

Postmaster Don Swanson of Morton Grove reminded customers that on Nov. 17 the U.S. Postal Service discontinued delivering mail on which there is no

Postmaster Swanson said the new policy was instituted because of the high costs being incurred by the Postal Service in its attempt to deliver such mail. Officials estimate that such costs total approximately \$18 million

In announcing the new policy last month. Postmaster General E. T. Klassen said 'it is unfair to burden the vast majority of mailers with costs created by the few who mail without prepayment of postage.

Letters now mailed without postage will be returned to sender if there is a return address, or to the dead letter office, instead of being delivered to the address as postage due mail as has been the custom: Postal officials will attempt to find the sender of unpaid mail and return it for a slight fee. if there is no return address.

"Naturally we realize that someone could inadvertently forget to put a stamp on a letter or that a stamp could come off prior to cancellation, so we urge mailers to be sure to include a correct return address on their mail," Postmaster Swanson said.

State Police offer suggestions on winter driving

Drivers must take the time to make their car ready for the hard winter season ahead. The first item on anyone's list should be the cooling system. To be adequate, the engine should be protected to from 15 to 30 degrees below zero. All hoses should be nspected for wear or cracks. Not to he overlooked is the car's exhaust system. It isn't necessary for the muffler to be noisy before it becomes dangerous. A small hole anywhere in the system is all that is necessary to allow deadly carbon monoxide fumes to seep into a closed up vehicle.

Another important item on your check list is the condition of your car's tires. We all know that snow and ice can be tricky surfaces to for just short periods of time to drive on; add worn tires and the problem is compounded. Snow vival tires are a must for good traction. Remember too that studded tires are permitted only between Nov. 15 and Apr. 1 of each year.

Getting the car ready doesn't end with vehicle maintenance. It includes everyday things like cleaning all of the snow and ice from the windshield, window surfaces, and outside rear view mirrors to prevent an obstruction of the driver's view. Mikva calls for revamped

Congressman-elect Abner J. Mikva said today that the antisemitic remarks by the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff are a symptom of the one-dimensional education given by the service

Mikva urged that Gen. George S. Brown be replaced as chairman and proposed the appointment of a blue-ribbon panel of educators to broaden the curricula of the service academies, which he criticized for being out of touch with the rest of American society.

"General Brown must be replaced because what he said represents how he feels. He cannot change his attitude at this time of his life and President Ford cannot reprimand him out of it,' Mikva said at Saturday's conference of the Jewish Labor Committee at the Pick-Congress Hotel in Chicago.

"The future chairmen of the Joint Chiefs of Staff must receive an education that exposes them to the real society they are supposed it may be a necessary, proto protect--a society in which Jews do not 'own all the banks and newspapers' and it would be

"The way we worked to build the Zion Nuclear Power Station saved over \$100 million."

"That's one of the ways we're keeping costs just as low as we can"

Dick Cosaro is chief project engineer at our Zion nuclear station.

"When you have a project this big, your budget has to have some give and take But you do have a set of standards to go by. When we build a power station, we measure the cost of labor in terms of man-hours per kilowatt of capacity. The typical figure for a big nuclear generating station is over 8 manhours per kilowatt. But the figure at Zion was only 5.2. That comes out to a saving of over 100 million dollars.

"People ask me how we did this. "Well, for one thing, it wasn't by cutting corners. Part of the answer, of course, came from good engineering and smart planning. from using standardized procedures and pre-built modules when we could.

But there were no technological breakthroughs, there were no miracles. The real secret was just plain hard work. Just a lot of people doing the best they can to get the job done.

"It took over five years and at times as many as 1,850 dedicated construction workers, technicians and supervisors to complete this job. Five years. That's a pretty fair chunk of a man's life.

"But with so many construction jobs coming in at record high prices these days, well, it sure feels good to bring in a big project the way we brought in Zion."

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
