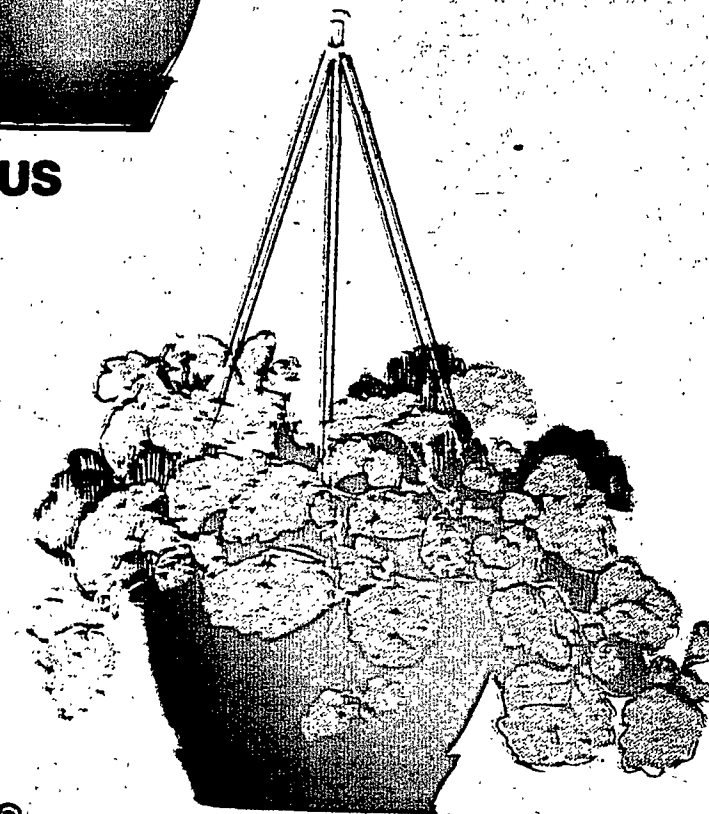

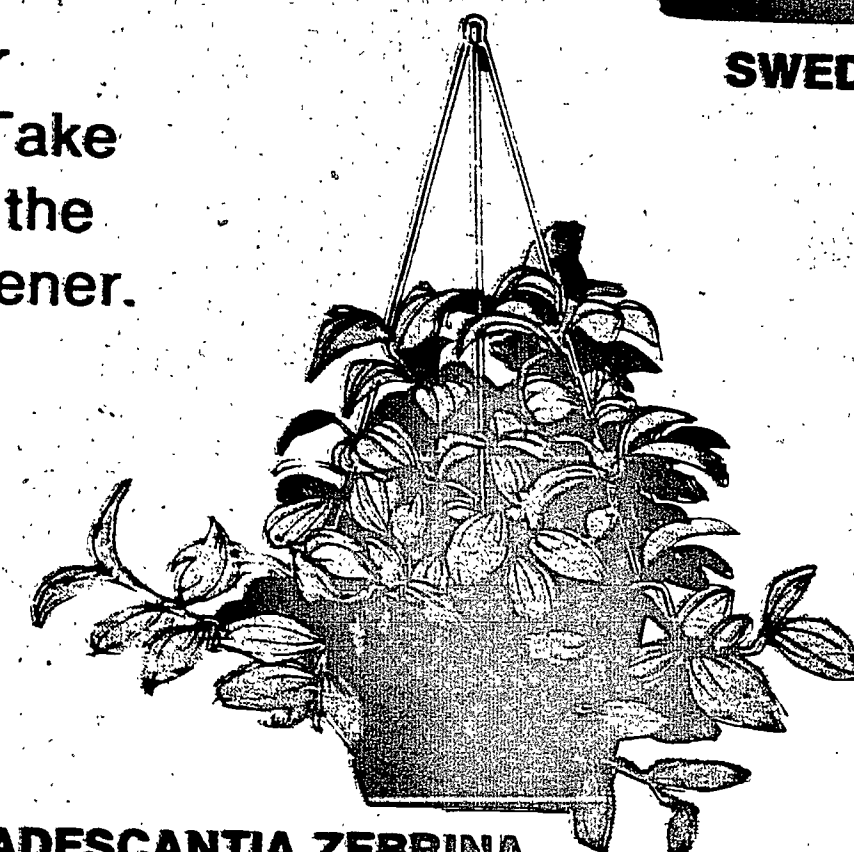

Ballard Complex manager enthused over operation

Ken Sipora, newly hired Ice Rink manager at the Ballard Sports Complex, promises a few "new wrinkles" for the Complex this coming year.

A 1969 graduate of Maine East High school, and a former Nilesite, Sipora attended University of Dubuque on a scholarship, majoring in business ad-

ministration and economics. Upon graduation he took a position with Skates Country, Inc., as assistant manager. He is married, since 1972, to Debbie, a former schoolteacher.

"I wasn't even looking for a job," laughed Sipora, who has kept in close touch with his parents, residents of Niles. Having heard of the position open at

the Complex, he said, he applied for it and was hired, as of Sept. 9. "I'm happy to be back in Niles," said the young manager. "The Sports Complex has unlimited potential with regard to Park District Programs."


He sees much room for improvement in many areas and intends to effect improvements as soon as possible.

"My ultimate goal for the Complex in my first year as manager is to turn the deficit situation around . . . If I can't erase all of it, I intend to erase a good portion of the deficit."

As chief administrator at the Complex, said Sipora, he is in charge of 4 full-time and numerous part-time employees, totaling approximately 25.

As for the "new wrinkles," said the new manager, "We have expanded the public skating schedule, we are initiating the use of popular music (by that I mean top 40 tunes), we are expanding our Pro shop and our snack shop will have several new items."

The Pro shop, he said, would be open approximately 25.

End O' The Month Potpourri . . .

About this time of the year we like to remind the natives to get their apple-pickin' selves away from their TV football games and take the family north on Rand rd. (U.S. 12) for an afternoon of picking apples. We usually head for the Wauconda area where an afternoon atop a ladder, and a stomach full of apples, is a great way to spend a warm Fall afternoon. On the way out from the orchards, stop off and buy some cider and donuts. And if your sweet tooth is still begging for more, invest in a few taffy apples.

Winding home you might wander off Rand rd. and head for Long Grove, which is a picturesque two blocks of quaint stores which will whet the curiosities of your lady friends. An area first discovered by antiquers it has now blossomed into a commercial venture which has expanded in four directions off a country intersection. Long Grove is 4 miles northwest of Wheeling which is about 12 miles from your home base.

If you're a bit more adventurous and want a memorable day, get up early Saturday morning and head south and east to Goshen, Indiana for the 7th annual Michiana Mennonite Relief Auction Sale. In the heartland of the Amish-Mennonite country you can bid for afghans, handmade quilts and dolls, rugs, antiques, toys, footstools, games and books. This is not a rummage sale. Three years ago an afghan went for \$530. The quilts and rugs are embroidered or cross-stitched, the rugs woven, hooked and braided. These works are a labor of love by the Amish ladies whose efforts result in the monies going for Amish-Mennonite supported charities.

There are more than a dozen fair ground buildings which house demonstrations and sales of cake decorating, apple-dumpling making, apple-fritter making, art and decoupage, Christmas decorating, glass-cutting, kitchen articles, homemade bread and soap, fresh produce from Mennonite farms, with bake goods, whole hog sausages and the very best of breakfasts being served from 6 a.m.

When you're up in Amish country the name of the game is to stuff yourself. Five years ago when we toured the Amish country around Lancaster, Pennsylvania, we recall two truisms about their plentiful menus which bears repeating for those heading for Goshen: "Kissing wears out, cooking doesn't" and "Better to die eating than die fighting."

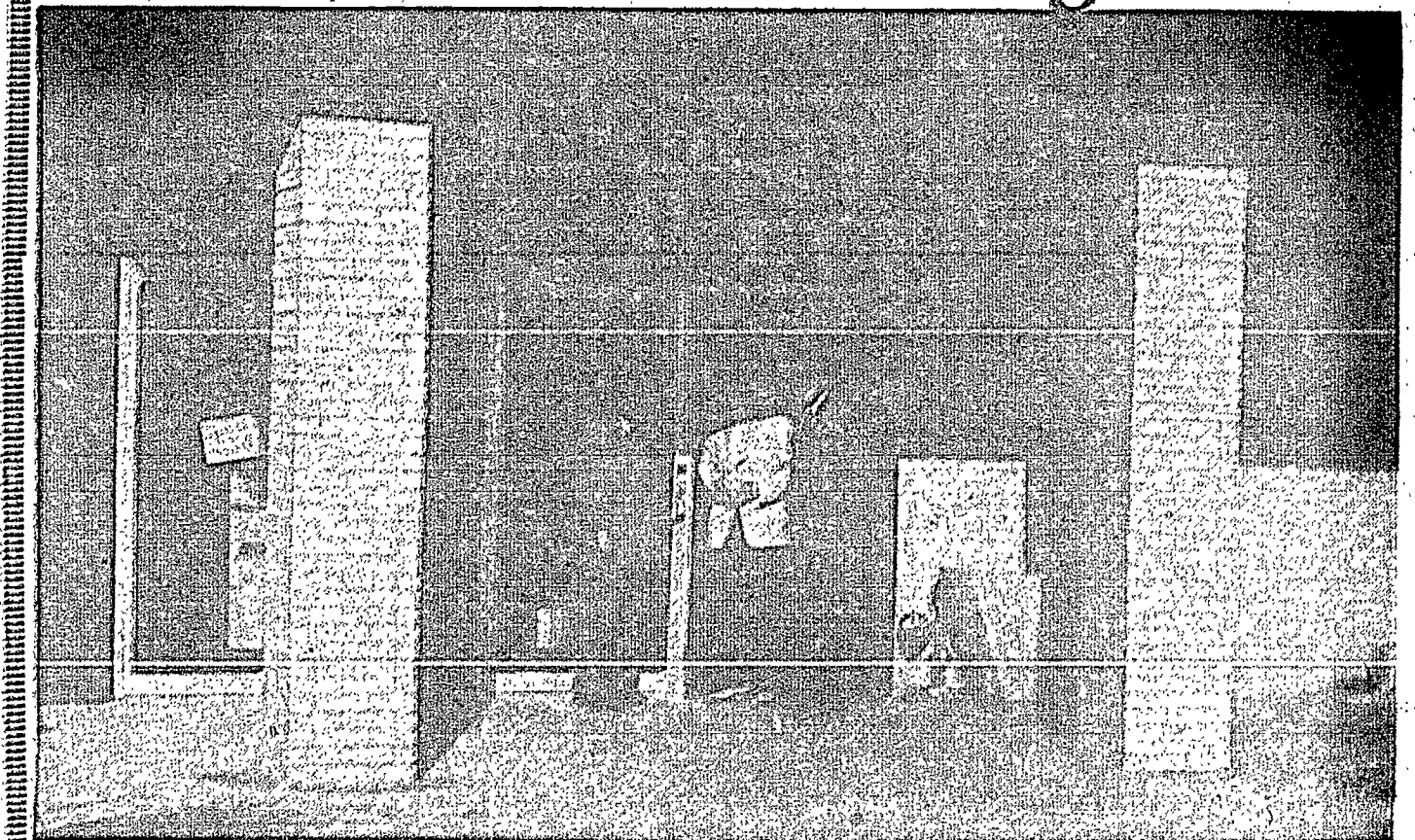
Village trustees unanimously approved an expanded service route by the Niles Free Bus, to begin Oct. 21, as presented to them during the Sept. 24 board meeting.

The route change will incorporate four new stops: one in the Four Flags Shopping area, a second stop in the Golf Mill area at Sears Roebuck & Co., in addition to the present bus stop at J. C. Penney & Co., another new stop at Our Lady of Ransom School (Greenwood ave. and Clara dr.), and a stop at the Community Center newly opened on Oakton st. near Prospect ct.

Also proposed by Asst. Village Manager Charles Kohlerman and accepted by the trustees were expanded hours of bus service for the Christmas season, effective Friday, Nov. 29. Buses will run from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m., instead of the usual 9 to 6 p.m. hours. The approximate cost of the extra service would range from \$1,500 to \$2,000 for the entire holiday season and could possibly come out of revenue sharing or sales tax. Kohlerman told trustees, adding that "a total of 23,900 people rode the Niles bus last month."

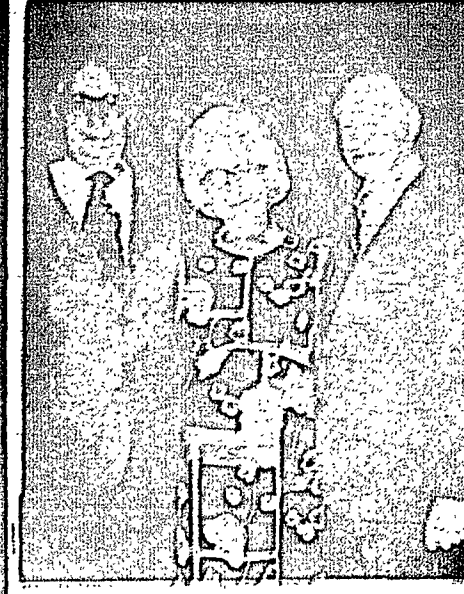

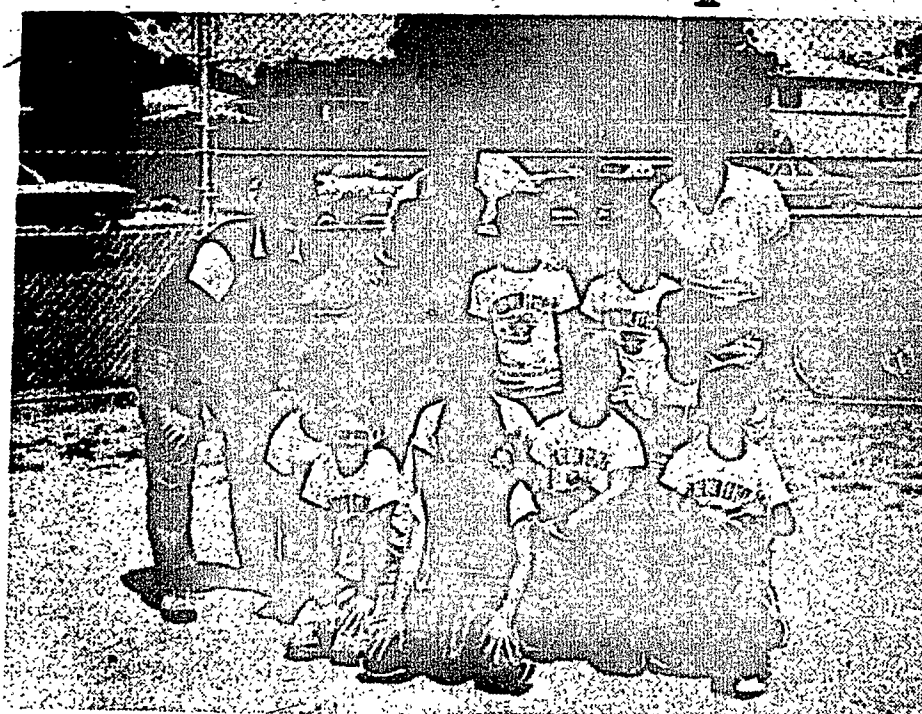

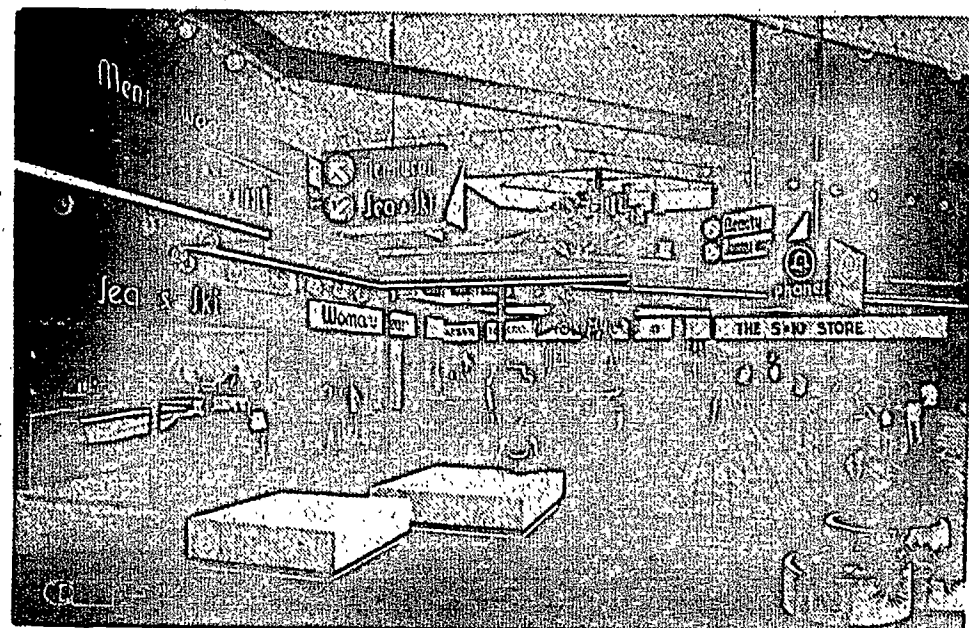
Northwestern riders win at Horse Show

Niles Saints down CFL Lions 27-9 Notre Dame beats Schurz

The Niles Saints got off to a slow start but came back strong to beat the Chicago Lions 27 to 9. In the first quarter the Lions began the scoring with a 29 yard field goal by Paul Brestin. The Saints retaliated with a touchdown by quarterback Bill Springsteen. Springsteen's kick was off so at the end of the first quarter the score was 6 to 3.

In the second quarter Springsteen connected with A. J. Owens for a 19 yard touchdown; this time the kick was good and the score at the half was 13 to 6.

Late in the third quarter Paul Sortal connected with Bob Glappe on a 55 yard halfback pass (the kick was good) to put the Saints ahead 20 to 3.

In the fourth quarter the Lions tried to rally with an 8 yard TD run by quarterback Terry Likens, but the kick by Brestin was bad and the Saints were ahead 20 to 9.

With 49 seconds to go in the game, Jim Nugent threw a 25 yard touchdown pass to Jerry Cooney. Springsteen's kick was good and the Saints won 27 to 9 and undisputed first place in the Chicagoland Football League.

The Saints led in statistics with 156 rushing to the Lions 127, and 282 yards passing to the Lions 116. The Saints had 10 first downs 2 rushing and 8 passing.

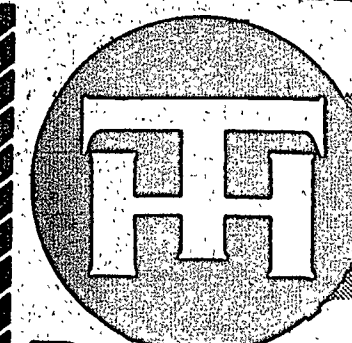
New ND cross country coach

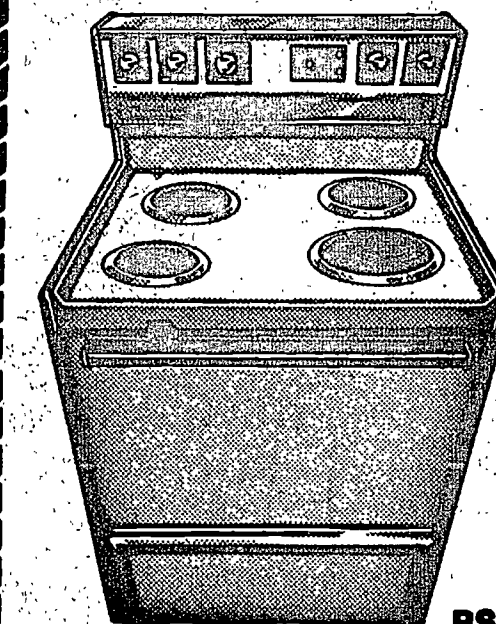

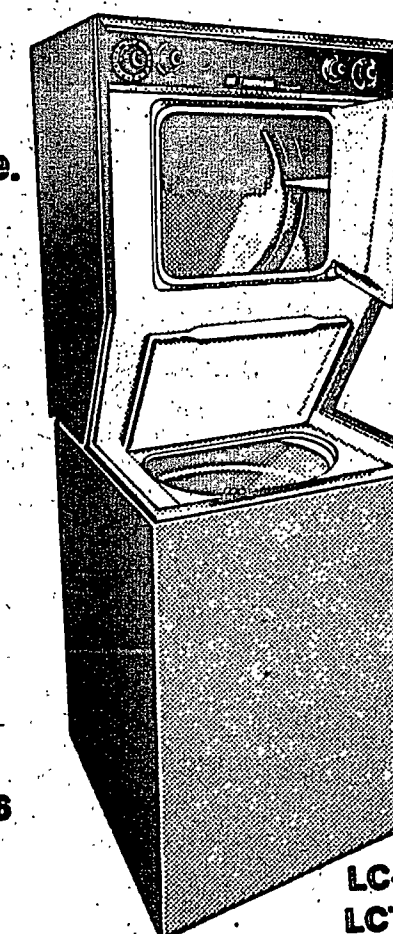

After graduation he studied at Quigley for five years, followed by six years at Mundelein, a major seminary in the Archdiocese at that time. He was ordained by the late Cardinal Mundelein on Apr. 7, 1934.

In 1960 the late Cardinal Albert Meyer appointed Fr. Paluch (then as associate pastor of Ascension Parish in Evanston) to organize a parish in the Maine East Township area to meet the spiritual needs of the fast growing Catholic population in the Northwest suburbs. The site chosen for the church and school was to be located at the corner of Greenwood ave. and Normal st., Niles. The name Our Lady of Ransom was selected for the new parish. Ground was broken on Aug. 18, 1961 for the construction of the church and sixteen classrooms to be staffed by Felician nuns. On July 29, 1962 Mass was said for the first time in the church. The convent for the nuns was built shortly after, and in 1964, due to overcrowded school conditions, the pastor received permission from the Archdiocese to build a Junior High School. Completed in 1965, the school presently enrolls 750 students. Today, Our Lady of Ransom parish is debt free and serves 2,000 families within its boundaries of Niles, Park Ridge and Des Plaines.

In honor of Father Paluch, parishoners have claimed Sept. 29 "Father Paluch Day". Immediately following the 5 p.m. Mass there will be a parish reception in the hall. All are invited to attend.

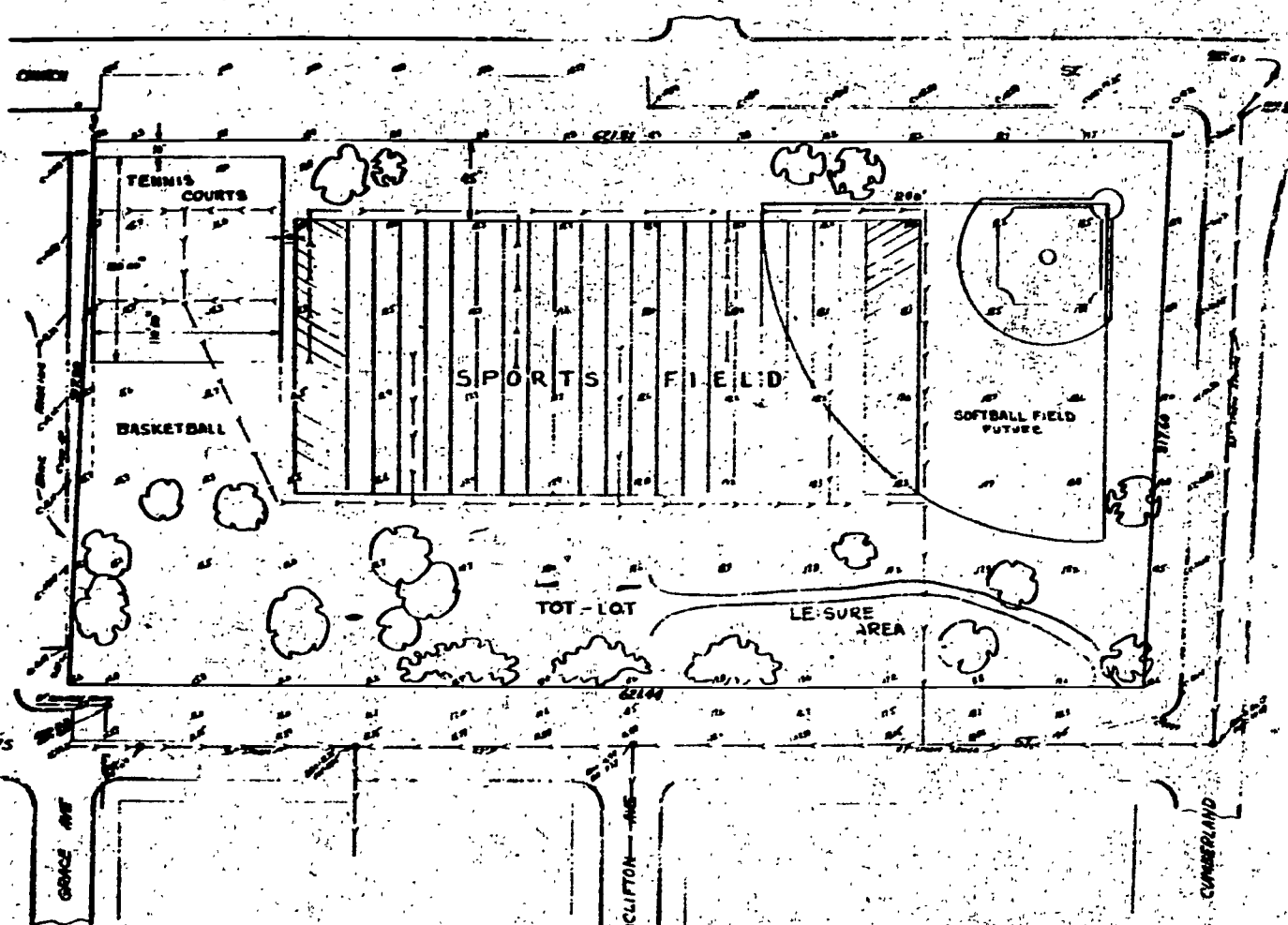

LWV clarifies position on candidate rating

Dear Editor:

It has come to our attention that some campaign literature being circulated in the Tenth Congressional District contains a reference to the League of Women Voters political accountability rating. The context in which this reference is placed allows it to be misinterpreted as a political endorsement.

The League does not rate candidates in a particular race. The League does rate the performance of incumbents as it applies to League program and action.

The bylaws of the League of Women Voters of the United States state that "the League may take action on governmental measures and policies in the public interest. It may not support or oppose any political party or any candidate." The League does lobby actively for legislative goals based on positions arrived at by its 155,000 members across the country. The League of Women Voters of the United States' political action is determined only after members have the opportunity to study national issues and reach a position on possible solutions. This process is in effect

provides a general blueprint for action which is used as the base measurement in determining which pieces of legislation the League will support or oppose.

Each year the League prepares a political accountability rating which shows the voting records of members of Congress on legislation for which the League and its members lobbied during that session of Congress. Our ratings are now an index of the overall performance of each legislator, only an evaluation of how often each legislator voted with the League position during that particular session of Congress. During the session, the League makes its legislative goals clear via position statements, lobbying, letter writing, etc. Its partisanship on issues, however, is not transferable to individuals, and the League does not support or oppose any candidate for public office.

To head of the village's one-day festival get up your early, head south down the Dan Ryan and take the eastbound Indiana on Hwy. 123 miles to the Elkhart, Indiana exit; then south 122 miles to the Goshen area. They serve a great breakfast beginning at 6 a.m. on the dining room set up early for a full day.

We've always wanted to recommend a sort of travelling snorgasbord to the more adventurous gourmet, who may be looking for a different way to spend an evening away from home. Our suggestions for eateries this month aren't for everyone and perhaps are only for a very few readers, whose digestive systems can take the roller coaster menu we're recommending.

Skagood lovers can start off at the small 44-bottled Hobsons Oyster Bar at 448 N. State. It's a grubby place known for its eccentric service and reasonable prices. Oysters, crab legs, shrimp and lobsters come highly recommended, though the size of the barroom may prevent you from sitting at a booth.

If you prefer to stay in suburbia you can go to Metrose Park to Skokie Sam's at 1111 Rice St., which has seafood similar to Hobsons with the addition of snails and conch. SS Sam's has great Italian specialties but if you're going to join our venturesome snorgasbord, you must push yourself away from the table after the seafood.

If you're at Hobson's you're only 5 minutes away from our 2nd stop, the Bowl and Roll, at 1339 N. Wells. For about \$2 you get a hearty bowl of soup which may include a half chicken or sausage and ham hocks or a beef soup that's more like a stew. You can order a chopped liver sandwich or Hungarian sausage, though such an order would likely end your joining us on this gourmet's delight.

If you've chosen Skokie Sam's and want to pass up the great soup house, you can proceed next to 7220 W. Roosevelt, and if you're near north, you head for 1958 W. Roosevelt, to Bishop's, the best chili houses in Chicago. These immaculate eateries have great chili and chili mac which can be eaten here on wire-backed "boke" chairs, or it can be ordered "to go". If you're strong, reach for the Tabasco and hot peppers dipped in vinegar, which are on every table.

After Bishop's we've probably lost all but those with copper-insulated stomachs. But for these hearty few, take off an hour and then head for Gaja's at 340 W. Armitage for a fondue. You can have chocolate, cheese, beef or other gourmet fondues while listening to live guitar and classical music.

After more resting time you can wind up this travelling snorgasbord at Bar's, 2454 W. Montrose. Behind a great German bakery, an intimate cafe (and outdoor patio) serves cream cakes and fruit and coffee cakes as well as fascinating ice cream specialties.

Most readers would wonder at such an evening. But it has interesting possibilities since you can detour one or more of the stop-offs and still enjoy great eating at most interesting and unique Chicago restaurants.

Our favorite bookie department for September includes the great Watergate caper, *All the President's Men*, as fascinating a whodunit as you'll ever read.

The investigative reporters for the Washington Post, give an 18 month biography of this mystery, that slowly unravels before your eyes in incredible fashion. The book is a great primer for anyone interested in reading about investigative reporting. And it's perhaps the most exciting story of the year about reporters who meet secret sources in underground garages at 4 a.m., and once were even told their lives were in danger for reporting a story which will rank among the top news stories in American history.

Two other books we've read this month are literary gems which use the very non-literary tape recorder, and transpose the tapes to paper with minimal editing.

No Cheering In The Press Box, by Suintesman Jerry Holtzman, interviews an older generation of sports writers, men mostly in their 70's and 80's, who tell fascinating behind the scenes tales about sports stars of the early earlier decades of this century. And Leonard Ritter's *The Glory Of Their Times* interviews elderly former ballplayers who tell wonderful baseball tales. If you want to know about Babe Ruth's sexual batting average, you can find it in Holtzman's book. And if you want to read about Germany Schaeffer, who after stealing 2nd base, turned around and stole 1st base, and then was out on the next pitch when he tried to steal 2nd again, read *Glory*. All three books are outstanding.
