Niles fence code hits again

by Alice M. Bobula

The height of fences within Niles again occupied the Niles village board during its Aug. 27 meeting, altho restricted this time to the "townhouse areas."

'These (townhouses) are so close that if all tenants decide to put up a fence, they will all look like concubinages." Village Mayor Nicholas Blase told the

Building Commissioner Joe Salerno reported a survey of the five townhouse areas revealed the smallest area to be fenced was 5 ft. wide and 19½ ft. long. Salerno, who personally favors no fencing for reasons of fire and health, told the trustees fence heights in the townhouse areas varied from three to five feet resulting in an unfavorable cosmetic appearance.

Reluctantly recommending a three ft. fence restriction in townhouse areas "for protection of lawn furniture, children and privacy." Salerno requested the trustees to also consider action on present existing fences which

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According to Village Attorney Richard Troy, "Present fences

would become non-conforming and after a certain length of time. would have to conform to a village decision on fence height." Trustee Pete Besole stated the unfairness of village ordinances which presently permit construc-

tion of fences within the village to a height of five feet and a possible future ordinance restricting height of a fence to three feet in townhouse areas. "How can you permit one person to have a fence up to five feet and tell another person he can only have a three foot fence? he queried.

Following a recommendation to consider fencing on a two-fold (existing and future) basis, Trustees Abe Selman, Ang Marcheschi and Ralph Bast were appointed as a committee on fencing ogether with Bldg. Comr. Joe Salerno and Village Atty. Troy, to return with recommendations at a future board meeting.

A fence hassle in 1970 resulted

in a change of the village residential fence code from a four ft. height to a height of "up to five ft." Despite the original fence code, established in July of 1965, which provided for restriction of fences within the village to a height of 4 feet, the Zoning Board had continually approved more than 30 petitions for five and six foot fences for reasons of "privacy." "owning a dog." or "to screen off an unsightly

The Village Board deadlocked, in July, 1970, 3 to 3, to change the village fence code from a 4 ft. height to a 5 ft. with no variations. It was Village President Nicholas Blase who broke the tie, casting his vote in favor of the foot increase in height.

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

"This legislation will help make sure that employees changing jobs do not lose all of their etirement benefits and it will make sure that the money will be available to pay employees when they retire," Young stated.

The bill provides for a new government insurance agency to pay pensions up to \$750 a month a company defaults on its obligations. The insurance fund would be financed through premium payments from companies having pension plans.

No company would be forced to begin a pension plan, however a company that has a plan or starts one after the law takes effect must meet certain minimum standards for funding, management, participation and vesting.


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
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Appointed to AMRA Committee
