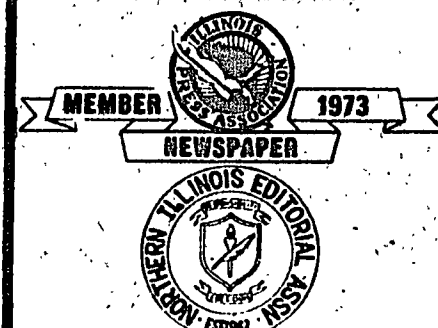

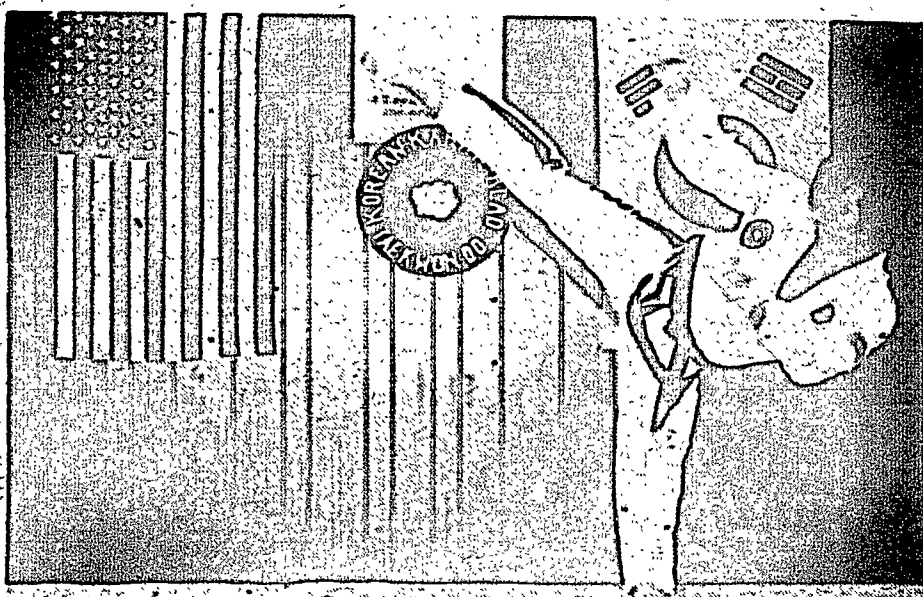

After the newspapers are delivered, there will be a rally in Linde Woods in Morton Grove. Both Proxmire and Mikva will be there.

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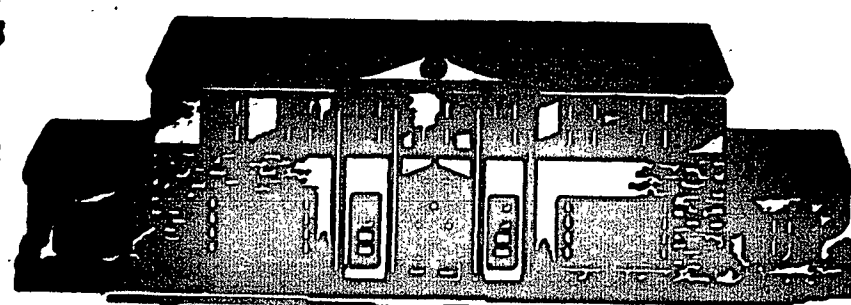

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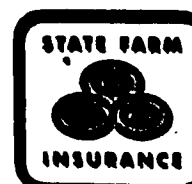

Park Ridge artist wins top LW Fair prize

Hundreds of art lovers—and buyers—wandered through the 11th annual Art Fair held Aug. 17 and 18 in the Lawrencewood Shopping Center, Waukegan rd. and Oakton st., Niles, as temperatures soared toward the nineties.

Approximately 90 exhibitors from Florida, Illinois, Wisconsin, Indiana and Iowa displayed various medias of art-work and creative art in the fair sponsored by the Niles Art Guild.

Winning the top prize of the Fair for the second consecutive year, Glenn Tammen of Park Ridge received the Village Purchase Award of \$100 for his "watercolor," "Birch in Winter," a winter farm scene featuring white birch.

A formal presentation of the prize watercolor to the village and acceptance of the award will be made officially at a future village board meeting. The framed painting will then be on display at the Administration Building, 7601 Milwaukee ave.

Tammen, 65, also took first place in watercolor, for "Evening," his 143rd watercolor, drawn from photographs. A retired industrial designer, Tammen began to paint "for something to do." He prefers to paint outdoor scenes and has won 21 awards out of the 22 art shows in which he exhibited during the last five years.

First and second place awards of \$50 and \$25, respectively, were made in the categories of oils, watercolor, mixed media and miscellaneous arts. Honorable mention ribbons were awarded at the judges discretion in both art and handicraft. Awards this year were based on the artist's overall work.

First in oils was awarded to Kay Groh, a resident of Niles for 20 years, who combines brushwork with palette knife. She admittedly "leans toward" outdoor scenes, although several of her portraits were breathtakingly realistic. John Grow, also a Niles resident, was awarded second place for his oils, using only brushwork. Honorable mentions went to Ruth Clifton of Edison Park, a self-styled "Sunday painter," and to Linda Dixon of Deerfield, primarily for a lifelike oil of a lion and his family.

Second place in watercolor went to Kathleen Salomone. Honorable mention was awarded to Niles resident Marge Berles, co-founder of the Niles Art Guild, a past president and an annual art fair exhibitor in oils and pastels.

Using watercolors for the past two years, her exhibits included strikingly realistic watercolors of a "Girl and Flowers" and "My Jewel Box."

In mixed media, Barbara Martens was first for her exhibit of inks, acrylics and macrame. Second place award went to Niles resident Joan Franzen, a free lance commercial artist who uses pastels for show exhibits, although she also uses oils and pen and ink. A first place winner in mixed media last year, she also won an Honorable Mention in 1972. Roberta Haas was given Honorable Mention for an un-oil scratchboard in color.

In miscellaneous category, which was given over to photography, Carol Garast, a teacher of art at Niles Elementary School, was awarded first place for nature photos. Second place went to Brian Zaken and Honorable Mention was given Russ Wegner for silk screen prints.

Outstanding of this year's Fair, again, was the painstaking craft-

work exhibit of "Horology in Pictures," displayed by Edward Danielczyk of Park Ridge, whose sales were tremendous both Saturday and Sunday.

A horologist (watchmaker) by trade, Danielczyk accumulated watch parts and began, several years ago, to fashion them into artistically intricate designs. Using mainsprings, dials, crown, crystals and "anything out of a watch," he designs trains, cars, boats and owls (listed in order of preference by customers.)

His average piece of work requires four hours to complete, and no two are exactly alike. "said the handicraft artist. His wife Lottie, "who is my greatest critic," selects suitable backgrounds in color and materials and unusual wood frames for his designs.

One of his designs, a 10" by 24" intricately fashioned train, is presently on display at Peacock's in Chicago. New in his exhibit this year were airplane designs and the use of action works and porcelain faces on his designs.

His most recent order, on Sunday, was for a crane, to be fashioned from watchparts.

Unusual and unique was said of Beverly Firmis' exhibit of sculpture, jewelry, bells and figurines fashioned "naturally" from Indian red clay. Beverly "makes things to suit herself" and her designs originate "from my love of the West"... "I would like to fashion enough designs so I could sell them on a wayside road, maybe somewhere on Highway 66," said the Niles resident, who was wearing some of her creations.

A 1972 award winner for watercolor, a young Chinese student, whose canvas name is "Jiro", exhibited an interestingly beautiful technique in oils this year. Fu-Lung Li, born in Yi-Lan, Taiwan, uses sand and string under oils of boyhood scenes. His choice of colors was striking.

Exhibit chairman Marilyn Brown commented that while "this year's watercolor exhibits are more professional and more realistic, the handicrafts are

getting more unusual every year."

The Art Fair Committee included Marge and Bob Berles, Frank Krusel and Myra Steinbrink. A devotee of art, Mrs. Berles deplored the too few exhibits... "There are more and more art fairs each year, who, unfortunately, exhibit on the same weekends. Artists are undecided in which fairs to exhibit."

Judges were Dan Sculan of Glenview, a free lance illustrator, previously with the J. Walker Thompson Agency; and Norman Brown of Deerfield, a commercial artist formerly with Wrigley.

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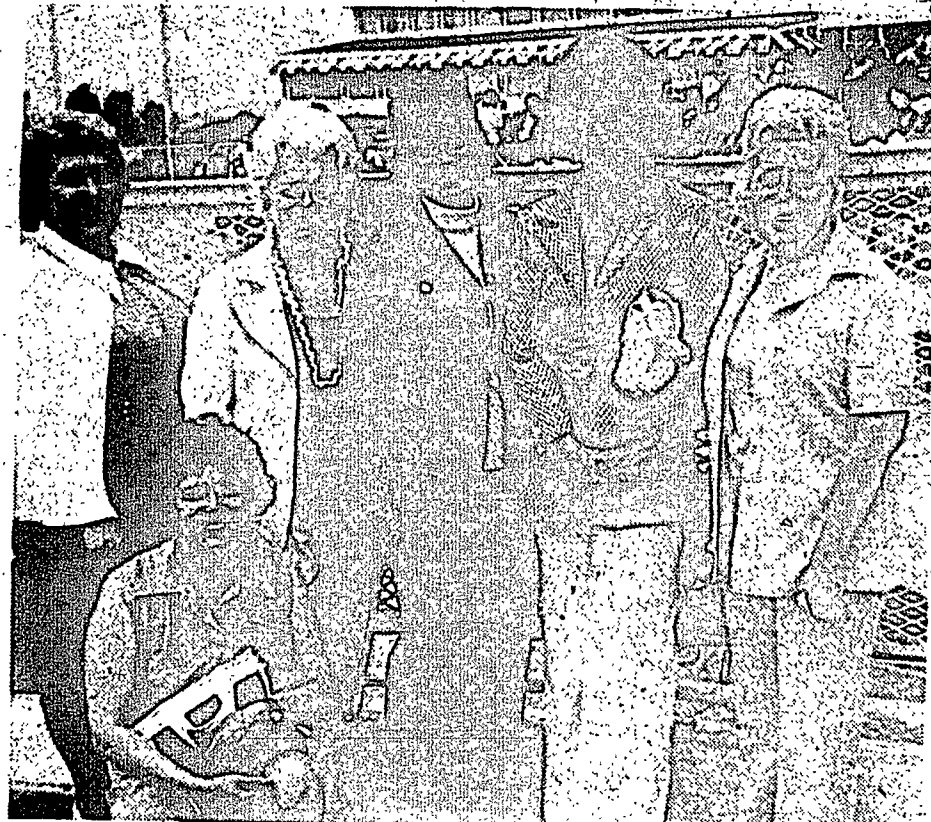

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Niles Family Service Thoughts For This Week

"SPARE THE ROD, SPOIL THE CHILD"

I appreciate receiving your letters and phone calls. Here is one of the letters.

What is your response to it:

Dear Mr. Renetzky:

I have often found that when my children are acting naughty they are really asking for a little more of my attention. I take time out from whatever I'm doing to hold them and talk to them, and that usually seems to be the answer. I do feel spanking is necessary when they do something that is potentially dangerous for them such as running out into the street or playing with matches. Because these are things which could be harmful, I feel it's important to get my point across the first time it happens so that it won't happen again.

I believe that "spare the rod, spoil the child" was a theory in keeping with "children should be seen and not heard," a way of keeping such a rigid control over the child that the child, out of fear, was respectful and obedient. It seems, though, that this denies the child's feelings and rights as a person. My children do, at times, become overly demanding of me which is what some people call being spoiled. At these times I reinforce the idea with them that I also have rights as a person separate from them and they must respect my rights as I do theirs. I don't believe spanking or lack of it has to do with producing a spoiled child. I feel that spoiling comes from the parents' inability to set limits on the children in regard to what are reasonable expectations for the child to keep.

Name confidential

Dear Confidential:

I agree that one of the most important times to spank a child is when they do something potentially dangerous to themselves. Whenever you spank a child as long as it isn't done in the midst of anger or hostility, it registers loud and clear with a youngster, this of course should be followed up with a brief and easily understood explanation. Make sure your child understands the reason for the spanking and then the child can more readily accept it. Follow up immediately or shortly after with an affirmation, hug, kiss, work of encouragement or something else to the affect that helps the child to know that you are not mad at him, rejecting him, or just trying to hurt him but that you do indeed love him or her. This does not spoil your child rather it strengthens the parent-child relationship and reassures your child that you indeed care enough to really involve yourself as well as it says to your child, "I'm O.K."

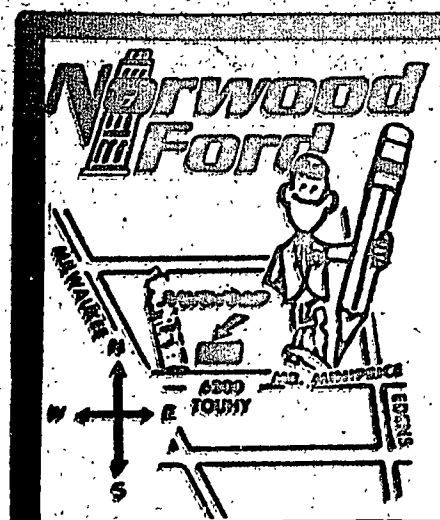

A jubilant Park Attorney Gabriel Berrafato reported to Park Commissioners, at the conclusion of Tuesday night's board meeting, that "Little Tam is now legally Niles Park District property...The property has been deeded to the Niles Park District...I am very pleased that all things have been resolved."

He referred to the trials and tribulations which have beset the Niles Park District since the condemnation proceedings to acquire the 122 acre Tam property at Caldwell and Howard were instituted in 1965 by the Niles Park District against the owners, J. Emil Anderson & Co. The suit was dismissed in 1966 and a 9-hole executive-type golf course set on the remaining, south 36-1/2 acres of Tam, following construction of an industrial park north of Howard st., gave the Niles Park District an option, up to Dec. 31, 1974, to purchase "Little Tam." The operation of the golf course and successful passage of a park referendum in 1973 finally earned sufficient funds for the Park District to purchase the property.

"Revenue Bonds in the amount of \$665,000 plus \$665,000 cash obtained with general obligation bonds under the 1973 referendum said Berrafato, "made the total purchase price of \$1,330,000." "Added to that," he explained further, "is the repayment to Anderson, of the \$175,000 advance to the Park District to improve the golf course, bringing the total cost of Little Tam to \$1,505,000."

He also told commissioners that the Jonquil Terrace Park city had been recommended recently for funding by the Illinois Dept. of Conservation. Purchase, by the Niles Park District, over a year ago, of 1-1/2 acres of Jonquil Park, also gave the Park District an option to buy the remainder of the 5 acre site upon successful passage of the 1973 park referendum. Purchase was made a month ago for \$180,000.

The funding, according to Berrafato, is monies dedicated by the government to conserve space and develop park recreation. "It is quite possible that the Dept. of Conservation will reimburse the NPD up to 50 per cent of the Jonquil purchase price."

"We will have a decision on the reimbursement around September or October," said Berrafato, who opined that the monies, if received, will be used for improvement of recreation overall the Niles parks.

In other business Commissioner-Treasurer Robert Romano cautioned Park Commissioners to prepare for a cutback in all fields of park operation. A projected anticipated assessed value, by the NPD, according to Romano, of \$300 million, as compared to an actual assessed value of \$219 million "means that we must get our operating budget into focus now, because we will not have the money anticipated." Acting Director Bill Hughes was requested to modify the budget.

Park commissioners selected the \$5,500 bid by the Hydronics Piping Corp. of Elk Grove for alterations and revisions to the air conditioning piping at the Ballard Sports Complex. The bid was the lowest of four received. Unanimous approval was contingent upon review of the contract by park attorney Gabe Berrafato. The \$3,626.18 bid by Inter-

state Playground Equipment of Oak Lawn, as the lowest of 4 bids on the fencing of Jonquil Terrace Park was approved unanimously, contingent upon response by the bidder for a change in order.

A special meeting of the NPD commissioners to discuss the proposed Bike Trail from Skokie to Des Plaines was scheduled for Aug. 29 at 8 p.m. A meeting of all park districts involved is set for Sept. 3.

Susan Welch was approved as the new Head Pro skating instructor at Ballard Complex.

Having previously been employed at Rainbow Arena in Chicago, the 27-year-old miss was given a contract by the NPD on a year-to-year basis.

A lack of esprit de corps displayed by the park board for the entire evening was finally lifted by Comr. Walt Beusse, who called for more supervision at Courtland Park over the week-ends. Acting Director Bill Hughes promised a tightening of management.

Beusse also asked for an opinion by Attorney Berrafato as to the

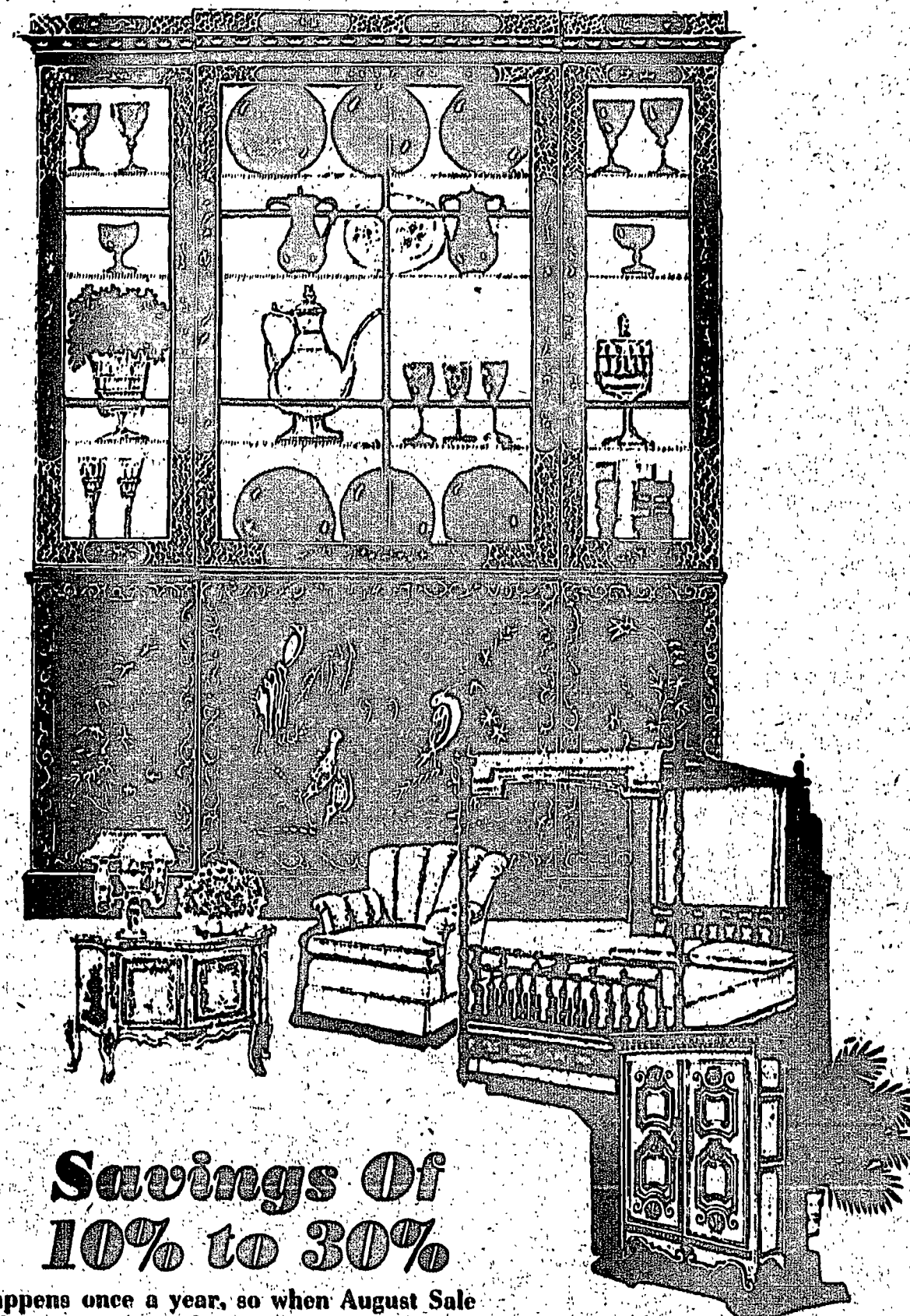
NPD legal status at the Greenwood area. "Constructionists are filling lots (intended for future purchase by the NPD) about 3 feet above the level of the ground, not only causing distress to area residents by swamping the," stated Beusse, "but we could be faced with a grading bill when the park district buys these lots."

Board President Bill Keener requested a review of the area by park commissioners and ultimate discussion with village administrators concerning ordinance violations.

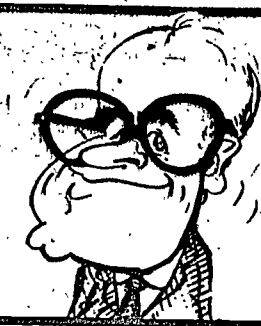

Miss Armstrong previously worked at a family counseling center in Louisville, Kentucky. She says Orchard Center's program is unique because it emphasizes helping families who are worried about their child's growth and development. "There are many programs to help families of handicapped children. We serve these families also. But we are also serving families whose children are not handicapped, but whose development seems slightly slower than average. We feel that by identifying these children and providing therapeutic activities as soon as possible, we can keep these small delays from developing into larger problems later in the child's life."
