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
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


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
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
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OLR's Rev. Paluch to celebrate 40th Anniversary Sunday



No Cheering in The Press Box, by Suntimesman Jerry Holtzman, interviews an older generation of sports writers, men mostly in their 70's and 80's, who tell fascinating behind the scenes tales about sports stars of the early earlier decades of this century. And Leonard Ritter's The Glory Of Their Times interviews elderly former ballplayers who tell wonderful baseball tales. If you want to know about Babe Ruth's sexual batting average, you can find it in Holtzman's book. And if you want to read about Germany Schaeffer, who after stealing 2nd base, turned around and stole 1st base, and then was out on the next pitch when he tried to steal 2nd again, read Glory. All three books are outstanding.

Des Plaines Theatre Guild's **Board of Directors voted Monday** night to extend the run of their current musical hit another weekend due to popular demand.


