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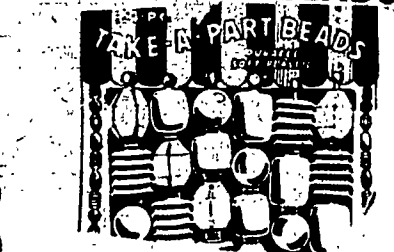

Rape case prompts action

Increase security at Oakton

Increased security by local and Oakton College police was reported by college representative David Hilquist, resulting from the Oct. 29 rape of a college student in Miami Woods across from the school.

At Tuesday's board meeting, board member Tom Flynn suggested the school increase the college police force by two men. While the suggestion wasn't accepted Hilquist said an emergency college van is being converted for security use implying increased patrolling will result. He said the entire Oakton

RTA rescues 'suburbroke' bus firms

The Regional Transportation Authority Board approved emergency aid grants totaling \$785,354 to two financially troubled suburban bus companies Tuesday to keep them from going out of business.

The grants (one for \$449,136 to South Suburban to South Suburban Safeway Lines in Harvey, and the other for \$336,218 to United Motor Coach Co. in

Des Plaines) are the first subsidies awarded by the RTA board since it became operational July 1.

Contracts stipulating the conditions under which the grants are to be made won't be approved by the RTA board until Friday. However, the RTA money should be in the hands of the two bus lines no later than Friday night. RTA

Denies request for land rental to Jerry's Market

PARK BOARD VOTES TO SAVE SPACE

A series of parliamentary procedures during the Tuesday night Park Board meeting threatened a decision by the Niles Park Commissioners to deny a request by Jerry's Fruit Market to rent Park District property for storage of shrubbery.

Park commissioners were requested to license Park District property located at the Rec Center, 7877 Milwaukee ave., immediately north of the swimming pool, for three months from Mar. 15, 1975, to June 15, 1975, for \$3,000.

A motion had been made and seconded to deny the request, when attorney Michael Lavin representing the Fruit Market asked whether he could withdraw the request in order not to set a precedent, in his case, of a refusal by the Park District. Instead, a motion to table the request was made, taking precedence over the motion to deny, but failed for lack of a second to the motion. The request was denied, 4 to 1, with Commr. Millie Jones voting for approval.

Post Office dis- continues unpaid mail delivery

Postmaster Don Swanson of Morton Grove reminded customers that on Nov. 17 the U.S. Postal Service discontinued delivering mail on which there is no postage.

Postmaster Swanson said the new policy was instituted because of the high costs being incurred by the Postal Service in its attempt to deliver such mail. Officials estimate that such costs total approximately \$18 million annually.

In announcing the new policy last month, Postmaster General E. T. Klassen said "it is unfair to burden the vast majority of mailers with costs created by the few who mail without prepayment of postage."

Letters now mailed without postage will be returned to sender if there is a return address, or to the dead letter office, instead of being delivered to the address as postage due mail has been the custom. Postal officials will attempt to find the sender of unpaid mail and return it for a slight fee, if there is no return address.

"Naturally we realize that someone could inadvertently forget to put a stamp on a letter or that a stamp could come off prior to cancellation, so we urge mailers to be sure to include a correct return address on their mail," Postmaster Swanson said.

Official township seal



Maine Township officials formally adopted the township's first official seal at the regular monthly meeting in October. It was announced by Township Supervisor James J. Dowd.

The seal is based on a design submitted by Arthur R. Wetter, 901 E. Villa dr., Des Plaines. Wetter was declared winner in a township-wide design contest conducted earlier this year.

The seal, adopted to commemorate the township's 125th anniversary next year, includes three basic elements, according to Wetter. The first element is an oak tree, symbolic of the forest which originally covered the area and which provided the raw material for the township's first industry, a sawmill.

The second element is a plow, depicting agriculture, the occupation of the first settlers. The tree and plow are separated by wavy lines symbolizing the Des Plaines River which bisects the township and was an important waterway to both the Indians who originally inhabited the area and to the early settlers.

An honorarium of a \$50 U.S. bond will be presented to Wetter

at the township's next regular meeting on Dec. 10, Dowd stated. He added that two honorable mention prizes of \$25 bonds will also be awarded that evening. The new seal will be used on stationery, documents, vehicle stickers for residents of the unincorporated area, and other official purposes, Dowd said. Its phase-in would be gradual, however, he added, as all existing materials with the seal would be used up before new materials are prepared.

Ordinance night at Niles Board meeting

Niles trustees "cleaned house" Tuesday night, Nov. 12, amending and approving proposed ordinances.

Unanimously passed by the village trustees were ordinances for:

... adopting a 1% Municipal Use Tax.

... STOP signs designating intersection of Western Ave. and Kathy Lane as a 3-way Stop.

... posting "No Parking" from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on school days (Mark Twain School) on the east and west sides of Parkside ave., from Emerson st. north 175 ft.

... vacating of alley bounded by Milwaukee, Mulford and Odell.

... approval of plat for subdivision at 8652 Sunset rd. from R2 to R2 subdivision.

... rezoning of property at 3101 Maynard rd. from R1 to R1 subdivision.

A negative vote by Trustee Abe Selman on the Amendment of an Ordinance permitting collection of garbage from 6 a.m. (instead of 7 a.m.) to 7 p.m. invoked a surprised reaction from Board and audience Tuesday night.

"As a matter of principle," said Selman, "I could not vote for noise pollution at an earlier hour, when Niles is presently considering legal action against noise pollution caused by O'Hare airplanes."

Village Manager Scheel had asked for the hour change. "Village garbage collectors have been ticketed for starting early, necessitated by the fact that the garbage dump closes at 3 p.m." Trustees approved the amendment, 5 to 1.

Also amended by the Board was Article 3, giving jurisdiction to the Village Manager on the equal opportunity clause in local government contracts.

Bowling for the handicapped develops skills

Bowling at the local Bowling Alley is an opportunity for both children and adults to develop skills and motor coordination. It's also a chance to laugh with old friends, make new friends, and just plain have fun.

The Maine-Niles Association of Recreation for the Handicapped has been working closely with bowling alleys within the community in order to offer bowling programs for educationally, as well as physically handicapped individuals. With the use of special adaptive bowling equipment and highly trained staff, M-NARH is helping individuals with even the most severe motor and physical disabilities to participate in the game.

Classic Bowl in Morton Grove has contributed funds which have allowed M-NARH to purchase such special equipment as a handle grip bowling ball and a bowling ramp. The handle grip ball features a built-in spring handle which snaps before into place immediately after release. This ball is ideal for those participants with limited motor coordination.

A bowling ramp is available to those with more severe physical disabilities. The ramp is placed in front of a wheel chair, and carefully lined up with the pins. The bowler may either push the ball from the top of the ramp, or raise the ramp to allow the ball to gather enough momentum to roll down the alley.

The Maine-Niles Association of Recreation for the Handicapped is a public agency whose purpose is to make recreation more accessible and appropriate to the handicapped children and adults within the area. The Association strives to allow each individual the opportunity to make productive and enjoyable use of his leisure time within his own community. The staff of M-NARH works diligently to help those individuals with special recreational needs to better adapt themselves into the mainstream of society.

M-NARH has worked with both public and private agencies in its member districts to allow its participants to experience the broad spectrum of sport, art, music, dance, nature, and social activities available to them within their own community. Special programs have been developed to meet the individualized needs of all M-NARH participants.

With the use of equipment such as the handle grip bowling ball and the bowling ramp, many individuals have been able to bowl for the first time. In an effort to allow even more residents within the community to enjoy bowling activities, M-NARH will leave its adaptive equipment at the Classic Bowling Alley.

The special equipment will be available to any handicapped individual wishing to use it. M-NARH is also looking towards the eventual acquisition of guiding rails which will give visually handicapped persons the opportunity to bowl.

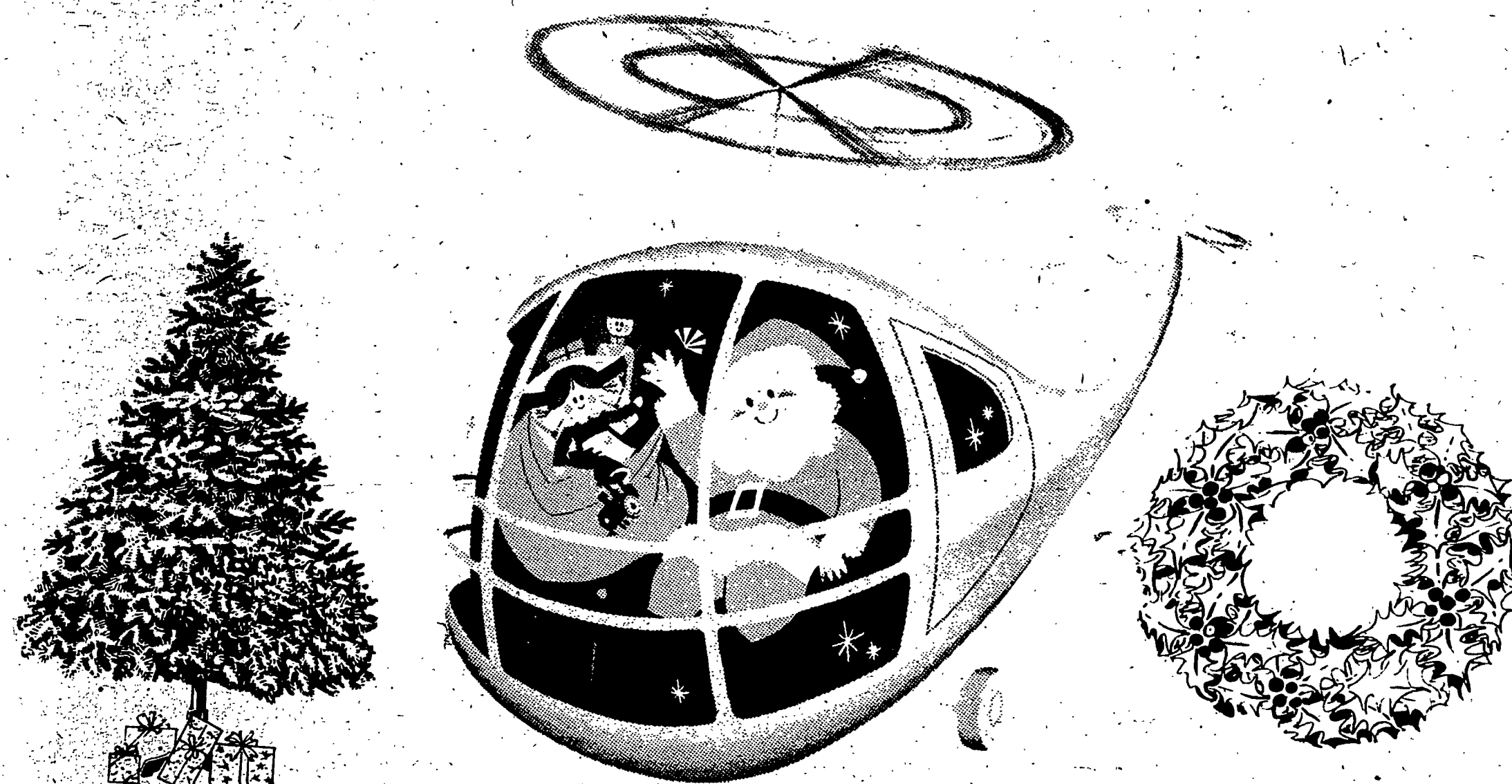

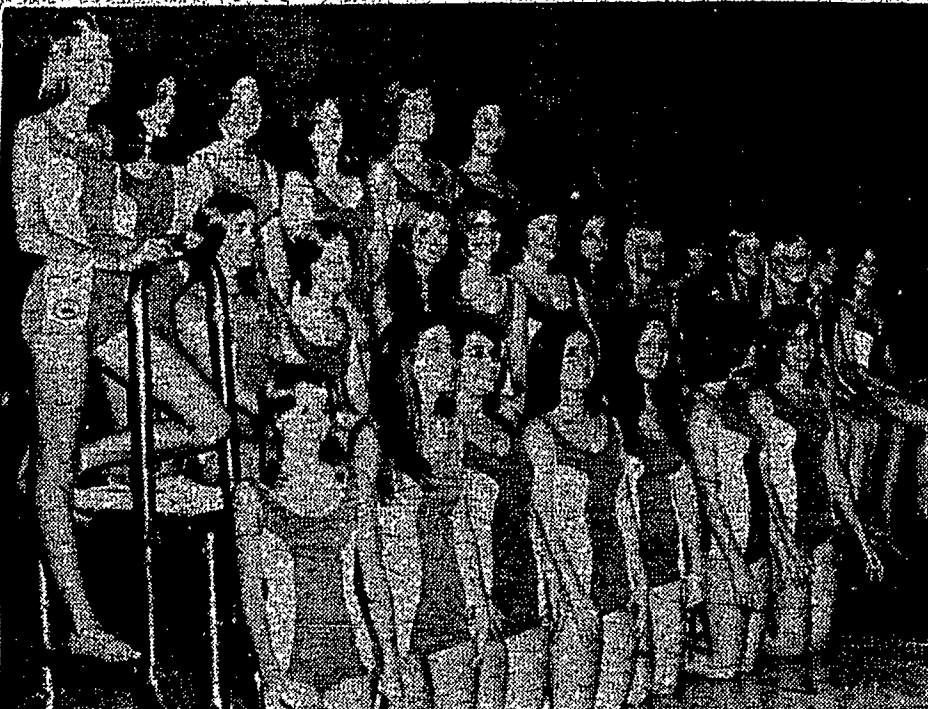
A winning season for the Demon varsity cagers has been predicted by Paul McClelland, head basketball coach.

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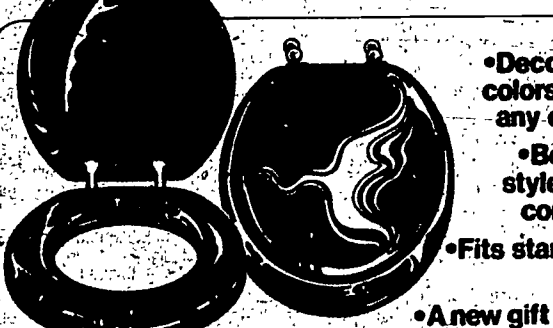

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State Police offer suggestions on winter driving

Winter weather, with the hazards it presents to driving, is upon us. The Illinois State Police offer the following suggestions to reduce the chance of undue hardship to motorists:

Drivers must take the time to make their car ready for the hard winter season ahead. The first item on anyone's list should be the cooling system. To be adequate, the engine should be protected to from 15 to 30 degrees below zero. All hoses should be inspected for wear or cracks. Not to be overlooked is the car's exhaust system. It isn't necessary for the muffler to be noisy before it becomes dangerous. A small hole anywhere in the system is all that is necessary to allow deadly carbon monoxide fumes to seep into a closed up vehicle.

Another important item on your check list is the condition of your car's tires. We all know that snow and ice can be tricky surfaces to drive on; add worn tires and the problem is compounded. Snow tires are a must for good traction. Remember too that studded tires are permitted only between Nov. 15 and Apr. 1 of each year.

Getting the car ready doesn't end with vehicle maintenance. It includes everyday things like cleaning all of the snow and ice from the windshield, window surfaces, and outside rear view mirrors to prevent an obstruction of the driver's view. If the family car must sit out in the open, it is a good idea to brush all the

collected snow from the hood, roof and trunk deck to prevent it from swirling onto the windshield and window surfaces when the car starts moving.

No one expects to be stranded in blizzard conditions, but evidence in recent years has proven to Illinois drivers that an unexpected blizzard can become a reality. A good winter driving plan includes carrying a shovel, a heavy woolen blanket, and a few candy bars. Just in case that set of tire chains in the trunk can't take you through. Remember, if you become stranded, your chances of survival are better if you stay inside your car. Setting out on foot during a storm may cause you to lose your sense of direction with tragedy as a result. In addition, snow removal crews or the police have a better chance of finding you if you stay in your car. Your car's engine should be run for just short periods of time to maintain sufficient heat for survival.

Mikva calls for revamped Officer Corps

Congressman-elect Abner J. Mikva said today that the anti-semitic remarks by the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff are a symptom of the one-dimensional education given by the service academies.

Mikva urged that Gen. George S. Brown be replaced as chairman and proposed the appointment of a blue-ribbon panel of educators to broaden the curricula of the service academies, which he criticized for being out of touch with the rest of American society.

"General Brown must be replaced because what he said represents how he feels. He cannot change his attitude at this time of his life and President Ford cannot reprimand him out of it," Mikva said at Saturday's conference of the Jewish Labor Committee at the Pick-Congress Hotel in Chicago.

"The future chairmen of the Joint Chiefs of Staff must receive an education that exposes them to the real society they are supposed to protect—a society in which Jews do not 'own all the banks and newspapers' and it would be irrelevant if they did," he said.

Mikva also proposed that the Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) be expanded and revitalized to add diversity to the officer ranks and reduce reliance on the service academies as the source of top leadership in the military.

"The cadets at the service academies are different in tem-

perament, background and ideology from the average college student or average American. Our top military leaders must reflect the thinking of the entire nation, not just the thinking at West Point, Annapolis and the Air Force Academy," Mikva said.

He said that the ROTC programs should be headquartered near, but not on college campuses, and would be attractive to students because they would help offset the rising costs of higher education.

Mikva stressed that a competent, well-trained reserve program would be in step with the American tradition of a citizen Army and would cut defense spending because it would reduce the need for a large, standing Army.

He concluded by quoting James Madison, who wrote that a standing military force "is a dangerous, at the same time that it may be a necessary, provision."

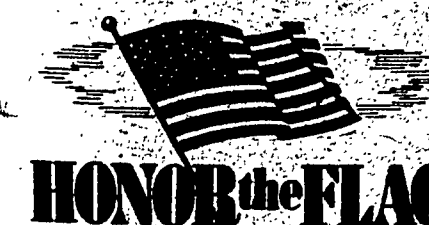

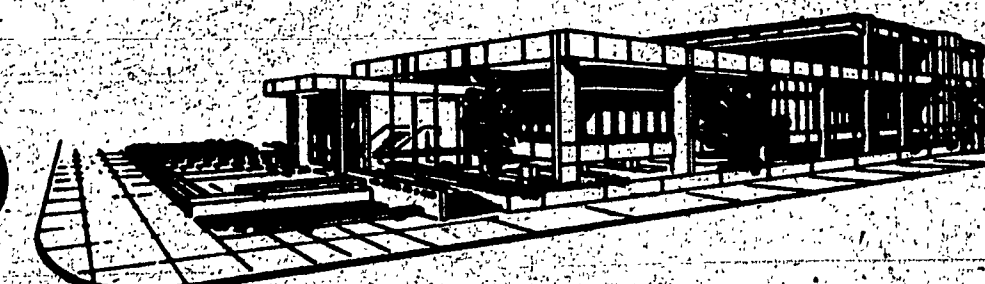

Centel reports higher earnings

Central Telephone & Utilities today reported higher earnings for the 12 months and third quarter ended Sept. 30.

Primary earnings per average common share increased to \$208 for the latest 12 months, compared with \$185 for the same year-ago period. Net income advanced 15.6% to \$40,693,000.

Third quarter primary earnings were 49 cents per average common share, up from 44 cents in 1973, despite a 6.1% increase in shares outstanding. New income rose 18.3% to \$9,879,000.

Third quarter operating revenues were \$86,124,000. Telephone operating revenues advanced 16.1% over the same year-ago period, electric revenues were up 8.3% and natural gas, 14.7%.

Robert P. Reuss, president and chief executive officer, said new telephone installations, registering a 7.3% annual growth rate, were below 1973 levels "but still very acceptable in light of current economic conditions." Telephone toll message volumes were 10.2% ahead of the same 1973 quarter.

The company noted that two recent Colorado electric power rate increases, amounting to \$1.4 million, will substantially offset higher costs of purchased power.

Natural gas rate increases in 31 Nebraska communities are expected to add \$250,000 in additional annual revenues. CTU's gas division anticipates approval of another \$400,000 in new rates during the fourth quarter.

Telephone rate cases filed earlier this year, totaling \$2.4 million, are pending in two states, Minnesota and Missouri.

Village seeks regulation of gas station ads

Niles trustees are considering an ordinance which will regulate outdoor signs for gas advertising in gas stations.

Motorists complain that some outdoor gas signs do not coincide with the pump price, which must reflect the state tax. Others state that the gas price is listed on the big station signs but the added tax is posted in lettering too small for the motorist to read until he has pulled into the station.

"We consider this to be deceptive advertising," said Frank Wagner, Director of the Consumer Fraud Division in Niles.

A survey of towns neighboring Niles, said Wagner, indicated that few have any type of ordinance regulating size of let-

"family" has been alerted to the incident and agreed the composite sketch of the attacker would be published in the school newspaper. He added more details of police will patrol the forest preserve area. He also noted the hourly bus routes would be rescheduled so they will frequent the area when students go to and from classes.

In other actions a report on the auto tech program will be announced at the next meeting. The faculty curriculum committee is waiting for additional information from teacher, Jim Kallas. He told The Bugle Newspaper all information requested had been submitted.

A tabling motion for a \$10,000 appropriation for a management committee study of personnel, curriculum and other areas of the college, was approved by a 6 to 1 vote.

A second study for a traffic light in front of the school will be undertaken jointly with neighbor, Crane Packing. The first state estimate of \$100,000 for the light plus widening of the street was considered prohibitive.

Condolences to the Cathleen Arns family, concerning the death of their daughter in an auto accident in Niles, was resolved by the entire board. Mrs. Arns is assistant vice president of curriculum and instruction for vocational programs.

The Spring school election will extend voting hours to 8 p.m. to enable religious Jewish residents time to vote after their Sabbath ends.

A report on the upcoming year's 5th anniversary celebration of the college was outlined. Trustee Flynn, while not objecting to the program, said the school has many needs and money shouldn't be spent on frivolous matters. It was also suggested the year's program should focus on the future campus, rather than dwell on the past.

Re-bidding for the printing contract for 12 issues of the student newspaper resulted from the Board's rejection of the 3rd lowest bid of about \$6,000, recommended by the people involved with The Planet, the student newspaper. A local Skokie company was selected because of the close proximity to the school, while the lowest bid was rejected because it came from a company in Palos. Because technicalities were not spelled out, the board will seek new bids.

tinger for gas price and tax. Of the towns surveyed, Des Plaines, Arlington Heights, Park Ridge, Morton Grove, Wheeling, Hoffman Estates, Elk Grove Village, Lincolnwood, Palatine, Skokie, Mt. Prospect, Glenview, Schaumburg, and Northbrook, only the last five have village ordinances regarding sale of gas.

"Only a few have any kind of enforceable ordinance, whereby they regulate the size of the sign itself or the size of the lettering . . . none of the ordinances are exactly what we are seeking."

Niles aims for an ordinance which would make signs uniform -- with a price, noting addition of tax in letters legible to passing motorists, or a total price stating inclusion of sales tax. There may even be the probability, noted Wagner, "of no outdoor signs . . . that depends upon the Board of Trustees."

Wagner has also spoken with gas station operators in Niles. "Of 9 stations selected at random of the 30 stations in Niles," he said, "about half stated that they would like to see the same price on the sign as on the pumps." Other operators indicated they preferred gas advertising to remain as it is presently.

"In face of the recent ups and downs in gas prices," stated Wagner, "gas stations carry different prices for gas. It is only fair that the motorist be aware of the total gas price before he pulls into the station of his choice."

Some gas station operators don't like outdoor signs, said Wagner, who himself was of the opinion that the huge signs definitely do not add to the ecology of the environment.

Only those stations who already have outdoor signs will be required to make their advertising uniform, dependent upon the wording of the ordinance. Other stations would be expected to conform to the proposed ordinance with regard to future outdoor ads.

The village ordinance would be enforced, if set to law, possibly under the licensing department or under the Division of Signs in the Building Dept. Following passage of the ordinance, station operators will receive a copy of the ordinance. A specified time in which to conform to the village ordinance will be allowed, after which time inspectors will verify requirements of outdoor ads.

"By the 1979-80 school year, it would probably be possible to accommodate our total enrollment in two high schools, if our enrollment projections hold up," Gibbs said.

The board's action, however, "did not in any way identify" which school might be considered for closing, board president Shirley Garland said. "This is a district operation," she said. Six district residents who spoke at the meeting, however, mentioned the rumored closing of Niles' East High School, Niles and Lincoln ave., Skokie. The other schools are Niles North, 9800 Lawler, and Niles West, Oakton st. and Edens Expressway.

Dissenting board member Evelyn Rosenzweig moved to force immediate action on improvement of the swimming pool and other life safety measures at Niles East. The improvements sought by Rosenzweig were part of a site and facilities committee report recommending about \$2.9 million in physical improvements to the district's three high schools, and part of a group of proposed life safety improvements that have been before the board since April, 1973.

The board, however, defeated Rosenzweig's motion on a 5 to 2 vote to direct the district's architect to proceed with planning pool improvements at a cost of approximately \$35,000. Her motion to implement other improvements at Niles East died for lack of a second.

A professional demographic study of the district has been requested to aid the board in projecting space needs and it should be completed by Feb. 1, Gibbs said.

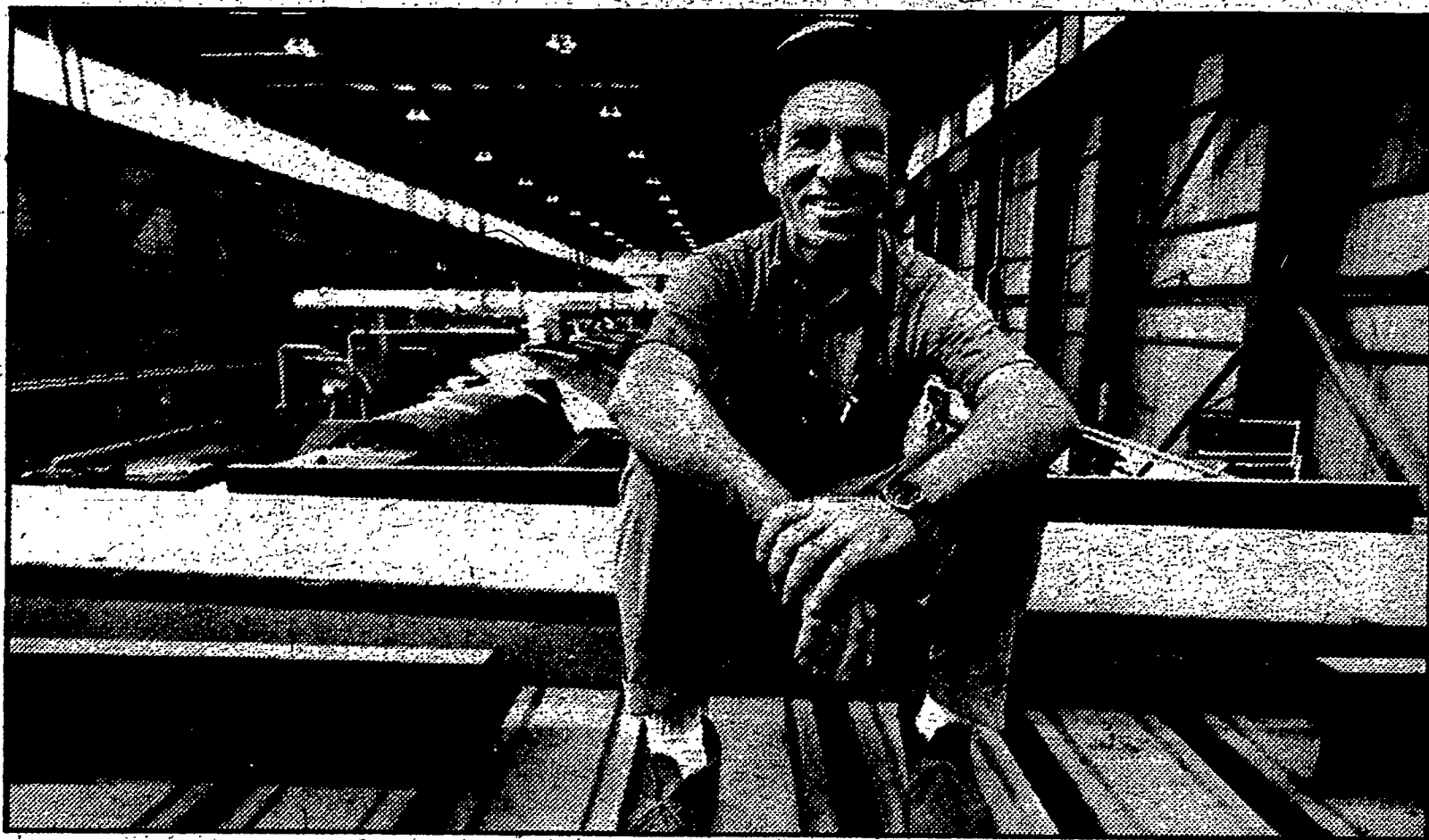

'73 park referendum budget favorable

A presentation and review of the Save Open Space Committee budget and expenditures was made during the Tuesday night Niles Park Board meeting.

Budgeted under the Nov.

Former Park Commissioner honored posthumously by Board

Niles Park Commissioners honored the memory of former Commissioner William Dressel with a resolution set into the Park District records at Tuesday night's board meeting.

Mr. Dressel served as a commissioner of the Niles Park District, appointed Apr. 19, 1960 and served until May 11, 1961. While active in the Park District, he also served as Chairman of the Policy Committee and Chairman of the Buildings and Grounds Committee.

Mr. Dressel died Nov. 13, 1974 at Boynton Beach, Florida.

1973 Park Referendum an amount of \$1,849,227.26 has been spent of the \$2,200,000 set for land acquisition, leaving a balance of \$350,772.74.

Development expenditures of \$223,032.41 of the \$515,000 allowed under the Referendum allows for a balance of \$291,967.59.

During a preceding discussion, Park attorney Gabriel Berrafato informed the Board their decision would set a precedent. However, he said, "Knowing that the property would be of no particular use to the Park District at this particular time, a decision to license, not lease, the property could be justified if proper steps were made to insure protection and maintenance of the property pending return to the Park District, and the income would be welcome to the Park District."

Comrs. Walter Beusse and Jack Leske opposed the opinion.

Al Bremer, 14, of 8144 N. Ozark, was awarded a tackle box as third place winner.

Park Director Bill Hughes was present to verify claims by the winning contestants. Requests to see the fish were bypassed, due no doubt to the time lapse between Derby and Park Board meeting.

"We promised residents we are going to use this land as a park," said Beusse, who said further, that "we may also jeopardize (by approval of the rental request) any future grant application the Park District may wish to make in the future."

Comr. Jack Leske, referring to himself as being tight-fisted when it came to finances, said, "It's not worth it. We would be misrepresenting our responsibilities if we either leased or licensed this property."

In voting for approval of the request, Comr. Jones looked with favor on using the rental monies in "other needed areas." She recommended that "the licensing be tried on an experimental basis."

In other business, park commissioners concurred to hold Park District elections jointly with village elections, next Apr. 15.

...motioned to table a recommendation to replace the ranch type wood fence at Grennan Heights Park until after the Annual Parks Conference. "It may be," said Comr. Leske, "we may be advised of a better fencing."

Park Attorney Berrafato reported purchase of Golden Triangle has been completed. He also stated that no reply was forthcoming as yet to the Park District request for a new appraisal for removal of bodies from the Jewish (Shermer) cemetery site.

Continued from MG P.1 consideration" by state officials. It probably would not be processed by federal officials before February at the earliest, Randall said.

The state has received requests for \$17.5 million in open space grants but has only \$3.6 million available, Randall said.

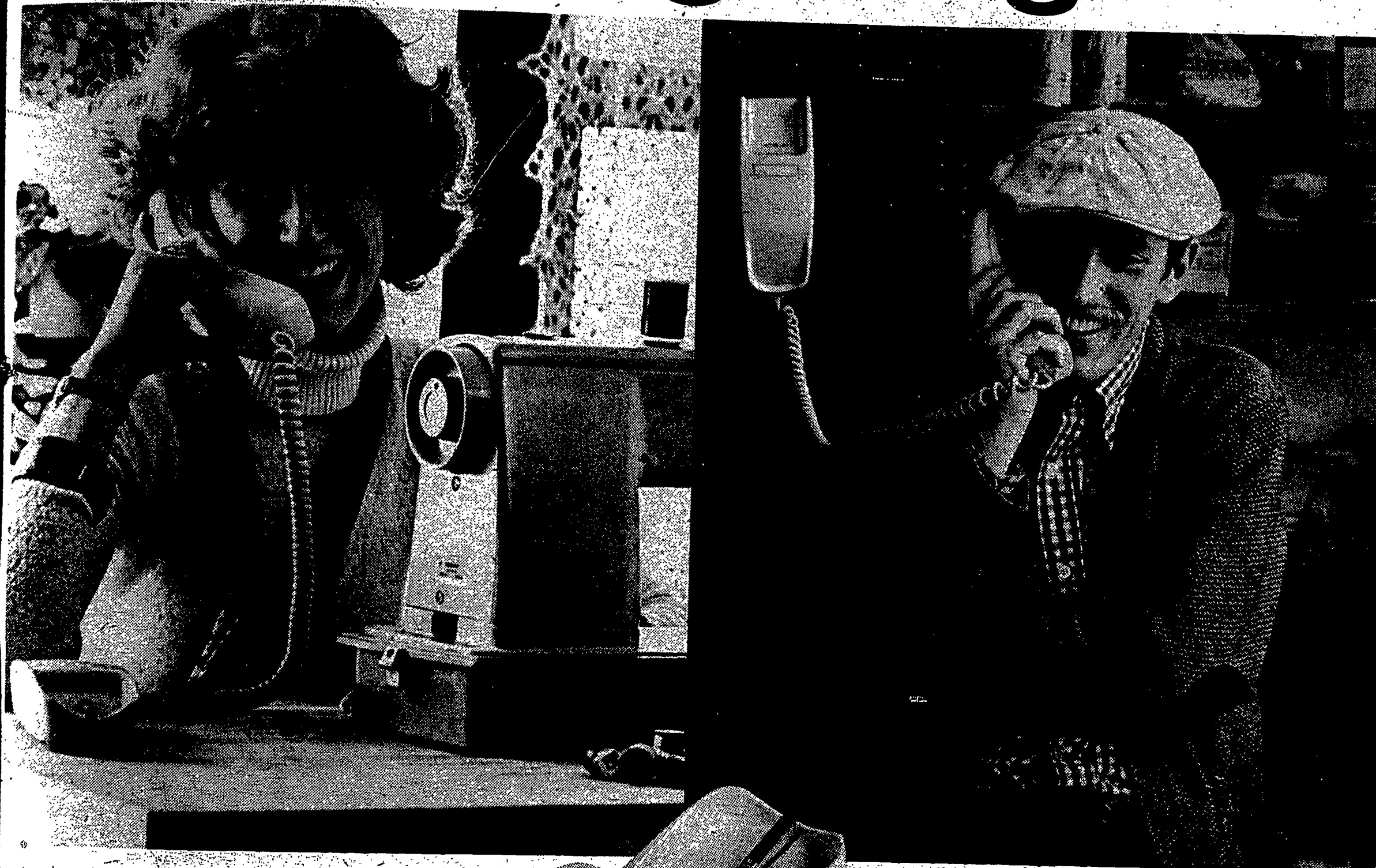
No building would be allowed on the property if the open space grant were received, according to Max W. Matz, a landscape architect with Recreational Planning Association of Glenview and a consultant to the park board.

The park district's original application for Bureau of Outdoor Recreation funds was for 14.2 acres of the site, rather than the present 10.4 acres, Randall said. The original application was unacceptable because of park district plans for a community center on the southern portion of the property, he said.

The park board has approved a \$2.9 million park development plan that includes four outdoor tennis courts, two baseball diamonds, and a community center housing an indoor ice rink. The property was purchased this year for \$1 million from Shaf Home Builders, Inc., 6834 Dempster, Morton Grove. The purchase price, established in a Cook County Circuit Court condemnation suit, is now being appealed by Shaf Home Builders.

Village and park district representatives have been unable to agree on whether the administrative complex proposed by the village should be on that site.

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
