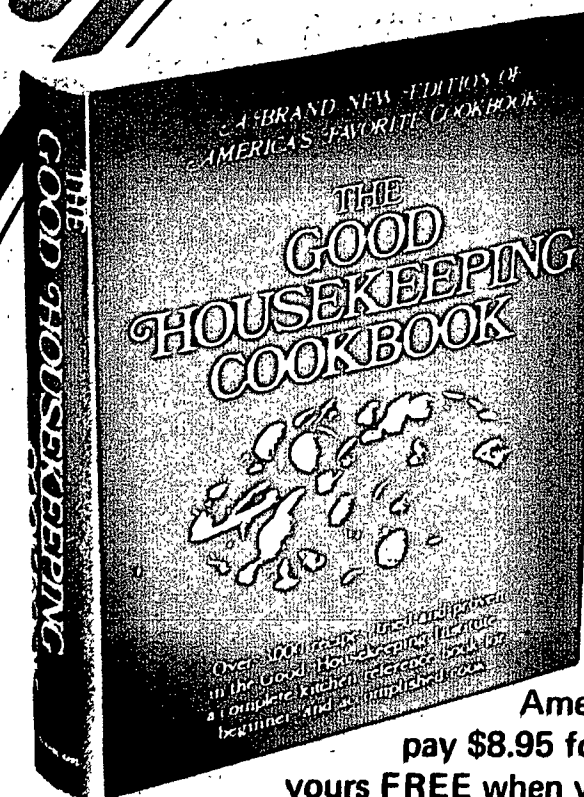


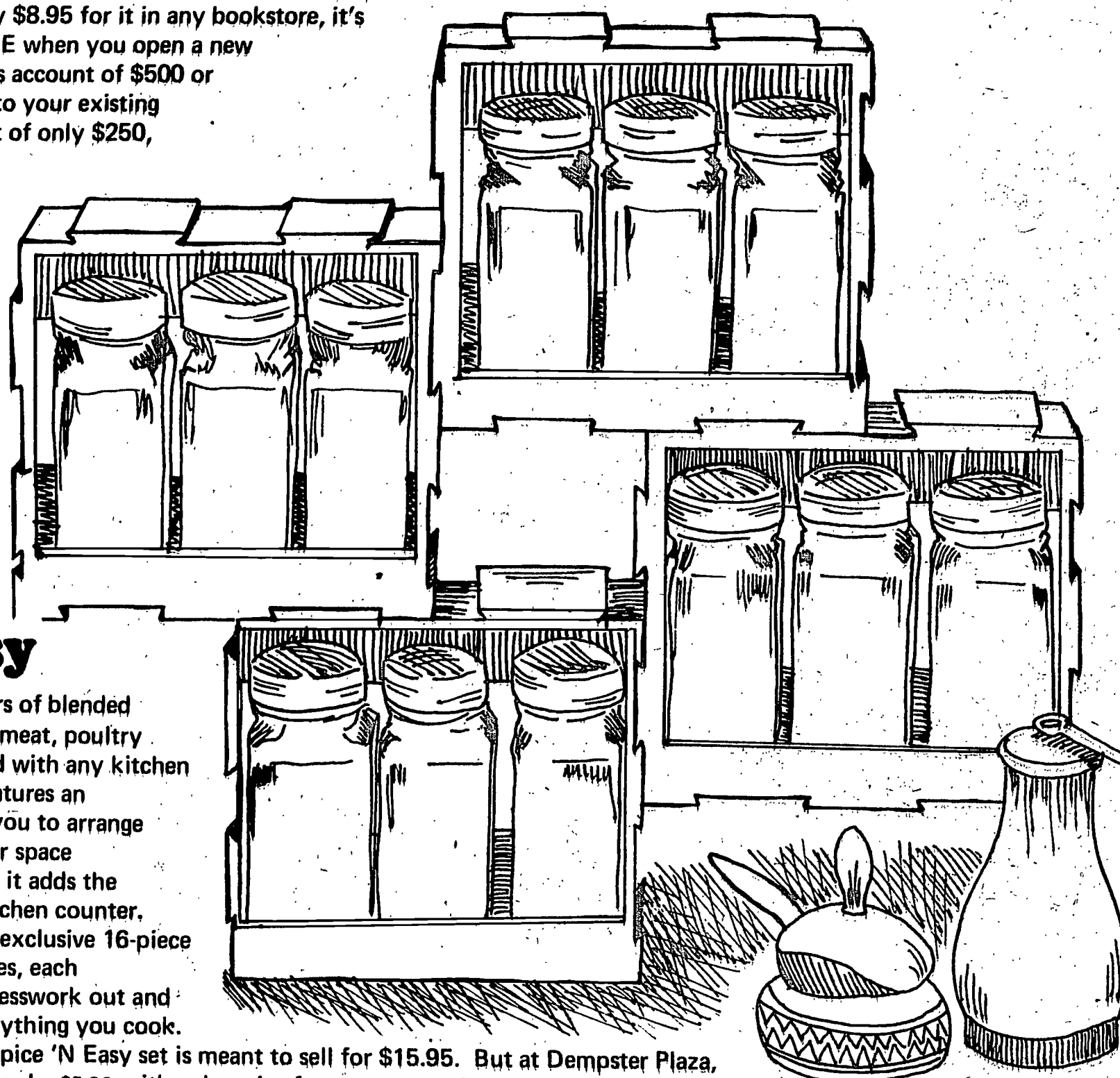

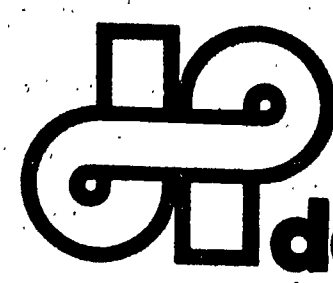

## Free vision tests for residents Sunday

All residents of Niles over the age of 3 years are invited to have their vision checked free of charge at Notre Dame High School, 7655 Dempster st., on Sunday, Sept. 8 between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. This screening is

presented by the Niles Commission on Community Health in cooperation with the Vision Conservation Institute and the Niles Women's Club. The tests will measure visual acuity, depth perception, field of vision, color

perception, and in residents over age 35 for glaucoma.

At the same time and place the Chicago Lung Association will conduct pulmonary function or breathing tests in persons bet-

ween the ages of 30 and 70. This test measures lung capacity and efficiency, detecting asthma, emphysema and other respiratory deficiencies. Persons with a heart condition are not advised to take this test! This testing is also free

of charge—it is paid for by your Christmas Seal Agency.

## OK ZONING FOR NEW S&L BRANCH

The Zoning Board of Appeals approved a request for rezoning of the northwest corner of Dempster and Cumberland, in Niles, for a savings and loan association branch to open for business Nov. 1 or Jan. 1, "dependent on all conditions concerned."

An existing building on the two-acre, corner site, will be used as temporary quarters for branch banking until a permanent, one-and-a-half story building can be constructed.

During the Zoning Board Hearing of Aug. 28, the president of Republic Federal Savings and Loan, 6222 S. Kedzie ave., Chicago, told zoning commissioners that Niles was selected when it became evident, 2 years ago, that branch banking was opening up in the suburbs.

An investment of approximately \$600,000, "or close to three-quarter million dollars" is planned for the area, which will have a plaza in front of the building. Entry to the drive-in facility will be from Dempster at Cumberland, with a north exit on Cumberland as well as a west exit on Dempster st.

The facility will have a split level arrangement for a spacious lobby and "sit down" teller upstairs and a community room downstairs, which will be open on a rent-free basis to community meetings up to 50 people.

The facility will employ 8 people in the temporary branch, progressively increasing to 25 employees.

### From the LEFT HAND

It wasn't any traumatic experience...and it couldn't be considered a tear-in-the-eye moment...or a lump-in-the-throat feeling...but still, our "little girl" left the nest Sunday, and little Mother and Dad knew one era had ended and another one was starting. We had joined that ever-growing legion known as parents of a collegiate.

During the past week I had noticed Betty Coed's mother was lingering in her daughter's bedroom. She'd just sort of stand in the center of the room, and rather gloomily look about the room. She didn't say anything but I didn't tease her about her lingering.

Sunday at the noon dinner Betty Coed had her boyfriend alongside her and when her corny Dad gave a toast wishing her well during the coming years she gave me that, "Did you really have to say that?" look. Since there were three other younger ones at the table who generally spill their way thru a meal, the chances for any sentimental "last meal at home" were unlikely. The only sentiment I had was, "I'll be glad when she's gone, then I won't have to look at this boyfriend 6 times a day."

Surprisingly, packing all her gear in the car took only a short time and the ride up to school was equally fast. Carrying her brown cardboard box luggage into the new dorm was done amidst much huffing and puffing. And while the huffing and puffing was natural for me, when I came upon the hordes of young people who seemed to be coming from all directions, I vowed I'd begin getting into condition at the "Y" beginning Monday.

Eleven floors up is her bedroom, a 12 by 20 room which seemed too small for all her brown boxes. When I saw her roommate had an equal amount of the same kind of luggage it seemed impossible 2 teen girls would be able to live in that cubicle.

The hordes of young people, who were downstairs, were figuratively matched by the throngs who were on floor 11. Amidst the brown boxes, the 2 teens and the little Mother and Father, an endless stream of Betty Coeds began squeezing into the room, laughing, griping about the food, shaking hands, squealing and just being friendly. They were from Edwardsville and Bensenville and "she worked at Lyttons" and "I remember you from orientation" and "boy, was the food bad...I was sick for 3 days with the flu...and I'm sure it was from the food." It was an endless stream of people, all young and full of talk.

## Niles fence code hits again

The height of fences within Niles again occupied the Niles village board during its Aug. 27 meeting, altho restricted this time to the "townhouse areas."

"These (townhouses) are so close that if all tenants decide to put up a fence, they will all look like concubines," Village Mayor Nicholas Blase told the trustees.

Building Commissioner Joe Salerno reported a survey of the five townhouse areas revealed the smallest area to be fenced was 5 ft. wide and 1 1/2 ft. long. Salerno, who personally favors no fencing for reasons of fire and health, told the trustees fence heights in the townhouse areas varied from three to five feet resulting in an unfavorable cosmetic appearance.

Reluctantly recommending a three ft. fence restriction in townhouse areas "for protection of lawn furniture, children and privacy," Salerno requested the trustees to also consider action on present existing fences which

exceed three feet.

According to Village Attorney Richard Troy, "Present fences would become non-conforming and after a certain length of time, would have to conform to a village decision on fence height."

Trustee Pete Besole stated the unfairness of village ordinances which presently permit construction of fences within the village to a height of five feet and a possible future ordinance restricting height of a fence to three feet in townhouse areas. "How can you permit one person to have a fence up to five feet and tell another person he can only have a three foot fence?" he queried.

Following a recommendation to consider fencing on a two-fold (existing and future) basis, Trustees Abe Selman, Ang Marcheschi and Ralph Bast were appointed as a committee on fencing together with Bldg. Comr. Joe Salerno and Village Atty. Troy, to return with recommendations at a future board meeting.

A fence hassle in 1970 resulted

in a change of the village residential fence code from a four ft. height to a height of "up to five ft." Despite the original fence code, established in July of 1965, which provided for restriction of fences within the village to a height of 4 feet, the Zoning Board had continually approved more than 30 petitions for five and six foot fences for reasons of "privacy," "owning a dog," or "to screen off an unsightly view."

The Village Board deadlocked, in July, 1970, 3 to 3, to change the village fence code from a 4 ft. height to a 5 ft. with no variations. It was Village President Nicholas Blase who broke the tie, casting his vote in favor of the foot increase in height.

Governor Neil Hartigan among special guests present. Louis A. Lerner, chairman of the Citizens Committee to Elect Norman Dachman will be present to wish Dachman well on his journey Monday morning.

Dachman said that public business is the public's business and that people expect an honest discussion of the issues and are entitled to know where the candidates stand on issues concerning County government in addition to citing their own positive views of government as it relates to them.

During the past month Dachman, the leader in opposing the Home Rule Commission's (of the County Board) proposed county income tax, formed the NUTS TO TAXES Committee (No Unfair Taxes for the Suburbs) and has been circulating petitions county-wide for presentation to the County Board at the conclusion of his Walk. He served as chairman of the transportation committee of the Cook County Council of Governments during the recent RTA referendum, and chairman of the Mayors Committee to Save the RTA.

## Reactivated Niles Jaycees receive charter Fall registration

A newly reactivated chapter, the Niles Jaycees received their charter and memberships during the August 27 meeting of the Niles Village board.

President-elect Terry Shevelenko, 8847D Washington st., Niles, described the group as being an extension of the Park Ridge Jaycees. "However," said Shevelenko, "we are a completely separate chapter and will function mainly in the interest of Niles."

Park Ridge Jaycees began tapping businesses and organizations in Niles for possible members at the beginning of the year. Shevelenko was contacted in March, as one of 20 young businessmen, the minimum needed to obtain a charter in Illinois. Requirements for membership were that the applicant be between 19 and 35 years of age, and he must live, or be employed, in Niles.

"Our goal is individual development through community action," said Shevelenko, who is employed at the Perry Shoe Co. in Chicago. Presently meeting the third Wednesday of the month at the Niles Rec Center, the group is looking for more permanent headquarters.

The newly elected 7-man Jaycee board is a diversified group from surrounding suburbs: Social Development vice-pres. Neil Hansen is also from Niles; Individual Development vice-pres. Neal Kosoff lives in unincorporated Glenview. Community Development vice-pres. Jack Budrow, is in unincorporated Des Plaines; Treasurer Anthony Carfang lives in Morton Grove; Secretary Herb Muskal in Skokie; and State Director Mark Hofmeister resides in Park Ridge.

Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase welcomed the new group, highly commending the former Jaycees as being the motivating power behind the selection of Niles as an All-American City in 1964. The group dissolved shortly afterward, apparently due to internal difficulties.

As the 54th chapter in the north region, the Niles Jaycees were presented with membership pins as charter members by the national Jaycee vice-president, Robert Sturgeon, assisted by members of the Park Ridge Jaycees.

While "our goal is to help the village of Niles wherever we are needed," Pres. Shevelenko emphasized strongly that the Jay-

cees will be non-political. Topping the agenda for the first official Jaycee Board meeting will be the mailing of a questionnaire to village and park officials, the school boards and Niles organizations, in an effort to set up priority projects within the village.

The Jaycees have already made themselves known through participation in Niles' 75th Diamond Jubilee. As Keystone Kops for the Brothers of the Brush, they arrested people who didn't shave and sold shaving licenses to them, before and during Jubilee events.

On a more serious note, Shevelenko indicated several projects are already under discussion. Collecting of green stamps for cash redemption will enable the Jaycees to send an area youngster to a summer Jaycee camp for the handicapped, located in Illinois. "Our goal is \$20,000, which is 10,000 green stamp books," said the Jaycee prey.

One of their targets for next

year is the bike safety program, which occurred before the formation of Jaycees this year.

Another project, also conducted on a national scale, will be alcoholism. Known as Operation Threshold, the aim is to teach control of liquor, as opposed to abstention.

"Many projects set up by national and state Jaycee organizations don't really apply to Niles," stated Terry Shevelenko. "Niles is already doing a great job... When we (Jaycees) first began to sort out problems in Niles, we had difficulty in finding any. That's one reason I like living in Niles."

"Basically," he concluded, "we will contact all groups within Niles to find out whether we can be of assistance and then we will help in anyway that we can."

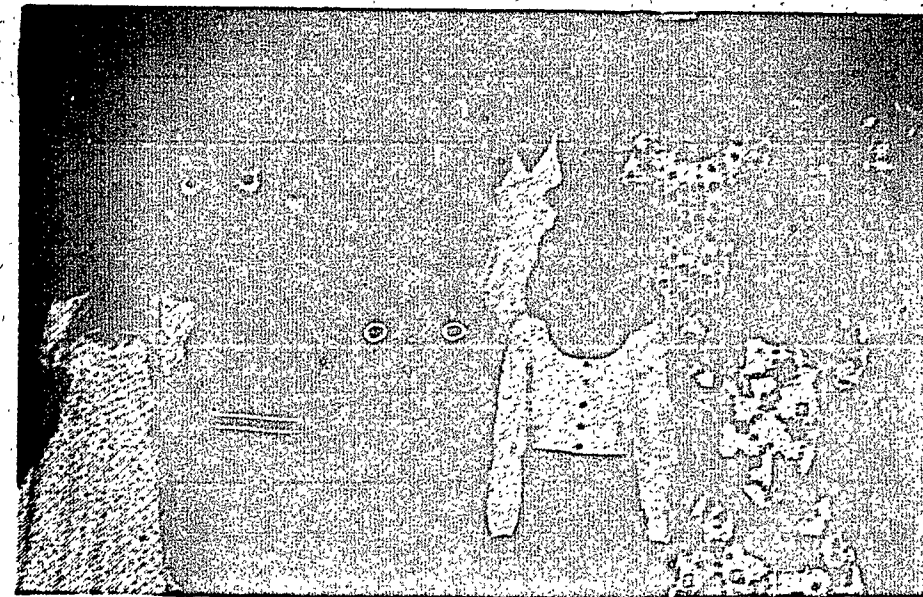

Earlier Morton Grove had

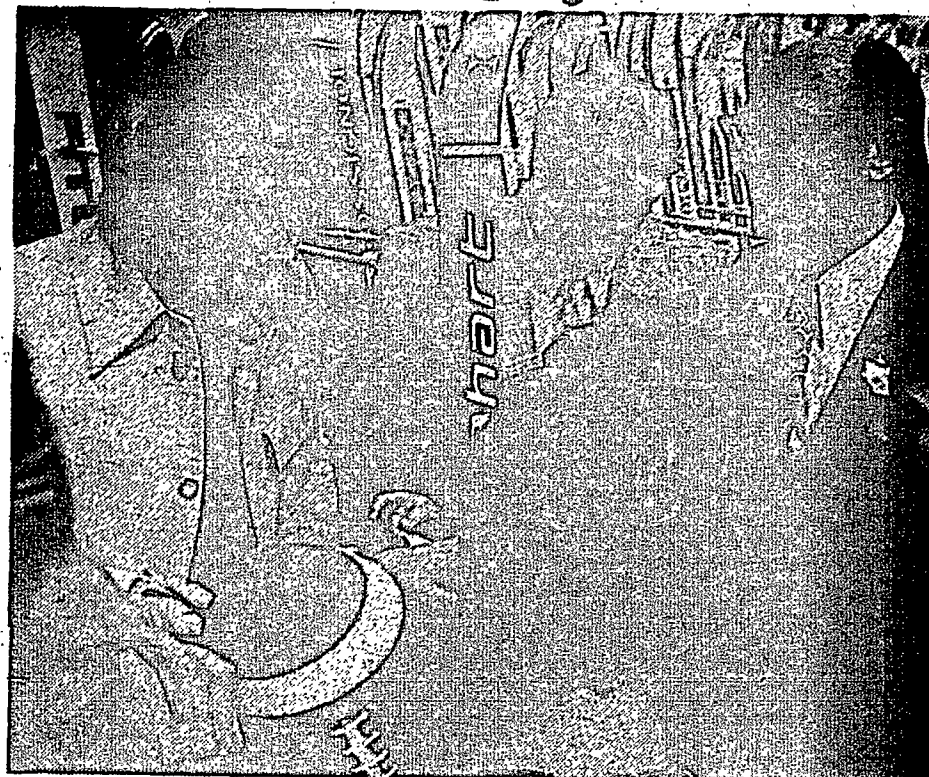

izing a junior tall club, "The High and Mighty".

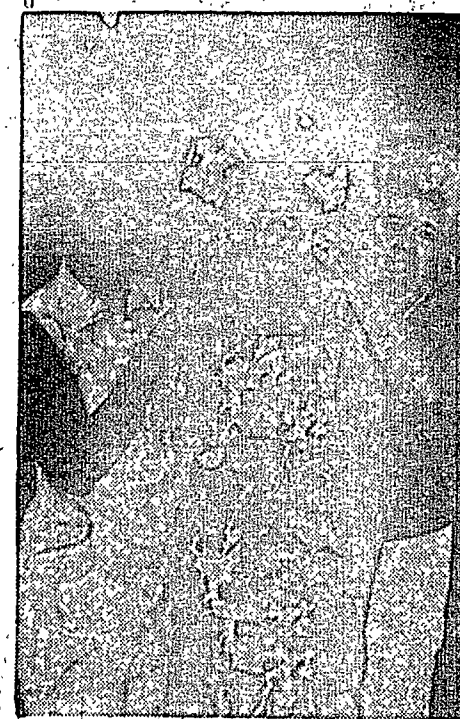

In accepting the appointment, he stated, "I am delighted to accept the appointment. The problem of alcoholism is enormous, and growing more serious daily. I feel it is vital that the problem be met and dealt with at the local level. I am honored and somewhat awed to have been selected for this immensely responsible task."

Callaghan's wife, Jean, is a learning disabilities teacher at Cumberland School, Des Plaines. They have four grown children.

## Young votes for pension reform

Congressman Samuel Young (10th, Ill.) voted yesterday in favor of H.R.2, a bill designed to protect the pension rights of 30-million workers.

"This legislation will help make sure that employees changing jobs do not lose all of their retirement benefits and it will make sure that the money will be available to pay employees when they retire," Young stated.

The bill provides for a new government insurance agency to pay pensions up to \$750 a month if a company defaults on its obligations. The insurance fund would be financed through premium payments from companies having pension plans.

No company would be forced to begin a pension plan, however a company that has a plan or starts one after the law takes effect must meet certain minimum standards for funding, management, participation and vesting.

The bill also provides these specific provisions: --retirement accounts for individuals not covered by other

employee pension or profit-sharing plans by permitting an income tax deduction of 15% of earnings up to a maximum deduction of \$1,500;

--increased income tax deductions for pension and profit-sharing benefits of self-employed persons by increasing H.R. 10 (Keogh Plan) deduction of \$7,500;

--required early participation of employees in pension or profit-sharing plans. Plans must provide for participation of employees at the age of 25 and with one year of service;

--three vesting options--100% after 10 years of service, graduated 100% after 15 years, and 50% when years of service and age of employee total 45, but 50% must be vested after 10 years of service regardless of age;

--with respect to funding of liability, normal costs must be funded currently, unfunded past service costs existing must be amortized over 40 years, and unfunded costs arising after enactment must be amortized over 30 years (40 years for multi-employer plans);

--all significant information about a plan must be disclosed; --limited "portability"--distributions from a qualified plan can be rolled over into an individual retirement account for future transfer to another qualified plan on approval of the new plan.

Administration of the plan will be shared jointly by the Internal Revenue Service and the Department of Labor.

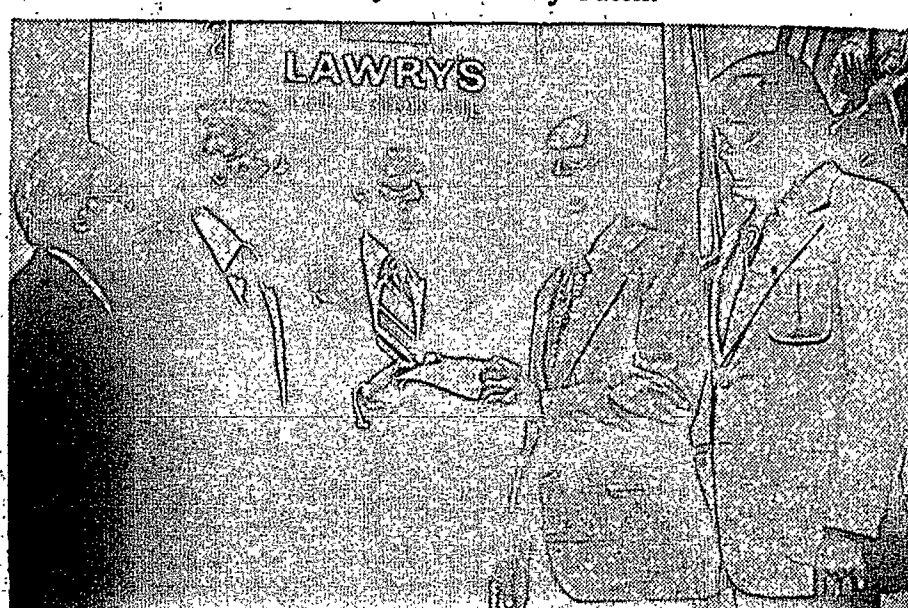

## Corrugated cardboard-recycle it

A corrugated cardboard recycling outlet is now available in this area. This new project, which is primarily aimed towards businesses and industry, is a new program developed and operated by the Niles Township Reclamation Center.

This new service was added due to several pleas from area paper companies to do, "Everything possible to step up the reclaiming of scrap corrugated cardboard."

Corrugated board, to date, is not profitable for transporting to recycling plants in Chicago in small quantities, but the demand for new corrugated grows daily. In an effort to offset high prices of new corrugated boxes, the reclamation center is trying to send more cardboard to the mills.

The center hopes that by setting up a centralized transfer station for the collection of corrugated board they can reduce the cost involved of hauling the material, and more important recycle this material and at the same time cut down garbage disposal costs for businesses and industries who have large quantities of cardboard.

This new service is offered free to any business, corporation, or individual who can deliver the material to the center which is located at 7929 Austin ave., in Skokie, Illinois.

Business and industry are being asked to carefully consider

utilizing this program. There are many advantages available to them, one being that the cost of disposing their garbage is \$2.50 a yard for most businesses, whereas the center will accept it free upon delivery. Another advantage can be off-setting the high price of new corrugated board by keeping a steady stream of scrap cardboard materials available to the paper mill. Then, of course, there is the environmental effect of saving 17 full grown trees for every ton of corrugated that is recycled, and a 70% energy savings if this commodity is recycled. This will reduce the cost of the new product by approximately 35%.

Recycling our wastes is everyone's responsibility, and if we are to continue to conserve and protect our natural resources, every person's cooperation is needed now.

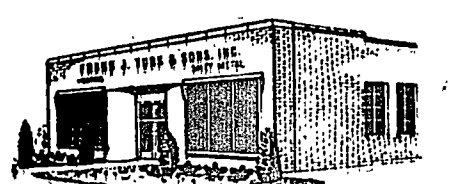
